A relevant issue which both towns should tackle concerns holding public meetings in comparatively private surroundings.

In Morton Grove the very routine meetings go on without a hitch, with seldom any controversy, and without even a dissenting vote. The very nature of the outward agreement of seven officials, week after week, month after month, manifests the meetings have been ironed out before meeting time.

In Niles the sound and fury of public officials can be heard on Saturday mornings when the officials settle their problems before their Tuesday. And while Niles still has occasional give and take at the Tuesday meetings, still the spark of controversy is left on the floor at the Saturday meetings at the Public Works Building.

Even though a full airing of all problems on meeting night would lengthen meetings, perhaps three-fold, nevertheless, the public meeting is where all shades of argument and discussion should take place.

In Morton Grove, Mayor Schreiber was a former member of school district 70, which in the past notoriously sat in private session, when they had a sticky problem confronting them.

Perhaps the idea of placing your best foot forward may be uppermost in public officials' minds, but it shows they have little faith in the democratic practice of holding public meetings in public.

To see the road show of a well rehearsed production, which is what these pre-planned and pre-decided meetings are, does not give the voters a chance to see their public officials in action. To merely see them vote, without any previous discussion, or at most minimal query, means they're well-cued in, they have nothing to offer, may have been led in private by others, or don't care to show their abilities publicly.

Mr. Voter has a right to a full hearing of all issues, and to a complete picture of the officials who represent them. Hearing only the finished product is cheating the very people who place these officials in office.

This is a genuine issue, and is one which should be thoroughly aired during the pre-election discussions.

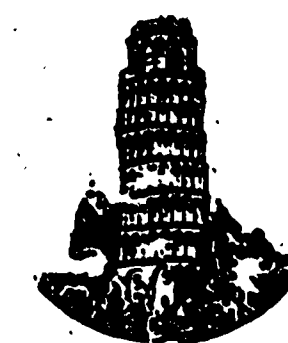

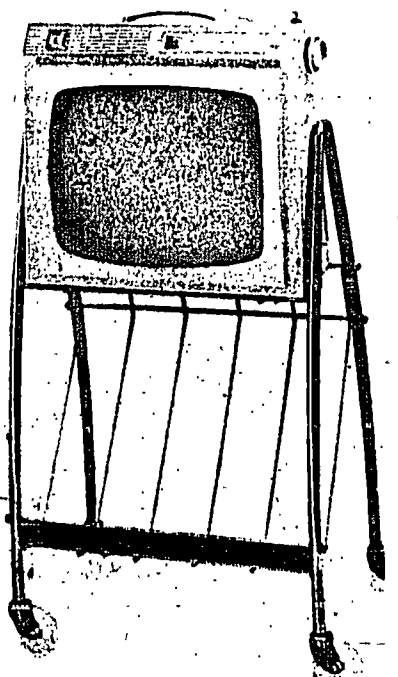

Notre Dame Mardi Gras Carnival Feb. 26

Mardi Gras will be celebrated at Notre Dame High School for Boys in Niles on Friday, February 26, with all the modern pomp and color reserved for the merrymaking occasion which traditionally precedes the Lenten season.

Notre Dame's Mardi Gras will be a day-long event beginning at 2 p.m. and ending at 11 p.m. Festivities designed for family enjoyment have been planned around the Mardi Gras carnival theme, a custom popular in the United States since 1766.

Billed as one of the largest single fund-raising events of the year at Notre Dame, the Mardi Gras is held annually to raise money for the Holy Cross Foreign Mission Society. Last year more than \$4,000 was donated to the foreign missions from Mardi Gras proceeds. The Niles' High School has been one of the nation's leading contributors to mission hospitals, leprosariums, schools and churches in South America, Africa and Pakistan, which are staffed by Holy Cross Fathers and Brothers, the same order which teaches at Notre Dame High School for Boys. Each year the event is planned and sponsored as a joint effort by the Fathers' Club, the Mothers' Club and the Student Council. All 1,500 Notre Dame students who live in ten surrounding suburbs will be taking some part in the family-styled event, according to a Student Council spokesman.

Games of skill, including basketball shot, sponge throw, rifle shot, balloon dart, and other games will be held in the school gymnasium, gaily decorated for the occasion. Other special attractions include a fish dinner served in the cafeteria from 5 to 7 p.m. (\$1.25 for adults, \$.75 for children); and a hootenanny-variety show held in the school theatre.

Admission to the Mardi Gras is free.

Nilehi West Hosts Regional Basketball Tourney

The remaining tickets are divided between the participating schools each evening, according to the school population. Student tickets are on sale for 50¢ if purchased at their school. Adult tickets will be \$1.25. Adult tickets and all tickets purchased at the door will be \$1.25.

East Maine Caucus Meets February 26

Delegates to the East Maine Township General Caucus will be voting on important proposed bylaw changes at their next meeting, which will be held on Friday evening, February 26, in the auditorium of the East Maine Junior High School. The changes, if accepted by the delegates, will incorporate Elementary School District 63 into the Caucus. The Caucus will then be able to nominate candidates for election to the Board of Education of Elementary School District 63. The Caucus presently nominates candidates to the Board of Education of High School District No. 207.

The Nominating Committee will give their report on the nominees for the elementary school board. The nominees will be introduced, and will be allowed an opportunity to speak and answer questions relating to their candidacy. may be accompanied by a statement, not to exceed 500 words, of the qualifications of the nominee. Delegates will then select the two nominees that the Caucus will support for election to the two vacancies on the Elementary District 63 Board of Education.

Another Morn 'nother Yawn..

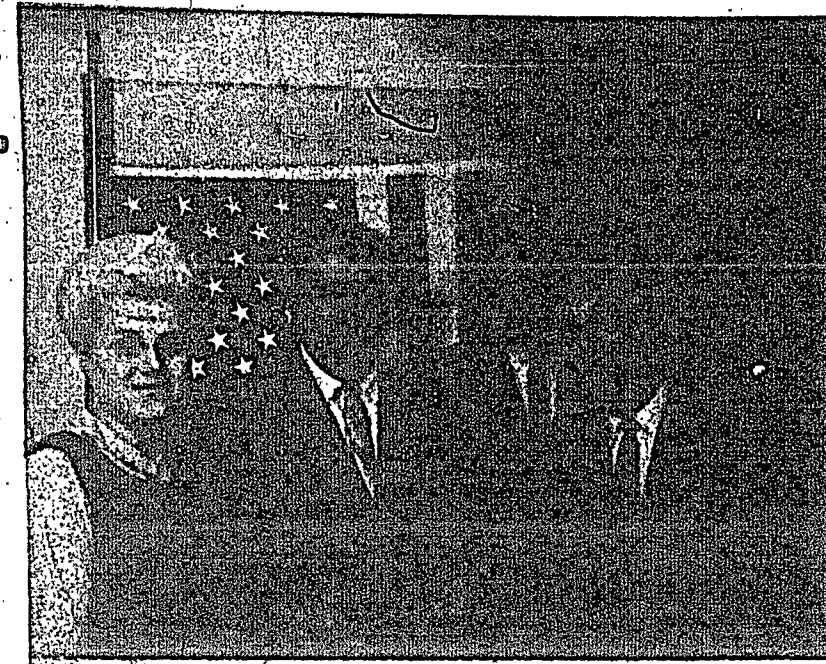


