

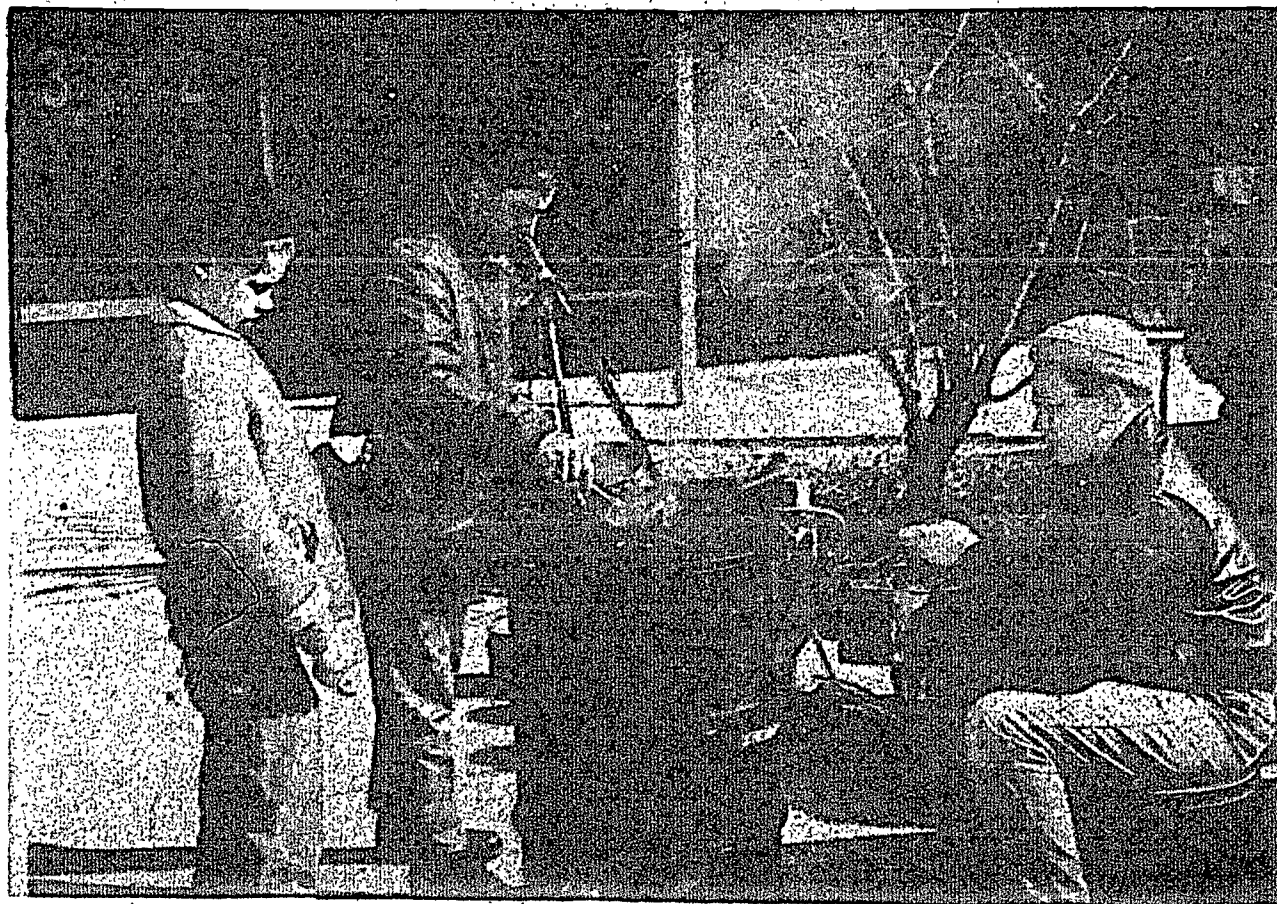

be measured in dollars. He was in the very unenviable position of serving in a school district which underwent violent change. Unlike many school districts the transition from a sleepy district to a volcanic monster in a few short years placed a gargantuan task on Bagg's shoulders.

The influx of the apartments in the district with its attendant children, and few tax dollars, made a mountainous job greater. With the demands for better education, with little money, from a very young and education-conscious area, it placed Bagg in a position quite unlike one in surrounding school districts. Had he joined a more stable district, he likely would have remained in his post. But in highly-charged district 63 his position became untenable.

While we've looked on many past testimonial dinners in the community with disfavor here's one man who deserves recognition for the tremendous effort he gave to the school district. We're hopeful his many friends will join together for such an effort.

election for a third term in April's election due to what he terms "business reasons".

The withdrawal of both Bagg and Epstein from official district 63 policy-making will close a chapter in the district's history, which often manifested heated controversy during the troublesome years when the district grew from two to eight schools.

Three years ago, when Epstein battled the Board and the superintendent, the school board actively sought the defeat of Epstein at the polls. But when Epstein triumphed on election day he returned to the Board and vowed he would fight the election of these very same men.

The following years new members were elected to the Board. They were more progressively-oriented in their educational policies. Complementing Epstein's thinking on many matters, the new board administered policy which formerly had resided with the superintendent.

During past years, in the pre-Epstein days, and when he was generally a minority of one, Bagg was seldom opposed. Many contended he created, administered and executed policy, while the school board stood aside.

When the new board members gained office the power clash became more obvious. Whereas in past years Bagg dominated the Board, now the Board was directing Bagg. Many clashes in public, as well as behind the scenes resulted. Obviously, this different view of administration was a factor in the resulting resignation.

When Epstein became president of the school board, he assumed a more conciliatory attitude, and ironically, became one of the main supporters of the superintendent.

However, Bagg was a marked man, and his days were numbered when some of the new board members assumed their new roles. Board member Shelly Nathanson showed the most militant anti-Bagg attitude when he first moved onto the Board, disagreeing philosophically with the superintendent. Obviously the entire history of conflict is significant in understanding Tuesday night's official resignation.

During the past three years the Board members represented a group educational background comparable to the high school boards. The board includes an accountant, lawyer, chemist, social psychologist, public relations man and educational writer among its members. The very nature of their backgrounds indicates independent actions by Board members which would no longer be dominated by the superintendent. And since the highly-trained superintendent had an equal background, and perhaps believed his specialized knowledge in his field made encroachments on his thinking, which likely resulted in an intolerable position. Such a running conflict resulted in Tuesday's resignation.

Bagg has served in the school district since 1957 when he was principal at Oak School. He became superintendent the following year and headed a school district which grew from two to eight schools in six years, and grew from a few hundred students to its present 5,767.

"Ray" C. Eagan was Park District Representative at the first meeting with the Niles Citizens' Committee, where plans were formulated to hold Niles Park District Elections in conjunction with the Village of Niles Elections, making it more convenient for all residents to vote in the coming Election. There will be a total of twenty (20) Precincts available for Niles Park District residents, easily accessible to every voter in the District. This is a far cry from the two Precincts available when "Ray" C. Eagan was elected four years ago.

Eagan To Seek Re-Election As Park Commissioner

(News Release)

"Ray" Eagan announced yesterday, his intentions to become a candidate for re-election to the position of Niles Park Commissioner.

"Ray" or "Eagan", as many of his friends call him, will have completed his first four year term as Niles Park District Commissioner on May 1st of this year, and although these four years have seen the Niles Park District progress more than in the entire past ten years, "Ray" feels that the years just ahead have more potential than ever before. He also feels that his experience during these past four progressive years has broadened his knowledge of the real needs of the Niles Park District, and he would welcome the opportunity to offer this knowledge and experience to the residents of the Niles Park District to work for their benefit.

"Ray" has been a resident of Niles for fifteen years and has fulfilled many civic obligations, always with the thought in mind to make Niles a better place in which to live.

"Ray" Eagan's aggressive and untiring leadership is attested to by the fact that during his four years as Commissioner of the Niles Park District, he was elected by his fellow Commissioners as Vice-President, three years, and President of the Board during the year in which the new Recreation Center and Swimming Pool were constructed.

"Ray" C. Eagan has been employed by the Illinois Bell Telephone Company for the past 25 years, the last 17 of which have been in various supervisory capacities. He is also a member of St. John Brebeuf Parish and the Holy Name Society, North American Martyrs, Knights of Columbus (4th Degree), the Telephone Pioneers of America, and a veteran of World War II with five years active service in the U.S. Army Signal Corps.

Other outstanding accomplishments which occurred during the past four years are:

1. First successful Bond Referendum in the history of the Niles Park District at low interest rates.

2. Niles Park District receives a Grant from the Federal Government of \$28,800, which is only the second Grant made in the State of Illinois.

3. The annexation of the Golf-Mill Shopping Center into the Niles Park District.

4. Employee Benefit & Hospital Insurance Program approved for employees of the Park District.

5. Permission received to use five acres of Cook County Forest Preserve District property at Howard and Nordica for Niles Park District recreation area, and also Forest Preserve property adjoining Jozwiak Park.

6. Many new activities added to Park Programs for both "Teens and Adult residents".

7. Four new Park sites purchased totalling approximately 13 acres.

8. Nine new areas annexed into the Park District.

9. Maintenance of Low Tax Rate throughout all of this growth.

Left Hand: 11 Possible Park Candidates ; Veto 2 Park Commissioners As Employees; Niles Days Confusion

As of Tuesday 11 petitions have been picked up by park board commissioner candidates, and three of them have been filed.

It's interesting there is very little competition for the village board openings, while so many are vying for the two park openings. It might be assumed the chance of upsetting the Blase-incumbent ticket is slim, and thus Nilesites desiring to serve in public office are turning to the park board. Or perhaps, Nilesites may feel the village is moving forward at a very successful gallop, while the need for ever-increasing park recreation needs never ends.

Two likely candidates for the park board, Jerry Sullivan, and June Annas, of Jonquil Terrace, spearheaded the assault on the swimming pool issue in the election two years ago. Sullivan, in particular, aroused the natives with his questioning the feasibility of the aluminum pool. Mrs. Annas, a very articulate young lady, was also concerned about the pool, and made the park commissioners promise they would not close their minds to enclosing the pool for all-year-round use.

Two years ago the attack was aimed in particular at Lou Schreiner. Many believed Lou was considering retiring from the Board, but after Sullivan's attack on the park board, Lou decided to seek re-election, and chose to run for the same six year term opposing Sullivan. Schreiner's victory was accepted by many that the park board's good intentions were supported by residents and that Sullivan's charges were unfounded.

If Sullivan and (or) Annas move onto the park board with Schreiner the incendiary meetings may leave smoke signals wafting from the recreation center.

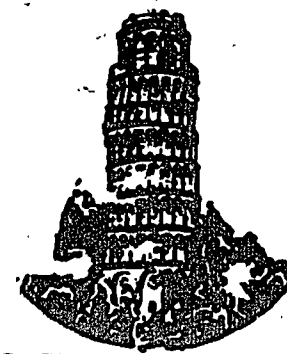

New park recreation director Weiss decried the many relatives who worked in various posts in Morton Grove, one of many reasons which prompted him to consider the job most difficult. Former Niles director Julie Pandera often bemoaned this similar problem here. Now, Weiss moved into the Niles post, and the same old problem persists.

At a recent meeting two commissioners' daughters names were submitted for hiring. As agreed by recent policy one veto from any commissioner would eliminate relative-candidates. Keith Peck, who is running for the village board vetoed both candidates, while the remaining four park com-

District 64 Vote Loses

Voters in Park Ridge Elementary School District 64 Saturday defeated a \$1,550,000 bond issue referendum for school construction.

The vote was 2,020 to 1,896. The money was sought for a three-year construction program. Additions would have been built in 1965 to Carpenter, Edison and Madison elementary schools and to the Emerson Junior High School.

In 1966, a new school was to have been built to replace Oakton School. The following year, plans called for another addition to Emerson Junior High and additional facilities to meet growing enrollment in the district, said Blair Plimpton, district superintendent.

During the 1961 election these same "political babes" condemned their opponents for business ventures within our village however, within one year after the election various "politico" high in the echelon of our village government became involved themselves. We of the Niles Voters Party do not condemn the present administration for the dissimulating tendencies toward their own platform however we as Niles Citizens cannot condone their different attitudes in policy.

We of the Niles Voters Party feel the Village of Niles has spent entirely too much of the taxpayers money on unsuccessful ventures which "profit a few but tax the many". Niles established a "village court" which was rammed through by referendum before the citizenry had an opportunity of just counsel to decide such an act which was created under the supposition of "village betterment" even though the local newspapers as well as the Chicago newspapers condemned the present administration. On the village court situation, we find 70% of the People of Illinois in favor of the Blue Ballot to solidify all courts, and yet Niles continued on page 12

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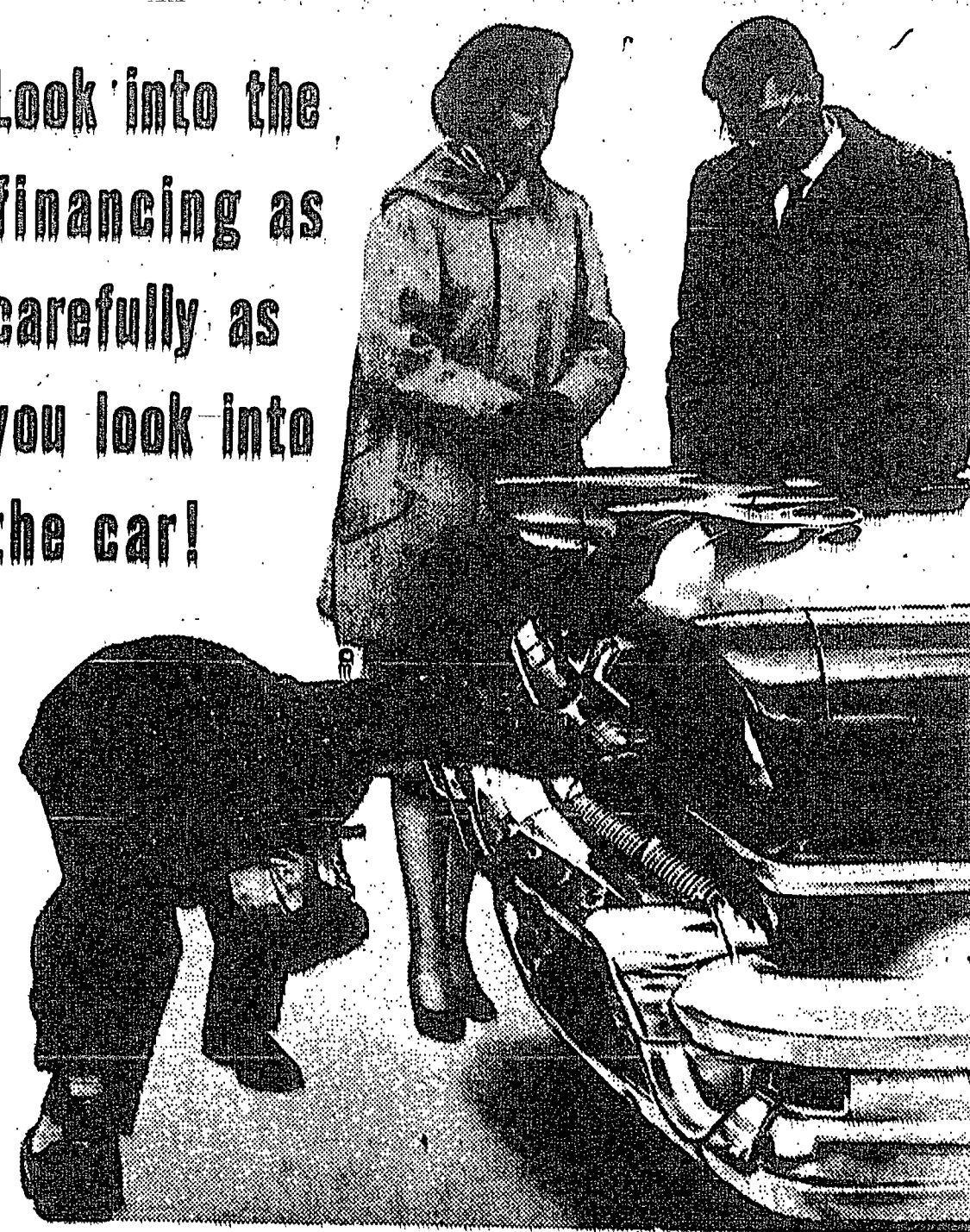
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Another Woman's Club Host Husbands 'nother Yawn..

Maine Students Complete Computer Course

Eight Maine East high school students completed a three-week course in computer fundamentals at the Illinois Institute of Technology computation center. Purpose of the course was to introduce them to an algebraic computer, known as Fortran.

Competition for the course among Chicago area students is keen. It will be followed in February and March by a second course introducing an assembly language, known as Map, for computer programming.

William T. Will, chairman of the business education department at East, said that students who complete these courses "join an elite group of rapidly growing numbers who can use the computer as a problem-solving tool."

The program is a significant effort in the Chicago area to begin to meet the demand for thousands of people trained in computer systems and processing data technology. Will explained.
