Meet Candidates For Niles Village Election

FORWARD ERA PARTY

With the April 20th Village election rapidly approaching, the Forward Era Party will spotlight each of its candidates in the next few weeks. Thus the voter will be better acquainted with the people who make up the ticket.

In 1957, Robert H. Wentz moved his family to Niles... and things haven't been the same for him since. At that time he was a man, like thousands of others, looking for the benefits of suburban living for his wife and children. Now, eight years later, Bob is seeking his second term as a Niles Trustee. It has been a busy eight years for him.

Shortly after moving to Niles, Bob became active in the Grennan Heights Homeowners Association. The western portion of Grennan Heights had many unpaved streets. Bob, with several neighbors, spearheaded a drive to get the Village Board to pass a special assessment for the paving. His work in getting this project successfully completed whetted his interest in general village civic affairs.



In 1959 Bob Wentz was appointed to the Niles Zoning Board of Appeals. Shortly thereafter, he became secretary to the Board with duties of keeping the minutes of the meetings as well as notifying all adjacent property owners about a parcel of land to be rezoned. He did this very diligently since he felt that property owners had a right to be fully informed about an impending zoning change. Also while he was a member of the Zoning Board, the antiquated zoning ordinance of 1937 was revised and updated. He remained with the Board until his election as Village Trustee in 1961.

The decision to run for office in 1961 was a big step for Bob. He was a comparative newcomer with little experience in politics. However, he joined with the New Era Party in promising to improve the Village. After conducting an exhaustive campaign and making his views known to the people, Bob Wentz was elected Trustee.

His record in office is excellent. As Chairman of the Water & Sewer Committee, he has been instrumental in initiating many of the flood control measures. He has also served as Chairman of the Plats, Subdivisions & Street Lighting Committee. Working closely with the Public Works department, Bob has done much to improve the operations of the department. Furthermore, he has been responsible for obtaining much of the new equipment which is so necessary for it to function properly.

Bob served in the Coast Guard in the European Theatre during World War II. After the war he was graduated from Elmhurst College with a Bachelor of Science degree. He is employed as a highway engineer by the Cook County Department of Highways.

He and his wife Marilyn have been married for 15 years. They have two children: Richard, 14, who attends Maine East High School, and Renee, 8, a student at the Oak School. The

family attends the Niles Community Church.

The Trustee job has kept him very busy for the last four years, but he does manage to find time for hunting up antiques and stamp collecting. His wife, Marilyn, is active with the Niles Garden Club.

Bob Wentz is now a candidate for re-election with the Forward Era Party. He intends to continue the job that was started four years ago in improving and upgrading the Village of Niles.

The only non-incumbent member of the Forward Era Party is the nominee for Trustee, Keith Peck. However, Keith is far from a newcomer on the Niles scene. As a ten year resident, he qualifies as an old-timer in a village which has so many new inhabitants.

Keith was born 39 years ago, and served in the Navy during World War II. In 1948 he married Elsie, and they are now the proud parents of four boys ranging in age from 6 to 13.

While he was raising a family and working during the day, Keith attended Marquette University at night to obtain his Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering. He graduated with the highest scholastic average in his senior class as well as the highest average in his graduating class.

He has been employed by the Interstate Bakeries Corporation for 17 years and has worked his way up to his present position as Chief Plant Engineer.

Never one to be idle, Keith Peck has a long list of civic action in his background. He is a director of the board of the Kirk Lane Homeowners Association. He is a past president of



the Niles Police Pension Board. He was chairman of the Citizens for Better Parks which was instrumental in passing the referendum for the pool and recreation center. This interest in parks led him to run successfully for a 2 year term as Park Commissioner in 1963. His term will expire next month.

For nearly 6 years, Keith has been teaching Sunday School at the Niles Community Church. Well aware that a healthy body goes along with a healthy spirit, he has also been involved with the Little League Baseball. As either a coach or manager, he has been an active participant for 6 years.

Bob, 44, is keenly aware of the necessity of good government and is dedicated to the principles of the Niles Voters Party.

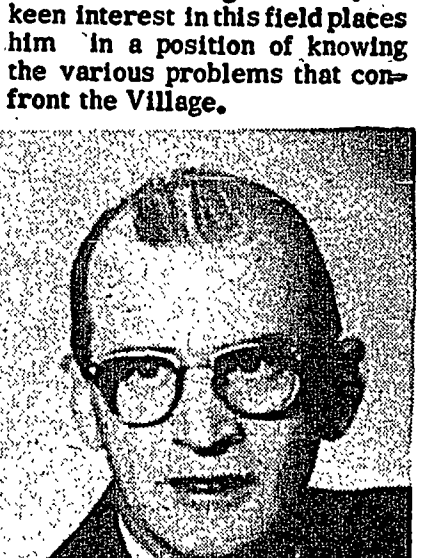

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From The Left Hand

In Sylvia McNair's eulogy at Monday's funeral of Shelly Nathanson she said of her fellow-school board member, "For two years he gave of his ebbing strength, joyfully... knowing he had a limited time to live.

"He packed more living in 36 years than many who live twice as long".

The Rabbi compared his premature death to that of an unfinished symphony. "But", he added, "it is better to have 'two parts' than none at all. He brought joy, serenity and guidance to many... he was an inspiration to all who knew him".

Nathanson, a two year member of school district 63's school board, knowingly lived with the burden of a fatal disease, and yet selflessly threw himself into school board work. Not too many months ago he went to California for cobalt treatments, returned home to Morton Grove, and served actively on the school board during these last weeks, even the visibly weakened by the disease and the treatments. He and his wife showed unbelievable courage.

Mrs. McNair, deeply moved by the loss of her two year friend, said the next school building in the district will be named in his memory.

It was John O'Hara, who may well have summed up the feeling of Nathanson's many friends. Writing of the premature death of young George Gershwin, O'Hara wrote, "George Gershwin died last week, but I don't have to believe it if I don't want to".

The passage of the Junior College referendum in the Palatine area the past week should give local residents pause to consider a similar movement in our area.

Last year Skokie led the Niles Township area in a vote against such an activity. Yet the need for education beyond the high school level in the coming years is paramount.

In an article Monday in Chicago's Daily News it cited the University of Illinois will only be taking students in the top half of their class within the next ten years, eventually restricting enrollment to the top quarter group.

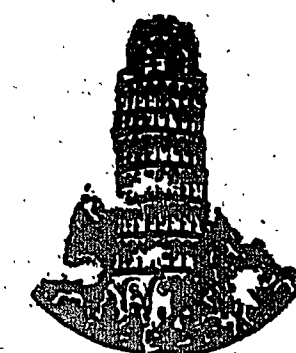
The phenomenal demand for college education in the next few years will make local public colleges as much of a necessity in the 70's, as is the high school need in the 60's.

Recently we were talking with one of Niles former trustees and mentioning how the annexation of the area north of Dempster and west of Milwaukee many years ago would have alleviated the great burden that school district now has. Foresight five years ago, would have resulted in controlling the zoning there, saving taxpayers hundreds of dollars yearly.

This foresight is the quality which is now necessary in viewing the college problem in the next decade. Many of our grammar school children may have

First Of 3 April Elections

Residents will head for the polls Tuesday to elect officials to the Township offices.

In Maine Township candidates of the Grass Roots Party charge the Republican incumbents on the GOP ticket conduct "hidden government", - i.e. they operate the township from homes and backroom offices.

The Grass Roots Party pledges all township functions will be consolidated in one place if their group gains office. They also chide the Republicans noting their ticket represents all persuasions of political allegiance.

Floyd Fulle, Republican committeeman contends this claim is "hogwash". Fulle states there are four Democratic Precinct captains on the Grass Roots ticket, three admitted Democrats and the other candidate has voted both ways during the past three years.

The incumbent Republicans include Supervisor, William C. Ziem, collector, M. H. Tuttle, clerk, Emil Bergman; assessor, James Parks; highway commissioner, Edward Koehler; auditors, Tom J. Montgomery, Harvey Frindt, and Phillip Raffae. All but Raffae are incumbents.

Grass Roots candidates include Supervisor, Kenneth D. Lindquist; collector, Allen Schwartz, present school board district 63 member; clerk, John Poeschl, former Niles trustee; assessor, John M. Roddy, of Morton grove; highway commissioner, Michael Provenzano of Niles; auditors, Clyde P. Stoller, Emil Fisher and William Levander.

In Niles Township national party influence is strong although national party labels are not being used.

The township Democratic organization has endorsed the Citizens Achievement Party headed by incumbent (and Nilesite) Walter Reschke.

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Letters From Al Green

Dear Sir:

A great deal has been said in recent weeks on the subject of "Conflict of Interest" but no one has defined this phrase. It is my opinion that this could be a situation where a public official could not discharge his duties properly because of his involvement with other public officials or employees of the Village.

I agree that it would be possible for such a situation to arise but this is very remote, and by restricting the local business and professional men from holding public office (which is what could happen if the so-called "Conflict of Interest" was pressed), you not only narrow the choice of political aspirants but also some of us who are not in the political arena may even restrict our community service as this may cast a shadow on the standards of public spirited citizens. In some instances, campaign issues are used for the advantage of a candidate without regard to its implications. This is a very unsavory situation, and can only lead to irreparable harm to the Village, its officials and political candidates.

Almost any political aspirant could be charged with conflict of interest as I know of no one who might not at some time or other perhaps deal with one of the village employees. On the other hand, I am aware of the fact that there could be conflict of interest but I feel that the benefits derived from good leadership far exceed any such remote possibility.

The basic elements of economics sets forth the fact that a profit must be made in business or the professions, and the economy of the entire country depends upon it. Always bear in mind that part time public officials must make a livelihood outside of their political realm as their compensation from the village is of a nominal nature. Therefore, it is not fair to restrict village officials from making a legitimate profit whether it be from outside sources or from village employees. It is to be expected that any public official will benefit to some extent in a business way from his political affiliations, and this will occur regardless of who is in office.

As an official of the Chamber, I feel that restricting any class of citizen from political office is uncalled for and discriminatory against the business and professional men whom I represent. In the past year, during my tenure of office, I have worked closely with the department heads of the Village and I have yet to see a situation where conflict of interest has arisen.

Niles Human Relations Council Features Shared Time Discussion

Last Thursday night, the Niles Human Relations Council held its third meeting and the subject was "shared time." This means that private and parochial high school students would be taking some of their subjects in the public high schools. The guest speakers were Reverend Robert Clark, Asst. Superintendent of Schools for the Archdiocese of Chicago, and Edward Keener, head of the Citizens Schools Committee and former Asst. Superintendent of public schools in Chicago (1948-1953), against the proposition.

"Shared time, or dual enrollment, as it is often called, does not mean a share of federal funds for parochial schools; there is no money given and no faculty exchanged. Students go to a public school for one, two or three classes. In America we have a monolithic structure of education. The schools are open to all people and this will not be a panacea to the problem, merely will help give the parents a choice in the education of their children. The plight of the parochial school education and its soaring costs, the hiring of lay teachers who cost more than the nuns and sisters should be considered. This plight affects the public schools, for there is a 140% capacity in the public high schools of Metropolitan Chicago and the parochial high school is necessary to relieve some

of the load of students," said Dr. Clark.

Dr. Clark agreed that the greatest objection was our constitutional right of separation of church and state, but at the same time offered that it was being done in many towns and cities already and it has been working very well in Evanston, our closest community of shared time. Taxes are paid by all the parents and they are entitled to the best education for their children. It has been decreed by the Attorney for the Department of Public Instruction, Dr. Clark said,

"Shared time will sound the death knell of public schools. Our early schools were church related and predominantly Protestant in character. Dissatisfaction developed with the religious influences in the schools as our population became more heterogeneous in religious beliefs. In the process of developing our public schools, we have created a philosophy of free public education. There are no objections to non-public schools as long as they teach the regular required subjects. They may also teach sectarian religious doctrines, provided their doctrines are not hostile to the public welfare. Non-public school pupils would be allowed to take certain courses in non-public church-related schools. This would be indirect aid, but, in the opinion of Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, 'What may not be done directly, may not be done indirectly.'"

Dr. Keener further stated that if Federal aid was given to private or parochial schools in any form, direct or indirect, couldn't there spring up special interest groups who would be induced to organize schools to teach their own beliefs and then expect the public schools to furnish the other subjects? These groups might include the John Birch Society, Democrats, Republicans, Trade Unions, Segregationists, Muslims and others.

The discussion period following the speakers was an excellent cross-view of the opinions most people feel, and hold toward sharing public education with parochial or private schooling. Some of the questions brought

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Niles Turns Down 9 Flat Request

Trustee Berkowsky requested the Niles Board of Trustees to withhold granting a permit to Chesterfield Builders for a 9-flat building, planned for the southeast corner of National and Greenleaf in the (already congested) area of Chesterfield Garden Estates. He asked for further investigation as to the parking facilities and the required side and backyard allotment. Trustee Berkowsky advised the board members that a candidate for trustee in the opposing party has been promising his future constituents that in the event of his election, the permit would be granted within a 1-5 days after the election. Therefore it was essential that the permit be withheld until the Zoning Board has had time to check all facilities. A nine flat building would be non-conforming with the existing properties there now and when the permit for multiple dwelling zoning was originally given Chesterfield Builders in 1960, it was understood that the same type of dwelling as now exists would be built on the property. The board would prefer to have the builder present himself to the zoning board and clarify exactly what his plans are. Even if refused his permit, the builder may take his case to court and if he conforms even to the barest minimum, he very likely may win his case. Therefore when Trustee Szymanski asked for a legal opinion of Village Attorney J. Gosciniak, Trustee Berkowsky protested on the grounds that such opinion might damage their case if it should be presented at court. The motion was seconded by Trustee Bruno and approved by the entire board.

A resolution defining the word "family" in the zoning ordinance was motioned for acceptance by Trustee Bruno and seconded by Trustee Wentz. Mayor Blase explained that as many as 3-4-5 unrelated persons (male or female) were renting apartments and causing disturbances to the village. "This was permitted by the zoning code, but as of now the word 'Family' has been reduced to two unrelated persons wishing to live in the same unit.

District 63 To Start Census

Plans have been completed for compiling the annual school census for 1965 for East Maine School District No. 63.

Census survey forms will be distributed through the various public and parochial schools involved in the district to verify current information beginning April 2, 1965. Following the return of these forms the various principles in each school will transfer information to the permanent census cards on file in the district.

During the week of April 19-23 members of the ITA will assist the principals by making a house-to-house survey to collect census information for new residences or for new families who have moved into the district.

The annual school census is an important factor in determining classroom needs in the future. All census takers will be properly certified according to the School Code of the state of Illinois by the Secretary of the Board of Education. It should be noted that this is not a national census and that the only information necessary will be the names and birth dates of all children up to 20 years of age, and the number of adults residing at a given address. Respondents may be asked to identify the school attended by school age children in the family.

It is expected that a complete tabulation will be made and presented to the Board of Education early in May. On the basis of this information the Board may then project classroom needs and attendance boundaries for East Maine School District No. 63.

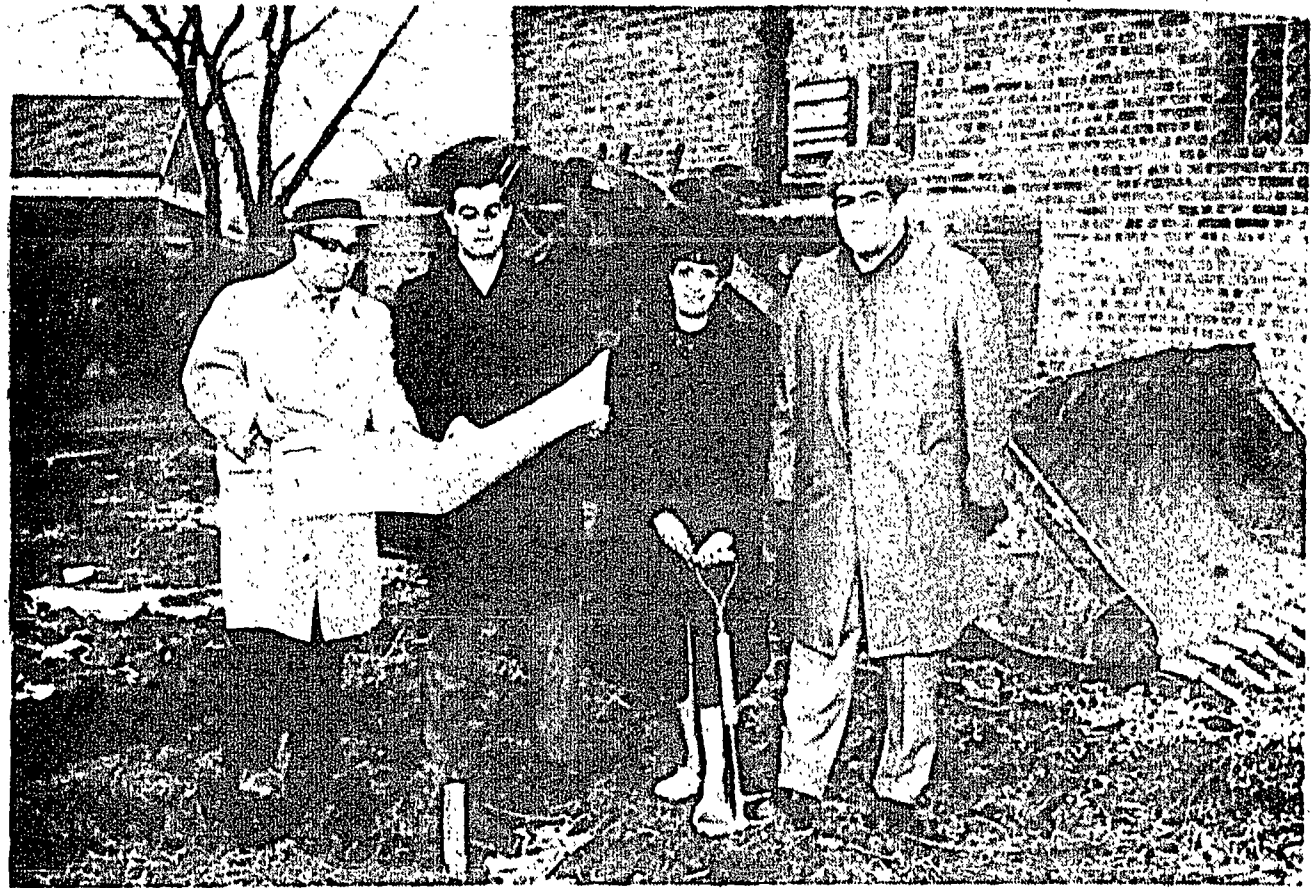

Kapp Points To Education Need

At a meeting of the Board of the Westfield Homeowners Association, Arnold Kapp, candidate for School Board in East Maine District 63, said that the School Board should put greater emphasis on education and communication to the residents.

Kapp asserted that the building program for the last five years has had the Board preoccupied with construction at the expense of instruction. He said that the necessity for this emphasis had passed with the implementation of the present building program. "Let's get down to the business of education now that we can fruitfully turn our attention to that area of policy," he said. Kapp suggested that by July the new acting superintendent should present an entire educational program to the Board, with a series of recommendations including target dates for completion. "The Board should then stipulate its educational policy on all the recommendations, and the administration should carry out the program with dispatch."

He also asserted that it was necessary for the public to keep informed about the progress of the program through East Maine News, the school districts newspaper, and that the newspaper should have one page devoted to board action on education with explanations of the reasons behind each major decision.

Kapp indicated that now is the time to change the emphasis from construction to instruction in all the publicity going to the residents. "The educational program has fallen far behind the building program. Now is the time to change that situation," he concluded.

The School Board election is April 10th.

Another Morn'nother Yaon..

The nearby streets were crowded enough without the jangling, clanging, and the always suggests a little trip into an hour's ride as we sought Harat College last Wednesday morning. Somewhere in Lake Forest, we drove up and down and around the lovely winding roads looking for a landmark, but found nothing. Suddenly a small white truck came into view and we hastened after it for about a mile until we could come abreast of the driver. "We're sure glad to see you. Will you direct us to Harat College, please?" "Lay," grimaced the driver with a tone to match, "I got all the box lunches for Harat College and I'm lost myself." We didn't have to eat the 500 lunches, for eventually someone came along and with more his and mine driving, both us and the buses arrived for the hour at the college.

This was a symposium sponsored by Harat College of the Sacred Heart and St. Paul North Women North Shore Baharian III, Council and the program was "The Fundamental Conflict—A New Era in Catholic-Jewish Relations." I am called on behalf of "Brotherhood Week, etc." I leave me unimpressed and somewhat less than enthused. I remember only too well, the well-known and long-time chairman of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, who lived in an apartment building on Lake Shore Dr., that was restricted to Jews. I remember the vociferousness of my next door neighbors as they spoke for the right of all men to be treated with equality and justice and respect, in the field of labor and housing and then clinched their liberalism with, "But I don't want them living next to me. After all, would you want your daughter to marry one?"

This was different than anything I had be prepared for or expected to find. It was an acceptance of a problem that had been plaguing the world almost since its inception. There was no need to skin over the truth, or indulge in platitudes and give the usual lip service. This was a frank appraisal of an incredible pattern of behavior, all the more incredible when realized that Christianity founded upon the death of a Jew, worshipping this Jew as their Lord, found only one way to repay this debt to his people, continued de-segregation and torture and murder. For the guilt of deicide which the Jewish people have been burdened with 2,000 years, there has been dedicated and fruitful genocide. Dr. Paul Mundy of Loyola University said, "An antisemite is a cruel, twisted and distorted personality." Mrs. L. O'Connor quoted, "If one hates the Jews, he must eventually hate Jesus Christ, himself a Jew." Mr. A. Abbot Rosen said, "There is a generation of transference of hostility. The Christian looks upon his Jewish neighbor with hostility and the Jew looks upon his Christian neighbor with hostility."

There was a warmth and understanding and unmistakable love blanketing the entire audience. The topics were indistinguishable—whether Catholic or Jew, just people's people put on this earth for such a short time. Why not live in harmony and accept differences without the need to exterminate all who are different?

The rosy glow in which I awoke home soon turned into an embarrassed purple. With much enthusiasm I had written a local Rabbi, inviting him as my guest to the seminar promising to call in a few days for his answer. "Keep Never gave it another thought until now when the whole program was over and done with."

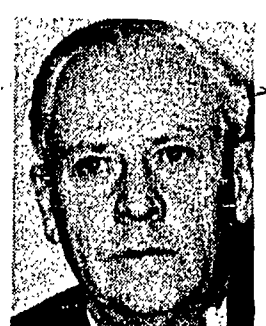
