Niles brags about being All American. Morton Grove officials contend it too will receive this lofty recognition in the coming years. Well, a North Shore Civil Rights Group is aiming to test how All American both communities are this summer by seeking open occupancy here.

Many Nilesites, who've been mighty proud of their town the past month, better do some deep soul-searching, if they don't want to look rather shabby in their ideals regarding what is All American. And the leaders of the communities, the trustees, have an opportunity to lead their communities in this area by publicly resolving a stand on open occupancy.

With the acceptance of an award, certain responsibilities must go with it. Since the hoopla and drum-beating is only the frilly stuff which makes up such an honor, the ideal behind the term All American is obvious to the most dull.

We refrained during the pre-All America days from writing about certain areas which might have injured Niles chances for such an award. Some of the public officials in particular, who showed little or no understanding when Niles one Negro family moved in, would have thrown the award out the window, had the true story been written. They now have a chance to prove their mettle by passing an open occupancy resolution, which will occur tomorrow, if it does not happen today.

On two consecutive Wednesdays, the last week in May and first week in June, testimonial dinners will be given for the two men who've given much to the school district.

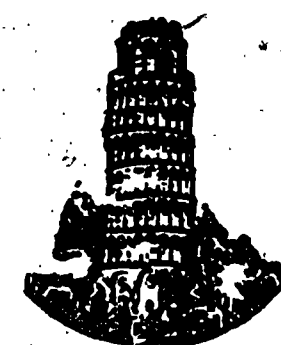
May 26 friends of Earl Epstein will give him a farewell testimonial. Epstein, who was the maverick who stood alone against the former board in his battles for moving the school district forward, was past board president when School Superintendent Jim Bagg was asked to resign from the district.

Four years ago the then-seated school board sent literature around the district opposing Epstein's re-election to the Board. Epstein put on an aggressive campaign, and won another term on the Board. His campaigning set a precedent which has been followed by succeeding Board members.

While Epstein's efforts were defeated when the older Board members opposed him, their opposition to his election resulted in their eventual defeat from the Board by persons thinking along Epstein's line. When the more progressive Board moved onto the scene it seemed obvious Jim Bagg's days were numbered with Epstein leading the way for his ousting. But ironically, Epstein was elected to the presidency of the board, and his co-operation with the superintendent seemed to reverse their past year's opposition. However, by then, even more aggressive and progressive members were

# PARK BOARD TABLES ANNEXATION PETITIONS



## Accuse Bd. Of 'Shilly Shallying'

Amidst shouts of, "Who voted you All American City...why don't you be American?" Niles Park commissioners "tabled" a request for the park annexation of the unincorporated area bounded by Dempster-Potter-Golf and Greenwood Avenue Tuesday night.

Newly-re-elected commissioner Ray Egan made a motion that the petitions for annexation be approved but the motion died for lack of a second. Egan then moved, and the board approved, a committee be set-up to further study the area.

Representatives from three homeowners groups in the unincorporated area stated their groups favored the annexation. It was said approximately 1500 signatures were submitted to Niles Park Board for the annexation which petitioners contended represented the majority interest in their area.

Village of Niles resident Mrs. Bernard Stein, 7030 Carol, implied opposition to the annexation when she asked the Board "Who will pay for them?" referring to the new area?

After the disgruntled 200 residents present from the area filed from the meeting Park president Jack Leske explained the annexation would increase the park district by 25%, representing a mile square area approximating Oakton to Dempster and Washington to Harlem, Illinois.

Leske and outgoing commissioner Keith Peck both stated the first obligation of the Board was to the present people of Niles, Peck raised the question as to how much assessed valuation would be added to the district which he said was difficult to ascertain.

On two consecutive Wednesdays, the last week in May and first week in June, testimonial dinners will be given for the two men who've given much to the school district.

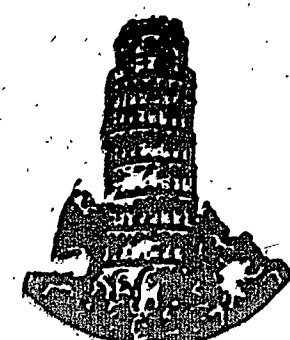
May 26 friends of Earl Epstein will give him a farewell testimonial. Epstein, who was the maverick who stood alone against the former board in his battles for moving the school district forward, was past board president when School Superintendent Jim Bagg was asked to resign from the district.

Four years ago the then-seated school board sent literature around the district opposing Epstein's re-election to the Board. Epstein put on an aggressive campaign, and won another term on the Board. His campaigning set a precedent which has been followed by succeeding Board members.

# PARK BOARD TABLES ANNEXATION PETITIONS



## Accuse Bd. Of 'Shilly Shallying'

Amidst shouts of, "Who voted you All American City...why don't you be American?" Niles Park commissioners "tabled" a request for the park annexation of the unincorporated area bounded by Dempster-Potter-Golf and Greenwood Avenue Tuesday night.

Newly-re-elected commissioner Ray Egan made a motion that the petitions for annexation be approved but the motion died for lack of a second. Egan then moved, and the board approved, a committee be set-up to further study the area.

Representatives from three homeowners groups in the unincorporated area stated their groups favored the annexation. It was said approximately 1500 signatures were submitted to Niles Park Board for the annexation which petitioners contended represented the majority interest in the area.

Village of Niles resident Mrs. Bernard Stein, 7930 Carol, implied opposition to the annexation when she asked the Board "Who will pay for them?" referring to the new area?

After the disgruntled 200 residents present from the area filed from the meeting Park president Jack Leske explained the annexation would increase the park district by 25%, representing a mile square area approximating Oakton to Dempster and Washington to Harlem, Illinois.

Leske and outgoing commissioner Keith Peck both stated the first obligation of the Board was to the present people of Niles. Peck raised the question as to how much assessed valuation would be added to the district which he said was difficult to ascertain.

## Another Morn 'nother Yawn..

The "unbirthday child" is reminiscent of the woman who watches her next-door neighbor or friend parade around newly milk-coated, gurgling to all who would listen, "My husband surprised me for my birthday (etc.). Why, I've never even dreamed of having something like this!" Cooing with appropriately extravagant appreciation, the looker-on assuages her envy silently, "My, some surprise. You tormented and threatened him for five years until he finally came across."

The child watches the days' favored one opening his gifts with less-veiled joyous "ooohs and aaahs". What's to be happy about, he's not getting any of that loot. We just had a long, lovely weekend in delightful countryside—famine en masse—translated it means the whole messy family, except the married daughter who no doubt is busily creating her own family mess. My youngest was not his usual ebullient self—after all his elder brother was the celebrant of the day! Tomorrow the pot will end, but today it's the order of the day.

Not being one to toe the hallowed line, unorthodoxy in any form excites me and garners my unequivocal admiration. Education is continually taking giant steps forward, but I've recently come across something of a completely novel dimension. So many parents are concerned because their child is a poor reader; with a normal or even above normal I.Q., is a slow-learner or classified as a low-achievement child, academically. Have you ever heard of the word—muscular re-education? You will—perhaps sooner than you think if your child falls into that category. In its simplest form, the theory espoused by a teacher of Remedial English in a Lake Forest school, Jan Schnobrich, herself the mother of a once slow-learning youngster, is that disturbances in the mid-brain, which is the seat of muscular coordination, cause the language-learning barrier. Reading, writing, spelling and speech are controlled by the mid-brain, as is muscular control. This "switchboard" is the cause of confusion at times by the crossing of wires, or a "short circuiting" of the wires. If a child is left-handed and favors the right leg and right eye, this is a mixed dominance and the mixed dominance hinders good brain coordination. It is the one-sided dominance that brings about smooth comprehension and better brain coordination. After a battery of tests, to evaluate the amount of muscular incoordination, the principle is to start retraining the mid-brain. Her method is a series of exercises in walking, skipping, crawling—starting at scratch, so to speak, and aiming to achieve total "one-sidedness". The results have been astounding in the short time the program has been in effect. Once the coordination is effected the advancement of the student goes ahead steadily.

Dear Len:

Your "Last Hurrah" was most disappointing and damaging to the Niles Park District Image. Criticism of other taxing bodies in public meeting is in extremely poor taste—especially since rebuttal was impossible (Park Board was in special session that evening). I am particularly referring to your tax arithmetic concerning Tam O'Shanter and the ratio of services and tax dollars between the village of Niles and the Park District. In your position with the Village, you certainly realized the hundreds of thousands of dollars that the Village obtains from sales tax, sale of water, vehicle tax, various license fees and permits, motor fuel tax, etc., etc. These augment the real estate tax to provide the revenue (over \$2 million) to operate our Village in the desirable fashion we now enjoy. Last year, the Park District had an income (tax, token sales, special funds) of \$220,208. Of this, 22% was used to retire general obligation bonds from the 1962 referendum.

Our parks now total 16 parcels—8 owned and 8 leased. We operate the best swimming facility and lighted ball diamond in the area and have a 12-month recreation and service program. If you have to quote figures—please quote these.

I, personally, acknowledge and endorse your attitude to preserve Tam O'Shanter. However, Len, our current approach toward this project is through Revenue Bonds (i.e., bonds retired on monies brought in as green fees, etc.—not through real estate taxation). It is unfortunate that this subject was broached in a public meeting since you certainly were unprepared to project our planning and timing on this most important matter.

## Illinois Bell Employees Attend Pioneer Assembly

Bell Telephone men and women throughout Illinois and northwest Indiana packed their bags to attend the Theodore N. Vail Chapter's annual pioneer assembly. It was held last week-end (May 14-15) at the Illinois Beach State Park Lodge, on Lake Michigan, between Zion and Waukegan.

Attending from Skokie was John Salvatore, president of the Gateway Council.

On Friday, there was an all-day business meeting. Delegates talked about Telephone Pioneer's three reasons for being — fellowship, loyalty, service (to each other and to the community).

Saturday was devoted largely to meeting old friends. And, they had a lot to talk about. A common bond unites them: all have been in the telephone business for 21 years or more. Capping the assembly activities was a banquet in the evening followed by a variety show featuring professional singers, dancers and impersonators.

All Pioneers could view displays of hobbies of other Pioneers and community service projects pursued by the 17 councils that make up the Vail Chapter. Pioneer projects include working with the Red Cross and hospitals, repairing discarded switchboards and equipping them for use in treating children with muscular disorders.

## North Shore Summer Project

Committees of Niles Township residents working with the North Shore Summer Project are spearheading a coordinated attack on segregated housing in their own communities of Niles, Morton Grove, Skokie and Lincolnwood.

The prime objective of the project is to get realtors to give equal service to all home-seekers, regardless of race, religion, or national origin. Sponsors of the project include the American Friends Service Committee, the North Suburban Illinois Council of B'nai B'rith Women, the Presbytery of Chicago, St. Peter's Catholic Women's Club, and the National Council of Jewish Women.

The working climax of the summer project will occur July 25-August 21, when college student volunteers will begin working with local adults. One of the student project will be to ask homeowners who are selling their property to list it with their realtors on a non-discriminatory basis. They will also work in community education for fair housing.

The students, who will be directed by an 11-member committee of teachers, social workers, a psychologist, and a psychiatrist, will attend a week long orientation program before their work begins.

Several thousand homes are offered for sale at one time on the north shore and in Niles Township, but two or three are shown to Negro families, who see these homes through the Fair Housing Committee or home.

Mr. Lawrence Martin, chairman of the Niles Township Fair Housing Committee, said, "Real estate policies in Niles Township have perpetuated segregated neighborhoods. Our project plans to open the north shore suburbs to families, whatever their race, religion or national background."

collecting and repairing toys for the poor, teaching safety to school children, befriending the elderly in nursing homes, sending books to needy institutions and becoming big brothers and sisters to orphans and disturbed youngsters.

The three Vail Chapters, covering Illinois Bell territory, are among 70 throughout the United States and Canada whose total membership is fast approaching 1/4 million telephone people.

The purpose of the Telephone Pioneer Association is summed up in the Constitution: "to provide a means of friendly association for the longer service employees in the telephone industry, both active and retired, and to promote among them a continuing fellowship and a spirit of mutual helpfulness; to exemplify and perpetuate those principles which...are the ideals and traditions of the telephone industry; and to participate in such undertakings to make for the happiness, well-being and usefulness of the membership and for the progress of the Association."

A shift to community service in recent years has taken Pioneering out of purely social-centered activities. The force of long-established tradition of telephone service has been crystallized into an effective pattern for community service.

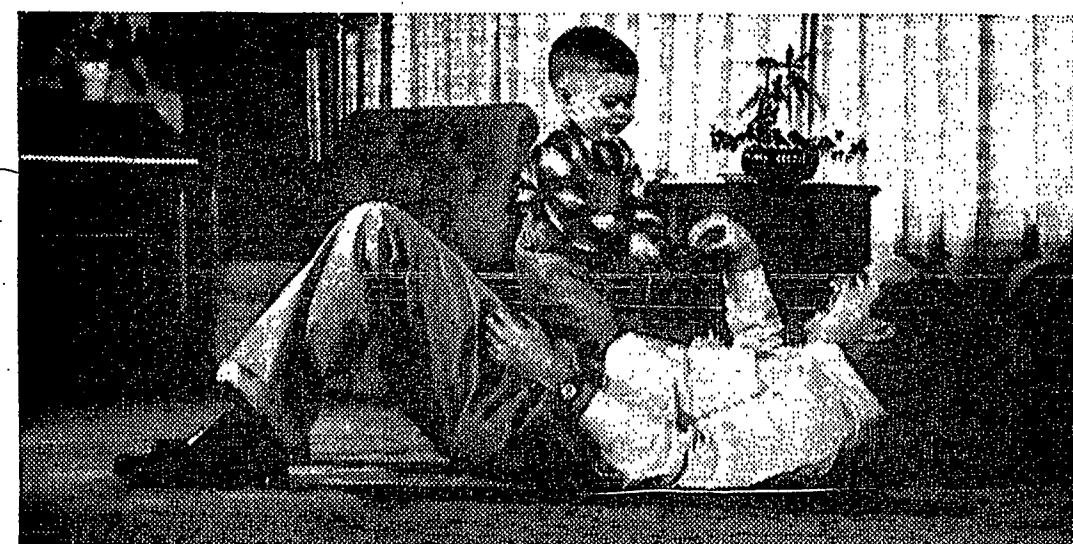

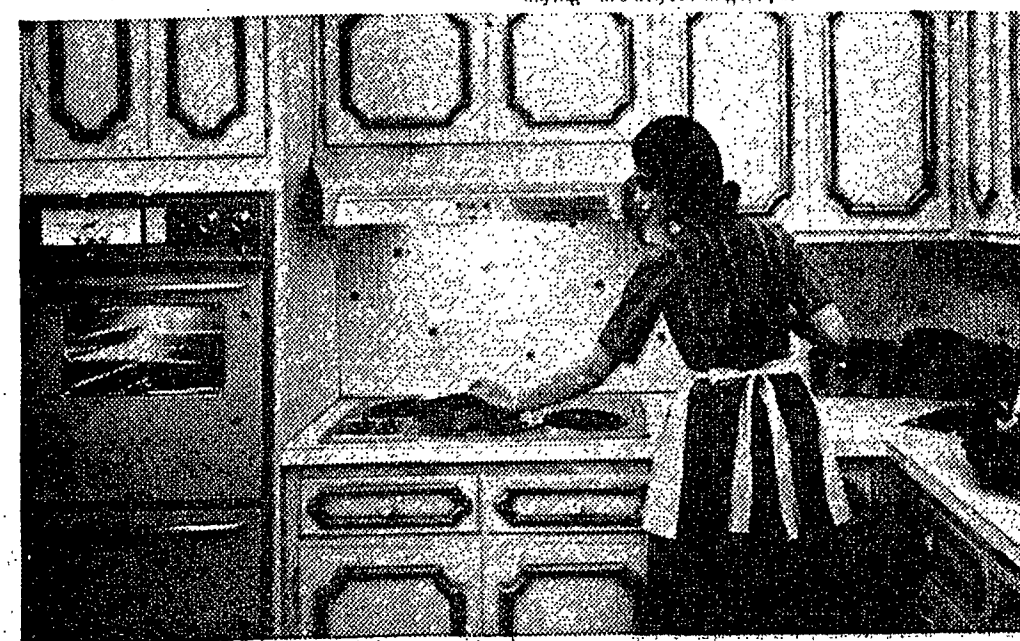
