ren and older people. "With a high fence blocking the driveway, it would be difficult to see children and one might be sorry afterwards," Mayor Blase promised that action would be taken within the next two meetings, realizing that the time is short.

Trustee Keith Peck reported that the Board of Health had reported 42 inspections and some summonses during the month of May. They will continue canvassing housing properties.

Sixty-two building permits were issued; 1,003 rubbish calls were received and \$4,311 in fines were collected by the Village of Niles, (and one of those was mine).

Widening of Oakton Street from Odell to Park Ridge starts on June 28th. This is the heaviest traveled road in all the suburbs and the cost is being taken care of by the county.

Bids were read for curbing and sidewalks for the year from Pacific Co.—\$11,000, and Capitol Cement Co.—\$13,400. A committee of Trustees Marcheschi, Wente and Berkowsky were given the bids for further study.

Four bids for a tractor—rubber-tire front-end loader were read—from \$20,167.75 to \$22,239 and given to Ed. Bacher, Public Works Superintendent, and Public Manager Jim Pryde for consideration.

The board of Trustees wished Mayor Blase a "Happy Birthday" and the Mayor sang "Happy Birthday to Me."

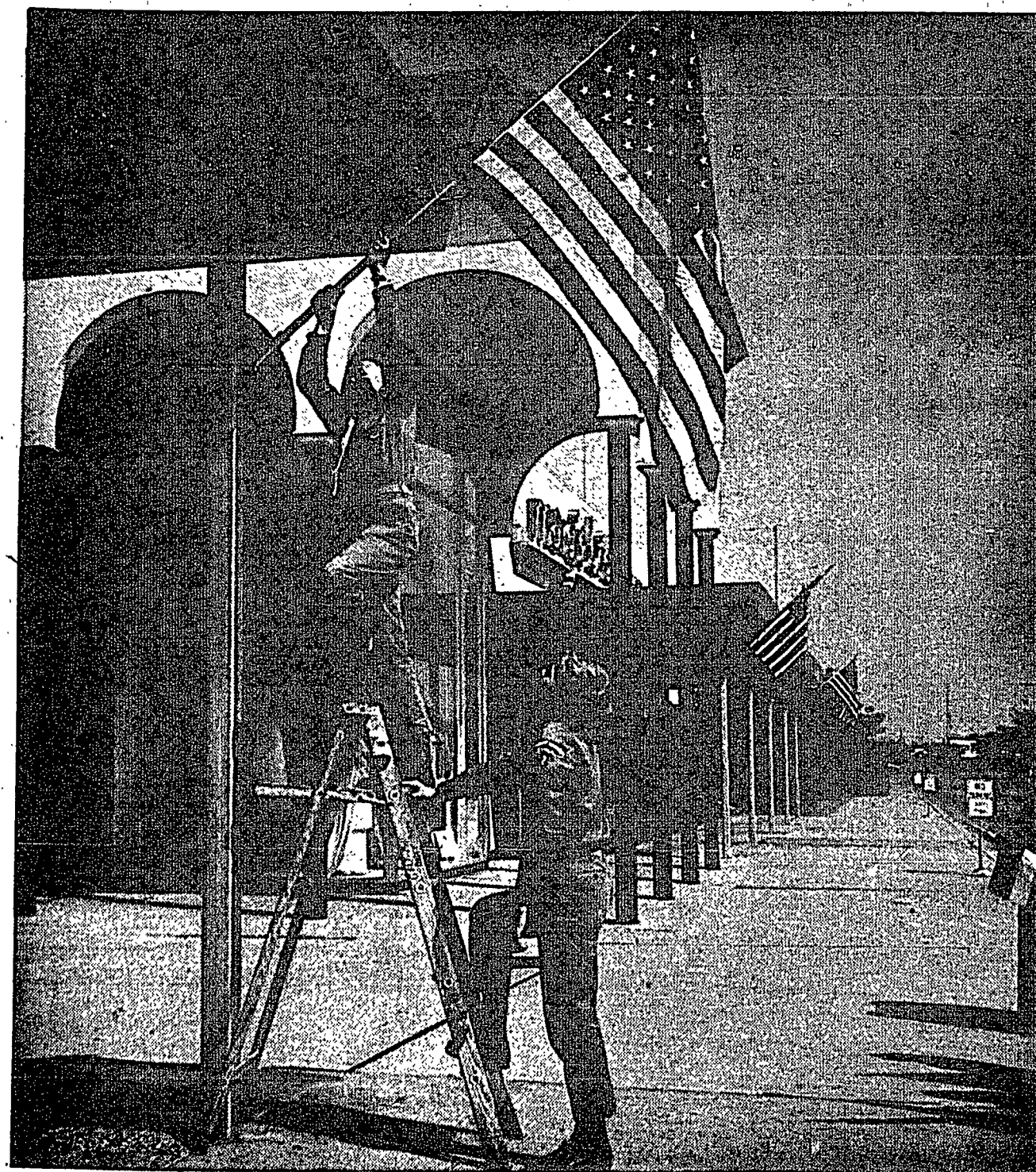

Democrats Okay 486 Apartment Units In District 63

Rezoning of 10 acres of land at Golf Rd. and Western Ave. to permit construction of six apartment buildings was approved Friday, May 28, by the Cook County Board, although Republicans contended the action was invalid.

The vote was 10 to 5 along party lines with the Democrats prevailing.

The rezoning had been recommended by the County Zoning Board of Appeals following a public hearing last Nov. 6 and despite the objections of two Maine Twp. School districts and the villages of Niles, Glenview, Morton Grove, and the city of Park Ridge.

Comr. Floyd Fuller, a Republican, asserted the rezoning had not received the necessary 12 votes for approval when an objection has been filed to the proposed rezoning.

Daniel Ferrone, County building commissioner, replied that the law required the nearest city or village within a mile and a half of the property—which would be Niles—to file the objection with the county clerk. He said a check would be made to see if this was done.

Comr. Charles Chaplin, who opposed the rezoning, indicated the state's attorney would be asked to decide the matter.

Walter Karnatz, of 6503 Eldorado, Morton Grove, owner of the property, agreed to give three acres of adjacent land to the schools for recreational use if the zoning was permitted. The proposed buildings, five stories high, would hold 486 apartment units.

The site is the southwest corner of Golf Rd. and Western in Maine Twp.

Fuller objected that the buildings would put a strain on fire-fighting, traffic, school and utility facilities in the area.

In other action, the board recommended that the Illinois General Assembly enact laws increasing some fees charged by the county recorder, sheriff and Circuit Court clerk.

The board opposed a pending bill that would require the county to increase jurors' pay unless means of financing the pay raise were also provided.

Edna, who may be considered a gal who always has a bee in her bonnet, also has a lot of working springs inside that bonnet. She has an insatiable curiosity about government, and aims to keep her town on even keel.

It is her desire to have politically "non-affiliated" lawyers and accountants included in her committee's workings, so they can do some digging into the more complex areas of legal voo doo and the suburban "numbers game". If the gal can take the bruising which goes with bumping into stone walls, her efforts will serve a most valuable service.

If we were to ask Mr. Taxpayer if he's getting full services for his tax dollar, he'd likely give a blank stare which has been conditioned by paying high tax rates. Like the Pavlov dog experiment, when the bell rings for Mr. Taxpayer to shell out to the many taxing bodies, his conditioned reflex automatically sends his hand into his pocket in preparation for handing over more and more money to his governments.

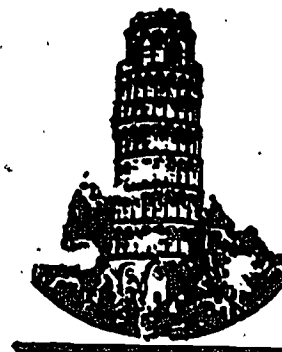

In Niles a new liquor dispenser will open in Golf Mill, when the theatre is completed, which seems unfair, when considered against the background of those who had to pay. This entire area is in need of review and study.

In school districts the comparing of students from our many districts might be undertaken. There is a great deal

Must Fulfill Present Commitments

Tuesday night Niles Park Commissioners turned down the request of the East Maine Township unincorporated area to be annexed into Niles Park District by a 3 to 2 vote. Commissioners Leske, Chameriski and Sullivan opposed the annexation at this time, while Eagan and Schreiner favored it.

After the decision was reached resident Nancy Des Champs, of the unincorporated area, who spearheaded the annexation request, broke into tears and left the meeting room. She had worked for more than six months in receiving 1500 names on petitions which were presented to the Park Board for the annexation.

The disappointed unincorporated residents stated they were misled by the park board which had met several times with homeowners, in anticipation of the annexation. Park Board president Steve Chameriski was accused by one resident of having reversed a previous commitment. In a heated debate Chameriski admitted to changing his mind which he said was his right.

Commissioner Leske spoke for the majority commissioners stating the year 1965 finds the park district with too many unfulfilled commitments, which had to be met within the present district. He said he was not closed to future annexation but said he was opposed to it for the year 1965.

Commissioner Schreiner, speaking for the minority vote, said he felt there was a moral commitment which the Board should fulfill.

In other actions Commissioners approved the hiring of Judy Schreiner and Carol Chameriski, daughters of the commissioners. Ray Eagan opposed the hiring and Jack Leske passed his vote, manifesting the disagreement the Board has had on the hiring of relatives. Dorothy Schreiner, wife of Commissioner Lou Schreiner, announced she verbally resigned from her park job and added, "I hope THE BUGLE is satisfied". 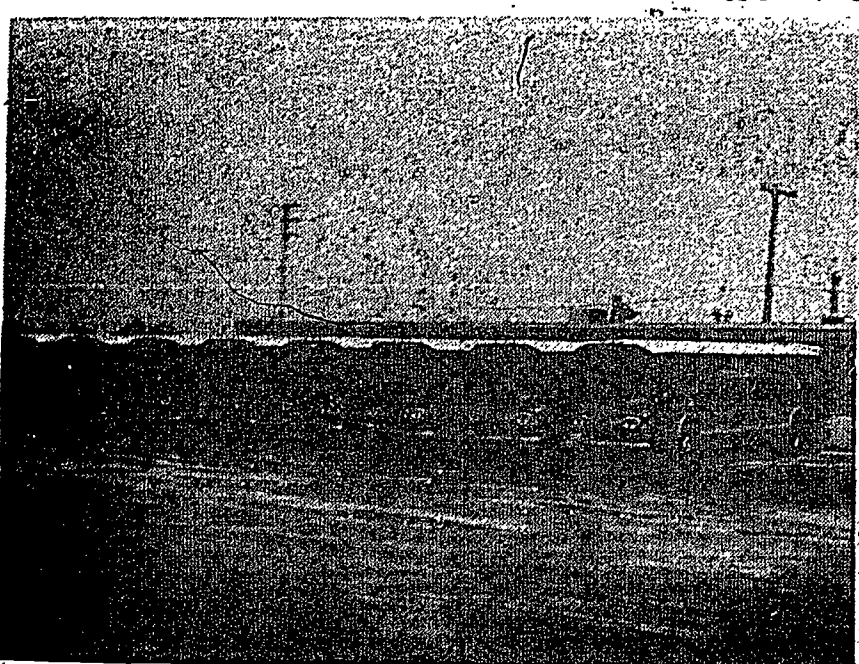

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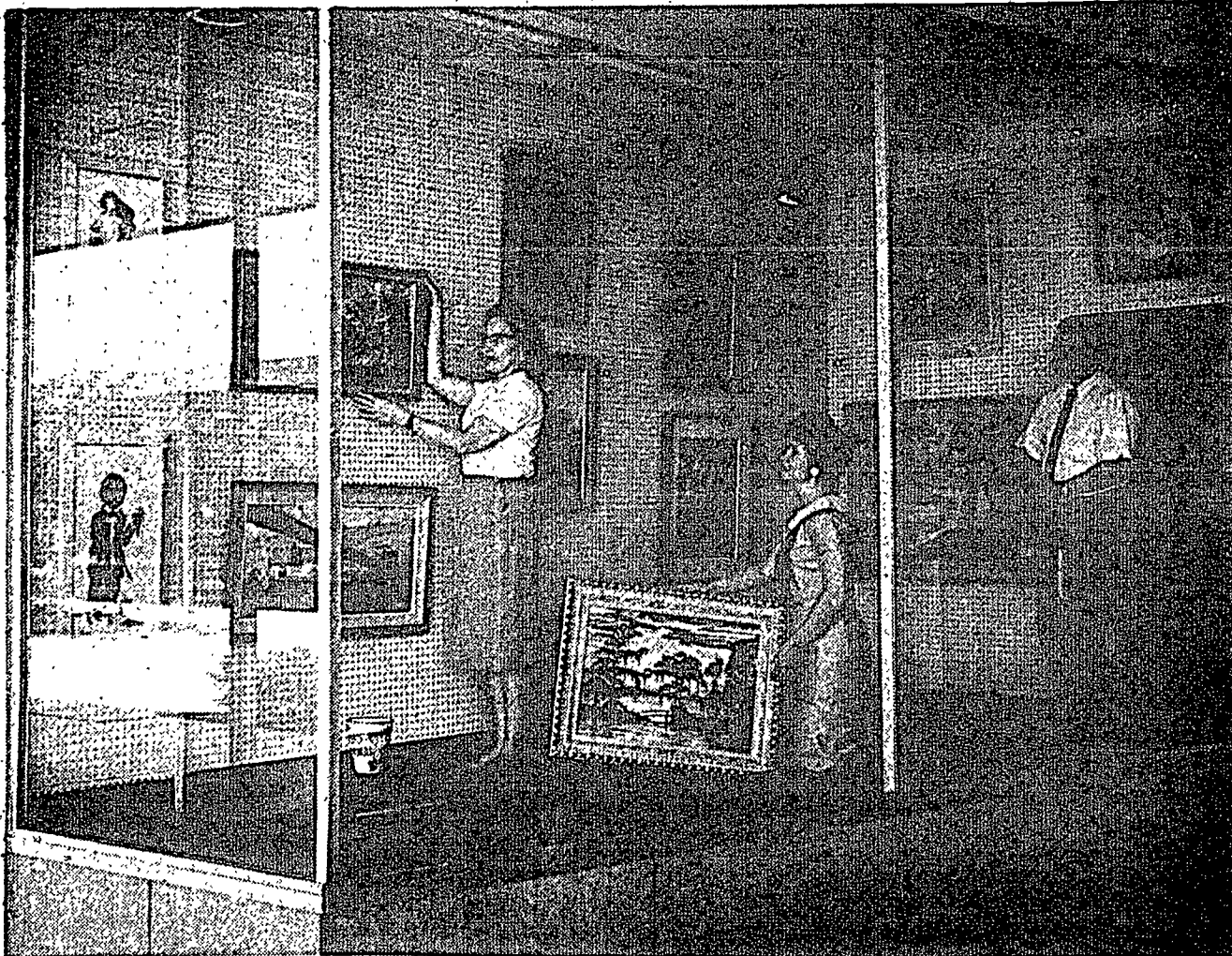

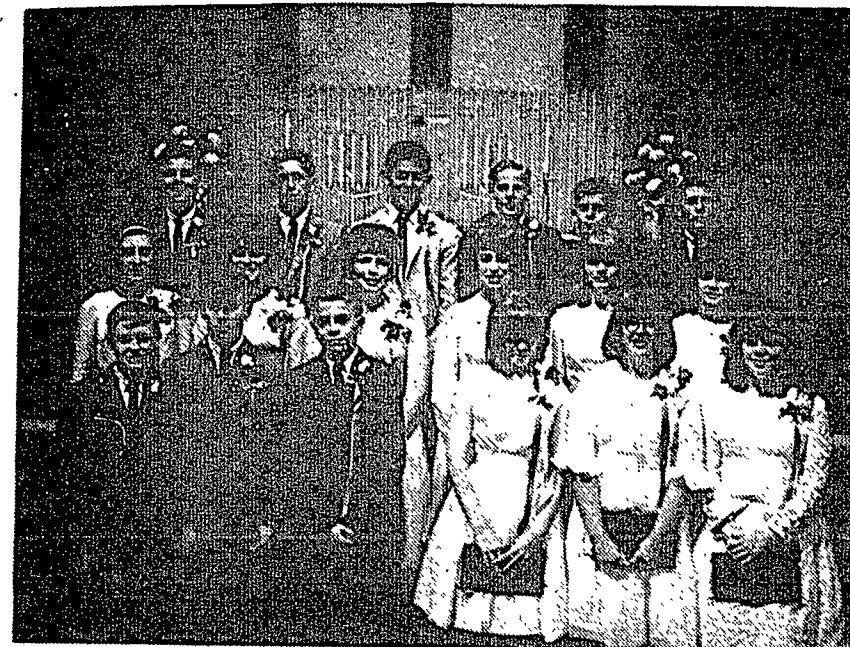
Nine new teachers have been employed for the next term by School District 67, Supt. William Stout announced.

perience this postponement, but weather conditions during the past few weeks simply have not been conducive to construction activity."

She added that all those who have purchased tickets will be informed of the date change and permitted a refund if the new date conflicts with another activity.

The 1500 tickets for this special performance are \$50 each for the first three rows and \$10 each for the remaining rows. There are only 15 rows in the theater with no row more than 50 feet from the stage. Mrs. Bennett W. Cooke, Jr., 855 Bridlewood Rd., Northbrook, is ticket chairman.

The theater is located at Milwaukee Ave. and Golf Rd., in the suburb.

All proceeds from this benefit will be used to help finance the work of the Chicago Heart Association in its fight against heart and blood vessel diseases. The Association serves Cook, Lake and DuPage counties.

Lutheran General Expansion Program On Schedule

Construction is moving on schedule in the expansion of Lutheran General Hospital, in Park Ridge, reports administrator Robert J. Nast.

The \$5,500,000 project includes adding three stories to the top of the original seven story structure and building a five story wing connected to the west side of the hospital.

Workmen will begin plastering on the upper stories this week. The eighth floor will provide 46 additional psychiatric beds. The ninth floor has 46 medical-surgical beds and 23 intensive care beds. The tenth floor will contain a cafeteria and dining areas.

Workmen are now pouring concrete on the third floor of the west wing. This wing will include one floor with 41 chronic care beds and one floor with 47 medical-surgical beds.

The first floor will contain a new emergency department, double the size of the present unit, expanded dietary kitchens, a public office shop, Service League work areas and administrative offices.

The ground floor will contain a complete outpatient clinic, large enough to accommodate 25,000 patients a year. Facilities include examining rooms, clinic areas, laboratories and minor surgical facilities. Also on the ground floor will be expanded areas for x-ray, a radioisotope laboratory and medical library.

The basement will contain a new medical records department, occupational therapy and employee locker rooms.

The construction began on the expansion in August, 1964. The project is expected to be completed in 1966.

When completed, Lutheran General will have 527 beds, making it larger than 98 per cent of all hospitals in the nation.

The \$5,500,000 cost includes a \$712,000 federal Hill-Burton grant, \$3,560,000 by the hospital and a \$1,228,000 public fund drive. The hospital has reached about 70 per cent of the \$1,228,000 goal.

Niles pharmacist, Albert Green has been honored by the Illinois Pharmaceutical Association as its 1965 recipient of the A. H. Robins Bowl of Hygeia award for outstanding community service.

Green received the award May 25 at the Illinois association's annual convention in Peoria. Making the presentation was Eugene L. Henriouille, medical service representative in the Central Illinois Division of the A. H. Robins Company. Participating in the ceremony was John H. Neumann of Aurora, president of the Illinois Pharmaceutical Association.

The recipient's service to the village of Niles includes charter membership on its Human Relations Council and membership on the board of directors of the Leaning Tower YMCA. He played a leading role in a fund-raising campaign to provide a new \$3,840,000 Y. ICA building.

Green is president of the Niles Chamber of Commerce and is vice president of the board of directors of the Niles Community Hospital. He served as chairman of the Niles Heart Fund drive for several years and has been an active member of the Niles Lions Club since 1955.

For the past 10 years, Green has sponsored a Little League team and men's and women's bowling teams. He also writes a monthly column for the Niles Bugle.

The Bowl of Hygeia, most widely recognized international symbol of pharmacy, derives from Greek Mythology.

Hygeia was the daughter and assistant of Aesculapius (sometimes spelled Asklepios), the God of Medicine and Healing. Her classical symbol was a bowl containing a medicinal potion, with the serpent of Wisdom (or guardianship) partaking of it. This is the same serpent on the caduceus, the staff of Aesculapius which is the symbol of medicine.

The Bowl of Hygeia Award, presented annually through the Illinois Pharmaceutical Association, is a handsome mahogany plaque measuring 10 by 13 inches and featuring the Bowl of Hygeia cast in bronze. It is modeled after a sterling silver bowl made by a Mexican silversmith and given to the A. H. Robins Company by its Latin American representative in 1953 on the Richmond (Va.) ethical pharmaceutical manufacturing firm's 75th anniversary.

The award was established in 1958 by the company's president, E. Claiborne Robins, and now, in addition to Illinois, is presented annually in 47 states, the District of Columbia and seven of the ten provinces of Canada.
