

Rezoning of 10 acres of land at Golf Rd. and Western Ave. to permit construction of six apartment buildings was approved Friday, May 28, by the Cook County Board, although Republicans contended the action was

The vote was 10 to 5 along party lines with the Democrats

The rezoning had been recommended by the County Zoning Board of Appeals following a public hearing last Nov. 6 and despite the objections of two Maine Twp. School districts and the villages of Niles, Glenview, Morton Grove, and the

Comr. Floyd Fulle, a Republican, asserted the rezoning had not received the necessary 12 votes for approval when an objection has been filed to the proposed rezoning.

Daniel Ferrone, County building commissioner, replied that the law required the nearest city or village within a mile and a half of the propertywhich would be Niles-to file the objection with the county clerk. He said a check would be made to see if this was







#### Holy Family Hospital Addition **Nearing Completion**

Construction of the 5-story, million dollar South Addition to Holy Family Hospital entered the final stages this week. The expansion is now 85% complete and the remaining work is rapidly being finished.

The new addition will provide an additional 42 beds, add 18,500 square feet of space and greatly increase efficiency of the hard-pressed X-ray, laboratory and out-patient departments. Visitors and staff will also welcome the greatly expanded cafeteria being enlarged about 300% to provide ter a seating capacity of 225.

With completion of the addi-tion labeled "Stage 2" in the hospital's development program, bed capacity will total at Golf and River Rds., Des Plaines originally had a capacity of 175 beds.

Variety and volume of outpatient service has greatly expanded in number of patients and diversification of health service tests, minor surgery and post-hospitalization followup. The new addition will provide 9 additional out-patient treatment rooms, new separate entry and larger patient wait-

Out-patient service has increased more than 150% since the hospital opened. The additional facilities are expected to provide impetus for much greater patient-doctor use of the department often called a Little Hospital Within a Hos-

Increased space on the first floor for the radiology department will be utilized to relieve the tight film storage section and provide additional office facilities for the staff. Additional first floor space will also permit centralization of the Pathology and clinical Laboratory.

With this expansion, space is also provided to initiate a school in X-ray and Clinical Laboratory training. On the second floor, 14 beds



#### Lutheran General Expansion Chicken Breasts Program On Schedule

Construction is moving on schedule in the expansion of Lutheran General Hospital, in Park Ridge, reports administrator Robert J. Nast.

The \$5,500,000 project includes adding three stories to the top of the original seven story structure and building a five story wing connected to the west side of the hospital.

Workmen will begin plastering on the upper stories this week. The eighth floor will provide 46 additional psychiatric beds. The ninth floor has 46 medical-surgical beds and 23 intensive care beds. The tenth floor will contain a cafeteria and dining areas.

Workmen are now pouring concrete on the third floor of the west wing. This wing will include one floor with 41 chronic care beds and one floor with 47 medical-surgical beds.

The first floor will contain a new emergency department, double the size of the present unit, expanded dietary kitchens, a public coffee shop Service League work areas and admin-A. Wanderpan Hill

istrative offices.

The ground floor will contain a complete outpatient clinic, large enough to accommodate 25,000 patients a year. Facilities include examing rooms, clinic areas, laboratories and minor surgical facilities. Also on the ground floor will be expanded areas for x-ray, a radioisotope laboratory and med-

The basement will contain a new medical records department, occupational therapy and employee locker rooms. The construction began on the

expansion in August, 1964. The project is expected to be com-When completed, Lutheran

General will have 527 beds, making it larger than 98 per cent of all hospitals in the nation.

The \$5,500,000 cost includes a \$712,000 federal Hill-Burton grant, \$3,560,000 by the hospital and a \$1,228,000 public fund drive. The hos all has reached about 70 per cent of the \$1,-228,000 goal.

Mational Zip Code Directory On Sale

The Post Office Department is issuing a publication which it expects will be a best seller for all volume users of the mail, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski announced yes-

It is titled "National ZIP Code Directory," and it is scheduled to go on sale June 1 for \$7.00 a copy at the Sup-erintendent of Documents, Goyernment Printing Office, Wa-shington, D.C. 20402.

The Directory offers an easy reference to the ZIP Code numer for every mailing address the country.

> It compresses into one vol-ume all the information previously contained in the 52 directories it will replace - 50 for the States, one for the District of Columbia and one for Puerto Rico and the Vir-

The National Directory consists of 1,816 pages—less than one-half the 3,714 pages in the separate directoris. It weighs separate directoris. It weighs 4 1/2 pounds, as against the aggregate weight of 18 pounds for the 52 volumes. Its cost is less than one-third the \$23,10 charged for the State directories combined.

ZIP Code listings are arranged alphabetically by State, Wi hin each State a complete list. ng is given of all post offices, stations and branches, with the appropriate five-digit ZIP Code for each delivery area, An appendix after each State gives the ZIP Code for each address in the larger cities where the streets are listed.

Alson included are a ZIPCode area map, optional State abbreviations to be used with zip code, a listing of post offices with multiple carrier deliveries, a numerical list of post offices by ZIP Code and a list of the 553 sectional centers through which the trans-

The Directory has been updated to include new streets and subdivisions created since the State directories were first issued in 1963, plus a few chan-ges in ZIP Code numbers since that time and changes in post offices that were discontinued or consolidated.

For strictly local mailers, Postmaster General Gronouski announced that separate local directories will be available free of charge for 207 major itles formerly zoned and now multi-ZIP Code.

The first printing of the National Directory runs to 125,000 copies. The first 535 will go o Members of the Senate and House of Representatives. Starting June 1, 10,000 copies will be sent to the Superintendent of Documents for sale to the public, and an additional 15,000 will be available by July 1.

A total of 47,000, pre-sorted by ZIP Code, will be shipped the nation's post offices. The size of the mailing ranges from one copy for third and fourth class offices to as many as 300 for the larger cities. An additional 12,000 will be sent to each of the Department's four supply centers, from which ostmasters can requisition Te copies as needed.


