Intermarriage is inevitable and increasing, much to the chagrin of the clergy. Says one Rabbi, "The reason for the high rate of divorce in this country is due to the fact that the matriarch society has failed and has always been a failure ever since Adam was persuaded by Eve to eat of the forbidden ruit".

Being a Jewish Clergy, guess who gets the blame? "Jewish girls are selfish, conceited and emotionally confused as to what they are looking for in marriage. The Gentile girl is just the opposite. She is not demanding, she cares for her husband and his welfare and is content in whatever occupation he enters. That is the main reason the Jewish boy seeks the Gentile girl. Therefore, intermarriage will continue to climb until the Jewish girl does not seek a husband as the slave but rather the master."

He goes on to quote from a book written before 1620, by a Polish Jew, entitled "A Good Heart". The purpose of this book was to teach men and women the basic laws and moral principles of Judaism. The fourth--try to be thrifty and careful with your husband's monev.

The fifth-don't be anxious about his secrets and if he should confide them to you, do not tell anyone else.

The sixth-don't like his enemies and don't hate his friends.

The seventh-don't be contradictory, do everything he tells you; let his words find favor with you.

The eighth--don't expect any-thing of him that he considers difficult. He may take a dislike to you because you expect something of him which he believes too hard.

The ninth-heed the requests he may make of you, awaiting in turn that he will love you if you do so.

The tenth-be very careful to guard against jealousy. Don't hurt him by anything you say or do, let him have his own way in everything."

A yearly chest X-ray is advised in large metropolitan mareas where high numbers of residents have become tuberculin positive thru exposure to active tuberculosis. At what age this should begin depends largely on the city's population, and various socio-economic factors.

John E. Egdorf, executive director of the Tuberculosis Institute of Chicago and Cook County, said this should begin at age 15 in Chicago, and elsewhere in Cook County at age 18.

"If any signs of a chest disorder are sighted by the physician examining the X-ray tilm, other follow-up and diagnostic tests are prescribed to determine its significance,"

Likewise, for those under the specified age, a tuberculin skin test is suggested, yearly, for the negative reactors, "This determines whether the child has been infected by TB germs. It also provides the major clues to the source of the child's infection." The source is usually located within the family structure, "An annual X-ray, and a physical check-up, is a must for positive reactors," he added,

Egdorf stressed that the chest X-ray and the tuberculin skin test are the most effective casefinding tools for ferreting out the likely candidates for active TB on a mass basis.

"Confirming active tuberculosis requires a series of additional tests which are administered at a TB hospital or clinic."

He said adults living in the Chicagoland area who disregard the annual X-ray suggestion, seriously gamble with their health, "Of the new active

The communitywide free chest X-ray program is sponsored by the Institute with the cooperation of the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium in the city, and the Suburban Cook County Tuberculosis Sanitarium District in the suburbs.







The bitterness expressed by residents in the unincorporated area over Niles Park District refusing to annex it was loudly acclaimed, We agreed with Commissioner Jack-Leske that

the park district has much unfinished business with its present parks and they must be placed in order before future annexation can be considered. Nevertheless, the unincorporated residents had a legitimate gripe, The park commissioners met many times with these people, The residents worked for six months getting petitions for the annexation, Then, after presenting them, they were re-jected, after having been led to believe the annexation was a mere formality, Commissioner Lou Schreiner, who favored the annexation, said the park district had a "moral obligation" to accept these people, Whether or not they were promised the annexation, and Park President Chamerski admitted changing his mind, it was a bind which the park district made for it-

These problems of zoning, schools and now parks, in this one-mile-square area, must eventually be resolved. They should have been faced-up-to five years ago when the multiple invasion first took place.

There is only one answer for the area, and it is for the annexation of the area by one or more of the neighboring villages, Des Plaines, Park Ridge and Niles should sit down with the Water Company there, as well as the people, and plan for annexing the area. 




