

The sudden death of 37 year old Ray Wilkins shocked Nilesites who only a week before had mourned the death of Clara Blase. The recent passing away of 36 year oldShelly Nathanson. a member of school board district 63, has left the community with a void, by the passing of three public minded

Wilkins served Niles as its health inspector and reflected Niles new look, with the service he rendered. Rather than carry a big stick Wilkins spoke softly and carried the respect of all who knew him. He was a very important part of Niles "New Era" and gave much of himself to make Niles a better place to live. He was in a position which could have been handled with arrogance. He preferred using tact and mani/ festing humility. This was the mark of the man.

This is the time of the year when newspapers submit examples of their efforts to various press associations in pursuit of awards and acknowledgements for work well done. Twice we have submitted past BUGLE efforts. This year we have been chosen as a judge for the Oklahoma Press Association's annual contest and now we're able to view these nebulous judgments from both-the submitter's, and submitted's side of the fence.

In the area which we are judging, "Community Service", we have tens of examples of work stacked on our desk waiting to be studied.

While many newspapers have a long list of accomplishments for work well done we were wondering when somebody might come up with an award for community efforts which were utter failures. If the dunce-hat award is ever announced we'll submit several examples of BUGLE works which have gone far, far astray. Examples of such campaigns, might include the following.

During the most recent years THE BUGLE shouted for open board meetings in school district 70 in Morton Grove. The impassable school board ignored our hootin' and hollerin' and the school superintendent brushed aside this upstart newspaper with exquisite deri-

In Niles we shouted loud and long against a parksite at Oakton and Waukegan, shouted equally loud in favor of Oakton and Milwaukee and behind the Oak School. You might say we made 2 1/2 strikes out of a possible three, for a batting average of .167, indeed a pretty anemic

In the areas of schools we beat the drums loud and noisily for a Nileshi school in the backyards of some pretty influential politicians by the Evanston Country Club area. When the Niles vote came in our side lost by about 10-1.



Paul Getty, reputed to be the richest man in the world-don't ask for a recount of his millions---asking for our sympathy in a recent magazine article, "the world is mean to millionaires."

So be it; but how kind is the world to non-millionaires? Mr. Getty claims the burdens of wealth are greater today than they've ever been and the rewards are slimmer. So be it; are the problems of the poor lesser than ever before with more substantial rewards? No man can eat more than

one meal at a sitting (unless he's a King Farouk), wear more than one suit or sleep in more than one bed (unless he's a King Farouk) at a time; drive more than one car and (legally) have more than one wife at a given time. It can be just as boring to eat pheasant under glass daily as it is to have hamburgers and spaghetti; but affluence lets you eat well, sleep without worrying about the payments due in the morning, on the house, car and the very bed you're sleeping in. Instead of the one seedy suit you're wearing, the closet will have a healthy abundance for you and your wife and if she feel's like adding to her wardrobe, she won't be taking money that has to go to the Gas Co., the Electric Co., the

of your millions. The rich man is penalized for being rich; he has to be wary of strangers, hangers-on who only want his money, he can't have simple relationships with females-they're all aiming at alimony payments, and he must even be suspicious of friends who want something of

Once upon a time a status symbol was a car, a plane, a yacht, round-the-world trips, Nowadays with pay-as-youride, fly, travel the thoroughfares of the continents, sail, etc., what status is left for the millionaire that hundreds of thousands of Americans do not already enjoy?

There is nothing left but to bury himself into the octopus of his corporations, work and work and work and increase his list of companies, thereby improving the economy of the worlds' workers who need the advantage of his payrolls. So, we do need the Mr. Gettys' of the world, but it is unfortunate that he has seemingly led a life free of the simple joys the average man is exposed to. Friends who love you for yourself, neighbors who will invite you to their house for a glass of beer, a wife who will stand by you through thick and thin, children who will clutch you as you open the door, weary after a hard day's work!



Chest X-Ray Is TB Safeguard

"More persons between the ages of 35 and 39 were reported to have new cases of active TB last year than any other age group, said Dr. E.A. Piszczek, field director of The Suburban Cook County Tuberculosis Sani-

"This at first seems remarkable, because we tend to think of tuberculosis in terms of an older population. Yet, in the last three years, the highest incidence was recorded for persons in their lower forties and the upper thirties," he conti-

"Within these age ranges, we find that women with tuberculosis are usually on the younger side of the age scale. For instance, in 1964, TB in men was highest in the 35 to 39 and the 45 to 49 age groups, but the highest incidence o women with the disease were between 30 and 34 years old.

"All adults, no matter what their age, have a precious legacy in their health. We urge that they protect it."

The letter previously published by you further indicates that the Village of Niles officials and other ogranizations only assisted as they felt it would accomplish something for themselves. I must state that this is equally untrue. The Village clerks office was most helpful in supplying information to our committee at the onset. The Jets defeated the Twins in a hard and well fought ball game. The Jets had a four run fifth inning to overtake the Twins and ice the victory.




