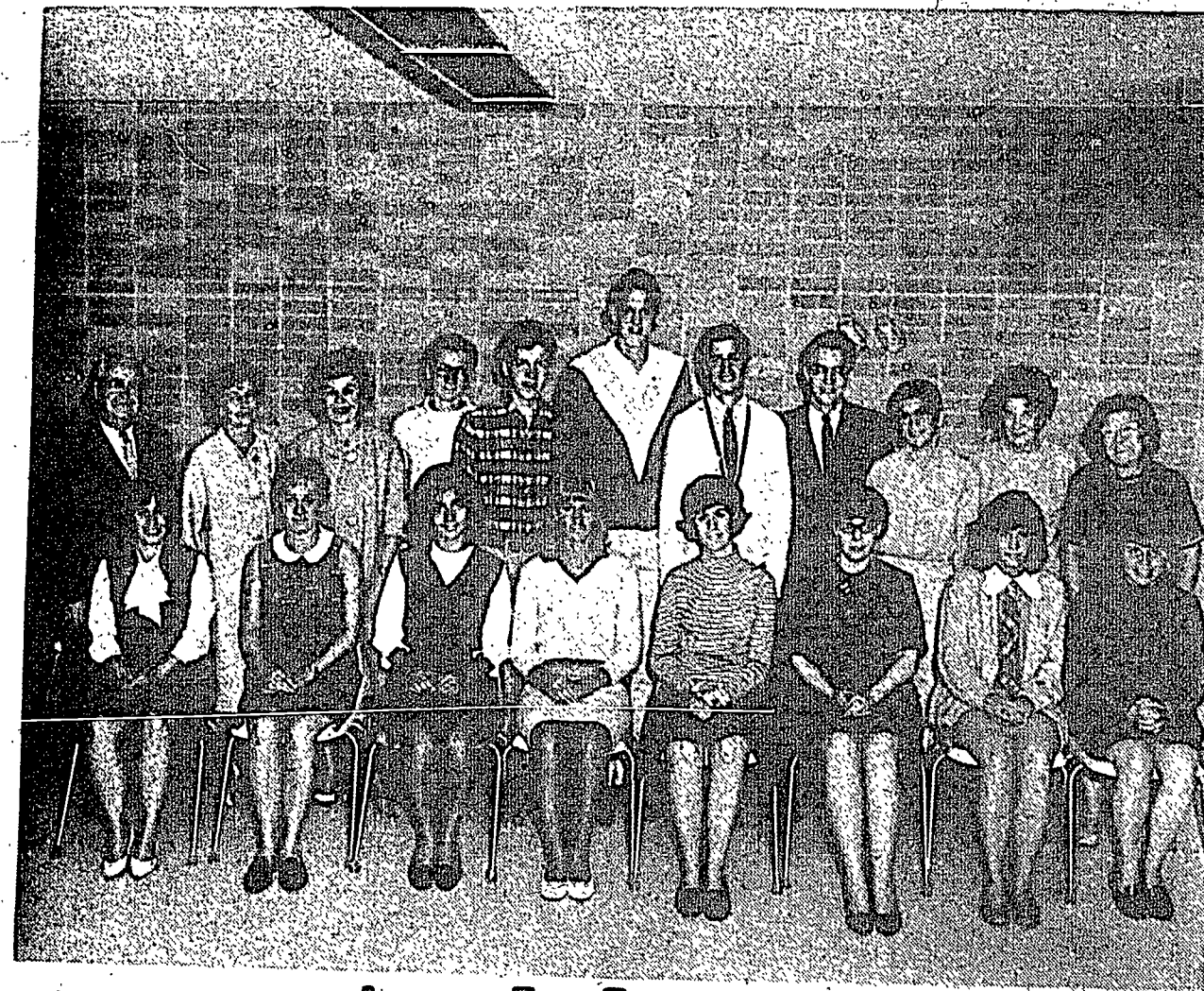

## 200 East Maine Residents Demonstrate Against Builder

Approximately 200 women and children, with a sprinkling of husbands, staged a massive project march in the area of Kathy, Western and Go! in East Maine Township, an unincorporated area in Cook County on Wednesday, June 23rd. The purpose was a visual protest to the request of builder Morris Suson for a zoning variation which will allow him to start a series of high-rise apartment buildings. Mr. Suson has given various figures as to the height of the buildings as being anywhere up to ten stories. Should he be successful in obtaining the zoning, by his own admission, he intends to make this area a "miniature Lake Shore Drive" of high-rises. There has been no provision or consideration for the influx of children in an already "bursting-at-the-seams" school district. Automobiles from these high-rises will crowd into an over-burdened traffic pattern for this area.

At the last word the recent ruling by the Cook County Zoning Board, headed by Seymour Simon, has been turned over to States Attorney Daniel P. Ward for a legal decision. The Board of Commissioners voted 10 to 5, for the zoning variation. However, under and Illinois Statute a minimum 12 to 3 affirmative vote is necessary when there is a municipality objecting to the zoning request. Niles, Park Ridge, Des Plaines and Morton Grove were opposed to the rezoning. The Village of Niles, being closest to the area, has filed a formal objection against rezoning.

This area, being unincorporated, receives its fire service

from the City of Des Plaines. Presently, because of the past water problems in the area, it is quite possible that even if fire equipment got to the area in time to fight a fire they would probably not have sufficient water pressure to reach the upper levels of the high-rises. Residents continually complain about the low water pressure in the area and have received unfilled promises that this situation will be rectified.

Mr. Suson has also taken option on most of the vacant land in the area and in particular the acreage owned by Station WJJD on Ballard Road, Greenwood Avenue, and Dempster. It is his avowed intent to put up high-rises on this property amounting to several thousand units.

The 1960 amendment to the zoning ordinance permitting the building of townhouses has been exploited by so-called developers to the point where many of the single family residents feel they are in a disaster area. Eleven school have been built in the last ten years because of the increase of school-age children in the area. Surveys have been revealed that these primarily come from the apartment buildings and town houses where a great portion of the units are rented and not purchased. The end is not yet in sight.

## 'Milk & Honey' At Tenthouse

The musical delight "Milk and Honey", the show that did for the state of Israel what "Oklahoma" did for that state, is the current attraction through July 11 at Tenthouse Theater in Highland Park. Molly Picon re-creates her original Broadway role in the pioneer saga set on the Israeli desert.

A New York triumph and a road company sell-out, "Milk and Honey" is the high spirited tale of the vigorous pioneers who today are building a country in what was once a desert. The spirit of Israel is seen through the eyes of American tourists and through those of an American girl who has married and settled there and is trying to adjust to the hardships of a remote desert farm. The tourists consist of a platoon of widows, middle-aged but still on the prowl for husbands - "we're still too young to shoot," says one of them, and the American father of a girl who has married an Israeli farmer.

Miss Picon heads the Tenthouse cast and delights audiences nightly with her show-stopping renditions of "Chin Up Ladies", a plea for a more concentrated and optimistic search for a second chance at happiness, and "Hymn to Hymie", a musical chant asking for her late husband's forgiveness for planning to make coffee again for two on future mornings.

Remembered for her two-year engagement in the London company production of "A Majority of One" opposite Robert Morley, Miss Picon has also delighted film audiences in "Come Blow Your Horn" and is currently winning literary praise for her new book, "So Laugh A Little". She began her career at age five on a Philadelphia vaudeville stage and has since appeared in over 100 plays in the Yiddish theater. It was at the Empire Theatre in Chicago where she first met her husband, Jacob Kalich, also featured in the Tenthouse production. Miss Picon and Mr. Kalich celebrated their 46th wedding anniversary June 29, opening night of their Tenthouse engagement.

Supporting Miss Picon are Lawrence Brooks, Lucille Smith, Lynn Carlyle, Bryan Da Silva, Faith Quabius, and Jacob Kalich. Mr. Brooks achieved Broadway stardom as Edward Grieg in the original production of "Song of Norway". He returned to Broadway opposite Anne Jeffreys in "My Romance" and is a favorite on the summer circuit for his performances in "Kismet", "South Pacific", "Most Happy Fella", and "The Sound of Music".

The story of "Milk and Honey", running a wide range of emotions, from hope to despair, from faith to frolic, and from love to unrest, is told in the delightful words and music of composer Jerry Herman, creator of the Broadway hit, "Hello Dolly".

## From The Left Hand

The sudden death of 37 year old Ray Wilkins shocked Nilesites who only a week before had mourned the death of Clara Blase. The recent passing away of 36 year old Shelly Nathanson, a member of school board district 63, has left the community with a void, by the passing of three public minded people.

Wilkins served Niles as its health inspector and reflected Niles new look, with the service he rendered. Rather than carry a big stick Wilkins spoke softly and carried the respect of all who knew him. He was a very important part of Niles "New Era" and gave much of himself to make Niles a better place to live. He was in a position which could have been handled with arrogance. He preferred using tact and manifesting humility. This was the mark of the man.

This is the time of the year when newspapers submit examples of their efforts to various press associations in pursuit of awards and acknowledgements for work well done. Twice we have submitted past BUGLE efforts. This year we have been chosen as a judge for the Oklahoma Press Association's annual contest and now we're able to view these nebulous judgments from both the submitter's and submitted's side of the fence.

In the area which we are judging, "Community Service", we have tens of examples of work stacked on our desk waiting to be studied.

While many newspapers have a long list of accomplishments for work well done we were wondering when somebody might come up with an award for community efforts which were utter failures. If the dunce-hat award is ever announced we'll submit several examples of BUGLE works which have gone far, far astray. Examples of such campaigns might include the following.

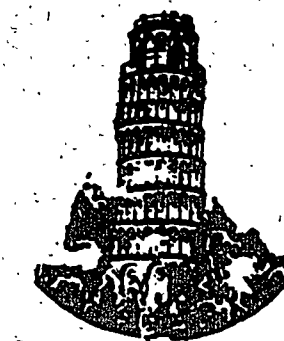
During the most recent years THE BUGLE shouted for open board meetings in school district 70 in Morton Grove. The impassable school board ignored our hootin' and hollerin' and the school superintendent brushed aside this upstart newspaper with exquisite derision.

In Niles we shouted loud and long against a parksite at Oakton and Waukegan, shouted equally loud in favor of Oakton and Milwaukee and behind the Oak School. You might say we made 2 1/2 strikes out of a possible three, for a batting average of .167, indeed a pretty anemic one.

In the areas of futility and failure we beat the drums for street lights in local areas in Niles, which we thought were needed as greatly as Niles new white way. We also favored a village manager by referendum, both in Niles and Morton Grove.

Scott Fitzgerald, the frenetically troubled writer of the '20s liked to use the phrase, "the rich are different than us". Today a favorite quip of the comedians is "the man with one million can live just as well as the man with ten million." Now along comes J. Paul Getty, reputed to be the richest man in the world—don't ask for a recount of his millions—asking for our sympathy in a recent magazine article, "the world is mean to millionaires."

So be it; but how kind is the world to non-millionaires? Mr. Getty claims the burdens of wealth are greater today than they've ever been and the rewards are slimmer. So be it; are the problems of the poor lesser than ever before with more substantial rewards?

No man can eat more than one meal at a sitting (unless he's a King Farouk), wear more than one suit or sleep in more than one bed (unless he's a King Farouk) at a time; drive more than one car and (legally) have more than one wife at a given time. It can be just as boring to eat pheasant under glass daily as it is to have hamburgers and spaghetti; but affluence lets you eat well, sleep without worrying about the payments due in the morning, on the house, car and the very bed you're sleeping in. Instead of the one seedy suit you're wearing, the closet will have a healthy abundance for you and your wife and if she feels like adding to her wardrobe, she won't be taking money that has to go to the Gas Co., the Electric Co., the Telephone Co., or the doctor.

Mr. Getty, of course, does not even consider the poor poor, he compares himself to the well-to-do poor—those in the \$15,000—\$20,000 bracket. "There are no noticeable differences between the way the two—the multimillionaire and the well-to-do live, except that the multimillionaire works harder, relaxes less, is burdened with greater responsibilities and is exposed to the constant and critical glare of publicity." Wrong Mr. Getty, there is one great exception; the other is forever scrounging around to stay in his bracket, is in debt almost beyond his income, is tension-ridden and pill-laden and frequently drops dead very, very early in middle life precisely because he lacks some of your millions.

The rich man is penalized for being rich; he has to be wary of strangers, hangers-on who only want his money, he can't have simple relationships with females—they're all aiming at alimony payments, and he must even be suspicious of friends who want something of him.

Once upon a time a status symbol was a car, a plane, a yacht, round-the-world trips. Nowadays with pay-as-you-ride, fly, travel the thoroughfares of the continents, sail, etc., what status is left for the millionaire that hundreds of thousands of Americans do not already enjoy?

There is nothing left but to bury himself into the octopus of his corporations, work and work and increase his list of companies, thereby improving the economy of the world's workers who need the advantage of his payrolls. So, we do need the Mr. Gettys of the world, but it is unfortunate that he has seemingly led a life free of the simple joys the average man is exposed to. Friends who love you for yourself, neighbors who will invite you to their house for a glass of beer, a wife who will stand by you through thick and thin, children who will clutch you as you open the door, weary after a hard day's work!

Say, what's he complaining about—he's been lucky!!!

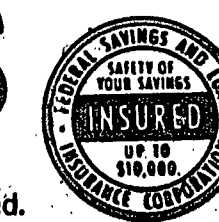

### Local Artists To Exhibit At Old Orchard Bank

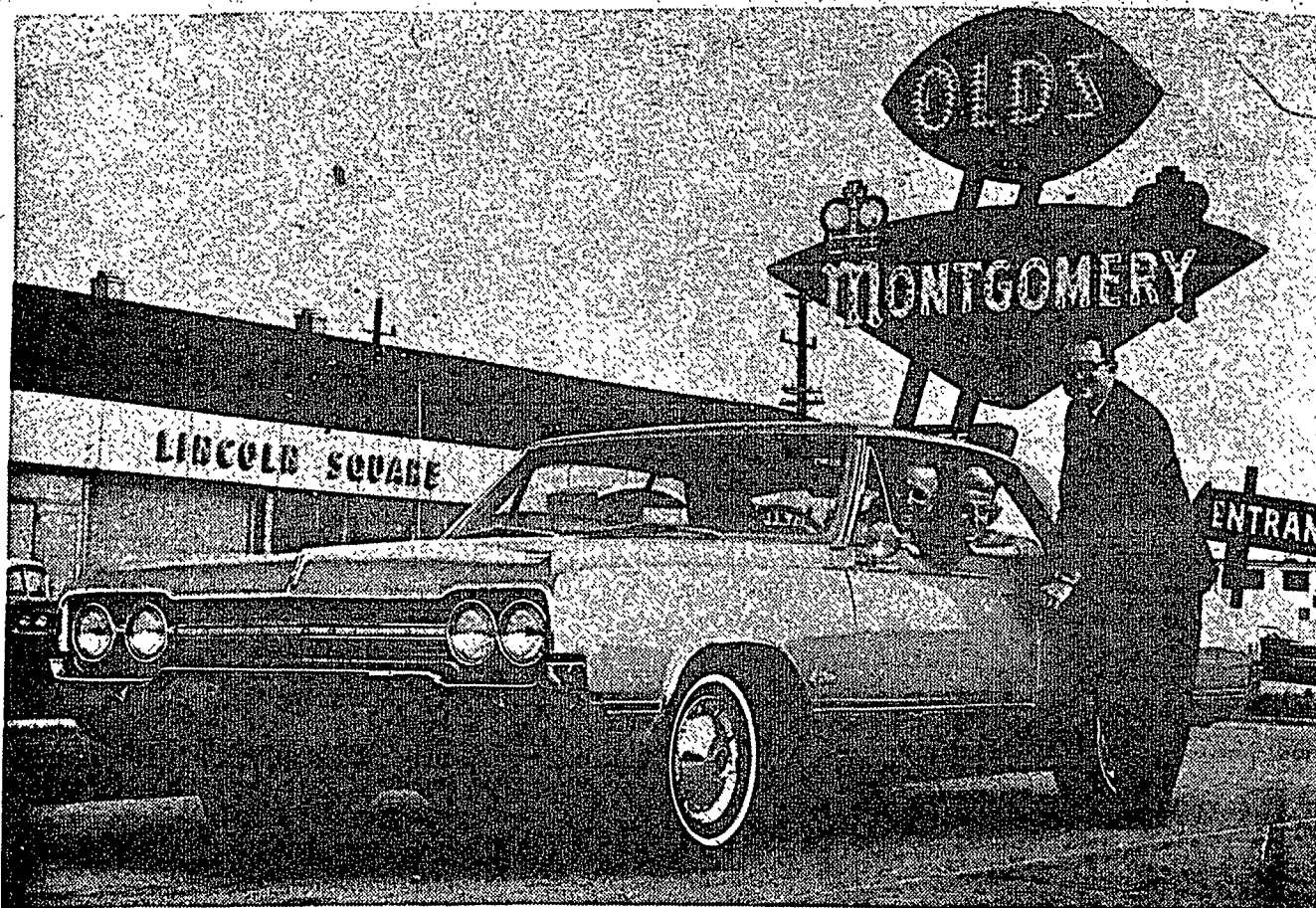
In its annual exhibit at the Old Orchard Bank, the Skokie Art Guild will show 36 paintings during the month of July.

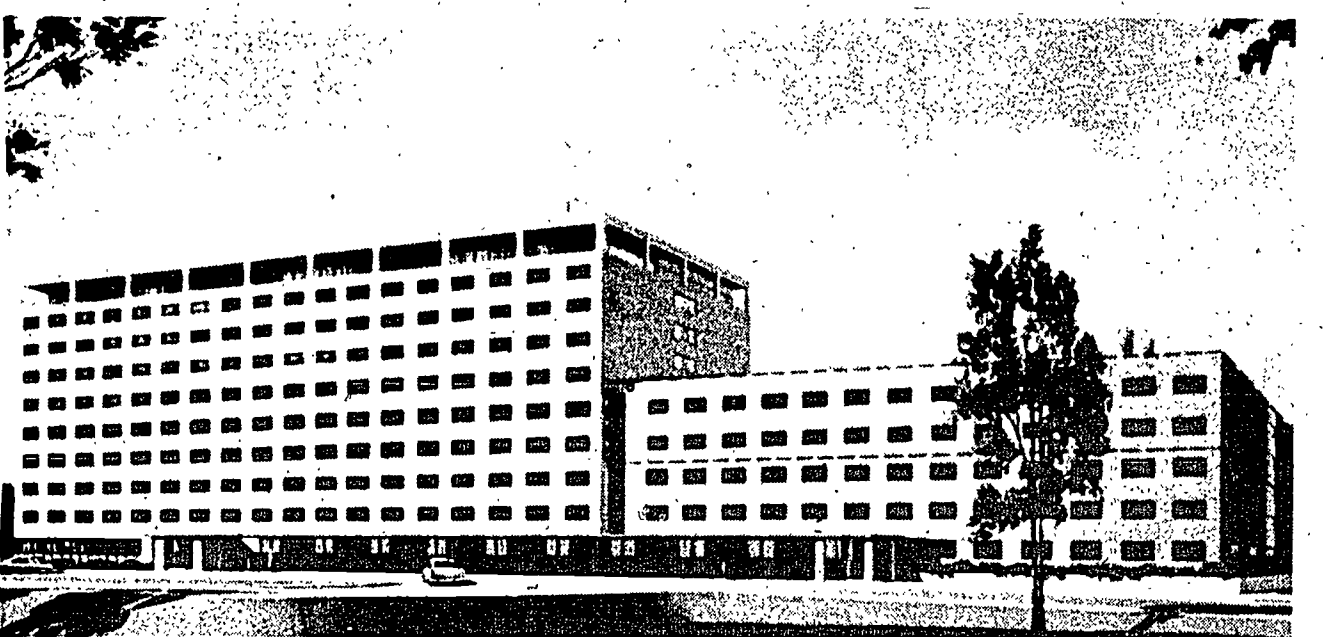

An additional two stories with space for 60 beds will be added to the expansion program currently in progress at Lutheran General hospital.

The two stories will provide facilities for patients needing diagnostic work, and will be added to the new west wing outlined in the plan scheduled in 1966. This will provide a total of seven stories, five above ground and two below ground level.

Cost of the additional floors is approximately \$700,000. This will be met thru short-term borrowing and public fund-raising.

## Chest X-Ray Is TB Safeguard

"More persons between the ages of 35 and 39 were reported to have new cases of active TB last year than any other age group," said Dr. E.A. Piszczek, field director of The Suburban Cook County Tuberculosis Sanatorium District.

"This at first seems remarkable, because we tend to think of tuberculosis in terms of an older population. Yet, in the last three years, the highest incidence was recorded for persons in their lower forties and the upper thirties," he continued.

"Within these age ranges, we find that women with tuberculosis are usually on the younger side of the age scale. For instance, in 1964, TB in men was highest in the 35 to 39 and the 45 to 49 age groups, but the highest incidence of women with the disease were between 30 and 34 years old."

"All adults, no matter what their age, have a precious legacy in their health. We urge that they protect it."

A chest X-ray at a near-by mobile unit is a safeguard against infection. The summer X-ray survey is co-sponsored by The Suburban Cook County Tuberculosis Sanatorium District and The Tuberculosis Institute of Chicago and Cook County.

### All America 'Credits'

Recently in your column, Letters to the Editor, there has appeared a lengthy letter stating categorically certain facts concerning the All-America Village Campaign, which statement of facts is confused and incorrect. This letter stated that Walter Zinn was solely responsible for the efforts on the part of the Niles Junior Chamber of Commerce in entering the Village in the All-America Award Contest. The letter implies that Walter Zinn was the only individual of the Niles Jaycees responsible for this program. There is no question that Walter Zinn, a former member of the Niles Jaycees (Walter Zinn having resigned voluntarily on May 7, 1965) had done work on the program, however, the record should be made clear that many of the members of the Jaycees spent as many hours as did Walter in accomplishing the result attained.

Russell McAndrew was responsible for all of the art work and much of the effort in filling the original application and further, Kenneth Karzen worked many hours in preparing the oral presentation at the San Francisco finals.

The letter previously published by you further indicates that the Village of Niles officials and other organizations only assisted as they felt it would accomplish something for themselves. I must state that this is equally untrue. The Village clerks office was most helpful in supplying information to our committee at the onset. We had support from the Village historian during the beginning months and when it became necessary that funds be obtained to finance the trip to San Francisco, we directly called the Mayor of Niles and upon the Chamber of Commerce of Niles, both of whom through their efforts obtained enough money to make the trip to San Francisco possible. It was the Niles Junior Chamber of Commerce which sought the services of Mayor Blase and asked him to present the oral argument in San Francisco. The other groups who attended the San Francisco hearings were necessary to assist and support the Niles Junior Chamber of Commerce in making its presentation.

It is unfortunate that the facts have become confused and this letter is an effort to clarify the situation. There were many other persons and organizations who worked with the Jaycees, both in spirit and in fact to bring about the award for the Village of Niles and it is my hope that this letter will lay to rest the apparent confusion.

## Dr. Shaffer Author Of Book

A book by Dr. James G. Shaffer of Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, has been published by Charles C. Thomas Publishers of Springfield, Illinois. Dr. Shaffer is director of microbiology and hospital epidemiology at Lutheran General.

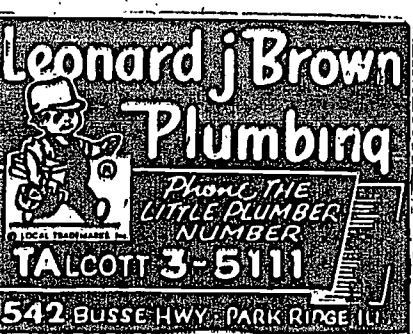

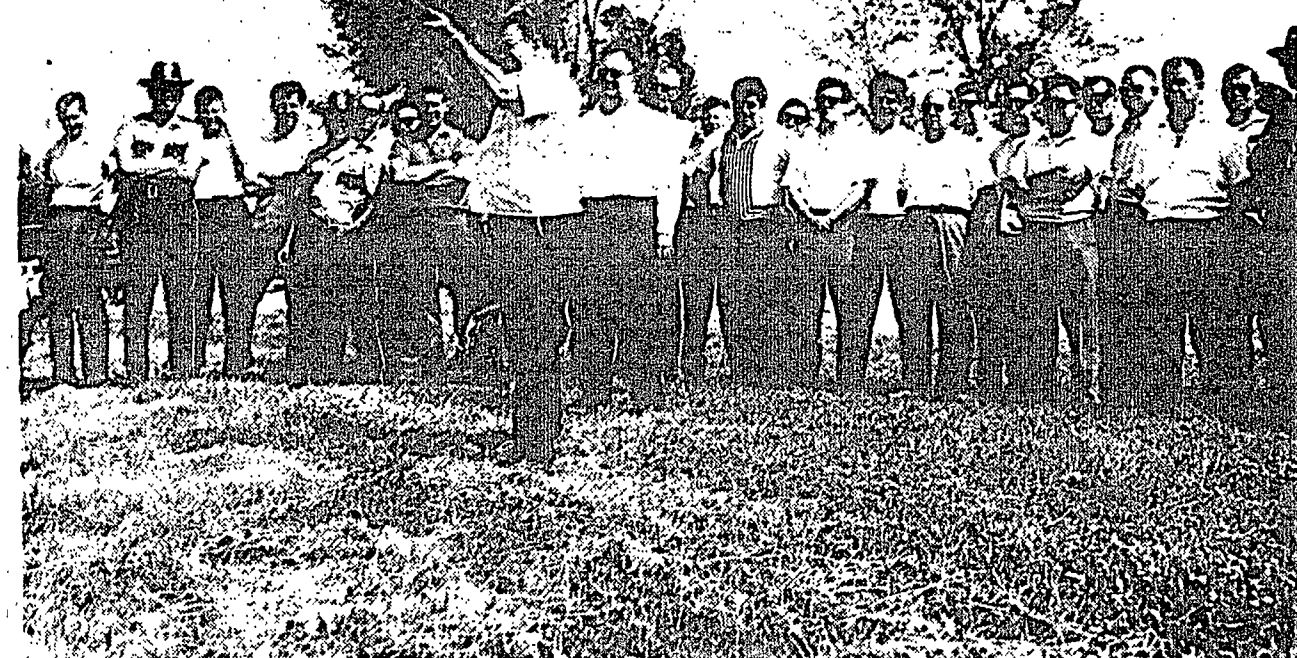
