3700 Pupils At Maine Summer School

More than 3700 pupils are presently attending the summer school sessions being held in the three Maine High Schools, according to Dr. Earle W. Wiltsie, superintendent of schools.

Dr. Wiltsie states that 1350 students are enrolled at Maine East; 1500 at Maine South; and 900 at Maine West. Nearly one-half of the regularly enrolled student body now attend Maine summer classes.

During the current 1965 session the district's three high schools are offering approximately 40 courses. The summer school curriculum covers a wide range of subject matter at all secondary levels (grades 9-12). Special classes are conducted in such areas as art, clothing, electronics, English, music and reading.

He later moved to Ohio where he graduated from Ohio State University. He entered the World Olympics meets in Switzerland where he distinguished himself by winning both the 100 and 200 meters races as well as the broad jump with a leap of 28 ft. 8 and 1/4 inches. He also ran on the 400 meter relay team that established a world record. He held the world record for 100 and 200 dash and 100 and 200 meters. "Jesse" is an All American who spoke in an All America city. In 1950 he was named the outstanding track athlete of the first half of the century.

The following are Schwartz's comments:

"I am happy to see on this platform Mr. Floyd Fuller, Republican leader of Maine Township. As you know Mr. Fuller's organization opposed the latest I ran on recently sponsored by the Grassroots Party, Sirtillary Mr. Simon, president of the County Board, though wrong in upholding the Zoning Board of Appeals in its decision to rezone Golf-Western from R-1 to R-6, has been right in the past in upholding and supporting our fight against density zoning. I certainly hope that these issues are decided in a non-partisan atmosphere in the future as they have been in the past. If any group takes a partisan stand, only the community will suffer.

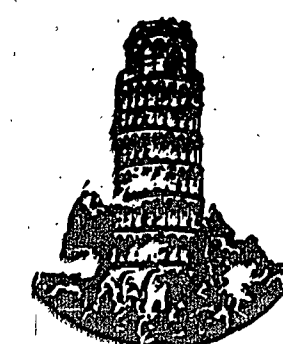
A few years ago the vast number of children produced by the zoning changes in the East Maine Area flooded our schools. Our school population grew 500% in a few short years. The school board recognized that it was the only local governmental body vitally concerned with these changing conditions endorsed a policy of opposition to density zoning. The main line of its argument was the number of children produced by high density housing was high, the tax dollars produced was low. The school was only able to keep up with demand by tax increases and bond issues. Today, the area is in the highest 1/3 of Cook County in taxes paid by its residents. It is in the lower 1/3 of Cook County in terms of assessed valuation behind each child.

We won the battle of zoning in that the zoning board began to inquire as to the numbers of children being produced by new housing—but the zoning board was too late. The era of town-house-duplex density housing which produced an excess of children over taxes is over. The era of high-rise apartments is now here—but the zoning board and the school board are still asking the old questions. They are still playing the numbers game.

It is time that we re-assessed the situation. The problem today is no longer the old one of number of children. Not the problem today is numbers of people as well as children. The high rise development at Golf & Western will have approximately 400 units—producing approximately 800 people plus children in small numbers. Ten acres of R-5 zoning will produce approximately 70 units or 340 adults plus about 350 children. What effect will more adults and less children have on fire protection, health, water, sewage and traffic patterns? I believe that the problems of adults density is one for a municipal government or self-incorporation can give us the tools necessary to fully explore the effects of this population growth on the community.

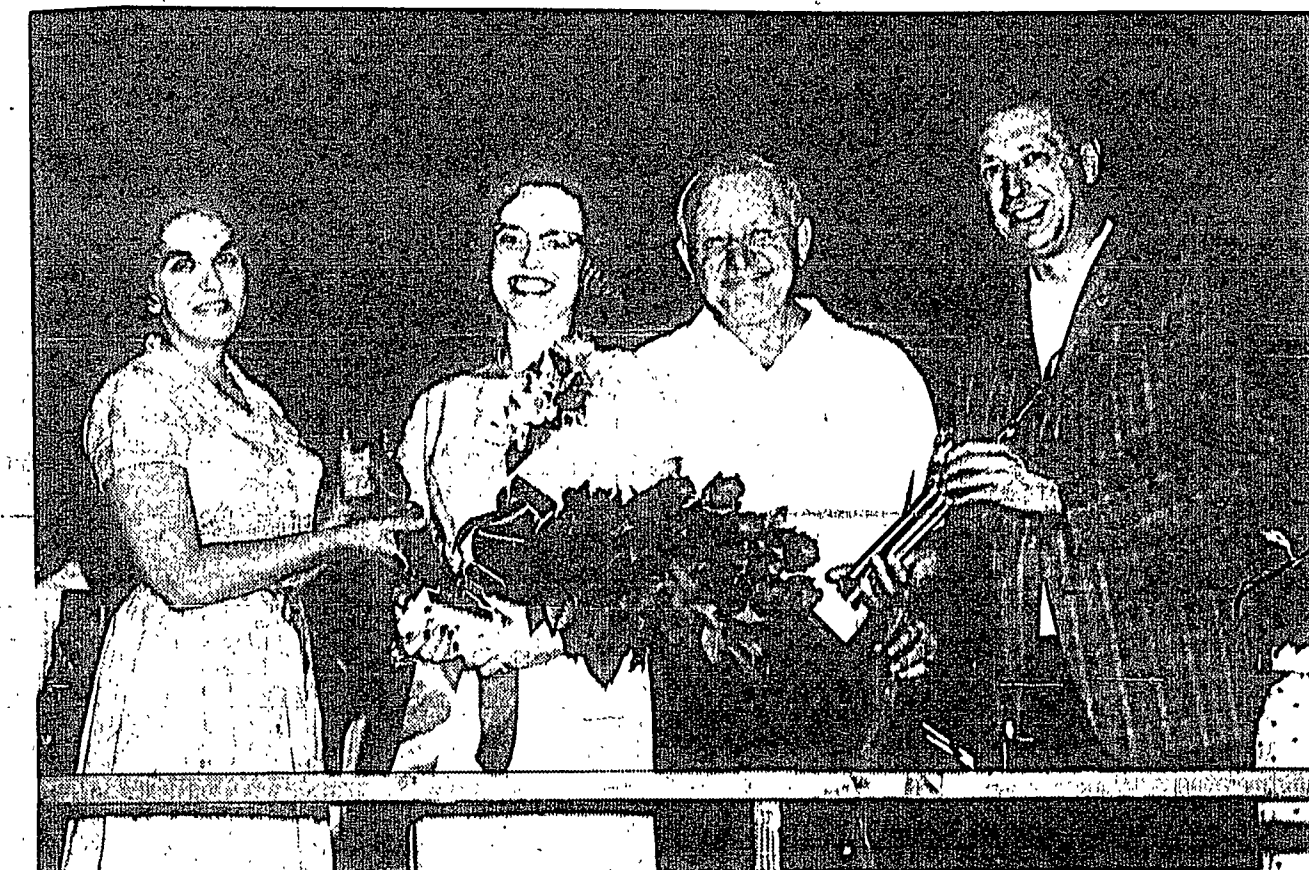

Seek To Annex Shermer

Trustee Berkowsky asked the annexation of Shermer Avenue between Waukegan and Dempster Aves., by the Village of Niles. This is a county road and it was recently upped to a 40 mile per hour street by the Cook County Department of Streets. Pleas and requests for the county to lower the speed limit have fallen upon closed ears and the only solution is to take the street into the Village Area. This street with two parks for children and used by school children constantly, is a definite hazard to the life and limbs of our children and Trustee Berkowsky quoted letters received from Reverend Murphy of the Lutheran Church, "Mrg. Flannagan of St. John Brebeuf and Steve Charnerski, president of the Park Board, among others, who asked for the lowered speed limit. Preferably the most desired solution would be closing up the whole street, discouraging any traffic at all, but that seems hardly probable. Trustee Wente while agreeing in essence that the increased speed limit was a danger and undesirable, rejected the idea of being responsible for the upkeep and care of the street. "Let the county be responsible for the necessary repairs and care of the street," said Bob Wente. Ed Berkowsky explained that the financial income from Motor Fuel Taxes, if the street reverted back to the Village, would cover any expense incurred in the care of Shermer Avenue. The Board with the exception of Trustee Wente voted for the resolution. (Mayor Blake implied that this seemed like a logical way for the county to force villages to take over the care of streets; increasing the speed limit and refusing to reduce same under pressure).

Holy Family Hospital To Open Intensive Care Unit

An Intensive Care Unit will be open at Holy Family Hospital, Des Plaines, about September 1, 1965. The new hospital facility will provide high level nursing care for patients requiring continuous observation and comprehensive treatment in an atmosphere of compassion and understanding.

Patients will be admitted to the new unit based on their nursing needs and on physician's recommendation. Such patients will include multiple injury and burn cases, acute coronaries, critically ill traumatic cases, pneumonia and major surgical cases for round-the-clock care following the release from the recovery room.

Nurses who have demonstrated ability to interpret patient's needs and to initiate the types of nursing procedures will staff the new service. As soon as the patient progresses to the point where his doctor decides that this type of concentrated care is no longer needed, he will be moved to the regular patient area.

Special nursing station is built-in within the unit for optimum control. In order to simplify individual nursing and treatment the most modern life-saving devices will be installed surrounding each bed. Provision is made for seven beds; patients to be accommodated in one room; a two-bed room reserved for patients who require complete isolation; two semi-private rooms in the area are designated for extended care.

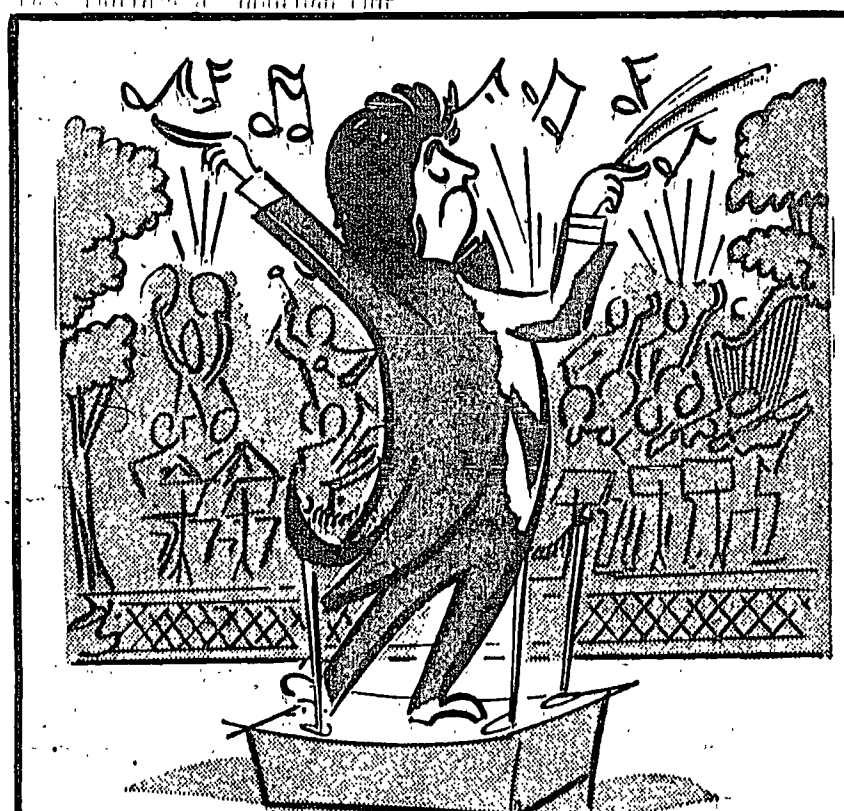

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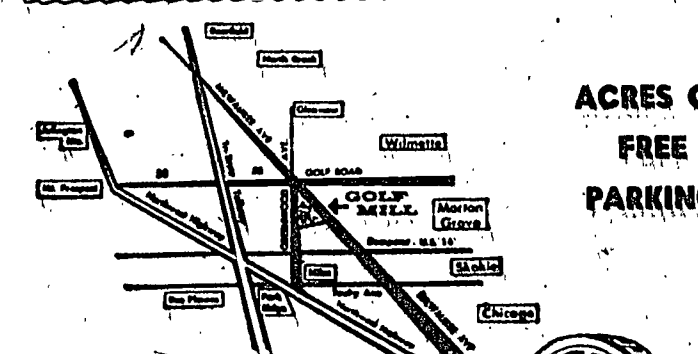

District 207 Board Appoints New Asst. Business Manager, Studies Site Developments

The board of education of Township High School district No. 207, at its regular meeting Monday evening, July 19, discussed problems of site development, filled 29 teaching positions, purchased 100 lockers for an expected enrollment increase at Maine South, set dates for the 1965-66 budget hearing, and approved 11 different state reimbursable programs for the three high schools.

In addition, a new assistant business manager, Robert E. Zisani of Sterling, Ill., was appointed to replace T. Nathan Pohl who became business manager for the Naperville, Ill., schools on July 1, 1965.

The building committee was authorized to secure additional bids for resurfacing tennis courts at Maine West. The architect will secure bids for construction in August on leveling and placing black dirt on 13 acres of the Maine South site. Development of play fields on the area will be done at a later time.

Contracts for installing lockers for 200 new students at the Maine South high school were awarded to J.C. Kasky Co. for installation of locker bases and up to 1000 lockers for lockers on the basis of the lowest bids. This total cost will be \$6,452.

Postponement of delivery of the Maine East High School Year Book, the Lens, was announced this week by Walter Lusky, Co-Director of the Summer School.

"We received word Monday that the printer could not meet the date originally given us, this Friday, July 23," Lusky said. "The printer has now stated that delivery will be made next Friday, July 30."

"We will set up distribution facilities in the Girl's Gymnasium on July 30, and begin distribution of books at 2 p.m."

School District 67 News

A driveway project at Golf Junior High School will wind up summer improvements underway for the physical plant of District 67.

The driveway involves the current Waukegan Rd. widening and curbing in Morton Grove between Dempster and Golf Rds. Changes in the roadway will make it possible for District 67 to put in the half-oval driveway originally blueprinted. It's on the west side of the district's newest school at 9401 Waukegan.

The new driveway will lessen the pressure on the two parking-lot entrances at the north and south ends of the building. It will not have a parking area. But drivers will have ingress and egress directly to or from Waukegan Rd. for pickups or dropoffs at the little used west entrance.

Harold Ohlson, Niles' director of Special Services, will retire at the end of this month after more than 30 years with the Niles Township High School district.

The Board of Education approved his resignation for retirement last Monday evening, July 19, after several persons on the board spoke their words of regret and best wishes.

Ohlson, who came to Niles in 1934 before Niles Township became a legally constituted high school district of the state, has held both teaching and administrative positions in the district. As a teacher he taught mathematics and science and was also a department chairman. He later became a class adviser and an assistant principal.

From 1956 to 1958, Mr. Ohlson was principal of the township's only high school. When the second high school was opened in 1958, he became an administrator in the district's central office in charge of special services and community relations.

Mr. Ohlson and his wife Gerda, who live in Morton Grove, plan to move to Morrison, Illinois, where relatives also live. Morrison, a town of about 3,000 persons, is in the Rock Island-Moline area.

In his early years on the Niles staff, Ohlson taught classes in the Lincoln school where the beginning high school district rented facilities for the high school youngsters of Niles Township.

Niles became a bona fide high school district in 1936 by vote of the people, and three years later the first high school building was opened.

Working with five superintendents in the past 31 years, Ohlson has been a part in shaping the future of the Niles schools.

Dr. Clyde Parker, Niles superintendent, said, "Mr. Ohlson through his contributions to Niles Township has influenced countless persons, and many of his labors since becoming an administrator at the central level will be in effect for years to come."

Parker pointed out that in the last few years the school board has adopted a written policy manual, which was done largely through the writing skill and

Teachers and administrators who have worked with Ohlson say his ability to teach is probably unmatched. Even though he was away from the classroom for several years, they said, he explained educational concepts whether they concerned finances, building, or professional ethics with remarkable clarity and sound methodology.

Ohlson was recently commended in the Cook County Educational Digest by a past student who wrote to the magazine asking that his letter be published. The letter, written by Donald Rhodes now a senior scientist with a leading corporation, praises Mr. Ohlson for his influence and for leading him into his career.

District 207 Board Appoints New Asst. Business Manager, Studies Site Developments

The board of education of Township High School district No. 207, at its regular meeting Monday evening, July 19, discussed problems of site development, purchased 100 lockers for an expected enrollment increase at Maine South, set dates for the 1965-66 budget hearing, and approved 11 different state reimbursable programs for the three high schools.

In addition, a new assistant business manager, Robert E. Zinnani of Sterling, Ill., was appointed to replace T. Nathan Fohl who became business manager for the Naperville, Ill., schools on July 1, 1965.

The Building committee was authorized to secure additional bids for resurfacing tennis courts at Maine West. The architect will secure bids for consideration in August on leveling and placing black dirt on 13 acres of the Maine South site. Development of play fields on the area will be done at a later time.

Contracts for installing lockers for 200 new students at the Maine South high school were awarded to J.C. Kipley co. for installation of locker bases and to Lyon Metal Products for lockers on the basis of the lowest bids. The total cost will be \$6,452.

Postponement of delivery of the Maine East High School Year Book, the Lens, was announced this week by Walter Lussky, Co-Director of the Summer School.

"We received word Monday that the printer could not meet the date originally given us, this Friday, July 23," Lussky said. "The printer has now stated that delivery will be made next Friday, July 30."

"We will set up distribution facilities in the Girl's Gymnasium on July 30, and begin distribution of books at 7 p.m."

Following the approval of employment of 29 teachers, Assistant Superintendent Ralph J. Frost told the board that all vacancies are now filled. A few who were secured too late for July approval will be presented in August. The list of new appointees appears in a separate article.

Each year approvals requested by all programs that are subsidized by state funds. Those approved by the board for 1965-1966 include: the educable mentally handicapped, social workers, psychologists, the homebound program, diversified occupations, supervised job training, distributive education, office occupations, vocational business education, the maladjusted program, and the handicapped program. 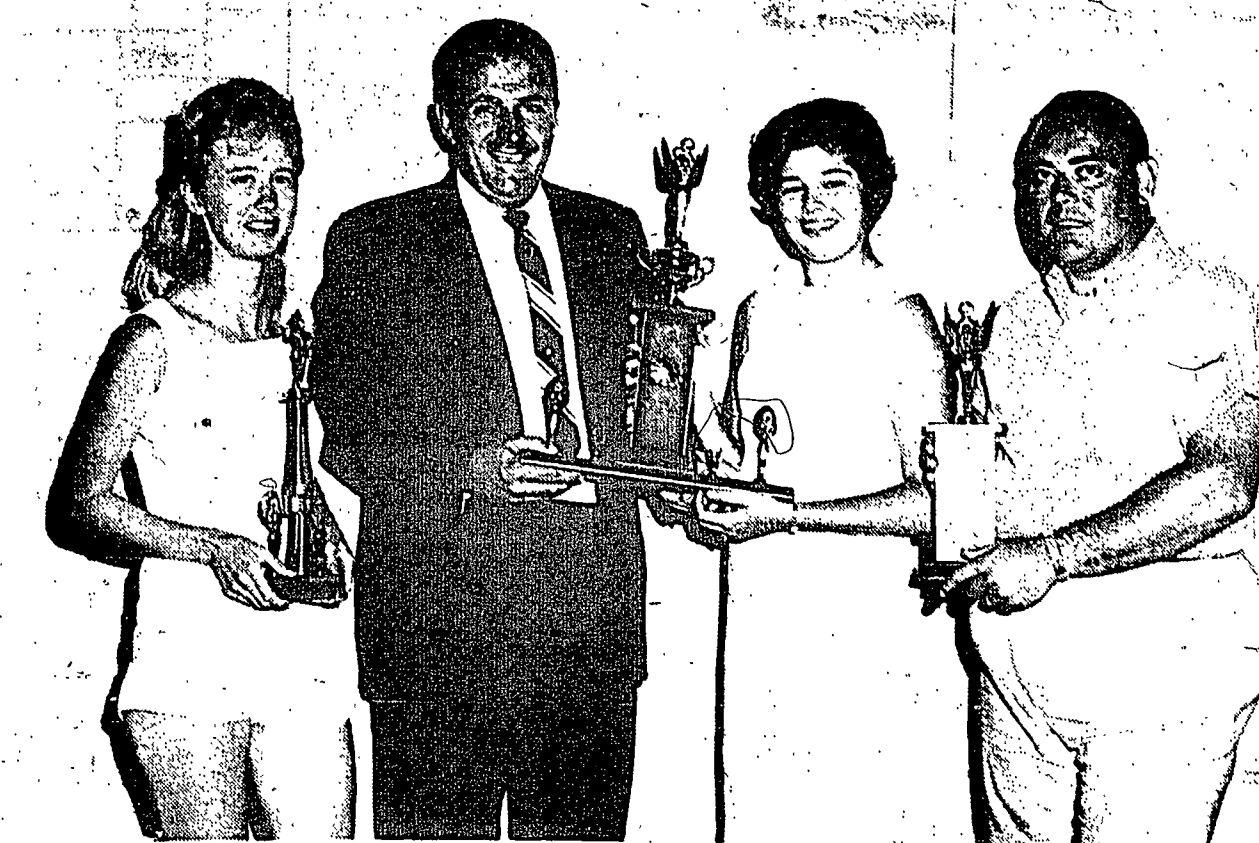

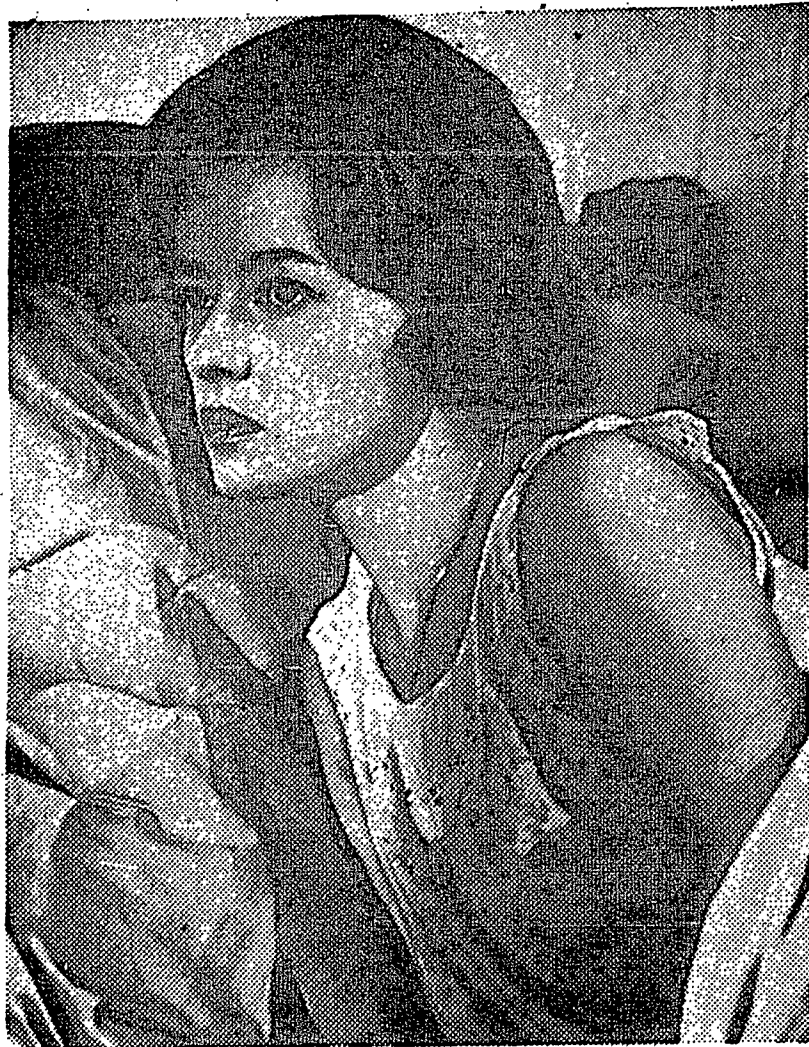

Chest X-Ray Is TB Safeguard

"More persons between the ages of 35 and 39 were reported to have new cases of active TB last year than any other age group," said Dr. E.A. Piszczek, field director of The Suburban Cook County Tuberculosis Sanatorium District.

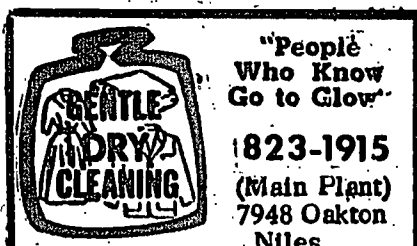
"This at first seems remarkable, because we tend to think of tuberculosis in terms of an older population. Yet, in the last three years, the highest incidence was recorded for persons in their lower forties and the upper thirties," he continued.

"Within these age ranges, we find that women with tuberculosis are usually on the younger side of the age scale. For instance, in 1964, TB in men was highest in the 35 to 39 and the 45 to 49 age groups, but the highest incidence of women with the disease were between 30 and 34 years old.

"All adults, no matter what their age, have a precious legacy in their health. We urge that they protect it."

A chest X-ray at a near-by mobile unit is a safeguard against infection.
