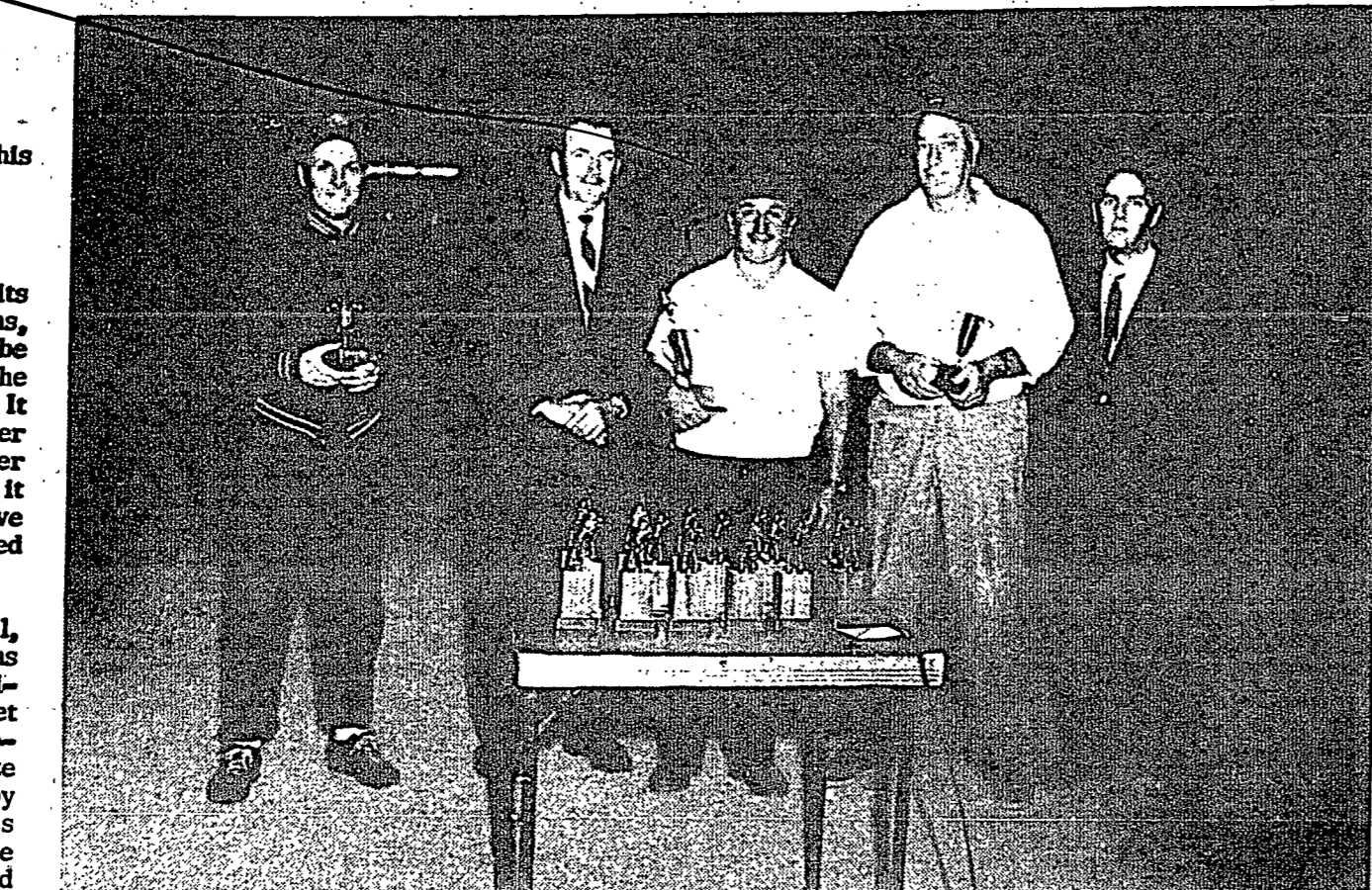

Rubbish Pick Up Routes Changed

poses, to almost zero. It therefore, becomes very important that the present Board of Commissioners take every legal means at its disposal to acquire any open area which may still be free of large land developers.

One of the legal rights a Park District has to acquire land is by Condemnation under the Eminent Domain Act. The Board made use of this legal method in the case of the Tam O'Shanter Golf Course in order to halt any immediate re-zoning of the property. This action also halted the possibility of resale of the property. The Condemnation Proceedings will also give the Niles Park District the opportunity to have a Feasibility Report made up to find out whether or not the property can be self-sustaining.

There have been numerous articles published in the local newspapers by individuals who have been misinformed or have

arrived at erroneous conclusions. President of the Niles Park Board, Steve Chamerski, questions the source of the one article placing a value on the property up to \$12 million dollars. President Chamerski stated that he had made a verbal offer of \$3 1/2 million dollars for the Course.

There is also the question of where the information came from which states that the Cook County Forest Preserve District would allow 45 acres of its property to be sold or turned over to the Niles Park District. The Forest Preserve District cannot lease, sell or otherwise dispose of its property, since it is entirely public owned. However, the property can be used by the Park District on a year to year agreement basis, as is now the case with the Niles Park District, which has an agreement with the Forest Preserve District to use two parcels of land for recreational purposes. The use of this land is restricted to picnics and play areas, with no permanent installation of equipment allowed. Mobile backstops for ball playing, tables for picnics, etc., allowed.

The public must be made aware of the fact that the Cook County Forest Preserve District property belongs to the public and is not available to accommodate any particular business interests.

As far as the Niles Park District is concerned, should

it be fortunate enough to acquire the Tam O'Shanter Golf Course property, it not only could be used as a Golf Course, but as a large recreational complex, including tennis, swimming, Boy Scout and Girl Scout Camp Outs, etc. Bicycle paths can be laid out without much trouble along the outer limits of the course. The modern Club House can be used for large gatherings for any type of recreational activities.

This large Golf Course and surrounding open area, represents 120 acres of fine land which is now ready and waiting to be used by the residents of Niles for outdoor recreation activities of all sorts. This will conform with the Physical Fitness Program strongly advocated by the late President Kennedy, and currently supported by President Johnson.

In a memo to Mayor Blase of Niles, Park Board President Chamerski, stated that many Niles residents must drive down Howard Street, which cuts through the Tam O'Shanter Golf Course, in order to get to work in the morning and to get home in the evening. At the present time, the out pouring of workers from the various industries now located on the eastern edges of Niles, into Howard Street, results in a terrific traffic jam. Should the twenty-five parcels of land be developed as planned, into twenty-five separate office buildings, warehouses or industrial complexes, it will certainly add greatly to the traffic problem.

There are many people in Niles who are not aware that J. Emil Anderson & Sons, Inc., have acquired all but two of the fine homes on the east side of Caldwell Avenue, across from the Tam O'Shanter Golf Course, so as to demolish them and make way for additional industrial complexes.

Residents of Niles, are we going to permit the loss of the last opportunity to acquire the last natural open land area in Niles?

dered to make a study for Niles Park District.

He noted such a study might include the valuation of the property and the potential income of the golf course and its attendant facilities. A 20 year review of the number of golf days per season, the number of golfers per week, both during the work week and one on weekends would also be studied. He noted prices, costs and income of surrounding comparable courses would be studied, weather data gathered and myriads of golf information digested before conclusions relative to action on the course could be determined.

Other statements by Leske included the following:

....He was surprised and disappointed at Mayor Blase for his anger at the Park Board, for its taking prompt action in filing the condemnation suit. Leske implied the potential loss of industrial tax-money income to the village might have contributed to Blase's anger.

....The Park Board is expected to sit down with County officials within the next couple of weeks to determine whether or not the 45 acre tract of Forest Preserve area, alongside the course, is available for lease. Leske said he was open to such an idea. However, he added, in past conversations with one of the Forest Preserve administrative heads the Forest Preserve jealously tries to conserve reserves, and the County Board is not prone to granting leases for activities for groups outside its jurisdiction.

Blase Meets With Ancel, Simon

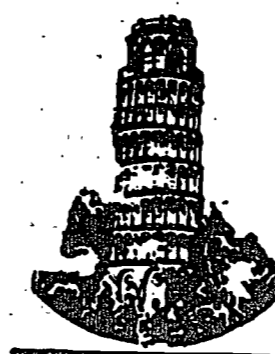
County Board President Seymour Simon told Niles Mayor Nick Blase Tuesday the County Board is willing to hear proposals from Niles Park Board regarding the use of Forest Preserve property alongside Tam O'Shanter, for the use of a golf course.

Blase, meeting with Tam O'Shanter representatives and Simon, said Simon was sending a letter to the Park Board indicating the willingness to entertain proposals for a course on leased Forest Preserve land.

Blase also indicated another meeting between village, and park officials, and Tam representatives, and possibly County officials, might meet relative to the Tam proposals.

A September 30 Zoning Board meeting in Niles, which will hear a petition for the re-zoning of the TAM property to M Limited Manufacturing, from its present Residential zoning, may hasten a meeting between these interests. It is understood Village attorney Jim Geocaris implied at a village board meeting two weeks ago that the park condemnation suit would not necessarily be significant in the seeking of the re-zoning by the TAM interests.

The other side of the coin would show if the Manufacturing Zoning was granted the value of the property might increase substantially. It has been reported the TAM property was purchased by its present owners for about 3 million dollars. With the new zoning the price might well increase to 5 million dollars. The Zoning Board's decision thus becomes of paramount concern, both to the TAM interests as well as to the Park Board.

Reading Specialist Joins East Maine Staff

A nationally known remedial reading specialist, Miss Ellenor-Knowles Stafford, has joined the staff of the East Maine School District No. 63 as language arts consultant. Her appointment is the first major step in the district's new program to provide classroom teachers with a curriculum and instruction consultant, to implement a philosophy of instruction geared to the individual child and based on the belief that "it's normal for a child to be different."

Miss Stafford comes to the district with a broad background in the development of individualized instruction programs and remedial therapy techniques. For the past five years she has been in charge of the reading clinic of the Baltimore County Board of Education. In this capacity, she worked directly with school personnel in formulating a pilot project to establish floating remedial reading clinics throughout Baltimore County. As head of the clinics, she closely coordinated her work with departments of public service such as the offices of guidance, pupil personnel and psychological services, Children's Aid and Family Service, the Juvenile Detective office, and the medical (psychiatric, behavior and seizure) clinics of local hospitals.

She worked with all students on a one-to-one basis in the development of reading therapy, and with the parents of clinical students through individual conferences and group counseling sessions.

The results of this experience will be adapted by Miss Stafford in her new position. She will assist teachers, especially new teachers, in putting into practice the philosophy of individualized instruction, utilizing the variety of techniques new teachers have learned in college.

"Teachers, new teachers particularly, need someone to whom they can turn, to work with them, demonstrate teaching materials, guide and advise," said Miss Stafford.

"In an individualized teaching program based on the belief that each pupil's individual learning pace is normal, teachers need specialized guidance and special encouragement if such a program is to be successful," continued Miss Stafford.

Miss Stafford holds an AB Degree from Sweet Briar College for Women and a Masters in Education from the University of Virginia. She has studied also at the University of Puerto Rico, Miami University, the University of Maryland Overseas in Munich, Johannes Gutenberg University, Johns Hopkins University, and Loyola College.

Since graduation in 1948, Miss Stafford has taught as an elementary and college-level instructor, both here and abroad. While in Baltimore County she conducted a reading class for television station WJZ. During the summer from 1961-63, she served as a reading and study skills specialist at the University of Maryland.

Miss Stafford is an author, having several articles to her credit and one book, "The Silly Child," Maryland Teacher, March 1960.

It's A Smelly Problem--- OWNERS SUE TO OBTAIN USE OF PRIVATE SEWER

Earl R. Foswold, 8384 Dempster, and Dr. A. R. Starr, M.D., 8380 Dempster, residents of the unincorporated area in Des Plaines, filed a suit in Circuit court last Thursday to obtain use of a privately owned sewer running past their homes on Dempster st.

A long chain of events leading up to Thursday's filing began, the suit says, when Foswold and Starr bought permits from the former owner of the sewer, The Greenwood Avenue Sewer co., to connect their own sewage lines to the Dempster st. trunk line, in 1956 and 1957.

They did not take advantage of the permits at the time, the suit says, because they were using septic tanks.

During August of this year, the suit says, the two homeowners decided that septic tanks no longer provided adequate sewage disposal, and they applied to Yackman's Domestic Service co. to connect their sewage line with the Dempster st. trunk line, basing their legal right to make the connection on the permits bought from the former owner of the sewer in 1956 and 1957.

Altho Yackman later refused the applications, Foswold and Starr went ahead with a \$3,000 sewer construction and connection project, and removed their septic tanks.

Now, the suit claims, Yackman has blocked the connection between his sewer line and the lines from the two homes, al-

legedly in an attempt to force the two men to transfer their sewer line to Domestic Utilities co., or to force extra payment from them.

Booth said Yackman's refusal is part of a personal conflict that began with the law suits over the water service in 1960.

The suit asks for a temporary injunction ordering the sewer service to be provided until the case is given a hearing, when a permanent injunction will be requested.

At present, Booth said, due to the connections blocked by Yackman last month, the sewer systems in the two homes are beginning to back up, and "it's starting to smell."

In 1960, the sewer system was bought by Victor Yackman, 133 Washington rd., Glenview, owner of Domestic Utilities Services co., named as defendant in the suit.

On Oct. 10, 1960, the suit says, Yackman stopped the water service, to Foswold and Starr, which was in connection with the Dempster st. sewer and water service, and the two men took court action to have the service resumed.

Harry Booth, attorney for Foswold and Starr, said that shortly before the water turn-off he had sued Yackman and had recovered \$7,000 fraudulently collected from the two men for the water service.
