It is a good reason why a consolidation of the entire metropolitan Chicago area is a likely eventuality.

There are many problems confronting the Chamber and our Village, the most prominent of which is the controversial Tam O'Shanter Country Club golf course. My opinions have been sent to the press, but I do want to impress our members and the citizens that it is most important that we retain this internationally famous golf facility in its present championship form.

Tetanus, or lock-jaw, as it is commonly called, is transmitted to the blood stream when the skin is lacerated or punctured an injury common to firemen. It is one of the few infections that still has a high death rate - about four of every 10 people who contract the disease die.

The shots were administered by Nurse Alice M. Bobula under the supervision of Dr. Jerome J. Podgers, Commissioner of the Niles Board of Health.

A Shot In Time----

Niles officials took steps recently to protect their firefighters from one of the most common hazards of that profession-tetanus.

Niles firemen received the first of a two-part inoculation of tetanus vaccine which gives up to four years protection. It is believed that Niles is one of the first communities in this area to administer the vaccine on a department-wide basis. Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbi said that this action was taken because of the increasing number of alarms being answered with its attendant accident-producing possibilities.

The size of the All-America parade in May indicates that we have a lot of proud people here. The Ball will give us a chance to renew old friendships and make new ones. The Ball will give us a chance to meet the mayors who are coming from all over the United States to visit us."

"Some things are invaluable; some memories are priceless; some celebrations capture the imagination with their sheer magnitude. The All-America City Ball is all of these. With the great Frankie Masters Orchestra headlining a complete and fun-filled show; with the people of Niles in a jubilant mood; with the atmosphere and surroundings of the lavish O'Hare Inn; could it be any less than one of the rare moments in our lives?"

The \$7.50 Ball tickets are selling fast. Table reservations in blocks of ten tickets are still available, although it is uncertain how much longer the reserved section will be open. Many groups and industries in Niles have assured themselves of good tables by ordering their tickets early.

A new group in the community, The North Shore Committee To Support Your Local Police, is commented upon in our Letters To The Editor column this week. While the letter sheds light on the group we might add the organization is an anti-civil rights group.

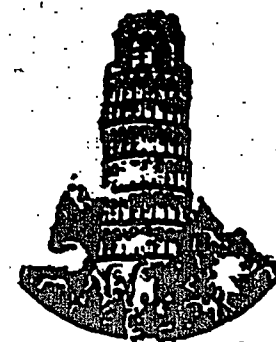
Why the right-wing groups in this country must constantly hide behind sheets or under hide behind sheets or under public motives, reflects a sad commentary on the times. Obviously trying to make light of the pro-civil rights North Shore Project, its name seems aimed at denigrating this group. Whether or not one's sympathies favor the civil rights movement nevertheless, these activists have gained respect by standing up for what they believe. The courage of the civil rights certainly stands out in contrast to those who camouflage their intentions.

Niles trustee Bob Wente called to remind us we left the wrong impression regarding the upcoming September 30 zoning board meeting regarding the TAM zoning. Bob said last week's article noted the value of TAM would increase if the Niles Zoning Board and Village Board approved Manufacturing Zoning. Bob said, whether or not the Boards approved the new zoning, the court would decide its true value. He mentioned, according to THE BUGLE article, it seemed the onus was on the public boards when in reality the determination of its true value, would be decided, after expert opinion was presented in court, as well as other pertinent information. The recent sale of the Edgewater Country Club in Chicago for an alleged \$7,000,000 would likely be part of this pertinent information.

Newspapers like to puff themselves up a bit by reminding its readers of the many public services it renders. Seldom does such service boomerang to the detriment of the giver. But in good old BUGLELAND we were a recent exception.

Jerry Maller, president of Golf Park Terrace, recently called to tell us school board 63 was considering transferring the students in his area from the Washington School to the Melzer School. He sought our wisdom in combating the transfer. We suggested he lead an entourage of fellow-homeowners to the next school board meeting, and we added, "the larger the group, the greater likelihood your case will be considered". Two weeks ago Jerry led 78 GP Terrace residents to the meeting and they gained their point. The school board decided not to transfer these children. Instead, the Board moved its plans across Washington Street, and transferred the children east of that street to Melzer. Two of the children caught in the switch have the same last name as the guy who suggested Maller lead his forces to the meeting. While Golf Park Terrace owes THE BUGLE a small bow for its excellent advice there's two

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Trustees Correct Misleading Impression....Question Park Board's Methods

TRUSTEES: 'WE WANT TAM BUT NOT AT ANY PRICE'

Blase: 'We Want Facts... Not Fantasy'

Summing up the official position of the Niles Village Board Mayor Blase said Tuesday night, "We all want Tam. We do not want it at any price".

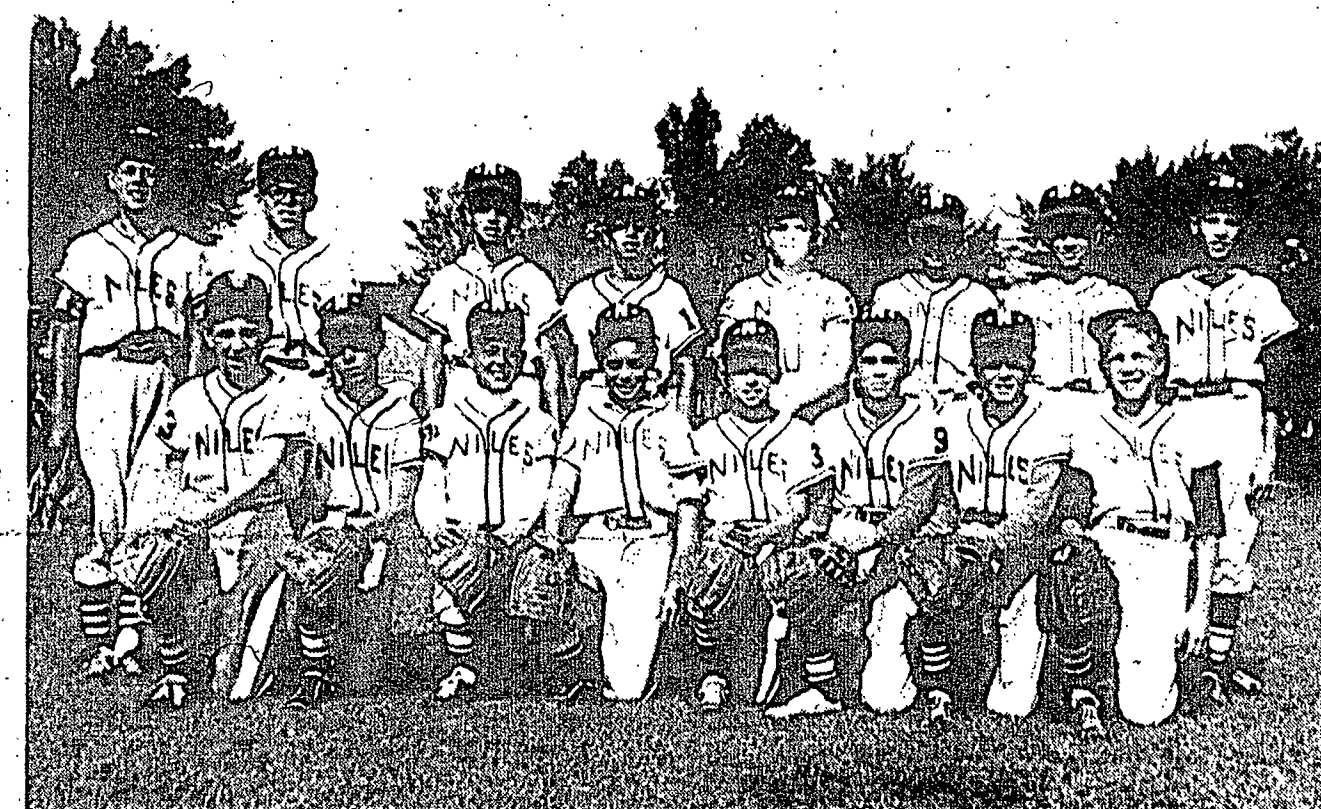
Blase's remarks followed trustees Berkowsky, Peck and Wente who made it emphatic the Village Board "desires to save TAM". Berkowsky said the trustees disagreed with the METHOD of the Park Board. He said the Park Commissioners acted "too quickly, too fast and did not act properly, in their method of seeking condemnation without first trying to reach accord with J. Emil Anderson owners of TAM. Berkowsky said the Park Board "cut off all lines of communication with Anderson. He added there is no longer a basis for negotiation between the Park Board and the Anderson Company. Berkowsky said this policy statement is being made to make it clear the Village Board wants to save TAM but "we want it done sensibly and properly".

Trustee Bob Wente commended the Anderson company which he said is a wonderful representative builder which is "reliable and sensible". In his dealings with the company (Wente heads the Water and Sewer Committee) they always comply with recommendations, which is unlike the "run of mill builders".

Wente said he felt the alternate plan of using part of the Forest Preserve and TAM for a golf course was "realistic and sensible".

New trustee Keith Peck noted when he was a park commissioner prior to moving on to the Village Board, he initiated the seeking of TAM. He said he still feels the same way as does the Village Board. Peck added there is a wrong impression that the Village Board is against the project.

Blase summed up the Board's position by stating the seeking of TAM reflects the majority opinion of the Village Board. However, Blase mentioned an opinion which he disagreed concerned the belief by some Niles-ster that Niles has TOO MUCH industry. Blase said a town can never have too much industry anymore than it can have too much money. Blase finalized the night's opinions on TAM by stating what is needed are facts....not fantasy".

"League of Women voters", "Nonpartisan", "Informed Women", say the signs carried by three suffragette figures in the showcase of the Morton Grove Public Library, created in 1920 by women who had worked in the Women's Suffrage movement, the League of Women Voters had an immediate and urgent objective—to help the women of the United States to use their newly acquired vote wisely and well. Through the years the purpose has expanded to create in citizens (both male and female) a sense of responsibility for knowing about governmental problems and doing something about them. League members want to LET THE PEOPLE KNOW. MAKE THE PEOPLE CARE. HELP THE PEOPLE ACT.

In honor of the forty-five years of progress League has made, Governor Kerner has proclaimed this week (Sept. 12-18) LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS WEEK in Illinois. Governor Kerner stated, "The League of Women Voters has been in the forefront of action to improve our government in the fields of welfare services for children, water conservation, protection of voters' rights, fair employment practices, constitutional revision including a constitutional convention, court reform and revenue reform."

The Morton Grove L.W.V. is only five years old and can hardly take credit for the last 45 years of progress (most of the members weren't even born when League was first started); but in these past five years has already contributed much service to Morton Grove residents. For example, when League was still provisional, it produced a comprehensive booklet on Morton Grove which was given to each homeowner as a public service. Ably edited by Mrs. Sherwin Potter and Mrs. Ralph Tuch who had wonderful help from the membership, the booklet "This is Morton Grove" received much acclaim from village officials and the general public.

In election years, the M.G. League has had well-attended Candidates Meetings. It is League policy to be non-partisan and to study and support issues, never candidates or parties. Because of this non-partisanship, Candidates Meetings are run objectively and fairly for both sides are represented and given equal time. League members are encouraged to become active in the political party of their choice but board members are not allowed to be affiliated with any political situation. Mrs. Egbert DeVries resigned from the board recently when her husband became involved in politics.

The Speaker's Bureau, headed very capably by Mrs. Oscar Liskar, is another service League offers to the civic and

social organizations of Morton Grove and Niles. League will provide well-informed, well-prepared, Speakers to those groups who would like to learn more about such current issues as The United Nations and its problems, Welfare in Illinois, The War on Poverty, and Constitutional Revision (III. constitution).

Mrs. Herbert Hibnick, Publications Chairman, announced recently another valuable service to Morton Grove residents. She says, "In conjunction with Head Librarian Mrs. Chet Aggen, we have permanently placed in the M.G. Library League publications in various fields—Welfare, Election Procedures, U.N., etc., which students especially will find helpful. Mrs. Aggen will be happy to help you find them."

Distributing nonpartisan information on candidates, issues, and voting procedures is another League strong point. Last fall, the M.G. League had a Voters Service Booth in Koryvet's and the people who received the readable, understandable material were very appreciative (especially information on the long orange ballot). Mrs. Edward Andersen, who had a short time to organize the booth, did a thorough job with much help from League members who volunteered to help man the booth.

League studies many varied issues on three levels of government—national, state, and local. Some of the items that will be presented at Unit Meetings this coming year will be The Development of Human Resources, Welfare in Illinois, Reapportionment, Foreign Economic Policy, the Village Manager System of government and many others. Mrs. James Plonka, a Niles woman in the Morton Grove League, has said, "League unit meetings are factual but not boring because they are usually presented in understandable language by women who know what they're talking about."

The car wash will be open from 9 to 4 Saturday.

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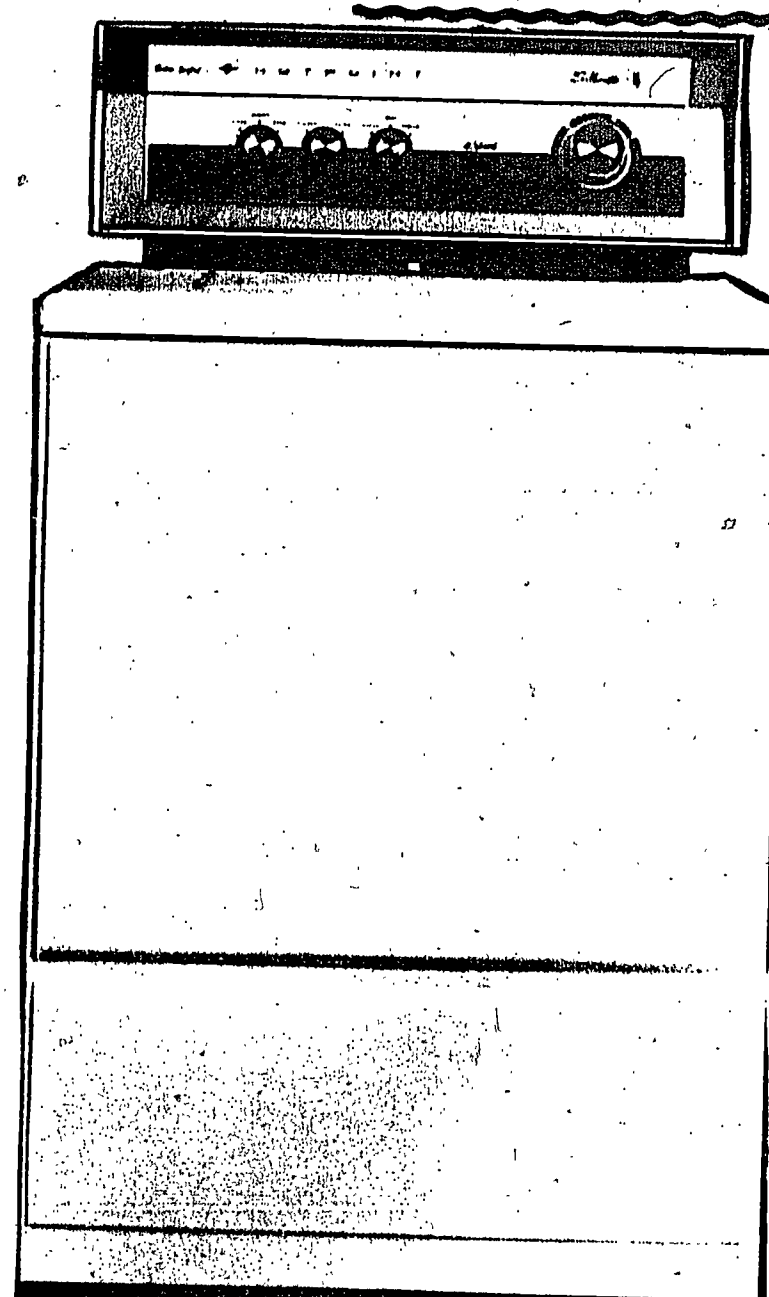
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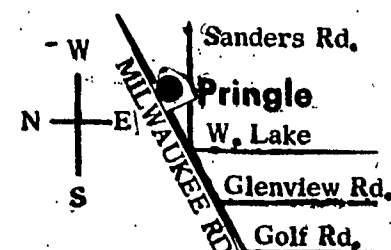
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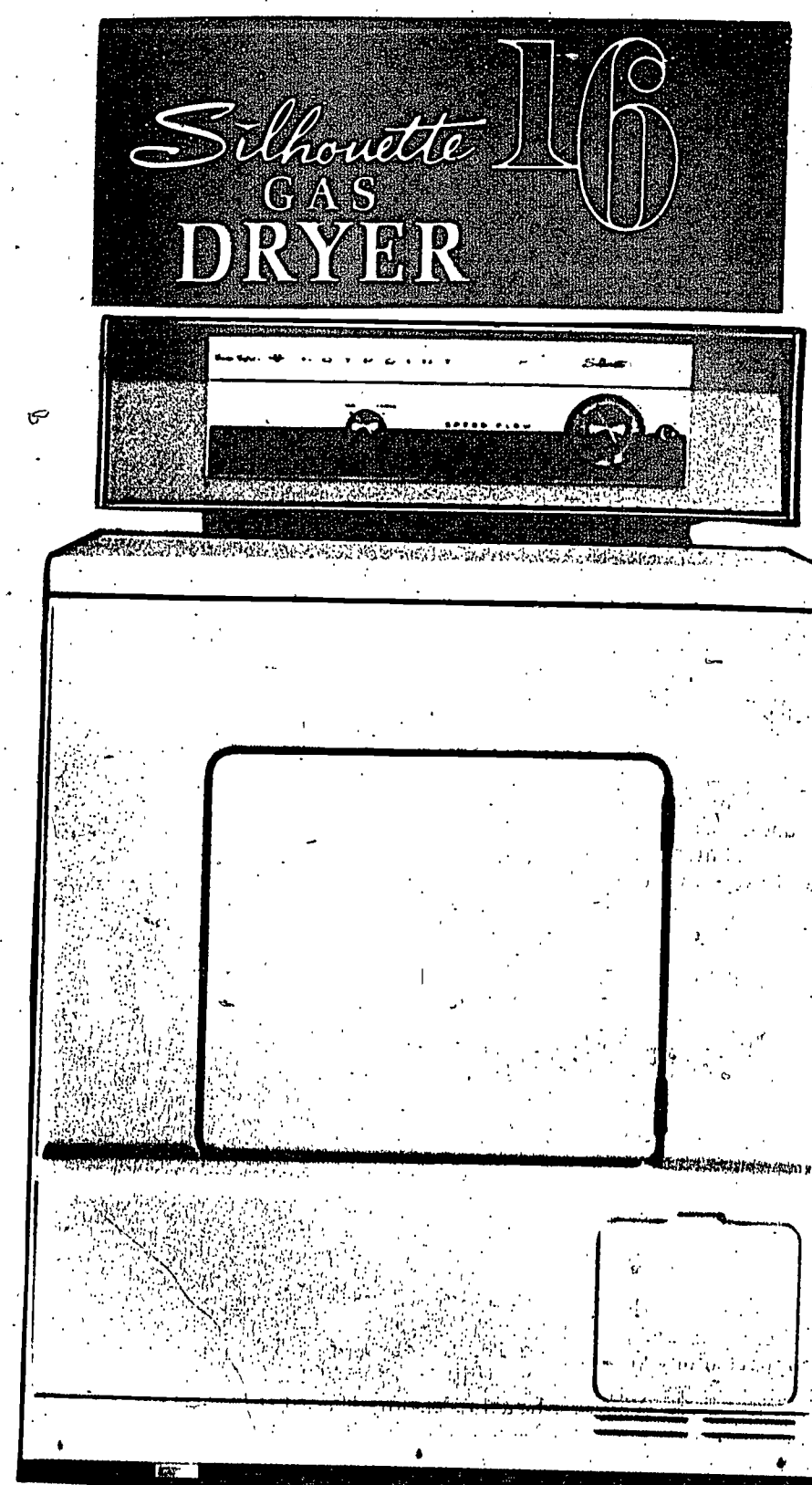
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Crusade Of Mercy Committee

PO Stamped Envelope Prices Raised

To halt an annual \$3.3 million loss in the postal envelope sales service, the Post Office Department today announced an immediate increase in the price of printed and plain stamped envelopes.

Under the law, stamped envelopes must be sold at not less than cost. The increase will become effective Saturday, September 11.

Excluding postage, the price of plain envelopes sold in box lots of 500 will be increased about 10 per cent. For less-than-box lot sales the price will be raised one cent per envelope, to two cents above postage.

The cost of printing return addresses on envelopes is being increased as follows: For orders of 1,000 or more, from \$2.50 to \$4.00 per 1,000 and minimum orders of only 500 envelopes are being increased from \$1.25 to \$2.25.

Over-the-counter sales or small quantities of envelopes account for a substantial amount of the loss being eliminated by the envelope price increase.

During Fiscal Year 1964, the Post Office Department sold about 2 billion stamped envelopes producing about \$17 million in revenue.

\$1,600,000 Tax Levy Approved In District 63

A 1965 tax levy of \$1,600,000 for educational purposes was approved last week by the board of East Maine School District 63, according to Dr. G. William Bullock, Jr., superintendent of schools.

Other amounts to be levied, receiving approval of the board, are as follows:

General Building fund: \$287,500
Municipal Retirement fund: \$30,000
Working Cash fund: \$57,500

Dr. Bullock announced a record enrollment as of the third day of school this year of 6,216 children, with the largest proportion of enrollments falling at the kindergarten level - 1,083. The breakdown of pupils per class grade is as follows: kindergarten, 35 students per class; first grade, 31 per class; second, 29 per class; third, 26 per class; fourth, 23 per class; fifth 27 per class; sixth, 26 per class; seventh, 31 per class; and eighth grade, 32 per class.

"These are highly satisfactory ratios we feel," noted

Dr. Bullock, "and indicates that the district is firmly on the road to implementing its projected policy of individualized instruction for each and every pupil in the East Maine School system."

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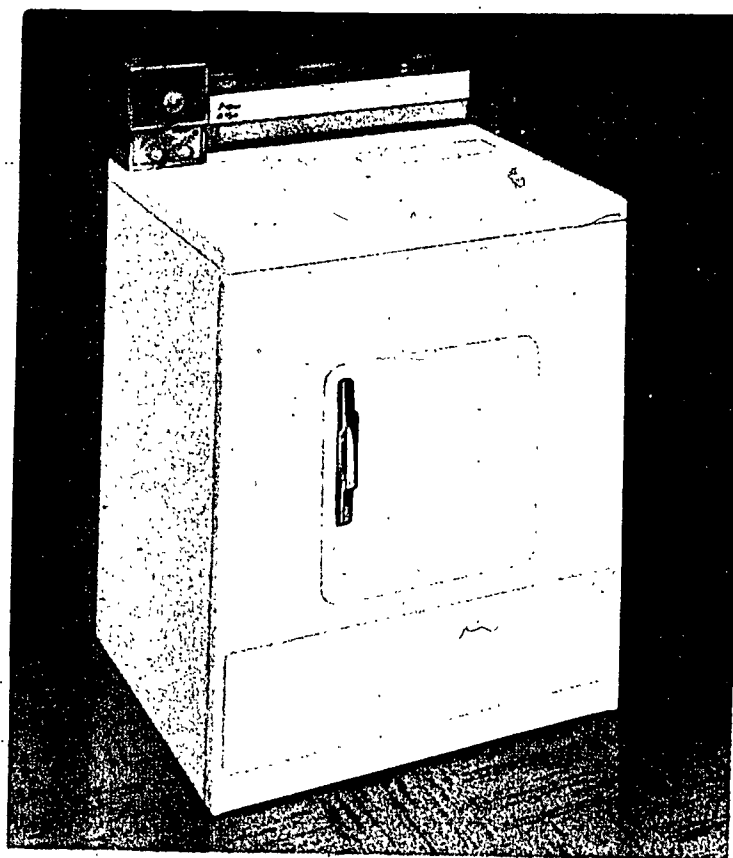
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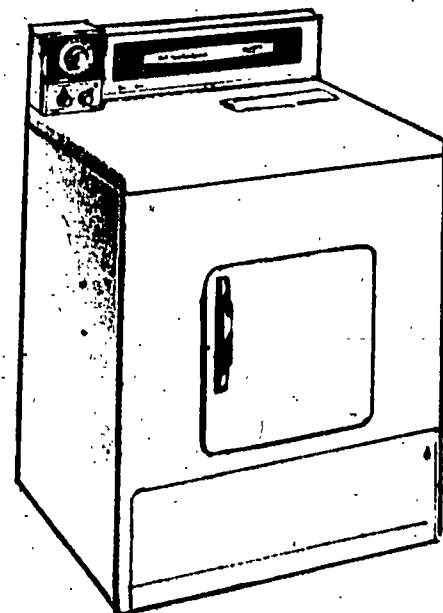
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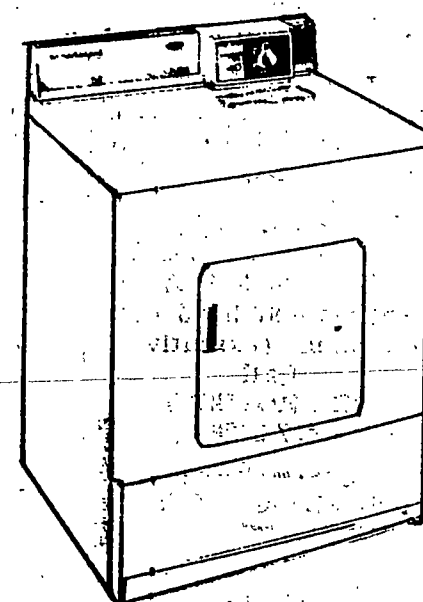
