Children who live north of Main and east of Milwaukee are invited to the morning sessions. Those living south of Main or west of Milwaukee are invited to the afternoon program.

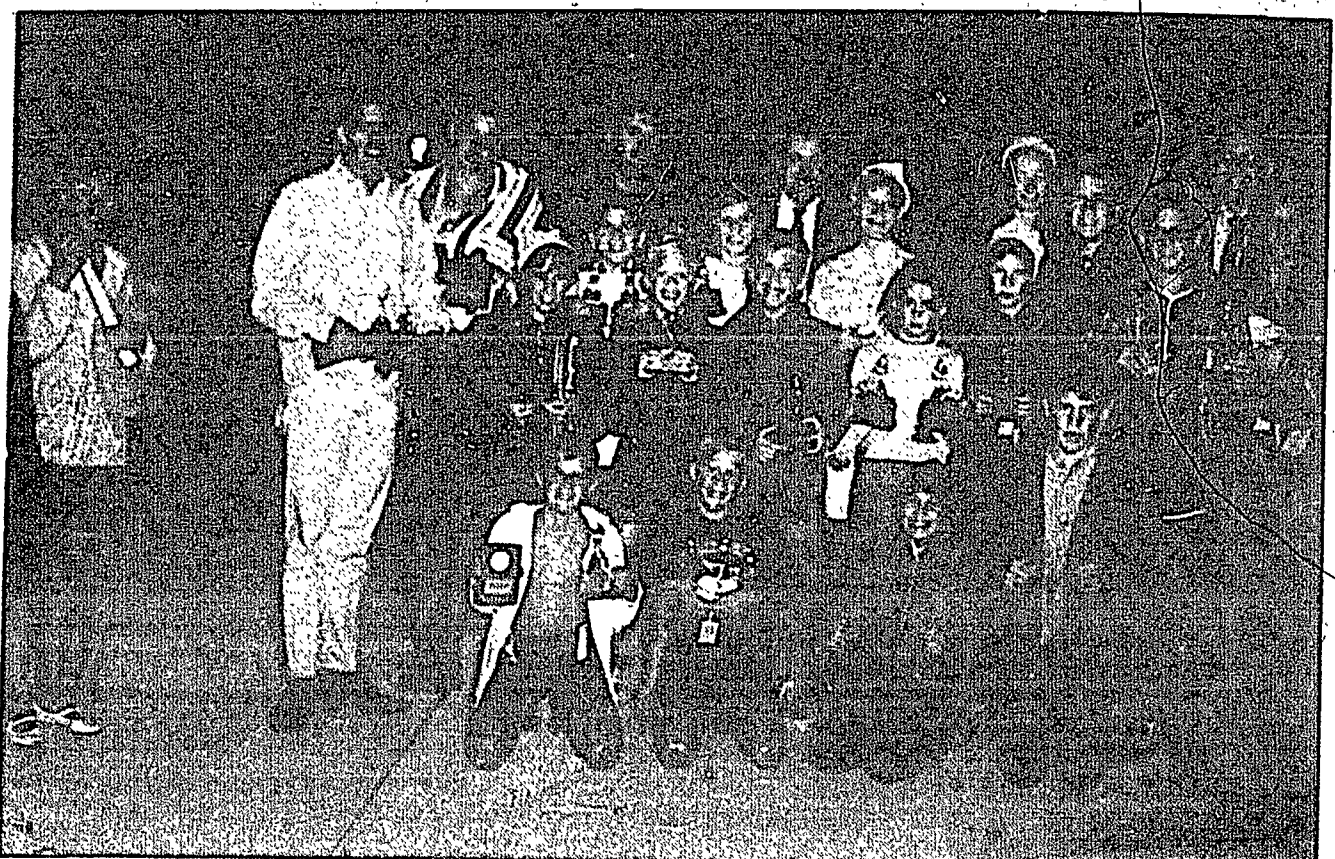
Story hours will be conducted by Mrs. Ann Rempel, Assistant Children's Librarian and Mr. Joseph Miszewski, Children's Librarian.

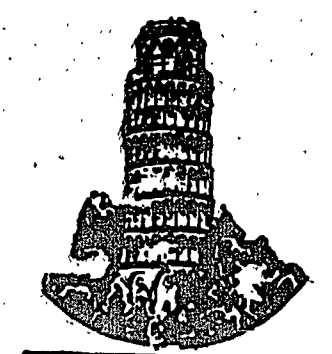

The money will be used for the construction of a 5,000,000 gallon water reservoir tank alongside the present one at Touhy and Waukegan. It is being built by Keno Construction Company.

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Another Morning Another Yawn

"How could you justify the long queue for tickets back to Germany for visitors? Coming as survivors from a homeland as offered you gas ovens as the ultimate in security, why the innumerate desire to relive the old times?" I continually alternate friends who are doing just that. They quote me the accepted and much propagated lines—"You must move with the times, you cannot stagnate in a bottomless pit of hatred—these are the younger German generation—those who were responsible for the holocaust are now in purgatory." Wiser and more experienced heads than mine doubt the truth of such remarks. The American born and bred, the thought of putting foot on the land of the Nazis, the land that found it expedient to destroy six million fellow humans for the myth of a Super Race, brings utter honor to my soul. There is no forgetting and no forgiving in my heart; a Rabbi who survived was quoted, "It is not necessary to forget, but one should forgive." Sorry Rabbi, I cannot. The following reprint from the New York Times and taken from the Chicago Daily News tells you why.

"One Little Boy"

"Why the search for Nazis 20 years after World War II? Why does bitterness still burn as a hot coal in the hearts of millions throughout the world? Why can so many decent human beings not find in their hearts the capacity to forgive and forget? There has just been published in Germany a book entitled "For Theirs Was The Hell". It is a documented account of the fate which befell some of the 1,200,000 Jewish children under 16 years of age in Hitler's concentration camps. These few sentences from the store are enough to suggest one reason: "Then the guard ordered the children to fold their clothes neatly and march into the gas chamber and crematory. One little boy, less than 2 years old, was too little to climb the steps. So the guard took the child in her arms and carried him into the chamber". There is one reason—one little boy. (There are 5,999,999 reasons more, for me).

Twinkle, twinkle, little star—the starlight and the bright glow were there, the glitter was fondly absent. Straightforward with hand outstretched in greeting, the girl came into the room, sheathed in poignancy. There is an air of compulsive attraction towards Susan Oliver, star of the visual entertainment field; the males are captivated by her projected warmth and tenderness, the females are lovingly attuned to her simplicity and unflinching womanhood. No theatrical coyness, no neurotic genius, no psychiatrist couch hugger, Susan is an intelligent and intellectual parcel of femininity and though always on stage, she tends to underact rather than overact. Her only exaggeration is her eye make-up, it gives you the impression of looking into a wide blue horizon and that is not bad at all. Her greatest charm lies in a combination of friendliness and reserve and a talent for presenting her make-believe as accepted reality, the way you want it to be. The frame of total poise in which she moves is shattered by one little nervous habit—tucking her blonde hair behind her right ear frequently.

The tyranny of the Great American Obsession—redistributing the bulge—has not (and probably never will)

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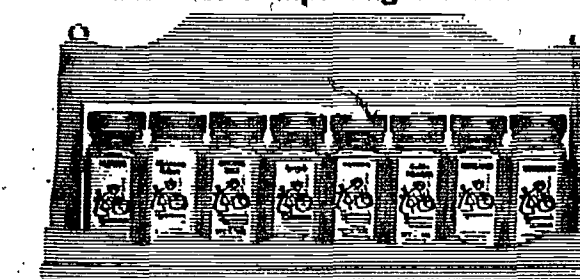
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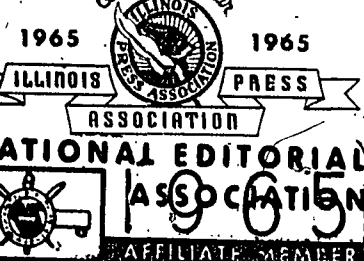

The campaign to raise \$200,000 to complete the expansion of Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, has reached \$36,950, reports John E. Kaufmann, executive secretary for the board of trustees.

The \$200,000 will complete the \$6,200,000 expansion program currently underway at Lutheran General.

"Now that the summer vacation period is over," Kaufmann pointed out, "more workers are being recruited to help bring the campaign to a successful close."

Kaufmann pointed out that gifts of all sizes are welcome and needed to help provide the additional hospital facilities urgently needed by the community.

Work began in the summer of 1964 to add three additional stories to the original building and to build a five-story wing on the west of the hospital.

The expansion will add 263 more beds for a total of 587. This will provide additional facilities for psychiatric, intensive care, medical-surgical, diagnostic and long-term patients.

In addition, the expansion provides a new emergency department, outpatient facilities and expanded service areas.

Down By The Old Mill Run

Wasn't it Shakespeare who said, "All the world's a stage and we're the players," or some reasonable facsimile? In the Mill Run Playhouse, the words were taken literally one evening recently. A small group of slightly intoxicated customers in the front row felt they could act as well as the performers. After each actor said his or her lines, "me, too," thespians, echoed those lines. It couldn't have been an easy task to continue in the face of such appalling rudeness. How about a bit more self-discipline for the audience? In another theatre-in-the-round, the first row audience put their feet on the stage and the performer had to circumvent those feet each time he found it necessary to be at that spot on the stage. Come now—such sloppiness has to be seen to be believed and unfortunately the seeing isn't hard.

That in essence is the reason Polly Rowles, delightful featured player in the recent attraction, "Remedy for Winter," at the Mill Run, dislikes playing theatre-in-the-round. "The illusion and glamor is lost with such intimacy between audience and performers, also, I much prefer the proscenium stage," she says. The proscenium stage is the one we've been accustomed to all these years. The platform stage is shaped like a rectangle and raised about five feet above the floor. The wall is in back and the performer projects to three sides. The audience is seated well below and in front of the stage. "Sometimes I have the feeling that I've been whirling all through the performance, trying to reach all four sides of the audience and end up with a headache after the show," Polly continued, wearying even as she spoke of the ordeal. Polly Rowles is one of those performers you've grown accustomed to her face, but the name eludes you. Once you've seen her close at hand, her bubbling charm won't let you ever forget her name. In television and movies and on the stage you'll find her—"I'm just a working woman, wherever the part is I'll go. I adore the theatre and though I speak of retiring, I'm sure I never will."

Polly is not a shy, retiring violet, resting on her laurels as an artist, and she is not of the school that believes an artist should stay out of world affairs, or civic matters that are important. "I'm not a do-gooder, but pressure applied at the right time to the right people will get the job done every time." She is a most vocal New Yorker and the powers that be in New York will hear from her when things are not to her liking or can be improved.

Most of all she decries the deterioration of the theatre as mass entertainment. Prices have rocketed and the faithful followers who came week after week, to each new play are pushed out by the fabulous prices. There is no more stock or repertory theatre when the same cast played different parts every few weeks the star system has ruined the stock theatres and as a consequence the audience is a fickle one—visitors or partygoers or some time attenders, not the hard core that kept theatres busy day after day, week after week, month after month.

Warm and gracious and fun to have around, Polly considers herself a "stubborn mule" when she wants something—and "it takes one to know one" she admits.

Jack Palance, screen villain, mellowed by his Television series, The Greatest Show On Earth, comes to the Mill Run Playhouse for a two weeks' run of "Heaven Can Wait" (or Here Comes Mr. Jordan). This is a fantasy of a prizefighter who almost died, but almost entered Heaven, but continues his shenanigans on earth, while in Limbo. It runs through October 3rd.

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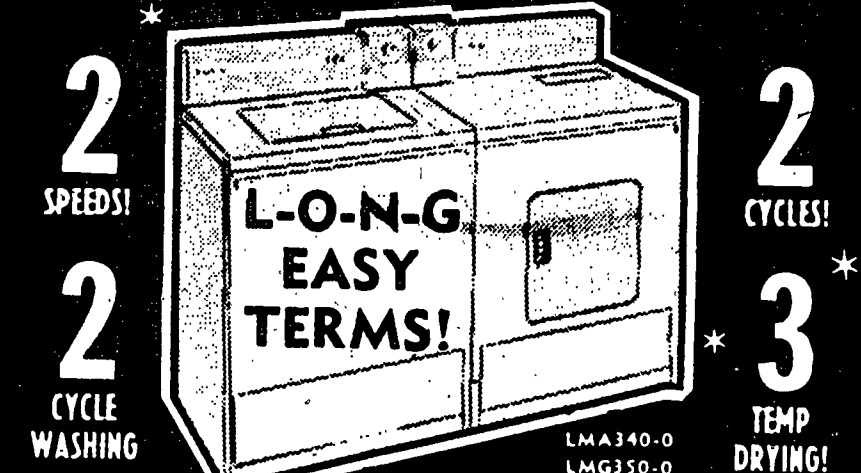
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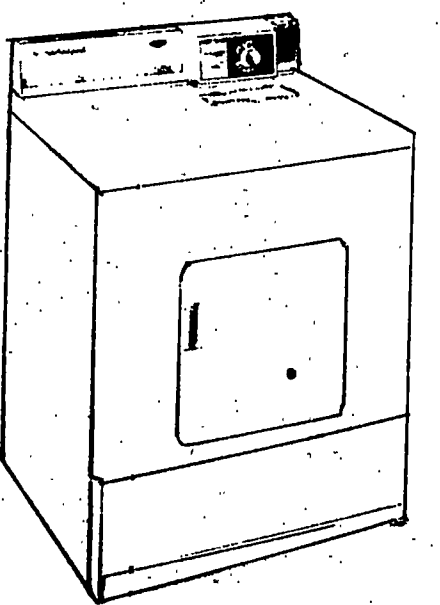


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36 Nilehi Finalists For Merit Scholarships

Thirty-six seniors attending the Niles Township High Schools this week were named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists, announced Dr. Clyde Parker, superintendent.

Thirteen of the semifinalists attend Nilehi East, while 12 go to Nilehi West, and 11 attend Nilehi North.

Lost African Capuchin Monkey Recovered

On Friday, August 27 our pet was enjoying a frolic in the back yard attached by a long leash to the clothes line. Shortly before dinner time, I went into the yard to bring him in only to find him gone. The neighborhood children were pressed into service in an effort to find him but when darkness began to fall and he was nowhere in sight the police department was alerted.

The challenge was one the department has never been asked to meet before, for Nicky is not an ordinary animal. He is a two year old African capuchin monkey weighing under five pounds and having capabilities beyond those of a dog or a cat. A tree climber, he can leap great distances which has led us on more than one occasion to say that he must be half flying squirrel.

In the days that followed both the police and we were to receive reports of persons having seen him in a yard, garage or in Maxyhill Cemetery. The frightened animal, with so many alerted to his apprehension, ran like greased lightning from anyone who came near. We never harbored fears that he would not have enough to eat for there are many fruit trees bearing now and insects in profusion. Water could be obtained from bird baths or puddles. Anxious moments came with the realization that from the date of his disappearance our area, except for a few days, has been visited with record cold temperatures, a very real threat to our tropical oriented pet. Monkeys are susceptible to respiratory diseases from exposure to drafts or extreme cold and Nicky had never been exposed to temperatures below 65 degrees. After he was gone for several days we abandoned hope of ever having him returned alive.

Sixteen days after his disappearance at about 6:45 p.m. on September 12, handsome officer Richard Vandini, badge #165 of the Niles Police Department rang our front doorbell with the announcement that he had our pet in his animal warden's vehicle in the driveway. We ran out to gaze in disbelief that our supposedly fragile Nicky was alive and in surprisingly fine condition. His coat was shiny and he appeared to have gained weight during his sojourn and uncontrolled diet.

He has been back almost a week now and we note that the picture window at limitless space outside almost as though the security and love he has with us is not enough to compensate for the limited activity of the fairly large cage which is his home.

We gratefully acknowledge the concern of neighbors and friends and the fine work of

the police department, especially officer Vandini for finally bringing him home.

The fact that Nicky found his freedom so enthralling has lead us to the wrenching decision that perhaps this wild, appealing creature should have more room to stretch his legs

and the companionship of others of his breed. Soon we will take him to live in the Lincoln Park Zoo where we are sure he will prove to be an attraction to a lady capuchin. Their progeny should be a source of delight to small children for many years to come.

The next time you visit the monkey house at Lincoln Park Zoo, call out to Nicky and the most alluring animal in the place will come to say "hello" and charm you with his performance of funny faces.
