At this time it is imperative that the villagers block the move by J. Emil Anderson to rezone the area. The blocking of the rezoning petition will prevent possible adverse effect on the purchasing of Tam.

Question #1: Do we need more factories? Question #2: Do we need to provide adequate public recreational facilities?

The people of Niles have a chance to answer these questions before the opportunity to do so is lost forever.

It is imperative that all citizens attend the Zoning Board Hearing at the Village Hall on September 30, at 8 P.M. to block the rezoning appeal.

We are in support of the move to acquire Tam O'Shanter without burdening the taxpayer of Niles. This can be done by the use of Federal grants to recreational activities and revenue bonding. This would not obligate the people of Niles. Yet their property would increase in value because of this tremendously attractive recreational area.

Karl W. Wilken Dies In Hospital

Karl W. Wilken, 60, of 7538 Waukegan Road, Niles, died in Lutheran General Hospital Monday afternoon, September 13. A resident of Niles for the past five years, Mr. Wilken had formerly been a resident of Edison Park for eighteen years.

He was the founder of Wilken Metal Products, 7736 N. Austin Avenue, Skokie, which he owned until illness forced his retirement a few months ago.

Surviving is his wife, Lina, nee Spreckels.

Services were held in the M.J. Suerth Funeral Home at 1:30 P.M. Thursday, September 16, with Rev. Paul Mehl, pastor of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, Park Ridge, officiating, and interment followed in Montrose Cemetery.

Library Increases Fee For Non Residents

Since the official ground breaking ceremony on August 29, work has been progressing on the new Niles Public Library building at 6960 Oakton Street. Excavation work is well under way and the shape of the building is beginning to appear as the foundation footings are put into place. Every day sees a noticeable advance as work is pushed along in an effort to have the building under cover before winter weather can put a halt to construction.

In order to maintain a fair balance of payment for services the Library has found it necessary to increase its fee for library service to people who are not residents of the library District. In the future a non-resident family card will cost twelve dollars per year. This is about what the average taxpayer in the District now pays, each year towards the improvement of his library service.

One additional fee has been inaugurated. From now on a charge of five cents will be made for reservation of a book for future use. This fee will help to defray the expense of this special service.

A Teen Social Night will be held in the lower level of the Niles Park Recreation Center every Friday evening beginning October 1. Activities will include dancing to your favorite records, ping pong, pool, and other teen activities. The Social Night is open to all high school students residing in Niles. that the Park Board has not even begun to make a feasibility study regarding the costs for the golf course (proposal).

Blase mentioned he expected the condemnation suit would be heard in court in October and expected a decision to be reached after three or four days of testimony. Blase implied as of now the park board is woefully unprepared for such action.

Meanwhile, back at the Park Board, president Steve Chameriski said County Board president Seymour Simon has not answered a Park Board letter regarding a heading on the forest preserve proposal. Simon had previously sent a first letter in which he requested detailed plans be presented to him by the Park Board. Simon's letter asked for proposed plans regarding green fees, indemnity of the forest preserve if they should leave the property, maintenance plans, number of employees, budget, and whether the forest preserve would have any jurisdiction over surplus funds used there.

The intended park board feasibility study, the first step in this project, will relate these answers. At Tuesday night's meeting the park board was considering hiring one of three firms, which would make such a study.

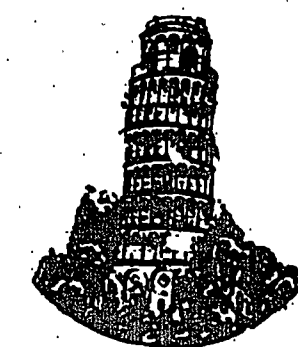

TAM REQUESTS INDUSTRIAL ZONING TONIGHT



SRO Crowd Expected At 8 PM

An expected SRO crowd will be present at 8 P.M. tonight at Niles new Council-Chamber to hear a request before The Zoning Board from the Tam O'Shanter Country Club owners to re-zone their property to industry. The meeting, which is likely to bristle with tension, will have an outpouring of residents, who are desirous of keeping TAM as a golf course, with Niles Park District purchasing the property. The Park District has already filed a condemnation suit for TAM, which according to all interested parties, will likely have a decision reached in the court sometime in October.

According to Niles Park President Steve Chameriski, he told THE BUGLE Tuesday, the case is being called into court Thursday, but because the park board's attorney will not be in town a postponement will be requested.

The highly-charged TAM issue was discussed at a Tuesday night meeting at Grennan Heights Fieldhouse when attorneys Brandel and Ancel, representing the TAM interests (Emil J. Anderson Co.), and park board officials were present to discuss their viewpoints on the matter. Ancel implied the property may be worth as much as \$11,000,000, which is many millions more than the park board expects to pay for the property. Ancel also said the Park Board's condemnation suit action has eliminated any hope for a federal grant for the property, because such a grant must be approved prior to such condemnation action. Park officials refuted his claim by stating they had applied for the grant back in April, before the suit, which makes it tellable for the money.

Most of the charges and points, thoroughly discussed in past week, were re-hashed at the meeting, and will be reiterated again at tonight's meeting.

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Another Morn'nother Yawn..

L'shono Tovo—May you be inscribed—in the Book of Life. This is the High Holy Days of the Jewish People, the time of the year when the book opens and the debts and credits are checked against the names on the ledgers. As a child, the picture in front of my eyes was a gigantic book that opened by itself to the center of tons and tons of pages, and a voice rose out of the binding, speaking wearily—there were so many names to go through—“Ah, here's Frieda—what do we do with her. She hasn't been more naughty than usual, it says here. Cries at bedtime, won't help her mother until she is spanked, fights with her sisters, cries when her mother leaves to go out for the evening and Daddy has to hold out his belt before she behaves. Ah, we'll put her in for another year.” Somewhere, I always was so sure of continuing in the Book of Life. That was the optimism of youth. Now it is a daily, fervent hope, with no certainty of the day after tomorrow.

The community I grew up in, about 1/2 square mile, in Coney Island, was a blend of Italians and Jews. We went to school together, played together, were friends, lovers and ultimately there were numerous intermarriages. The only requirement we could see for a marriage was a boy and a girl. The holidays, Jewish and Catholic, were dress up occasions; all the children received their quota of new clothes for the Holy days. If at all possible, we tried to get into temple or church to celebrate each others holidays, if it meant a day off from school. On the Jewish High Holy days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, the children congregated in front of the synagogue in their finery, playing tag, teasing those of the opposite sex, and parading around the temple while the parents were inside. Many of the parents were not temple members, only yearly congregants and bought tickets for those three days, the children didn't need tickets, but no one would have used them anyway. We never went inside, except to speak to our parents for a minute or so. Our place of celebration was outside with all the neighborhood children; they were fine fun days for us. On the fast day of Yom Kippur, a day spent in prayer at the synagogue, all the children were well aware that there were clandestine trips taken by the parents at alternate times, to the neighborhood diner, which held them until fasting time was up, at sundown. We, the Italian and Jewish children were the only true observers of the fast, we were too busy playing to worry about eating. There wasn't too much of an outcry from the parents, because the church and temple were used continually by all of them, too. Everyone participated in the weddings, bar mitzvahs, confirmations, communions, and some of the feast days that seemed attractive to the community.

When the Catholic Feast days came along, all of us tried the old story—“may I be excused—it's a holiday”. Sometimes we made it and sometimes we didn't, depending upon the mood of the teacher. The attitude of the Italian parents was in reverse; they stayed home but made their children attend all the feast days. It was an ideal community to live in. Organized religion was taken lightly, but we lived the real concept of religion—brotherly love. It was a marvelous way to grow up and I wish the whole world could grow up that way.

Participating grade school bands will include St. Isaac

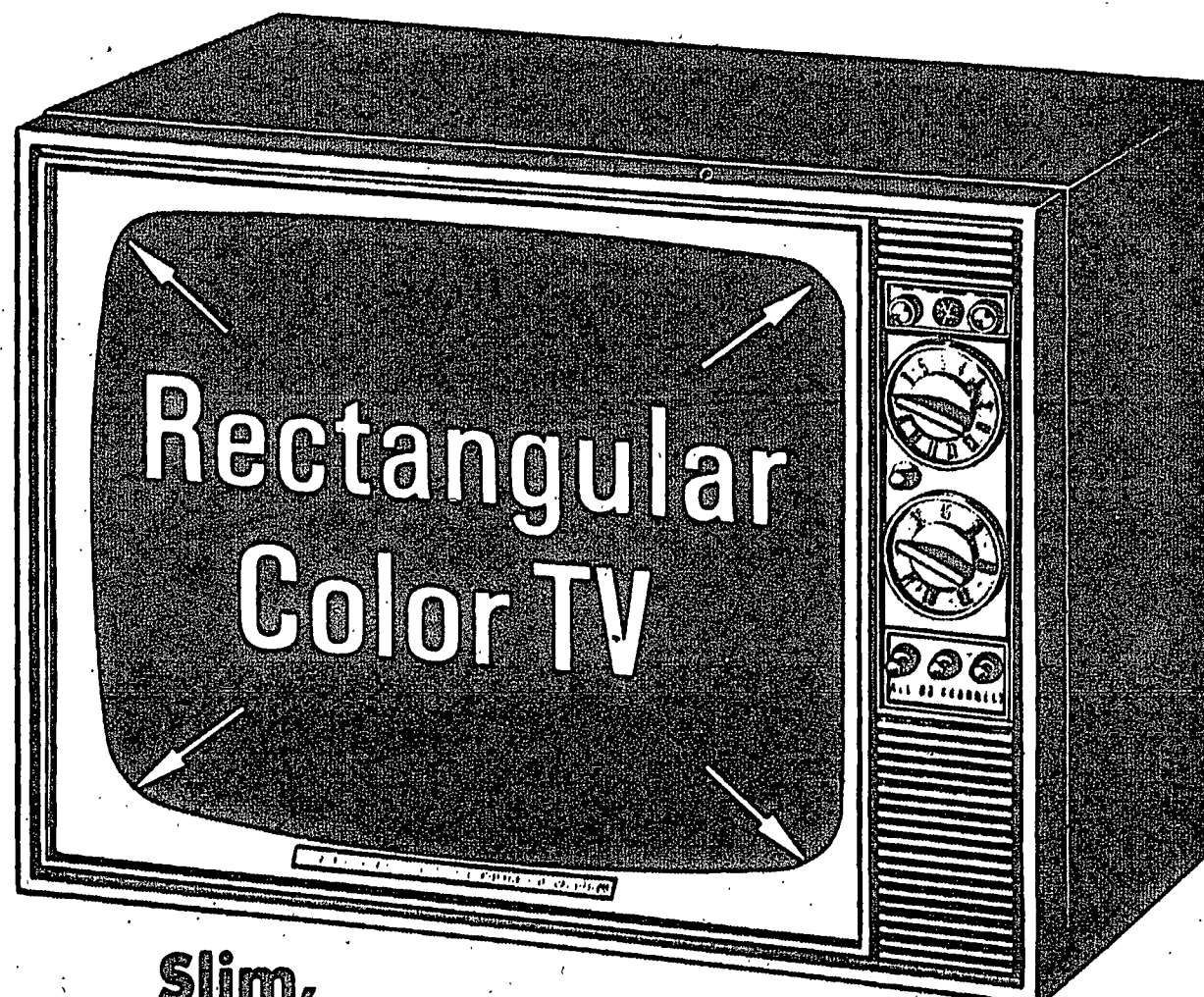

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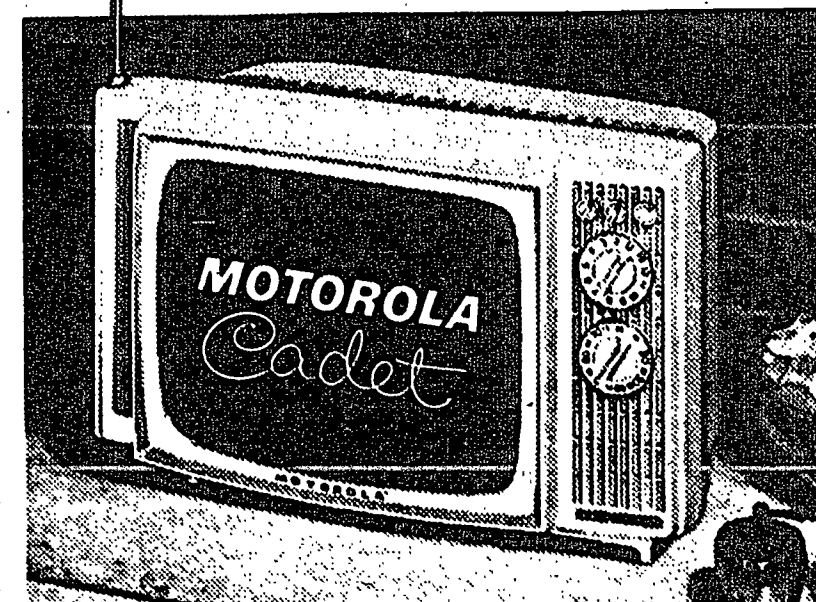
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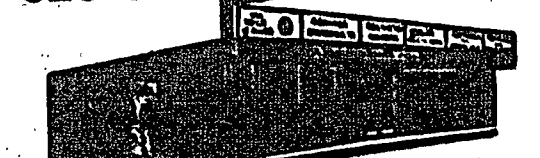
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Maine Democrats Hold Meeting

St. Francis Hospital Invites Public To Open House

The fourth and final phase of the building program is the remodeling and reconstruction of the older portions of the hospital, now underway.

Part of the older hospital structure was torn down to make space for the new Galvin Building. The new building, facing Ridge Avenue, now forms the entrance to the hospital and is attached to the older building.

Also located in the new building are the lobby, administrative and medical records offices, Adult and Child Guidance Center, and the Medical Library, all of which will be open to the public.

The building is named in memory of the late Paul V. Galvin who for many years had been deeply interested in the progress of St. Francis Hospital. Mrs. Paul V. Galvin, widow of the founder of Motorola, Inc., and members of the Galvin family, have sponsored major medical units in the hospital. These include two intensive care units, one for adults with 16 beds, and one for children with 12 beds, and the Galvin Heart Center.

The construction was made possible by the generous donations to the building fund from all segment of the community, from the medical staff, the hospital auxiliary, the employees, and financing by the Sisters of St. Francis.

Almost \$4 million has been raised so far in fund raising efforts, which are continuing.

St. Francis is a general community hospital serving Evanston, Chicago's northside, and the surrounding suburban communities.

Park Board Tells 'Their Side' Of TAM Controversary

(Press Release)

The Board of Commissioners of the Niles Park District, along with the Commissioners of all other Park Districts, are very much aware of the fact that a new era has opened up for the Park Districts in the United States. An era where Parks, both Local and National, Recreational Facilities, Open Land Use, etc., have become of major public concern. With these new developments have also come a sense of heavy responsibility for the people administering the operation of Park Districts.

It is NOW that the Board of Commissioners of the Niles Park District must take its stand and begin building for the future. By combining its strength and efforts with those of the civic minded citizens of Niles, a great many things can truly be accomplished.

Therefore, the Board of Commissioners of the Niles Park District, feels that the time has arrived to make public all the facts relating to its efforts to acquire the Tam O'Shanter Golf Course property in Niles, Illinois, in order to make available to the residents of Niles, all its recreation facilities.

With press releases, issuing from Mayor Blase's office, quotes from members of the Village of Niles Board of Trustees, interviews with representatives of the J. Emil Anderson Company, being rampant in the newspapers regarding the Tam O'Shanter Golf Course, the Commissioners of the Niles Park District would at this time like to release the following information for the benefit of the residents of the Niles Park District and all other interested parties.

We would like to make very clear to Mayor Blase and the Village of Niles Board of Trustees, that we, the Niles Park District Commissioners, are fully aware of what a fine organization the J. Emil Anderson Company is. We also are fully aware of what that organization has done in the past for the Village of Niles, but we are also fully aware of our obligations to the residents of Niles to do what we can to further the recreational interests of the Niles Park District for the benefit of the entire City of Niles.

To correct some statements regarding our Condemnation Proceedings against Tam O'Shanter, one must go back

a few months. On May 25, 1965, the Commissioners of the Niles Park District met with representatives of the J. Emil Anderson Company at the Tam O'Shanter Country Club. At this meeting, a preliminary discussion was held regarding the use of the Golf Course. The Commissioners were informed that an Industrial Complex was planned for development south of Howard Street, and the possibility of a 9 Hole, Par 3, Lighted Course, north of Howard Street. The meeting was adjourned on a very pleasant basis, and with the parties came firm promises that as soon as something definite was on the drawing boards, the Commissioners would be promptly notified. Some months passed by with no communication from the J. Emil Anderson Company. Then our President, Steve Charnerski, received a call from Mr. Brandel, attorney for the J. Emil Anderson Company, stating that we would be able to look over some Plans of the Company's proposal on Tuesday evening, August 10, 1965. A young man brought the Plans over from the J. Emil Anderson Company for Commissioners Charnerski and Schreiner to look over. They were only able to look over the Plans for 15 minutes when the young man took them and left. Incidentally the three other Park Board members were not available. This proposal covered the use of 42 acres of land west of the North Branch of the Chicago River which meanders through the Golf Course, plus approximately 42 acres of land owned and controlled by the Cook County Forest Preserve District.

The Board of Commissioners of the Niles Park District immediately took steps to check whether such an arrangement could be made for the use of Forest Preserve District property and found that Chapter 37 1/2 (Forestry), Section 6, of the Illinois Revised Statutes 1963, limits the disposition of Forest Preserve property to two (2) specific categories, (A) Leases up to 40 acres in size for terms up to ninety-nine years in duration to veterans' organizations as grounds for convalescing sick and disabled veterans, and (B) To grant licenses, easements and rights-of-way for Public Utilities. No other provisions are known.

Some time after this, President Charnerski received a telephone call from Mayor Blase of Niles, informing him of a meeting to be held on Thursday, August 12, 1965, between Niles

nowledged by Mr. Janura of the Forest Preserve District. The Commissioners feel that this proposal should be made public and should not be kept between Mr. Simon and Mayor Blase only.

While all this meaningless delay by Mr. Simon and Mayor Blase has been going on, the Park Board has quietly gone about other matters, such as seeking information on the method of financing the purchase of the Tam property. In regards to this, the Park District has applied to the Federal Housing Agency, under the Open Land Program, for a Federal Grant to aid it in the acquisition of the property. This was done as early as April 17, 1965.

The Park Commissioners also feel, at this time, that the balance of financing can be obtained through the issuance of Revenue Bonds, where only the users of the Golf Course and its facilities would pay for the ultimate purchase price. But not being experts on Golf Courses and their operation, the Board began checking on Engineering & Planning Agencies who could furnish it with the necessary pertinent information. Several firms were contacted and they offered proposals to prepare a Feasibility Study on the operation of the Tam O'Shanter Golf Course by the Niles Park District. One of these firms will be selected to prepare this Study which will indicate whether the Course can be purchased and operated successfully. This Study must be made to enable the Park District to receive a Federal Grant.

It must also be kept in mind that we are not looking at the Tam O'Shanter Golf Club property as only a Golf Course, and if the Park District is successful in obtaining the Course it is intended to fully develop the present Swimming Pools, Tennis Courts, Club House Complex, etc., that are now on the property into a large scale recreational facility for the use of all. One must also bear in mind that with the continual demands by Labor for shorter work hours, the average wage earner will be having more time for recreation and now is the time to have the foresight, and not hindsight, to purchase and set aside one of the truly fine recreation areas left in this part of the state. The Tam O'Shanter property will more than adequately fulfill these requirements.

A parting thought for Mr. Simon: "If the Niles Park District Board of Commissioners acquire this property, the Niles Park District will be definitely requesting use of the land adjacent to the course, not to cut down trees or move the landscape around, but to make better use of the presently owned Forest Preserve District property in conjunction with recreational facilities as offered by Tam O'Shanter."

The school was established in 1906 at Lutheran Deaconess Hospital, 1138 N. Leavitt St., Chicago.

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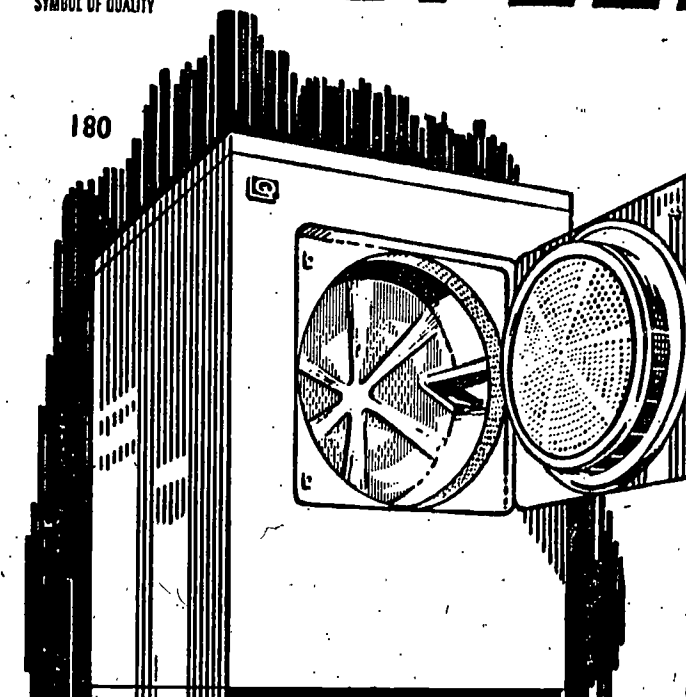
