Last Thursday Niles Plan Commission continued until November 11 a request from the Tam O'Shanter Country Club interests for change in zoning from RI Residential to MI Limited Manufacturing zoning

Before a surprisingly small crowd of less than 100 people attorneys Marvin Glink, former village of Skokie attorney, and municipal authority Louis Ancel, presented witnesses supporting their request for the new zoning. Plan Commission Chairman Kal Rowan, who superbly conducted a potentially difficult meeting, told Glink it was the finest zoning presentation he witnessed in the five years he served on the Plan Commission (Zoning

In making their presentation the following points were em-phasized by the TAM group:

.....Under Illinois State statute the Conveyance Act allows a leasing of public lands to a second public body. Glencoe has such a course leasing Forest Preserve property in 1922.

....The TAM proposal for a combined course for Niles would include about 45 acres of the present Tam and 45 acres of Forest Preserve land.

..... At an August 12 meeting with TAM, village and park representatives, all seemed agreeable to the above proposal. The next morning the park board filed its condemnation suit.

At the November 10 trial the court will decide the value of the property based on its highest and best use. It was implied the condemnation suit would freeze the price, but the court will make its decision
