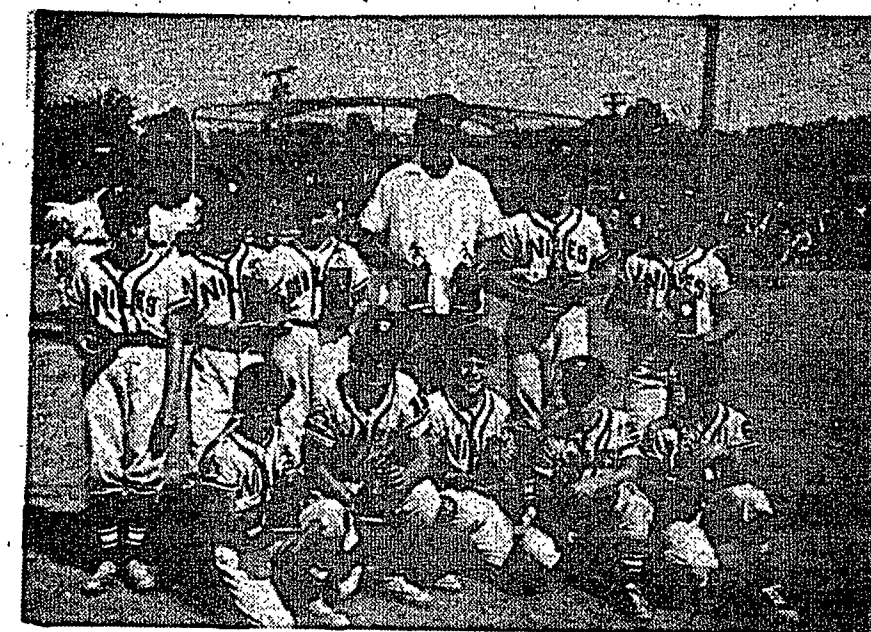

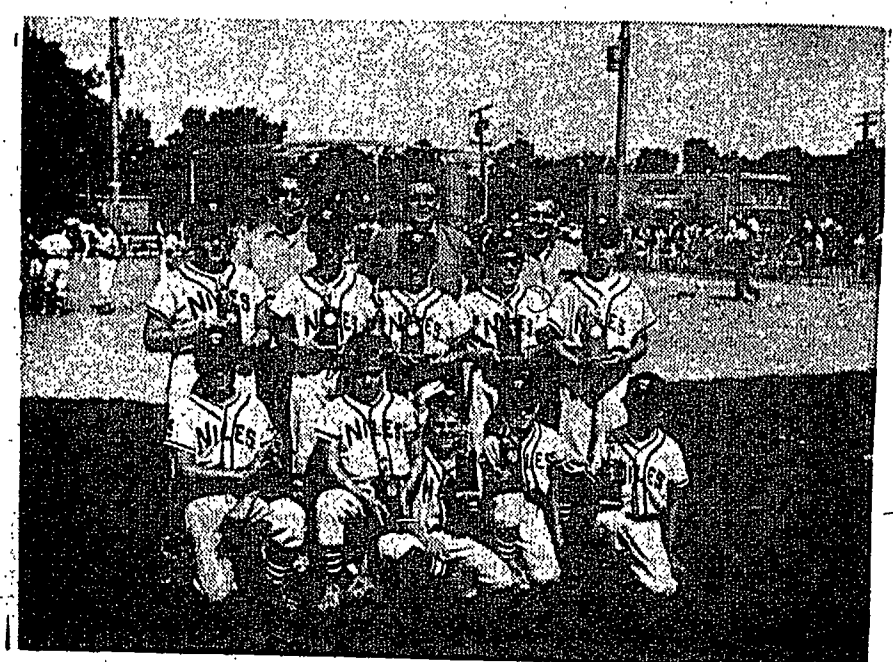

Nick Blase's appointment of John Poeschl as a \$100-a-month civil defense director raised many an eyebrow in Niles last week. While the eye-brow-raisers looked somewhat incredulous at the appointment, trustees Keith Peck and Ken Scheel tried unsuccessfully to block the appointment, but their two votes were one short of the necessary majority.

The Poeschl appointment was particularly painful to Nilesites who thought the new era in Niles was here to stay. Poeschl was the foremost representative of the old dragons of the old era, who, Blase in particular, campaigned so ruthlessly against when he sought election in 1961. Blase, more than any other candidate lambasted the old era, implying a great deal of hanky panky was taking place. Blase, and only Blase, directed his attack against the gambling in the community, and pointed a finger at the old era politicians as being responsible for it.

Blase also bounced kudos around concerning the old era big builder tie-ins and lots of other juicy curves which led to the ousting of the old line politicians in Niles.

Among the politicians, no old era official was more prone to the Blase blasts than John Poeschl. When newly-elected Ken Scheel introduced the motion which eventually banned pinballs (gambling) in Niles it was Mr. Poeschl who tried in vain to retain the pinballs. He and John Stanley voted against the ban, but were overwhelmed by the new era which had just gained control of the village board.

Last year, when Blase and friends led the way to San Francisco in pursuit of the All America title, the very first page of the booklet submitted to the All America committees, blared forth Niles old gambling problems, and later pages showed how Niles cleaned up its bad image. Well, who was Blase and friends speaking about when they were critical of the past, of the gambling, big builder tie-ins and the general hanky panky? They were referring to John Poeschl, and the other officials (Sam Bruno, also) who were content to let Niles slip to its past image. Now, Blase is once again revealing his ability to talk out of both sides of his mouth.

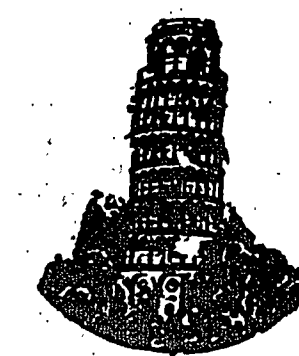
As for Niles officials' Trustee Bob Wente is the biggest disappointment of the trustees who were part of the New Era. Wente was his "own man" when he moved on to the village board in 1961. But today, Wente, like the off-year trustees, are little more than puppets for Blase, who pull their strings as the spirit moves him.

Ken Scheel and Keith Peck, who show the last vestiges of the independent spirit of the New Era, are likely to be fighting losing battles for the next 18 months in opposing Blase and his puppets.

Scheel has been placed in the role by Blase of being "a jerk" for standing up and sounding off as often as he does. When a guy fights the system, in this case what looks like the spoils system, the other officials look on the independent spirit as an

Proposes \$30,000,000 Project

With an assurance to all present that "this is still America" that "that the trouble with the world today is lack of communication which hampers progress," Morris Suson, beleaguered house and apartment builder in the unincorporated Des Plaines area, strode into battle with School District 63 once more last Thursday night as his attorney held before a public hearing held by the Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals of the Village of Niles, a pre-annexation rezoning petition concerning a parcel of land, owned by Suson, of approximately 45 acres located on the northwest corner of Greenwood and Dempster, and fronting approximately 1244 feet on Greenwood to Ballard rd.

The property when normally annexed to the Village of Niles would be zoned R1, single family residence district, whereas Suson is requesting zoning for B1 retail business district special use and R4, general residence district (multiple dwelling) as a condition of annexation for the construction of a planned development.

It was the presentation, by architect Martin Balaban, of the proposed plat plan layout that brought audible notes of rejection of the idea from the area residents present as a sign of disapproval. School District 63, already beset by overcrowded school conditions and seeing a possible further burdening of existing facilities by the planned development, was represented by Attorney Jack Stegel.

The property, now zoned R5 by Cook county zoning, would contain the following, all to be built by Suson: eight 15-story apartment buildings, containing 1296 units (20% two-bedroom apartments and 80% one-bedroom apartments; eight two-story buildings (each containing 20 units); a health club, recreation pavilion, enclosed swimming pool, tennis courts and a separate play area; a commercial development (shopping center) of about 150,000 sq. feet in area. Total cost of construction was estimated by Balaban to be \$30 million.

The zoning board, chaired by Kal Rowen, listened patiently continued on page 16

Traffic Problems Aired Troop 45 Holds At Dist. 63 Meeting --- Seek Lites, Guard

Traffic control for the area around Mark Twain school, 9500 Hamlin, Des Plaines, as well as school site problems and playground equipment usage were aired at the last meeting of the Board of Education, School District 63, held in East Maine Junior High school, Niles.

Since school opened in September, the flow of auto traffic to and from the school has been a constant threat to the students. Members of Mark Twain PTA as well as school officials have been attempting to control the traffic problem with little success, according to Bob Behymer, PTA safety chairman and former candidate for a seat on the school board.

The problem was brought to the attention of Dr. William Bullock, district 63 acting superintendent, who reported at the meeting that the Cook county police had been asked to install a crossing guard in front of the school as a temporary safety measure until a traffic survey could be made. According to Bullock, that survey has been completed and recommendations are forthcoming.

In the meantime, Behymer has asked the county police to make the following change in traffic patterns: Hamlin to be a one-way street going north; Shermer to be a one-way street going east. According to Behymer, this would alleviate the congestion at the front of the school. Alternatives include the installation of traffic signals at the intersection of Hamlin and Terrace.

Mark Twain playground problems include poor drainage and grading and lack of landscaping. Dr. Bullock reported to the school board that with the advent

of the winter season no major changes will be made in the location of playground equipment but the playground surface will be smoothed and sanded to improve its appearance and the use of the present apparatus area.

At the same meeting the school board members voted "yes" in support of the agreement set forth by Des Plaines and Park Ridge relative to interscholastic activities, including interscholastic basketball games.

Possibility of the unavailability of a water supply for the proposed Shelley Nathanson school at Potter and Ballard was discussed by the board. Des Plaines officials have informed the school district that the city will not supply water to the school area unless annexation proceedings are instituted. Water would then have to be purchased from Domestic Utility, a privately-owned water company.

In other action, the board approved payment of a \$100 settlement to Good Shepherd Community church, Des Plaines, since the agreement between the church and school district to lease space for kindergarten facilities was not used.

The board directed Dr. Bullock to immediately dispose of a 322-gallon supply of highly combustible Dito fluid found stored in the junior high school building.

Dr. Bullock has since informed THE BUGLE that two large metal tanks have been installed about 50 feet from the school building and the fluid has been placed in these tanks.

School District 219 To Vote On Educational Tax Levy Increase

On November 20, the citizens of Niles Township will decide the type and quality of education offered their children in the high schools. The Board of Education has determined that it cannot continue to maintain the present educational standards on an educational tax levy of \$0.87/\$100 assessed valuation established in 1958. The only way it can do this for the present school year is by deficit financing. The School Board is asking the voters of District 219 to approve an increase in the educational tax levy of \$0.21. This increase should be more than adequate to maintain and improve these standards for several years to come.

Niles Township and its schools have had a remarkable growth in the past fifteen years. During this time, the population has expanded far beyond anyone's wildest imagination. The Board of Education was challenged not only to provide buildings and facilities for its mushrooming population but quality education as well. That it has succeeded is apparent to all. In 1950, there was only one small high school building on Lincoln Avenue. Today, District 129 has three huge establishments each offering a full, four year curriculum. The yearly increase in the number of semi-finalists in the National Merit Scholarship competition attests to the growing quality of education in its school system. Recent studies have revealed that over 80% of its students who enroll in college graduate. The national average is only 50%. The welfare of the non-college-bound students has not been neglected. They can choose from a wide variety of high quality vocational business education and industrial courses.

The unfortunate and inescapable fact is that all of this takes money. The educational crisis in Niles Township is

caused by the fact that its population is now increasing faster than the assessed valuation. The present tax rate was established in 1958 when the school enrollment was half the present number. Then, there was only one high school building in operation and one in the process of construction. Since that time, the rate of real estate growth has decreased

while the population growth has accelerated. District 219 has now reached the point where the funds available from the 1958 educational tax levy are no longer adequate to maintain the level of education everyone has come to accept and expect for their children. The citizens are now being asked to determine

whether they want their children to continue to have the finest education available. On November 20, the township will know the reply.

The Niles Township high school district will hold a rate referendum Saturday, November 20, asking the citizens to approve increasing the educational fund's tax rate ceiling from \$8.791 per \$100 assessed valuation to \$10.091 per \$100 assessed valuation.

This is an increase of 21 cents, the maximum which an educational fund rate ceiling may be raised at any one time according to state law.

"When Superintendent Dr. Clyde Parker called me," exclaimed Mrs. Wyler, "to ask if I would take this job, I said 'yes' immediately."

Although she has never worked on such a steering committee before, Mrs. Wyler believes previous activities have prepared her to be able to coordinate the committee.

"I am firmly convinced as are the other 14 members of the steering committee that the high school district needs the educational rate referendum ceiling."

Believing she has an objective point of view, she doesn't see how the three high schools in the district can possibly continue at their level of quality education if the district doesn't get the increase.

"I am convinced the Niles Township High Schools are very good," she explained, "and this is obvious in their accomplishments. Our district is rather young among the surrounding high school districts in this north suburban area. We have been a district since 1939 and in 26 years we have had fantastic growth, witnessed by the district's need to build three high schools."

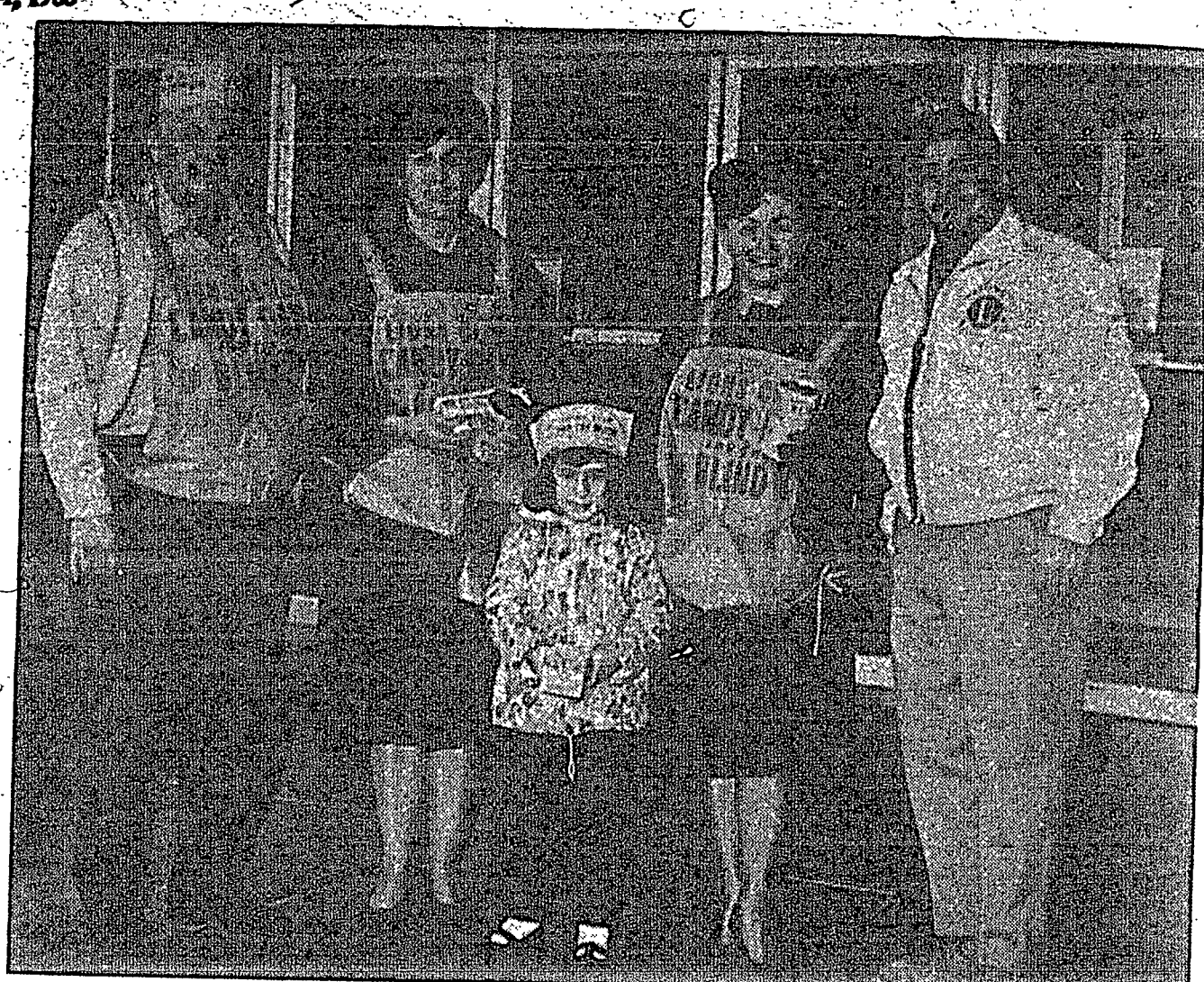
She worked with the department of Biological Warfare at Northwestern University before settling down to a career as a housewife.

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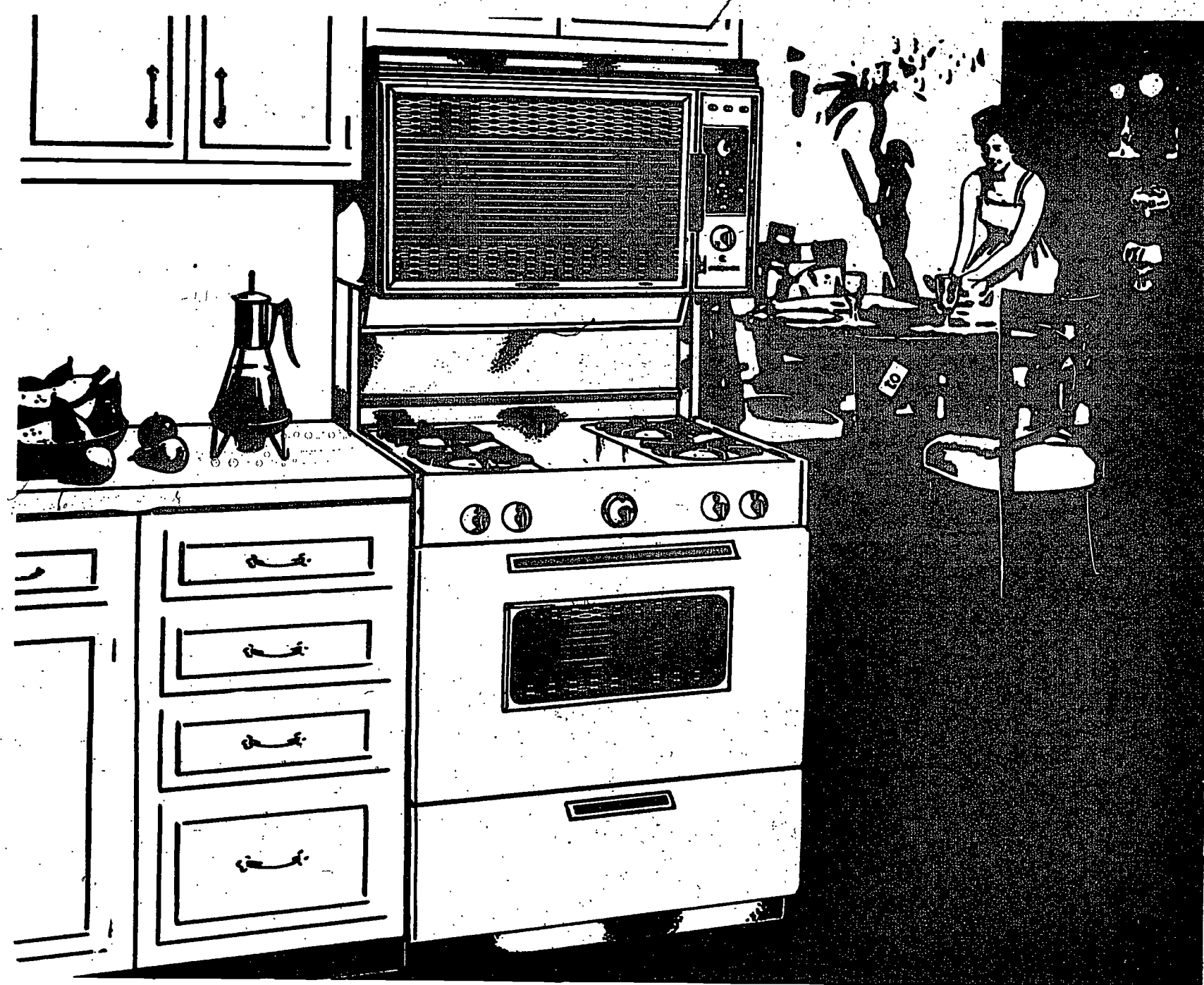
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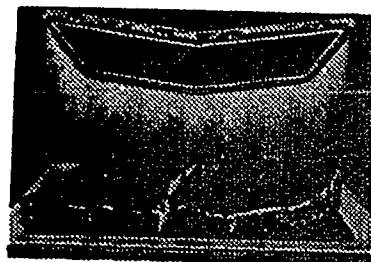

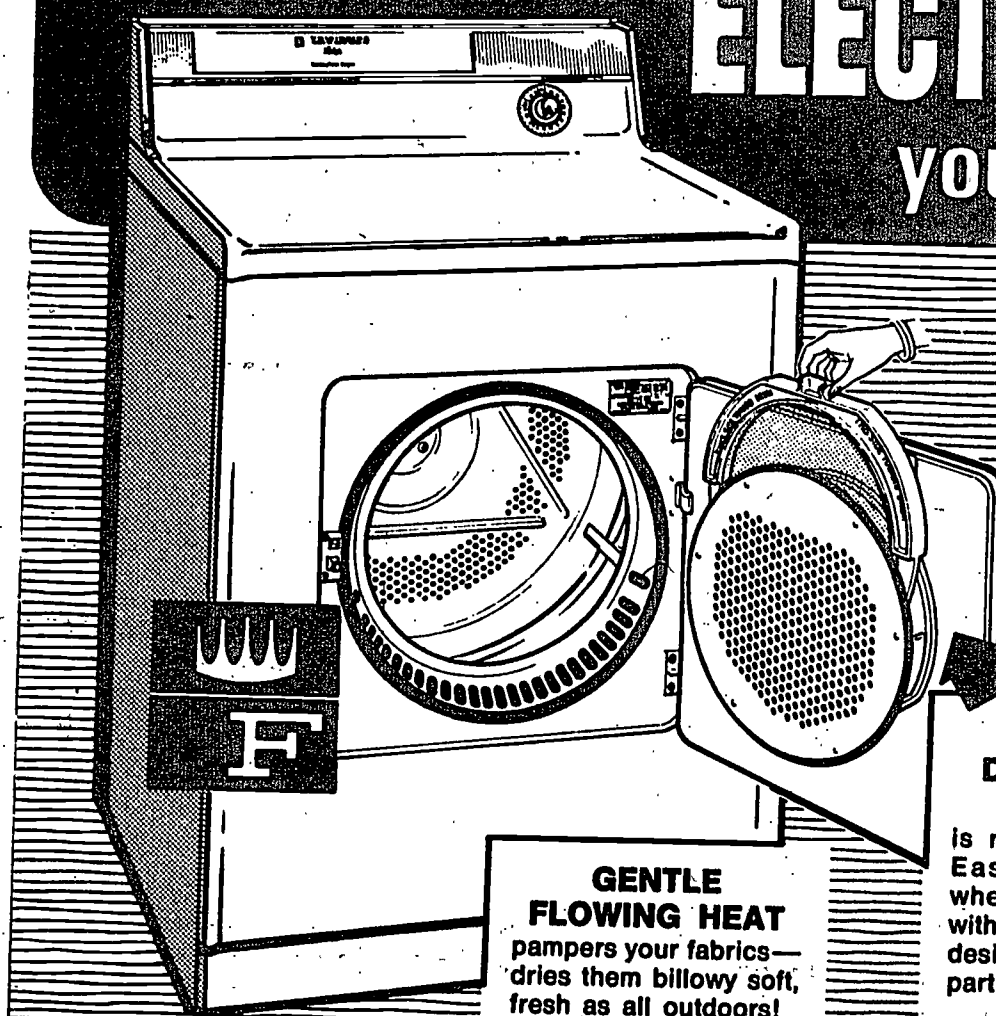

The cast of "A Majority of One", playing the Mill Run Playhouse through November 7th, handles diversity with as much aplomb as does Mr. Asano, (Frederick Tozere), the Japanese sutor of the incomparable Molly Picon, who plays the Jewish widow Mrs. Jacoby. "Ah so—diversity!" says Mr. Asano, when Mrs. Jacoby explains about her convertible (daybed turned into nightbed), giving the astute business man tips on how to add to his business dealings, and proving herself possessed of intelligent understanding and compassion that surmounts the barriers of race and language.

There is Molly Picon, the Jewess, Stephen Cheng, the Chinese grandson of the first Chinese Counsel General to Hawaii, (Stephen also cements public relations) and Frederick Tozere, Protestant descendant of an old English family line, transplanted to America before his birth. (Frederick was born in Brookline, Mass.) but maintaining his "veddy British" way of life. Frederick Tozere has a British accent, but is wholly American in his delightfully frank and humorous appraisal of the British ego, which is the Rock of Gibraltar under the greatest of stress (ie; the blitz) but is thrown completely off balance by the infinitesimal. Hear this story of Aunt Florence, who was a survivor of the Titanic disaster and spent 8 hours in a lifeboat until her rescue.

"How did it feel being in a lifeboat from 11 to 77? Wasn't it fortunate that the Carpathia (the rescue ship) picked you up?" said his mother to her sister, Florence.

"Yes, but the butter wasn't fit for a dog," said Aunt Florence. (The Carpathia might have managed a better brand of butter for the survivors, don't you think?)

"I'm a frustrated tenor," says Frederick. "When I turned out to be a baritone that was that." He did sing for a number of seasons as church soloist; he was the premiere pantomimist with the Russian Ballet and when offered a role as pantomimist with the Metropolitan Opera Company refused it then, but regrets it today. His background includes a wide variety of stage, movie (which he was not pleased with, leaving Hollywood for greater opportunities in New York) and television work. Serials are his preference because they come from his home town—New York. Frederick Tozere is an excellent example of the artist today, whose vocabulary has not been abolished that very "thin pronoun"—"I"—and, commonly attributed to the acting profession. He is above average in his performances with a scattered range of interests to supplement his acting.

"I play my own father whenever I get the opportunity. He was an amazing character, typically British, always shouting at me as if I were two blocks away. I had been in the acting business for 26 years, doing well, supporting a family nicely and was up in Boston with the try-out of a Broadway play. My father said, 'Is your play a hit, Freddy?' I said it was. 'Yes, that's nice' he said and after a pause, 'When are you going to get a job, Freddy?'"

Mr. Asano doesn't make up too oriental—there is merely a slight raising of the brows. He feels that the differences should be underplayed; people must learn to see each other as just plain people and the

relationship should not be hampered by color, religion or background. His clipped Japanese accent is in imitation of a dear friend and his severely disciplined oriental demeanor is pierced by the most delicate shading of tenderness and love when Mr. Asano says to Mrs. Jacoby, after she finds it necessary to reject him as a sutor, "Mrs. Jacoby there is something I left out of what I have said tonight. In my own way—I love you."

Bringing the focus on person to person appreciation is the greatest value of the play as it alternates between gaiety and poignancy. Don't miss "A Majority of One"—four more days at the Mill Run Playhouse.

ate Nine-Period Day For Maine Wesp. High Schools In '66, Board Lets Contract On Lobby Seal

In order to accommodate an increasing enrollment, the Township High Schools will operate next year on a nine-period day. The new schedule will become effective with the opening of school in September.

This action, recommended by Superintendent Earle W. Wiltse, approved by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Oct. 18.

The high school district anticipates an enrollment of approximately 9,350 pupils in 1966-67, up from 1967-68; and 10,800 in the 1968-69 school year.

The extra period brought about the nine-period day will increase the capacity of the three schools. Class periods will be shortened to 42 minutes from 45 and the length of the school day will be increased by 25 minutes.

A low bid of \$17,435, submitted by the Mayfair Construction Co. of Chicago, for the building of a sidewalk along the south side of Dempster St. at Maine St. and the construction of sidewalks at Maine South, was approved by the board.

Peter A. Johnson & Son of Ridge was given a contract low bid to install a district seal in the lobby of Township High School West. Total cost of the project is \$1589. Class of 1965 has donated \$100 to help defray expenses. Similar seals are located in the lobbies at both Maine East and Maine South. Students consider seal to be a vital part of school tradition.

In other action, the board approved the appointment of two

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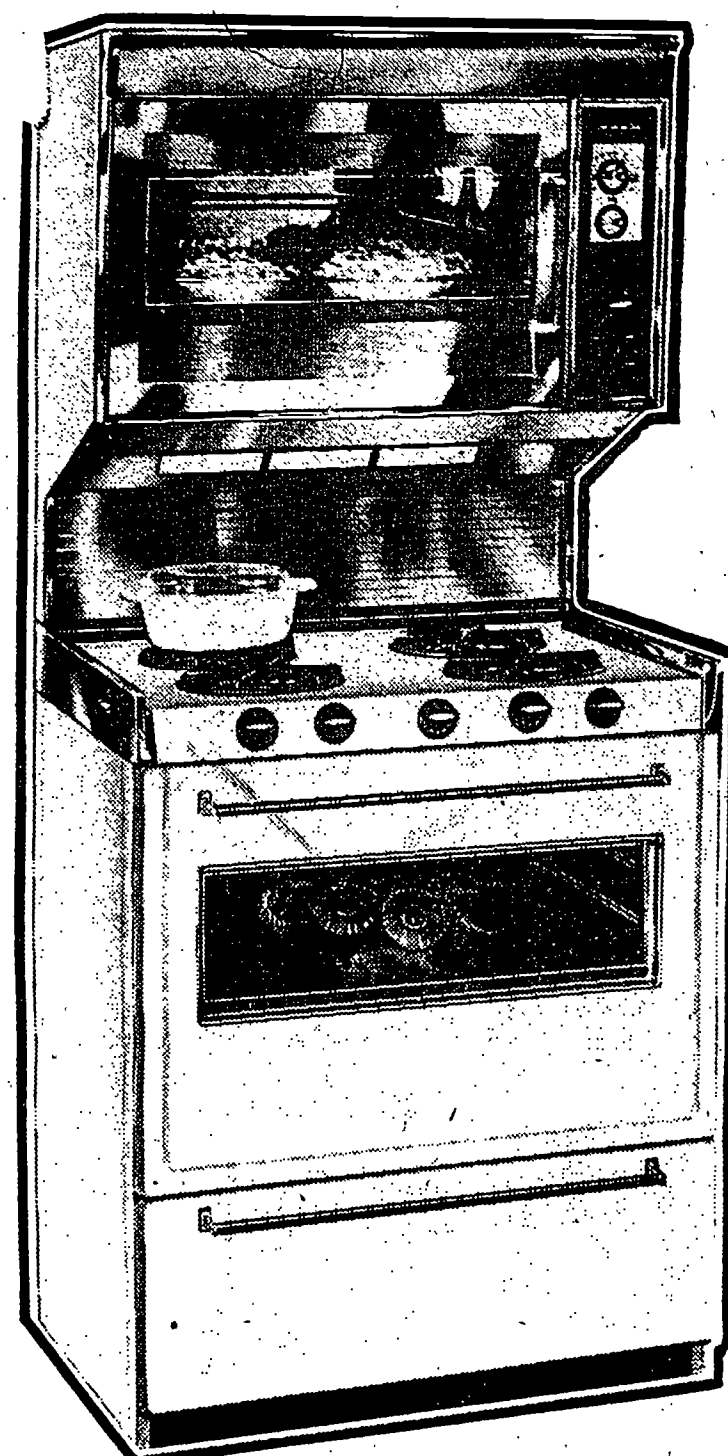
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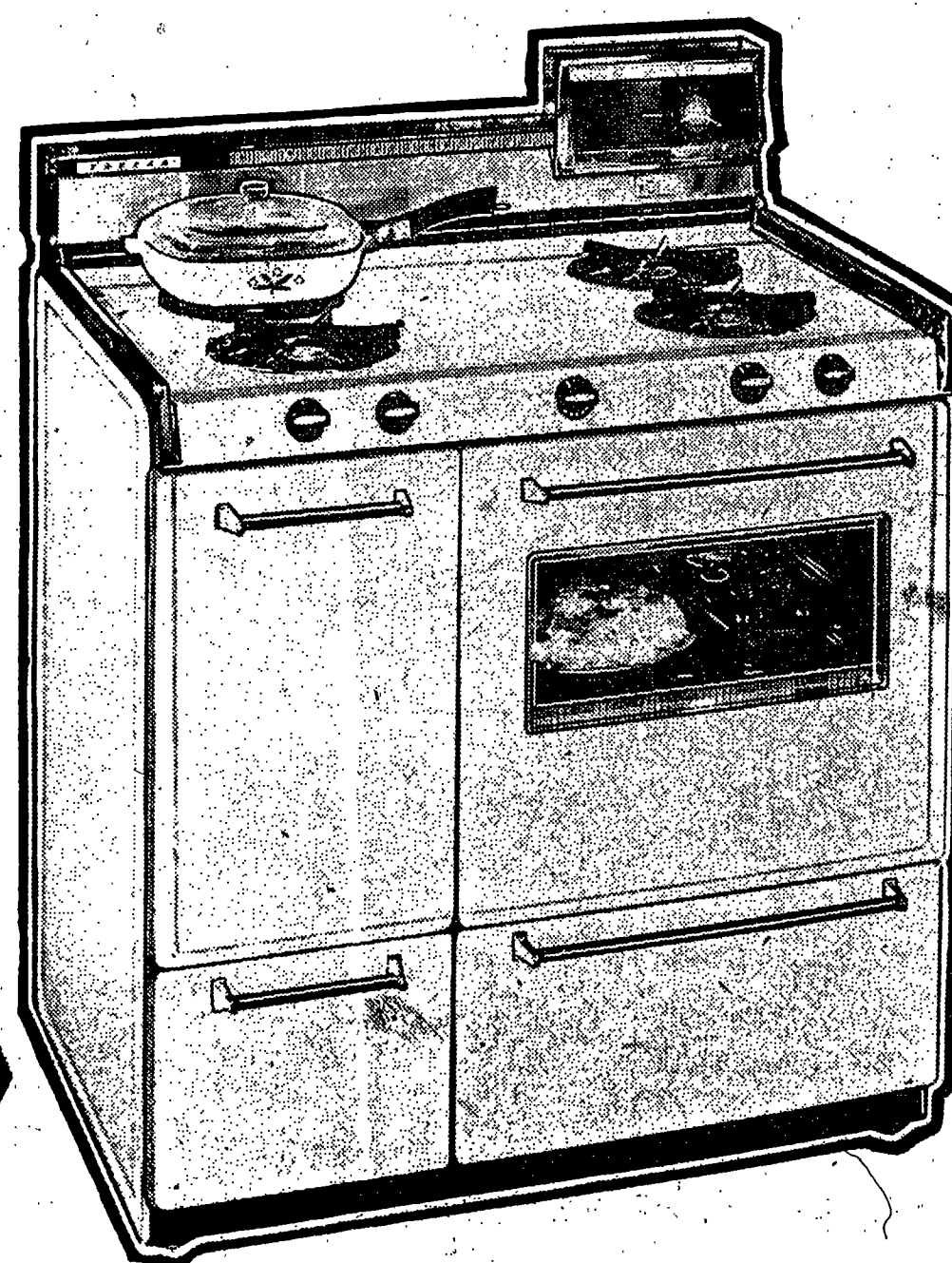
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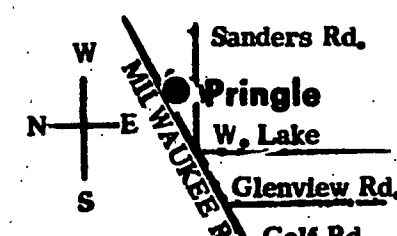
