Niles Township West High School, located at Oakton Street and Edens Expressway, will be the scene of the show, in their beautiful auditorium.

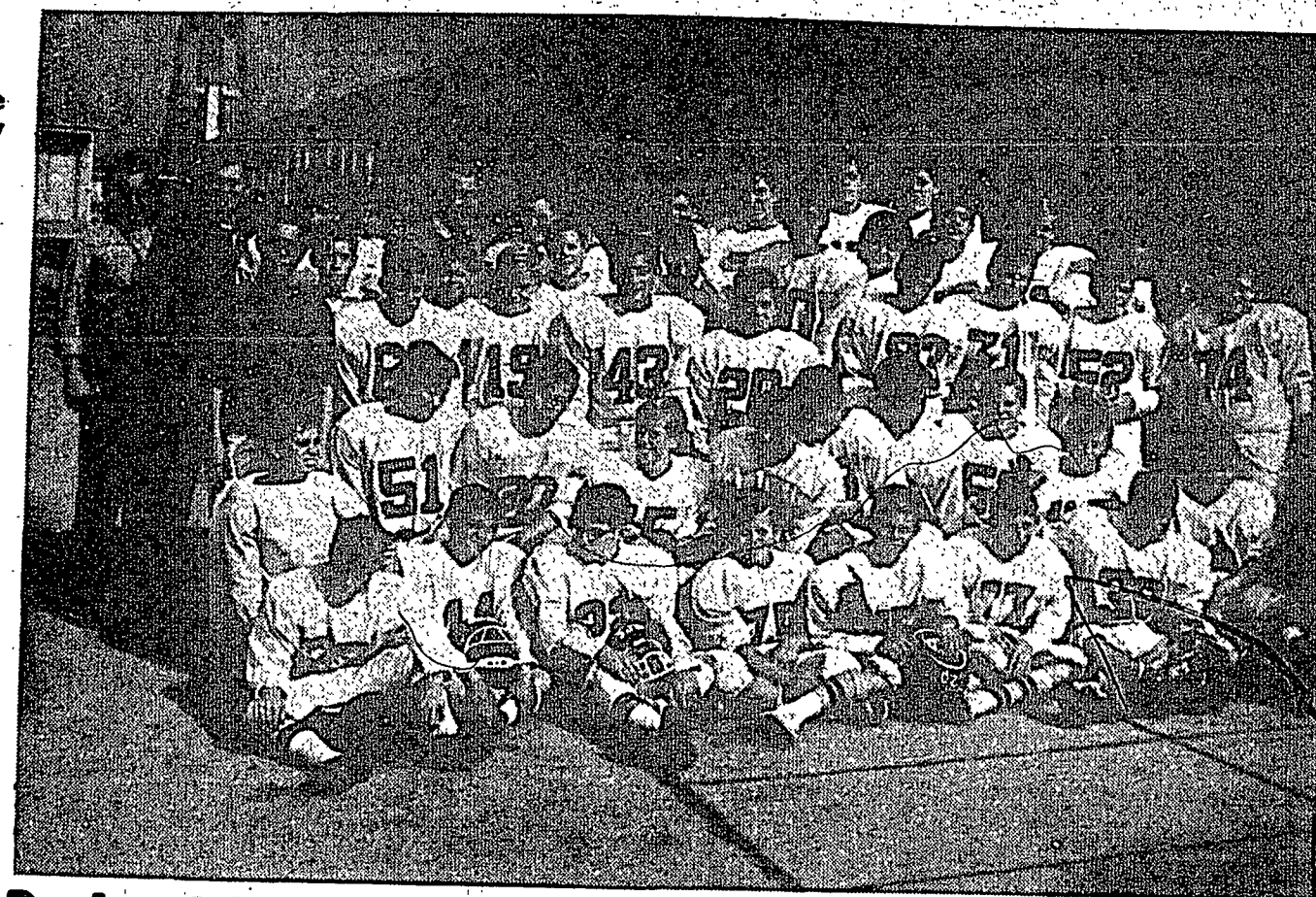

as Susan, under questioning by his attorney, stated his belief that this type of planned development is being done thru out the country now, that it would be "a thing of beauty and a benefit to the area." He presented figures, compiled by his accountants, showing how much tax money would go to the school district and the Village of Niles, if such a project were allowed. Susan also contended that such a proposed development would not produce a deluge of school-aged children.

Under questioning by school district 63 attorney Siegel, the builder admitted that, since he did own the land, purchased from radio station WJJD, he would still develop it even if his pre-annexation rezoning petition was disallowed by the board. He then would build under Cook county zoning rules.

Susan, who has already developed more than 1,500 units in school district 63, spoke of the results of a survey taken by his organization of his existing buildings in an attempt to

determine how many school-aged children now reside in the area. From approximately 1514 units, Susan reported that there are only 54 children in district 63 schools at the present time.

In answer to a query from the board as to "why annexation by Niles" Susan replied "Niles is a wonderful place to do business with". A board member expressed the opinion that possibly Susan was trying to entice Niles into the annexation move with the promise of tax revenue, and asked if he was willing to negotiate on the amount of building on the land. "It's negotiable," said Susan. "Whole pie or a hunk of it can be negotiated. I'm willing to co-operate."

After discussion on other points pertaining to the planned development and ranging from parking to the existing traffic snarl on Dempster and Greenwood as well as fire and police protection and maintenance ("union janitors, claimed Susan"). Rowan asked if there were any statements spectators wished to make.

Former Des Plaines resident, Arthur LeTourneau, now a Glenview resident, spoke as Ballard PTA president, and cited the traffic and safety problems now in that particular area as well as the serious tax problem and eight-fold census increase. Several other residents mentioned bad drainage now in existence in the area and the whole package was neatly tied up for the night when a board member asked both Susan and school district 63 to conduct surveys in the area; attorney Siegel asked for a continuance so that he might garner more facts, and a motion was passed calling for both.

The next chapter of the "Saga of Susan and School District 63" will be unfolded in the splendor of the new Niles court building, 7200 N. Waukegan rd., Thursday, Nov. 18, beginning at 8 p.m.

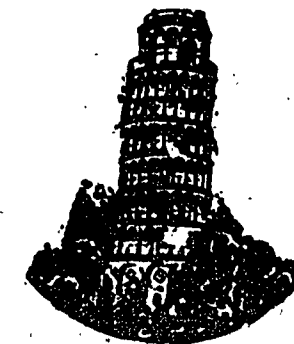

# APPROVE CODIFYING ALL NILES ORDINANCES



## 'A Major Success Of Last 4 Years'

In what trustee Ken Scheel described as "one of the major accomplishments of the past four years" Niles officials passed an ordinance Tuesday night codifying all old ordinances into one book. In announcing the accomplishment Scheel said, "No one can imagine the job it was to do this. Now Niles is at last a modern village". Scheel undertaken after the New Era took office four years ago. He implied accumulating the ordinances required a great deal of searching thru the myriads of records which were found at the village hall.

In other Tuesday night actions Mayor Blase announced action will be taken at the next meeting on a rezoning request for the Milwaukee-Ballard corner for commercial use on Milwaukee, and residential zoning for the rear of the lot fronting on Ballard.

....Passed a resolution to be a part of the North Suburban Transportation Committee which is studying transportation problems in the north suburban area.

....Niles will send a letter to the County Board opposing a multiple zoning request for 38 acres of property at Golf and Western in unincorporated area.

....Niles will act at its next meeting on an ordinance creating a Human Relations Commission.

....Passed a resolution that fence variations from 20 feet would have to be approved by the Plan Commission.

....July sales tax return from the state is \$36,144.13.

....The All America Commission reported \$5,250.50 was received for tickets for the recent ball and expenditures were \$4,432.04. Presently, the Commission has a \$5,370.77 balance of its appropriation.

## 'Hot Line' To Be Used In Niles Hi Tax Vote

Niles Township High School District 219 will use a telephone "hot line" to promote an educational tax referendum November 20.

The proposition on the ballot will be a tax-rate increase of 21 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, from \$8.791 to \$10.01.

Members of the school board and administrators from the district's three schools will man telephones between 7 and 9 p.m. November 18 and 19 to answer any questions on the proposal.

The school board has scheduled a town meeting for 8 p.m. Wednesday at Niles Township High School-West. A panel will provide information about the district's growth and financial needs.

It is not likely that the tax will hit the new maximum rate for several years, according to a district spokesman.

Additional revenue, however, will be needed soon to provide salary increases and to permit the hiring of new teachers and counselors.

In 1958, voters approved a 21-cent increase in the education fund tax rate. Enrollment in the district then, with only one high school, was 3,401, compared to the present 6,760 at three schools.

The 1958 faculty of 191 has swelled to 434 while property valuation in the district has increased from \$359,000,000 to \$549,000,000. Valuation per pupil since 1958 has declined from \$105,000 to \$82,000.

## Nilesite Honored As Master Mason

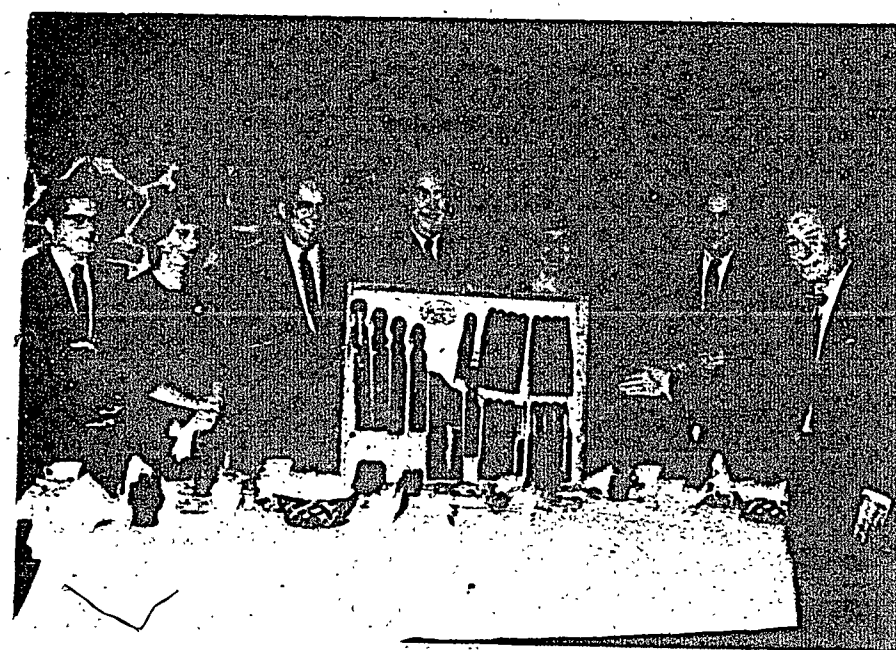

We went shopping for agown. She's the mother of a son-to-be Bar Mitzvah boy. If you never heard of a Bar Mitzvah, it is a ceremony marking the initiation of a Jewish boy at the age of 13 into the Jewish religious community and calling-up of the boy to the reading of the Law, Hebrew law—specifically the Torah, (Five Books of Moses) and the Haftarah, (Book of Prophets). This ceremony has become the occasion for festivities of varying degrees. If you eat with the gloves, they get dirty, if you eat without the gloves, they land on the chair, the floor, the table and get dirty, if they are rolled up around your wrist, you have an ugly band of thick gloves on your wrists and the elegance of your costume is destroyed. Frank G. Shepard Jr., manager of the Mill Run Playhouse last week ate some very fancy words he had spoken only recently and the swallowing was not easy. To a group, including the five All-American City Mayors, who came to glimpse our newest citadel of Culture, he gaily spread the gospel—

"There has been relatively little temperament to contend with. Our actors have not been too kooky, nor have they had too much of the prima donna in them". The words were somewhere in that vicinity, weren't they, Frank? And how he did rue those utterings last week!

Twenty seven singers and dancers were expected to arrive for the current production, "Carousel" and with best intentions and most gratifying responses, homes of thirteen Nilesites were requisitioned and made in readiness for their guests. Temperament, temper, and various degrees of tantrums were the order of the day. But if these highly volatile personalities were not such

Nonetheless, Frank hopes you wonderfully generous "almost hosts" did enjoy the opening nights' performance of "Carousel".

About 50 children were auditioning for parts in the play "Carousel"; there are 7 Snow children, whose father, Mr. Snow, is played by Gary Mann, producer of the Mill Run Playhouse, actor and singer. The children were brought by dancing schools (Dee-Dee's in Golf-Mill and June Rold in Des Plaines) and individually by their mothers. They pranced and prouetted and jumped around the stage under express directions of the choreographer, Tom Tume. Some were graceful, some were clumsy, some followed instructions minutely, some were comically

lost, but all clung to the eyes of Tom Tume as he spoke to them. Sometimes he found them behind him as ordered and sometimes he found himself behind them, as not ordered, his patience was inexhaustible, as he tried out all of the children.

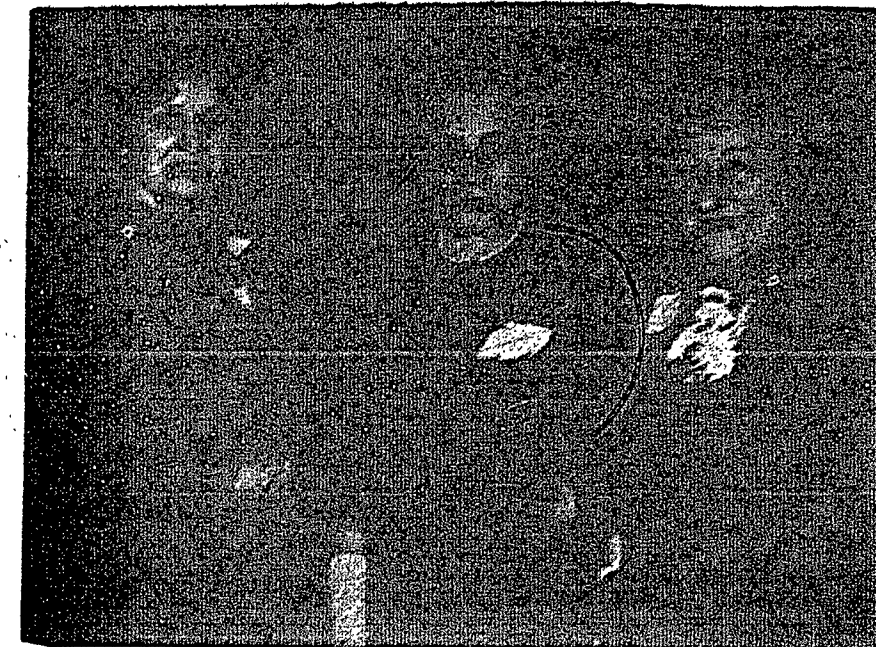

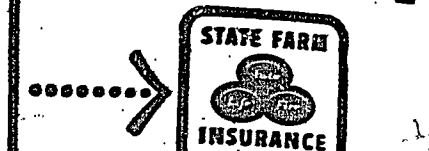
