

Per \$100 lmcrease

Seek 21¢

Niles Township residents will go to the polls Saturday to vote for an educational tax increase of 21 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, increasing the rate for \$.8791 to \$1.091. The money will be used to provide salary increases and the hiring of new teachers and counselors.

This is the first increase since 1958 when voters approved a 21 cent increase in the education fund tax rate. Enrollment then was 3,401 in the one high school. Today, the enrollment is 6,760 at three schools. Since 1958 faculty has increased from 191 to 434 while property valuation has increased from \$359,000,000 to \$549,000,000 Valuation per pupil since 1958 has declined from \$105.000 to \$82,000.

What happens when the star of a play misses a performance? The reason given may be illness, but the know-it-alls/have a better one. Rumors fly high and wide, speculation knows no bounds and the absent one lies home in bed unable to speak for himself, And then come the Horatio Alger visions. Will the stand-in make it? Will the extra reach stardom this shortcut way? Taint so, none of it-not when the play is of hort duration, a two week run.

Gordon MacRae, singing star of the play Carousel at the Mill Run Playhouse, still in the throes of a bug he picked up in Boston, before coming to Niles, held out for two days and then Thursday evening, was unable to sing and the performance was cancelled. Out of 800 advance reserved seats, 70% took new reservations, the rest accepted refunds. There were only two irate customers; one wanted the show to go on anyway, the other was furious that she hadn't been called personally (her husband had bought the tickets at the box-office earlier, naturally leaving no name in case ————). In the best tradition of the "show must go on", actors and singers manage to get well in a hurry and the next night, Friday, Gordon was in pretty good voice and almost back to normal. In an after show speech, he admits that he has never played to a more beautiful theatre and the audiences are swooning over him. Gary Mann, who plays Enoch Snow in the production of Carousel, is strong competition in the vocalizing department, Gary, a handsome young man with voice to match will be seen more and more in the upcoming musicals at the Mill Run Playhouse.

The birthing pains and afterbirth complications seem to be slowly but surely settling into the background as the Mill Run Playhouse comes into its own. It is not easy to build up an establishment of this sort and each step brings problems and frustrations and since July when the theatre first opened they have run into a score of kinks which are only now being ironed out. They have been running on a day to day programming basis, almost not knowing until a few days before what show will arrive, who will be in the show and the advertising would be nil as a result and the house showings would be an agonizing disappointment to the cast and the management. Now with a better scheduled program, projecting into the far future, it is hoped that the audiences will fill the beautiful arena as it was meant to be. The scheduling is so well planned that the cast of 'The Flower Drum Song" due to start on November 23, has already arrived (Monday) and rehearsals started on Tuesday. Many a

time the show arrived on the night before opening (A View from the Bridge) and there wouldn't even be time for rehearsal, only a partial walk-through. That means the characters go through their places on stage, and their exits and walk-ons, and barely have time to mumble their lines. Sometimes part of the cast arrived and the delays until the rest arrived left doubts as to whether there would be an opening night.

With the arrival of the cast for the "Flower Drum Song" the theatre is jumping and jiving; the large "Flower Drum' cast is rehearsing in daytimes and the large cast of "Carousel" is playing nights; the theatre is overflowing with performers and it wouldn't surprise anyone if Flower Drum players turned up among the Carousel players by accident.
