Demos Object

Dear Editor:

We noted with deep regret the exception taken to the recent appointment of John Poeschl to the post of Civil Defense Director by Mayor Blase. The manner and tone of your recent editorial towards Mr. Poeschl can only be described as assassination of ones character through innuendo and muffled accusation. The only revelation in your recent editorial was the fact that Mr. Poeschl was active in Village politics during the time of the so called "Old Era" where "Hanky Panky" was taking place.

Suffice it to say, in no place in your article could you show that Mr. Poeschl was involved in any of the scandal of the era or received personal gain by virtue of his position as Trustee. To say that Mr. Niles, of 1965, was representative of the "dragons" of that era is to slap a man who has devoted his lifetime for the Civic betterment and improvement of our Village.

To be sure, John Poeschl lived in the days of Niles' ruff and tumble era, but that he benefited by it or condoned it or that he failed to take part in the clean-up in recent years is to deny the many achievements he has made. In the appointment of Mr. Poeschl by Mayor Blase, there is something akin to former President Roosevelt's appointment of Wendell Wilkie, or the appointment by President Truman of President Hoover, which was so strenuously objected to, or the use of President Eisenhower by the late President Kennedy.

Mayor Blase did not campaign against the qualifications of John Poeschl, he campaigned against the failures of a group in general and it would be truly a waste of talent to deny the Village of Niles the service of a competent man merely because he was a member of a regime turned out of office by the voters. The experience of a man, his life long interest and abilities could not be smeared by a McCarthyite innuendo for the mere purpose of seeking readership and sensationalism at the expense of an individual. We sometimes confuse freedom of speech with freedom to assassinate with the power of the printed word. We sometimes confuse journalistic sensationalism with responsibility.

The mere fact that there were objections by two of the members of Trustees does not per se mean the appointment of John Poeschl is a bad one. There were three other Trustees who considered that John Poeschl had special qualifications for the job and to denounce them because they did not follow the favorite Trustee of your newspaper does not make them less independent than the two which did not follow the majority view. To be in the minority does not have any special significance as the minority opinion is not inherently correct and courage and independence ought not be confused with stubbornness. No one in this life has any monopoly on being right and the mere fact that one votes does not give him any sainthood.

We choose to state that Mr. Poeschl, in the very year which the Village of Niles was chosen as the "All America City" was chosen as Mr. Niles, of 1965. This was done by an

independent group and we did not hear any complaints to that selection by your newspaper or the venerable Trustees who voted against Mr. Poeschl with reference to his appointment. In conclusion we do not say that Mr. Poeschl is a Saint. We do not however, take humage with your newspaper's desire to make Saints of all those who vote the way your newspaper thinks they ought to, and to chastise those who make an appointment for the best interest of Niles.

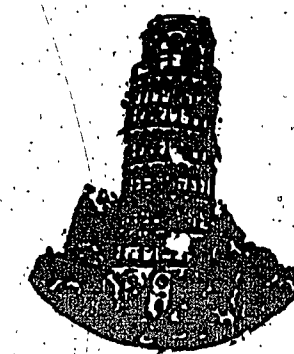
We received a news clip from former Nilesite Herb Adler, who now lives in Park Forest.

NILEHI EDUCATIONAL TAX REFERENDUM SATURDAY

Seek 21¢
Per \$100
Increase

Niles Township residents will go to the polls Saturday to vote for an educational tax increase of 21 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, increasing the rate for \$8,791 to \$1,091. The money will be used to provide salary increases and the hiring of new teachers and counselors.

This is the first increase since 1958 when voters approved a 21 cent increase in the education fund tax rate. Enrollment then was 3,401 in the one high school. Today, the enrollment is 6,760 at three schools. Since 1958 faculty has increased from 191 to 434 while property valuation has increased from \$359,000,000 to \$549,000,000. Valuation per pupil since 1958 has declined from \$105,000 to \$82,000.

Voters will go to the polls from 12 noon to 7 P.M. All Niles residents will go to the precinct 16 poll at the Niles South Public School, 6935 Touhy. Morton Grove residents will vote at the Grove, Hynes and Parkview polls.

In a news release from an active supporter of the bond referendum, former Niles Public School Board member Walter Kramer noted the following:

THE CRISIS confronting Niles is the same one confronting every school district in the country.

Our population is expanding faster than our resources.

The per capita cost of educating our children is rising each year.

The average annual salary of the instructional staff increases as its experience grows.

Competition from other school districts and industry continuously forces us to pay larger salaries to attract and hold our teachers.

The inflationary spiral causes the prices paid for textbooks and related educational items to increase annually.

As a consequence, the educational tax levy of 87 cents per \$100 of equalized assessed valuation is totally inadequate.

District 64 Vote On 2 Issues Saturday

Niles residents of School District 64 will vote on a \$2,150,000 school bond issue and a 12.5¢ School Building Fund increase at a referendum on Saturday, Nov. 20, according to Dr. Blair Plimpton, District Superintendent. The voting place for Niles residents of the District is Jefferson School, located at 8200 Greendale Avenue, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Boundaries of District 64 in Niles are Howard Street on the south, Harlem Avenue on the East to Oakton, Oakton to Milwaukee, Milwaukee to Monroe, Monroe to Washington, Washington to Evanston Lane, and west to the Niles City Limits. Dr. Plimpton explained.

Dr. Plimpton pointed out that the bond issue is to pay for the completion of Emerson Junior High School, an addition to Jefferson School, and construction of a new school at Greendale and Western Avenue. These additions will directly benefit Niles residents. In addition four other schools in the District will be completed. Voters will be asked to authorize

an increase in the school Building Fund from 25¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation to 37.5¢. This increase, Dr. Plimpton said, is needed to pay for operation and maintenance of school buildings and to eliminate a current deficit.

Residents are urged to purchase their vehicle stickers early to obtain the \$2.50 discount available.

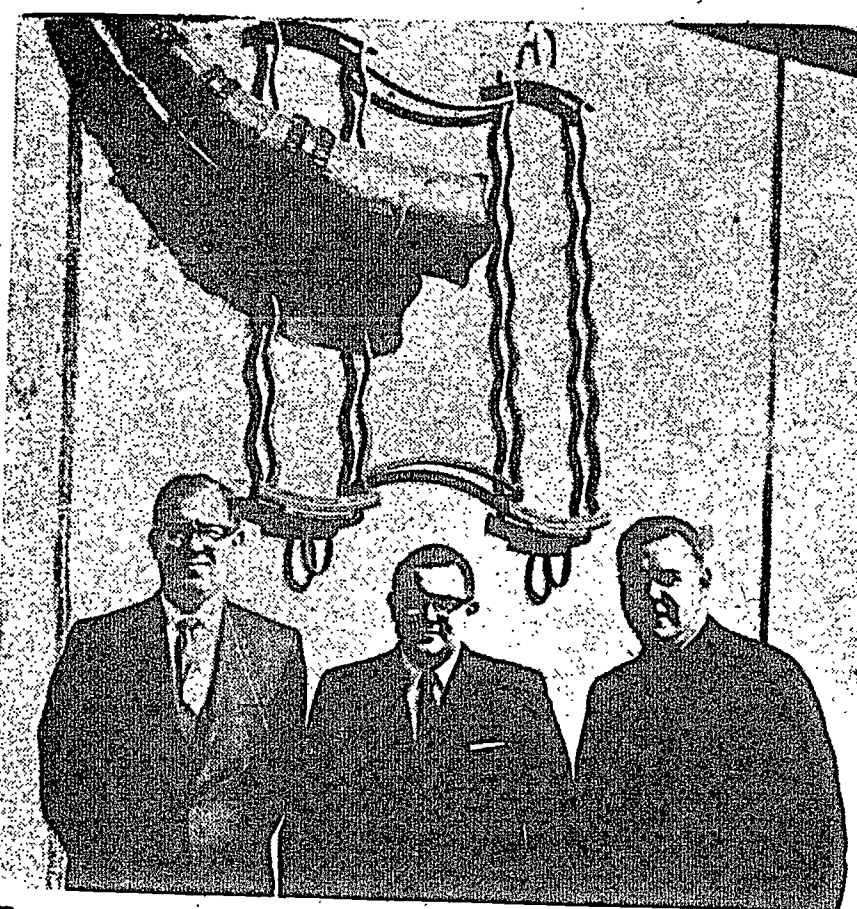
Lions Host Wives Tonight

Down By The Old Mill Run

What happens when the star of a play misses a performance? The reason given may be illness, but the know-it-alls have a better one. Rumors fly high and wide, speculation knows no bounds and the absent one lies home in bed unable to speak for himself. And then come the Horatio Alger visions. Will the stand-in make it? Will the extra reach stardom this short-cut way? 'Taint so, none of it—not when the play is of short duration, a two week run.

Gordon MacRae, singing star of the play Carousel at the Mill Run Playhouse, still in the throes of a bug he picked up in Boston, before coming to Niles, held out for two days and then Thursday evening, was unable to sing and the performance was cancelled. Out of 800 advance reserved seats, 70% took new reservations, the rest accepted refunds. There were only two irate customers, one wanted the show to go on anyway, the other was furious that she hadn't been called personally (her husband had bought the tickets at the box-office earlier, naturally leaving no name—in case —). In the best tradition of the "show must go on", actors and singers manage to get well in a hurry and the next night, Friday, Gordon was in pretty good voice and almost back to normal. In an after show speech, he admits that he has never played to a more beautiful theatre and the audiences are swooning over him. Gary Mann, who plays Enoch Snow in the production of Carousel, is strong competition in the vocalizing department. Gary, a handsome young man with a voice to match will be seen more and more in the upcoming musicals at the Mill Run Playhouse.

The birthing pains and after-birth complications seem to be slowly but surely settling into the background as the Mill Run Playhouse comes into its own. It is not easy to build up an establishment of this sort and each step brings problems and frustrations and since July when the theatre first opened they have run into a score of kinks which are only now being ironed out. They have been running on a day to day programming basis, almost not knowing until a few days before what show will arrive, who will be in the show and the advertising would be nil as a result and the house showings would be an agonizing disappointment to the cast and the management. Now with a better scheduled program, projecting into the far future, it is hoped that the audiences will fill the beautiful arena as it was meant to be. The scheduling is so well planned that the cast of "The Flower Drum Song" due to start on November 23, has already arrived (Monday) and rehearsals started on Tuesday. Many a

time the show arrived on the night before opening (A View from the Bridge) and there wouldn't even be time for rehearsal, only a partial walk-through. That means the characters go through their places on stage, and their exits and walk-ons, and barely have time to mumble their lines. Sometimes part of the cast arrived and the delays until the rest arrived left doubts as to whether there would be an opening night.

With the arrival of the cast for the "Flower Drum Song", the theatre is jumping and jiving; the large "Flower Drum" cast is rehearsing in daytimes and the large cast of "Carousel" is playing nights; the theatre is overflowing with performers and it wouldn't surprise anyone if Flower Drum players turned up among the Carousel players by accident.

I now better understand the announced goal of our city officials to pass an ordinance creating a Human Relations Commission, this coming Tuesday night, November 23, Council Chambers, 7200 Waukegan Rd., at 8:00 P.M.

The Chicago Tribune, October 29, reported that Andrew Young, executive director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, was here to speak to 15 integration groups in preparation for a successful integration drive in Chicago-land by Rev. Martin Luther King.

He declared that "each organization here tonight must prepare 1,000 troops, people willing to act for what they believe in at any time of the day or night." Part of the work of the 15,000 troops" was to urge "suburbs to create a human relation commissions to promote integrated housing."

I can now better understand the behind-the-scenes pressure put upon our city officials by racist groups with a mania for integration regardless of the sacrifice of personal liberty to our citizens.

It behooves all citizens who love God, freedom, their fellow man and who wish to maintain a respectable city for citizens of any color, to show our village officials that they need not submit to the pressure of the liberal "troops" or the powerful liberal propaganda.

Requests Villages Annex Unincorporated Dist. 63 Area

The need for control of housing development in the unincorporated areas of East Maine School District 63 and the position of the Board of Education in relationship to this problem as it affects the continuing quality of education in the district was reviewed during the November 10 meeting answer to a resolution offered the board by former board member Earl D. Epstein. The petition requested the board support an appeal to the village boards of Des Plaines, Glenview, Morton Grove, Niles, and Park Ridge for immediate enactment of annexation referendum ordinances which, upon voter approval, would annex to the village the two square miles and over 15,000 residents at present not within municipal borders.

The resolution stated "Whereas the unincorporated area has developed adverse to school, community and adjacent municipal interests and it is reasonable to believe that its continued development will be adverse to the public interest, and whereas experience has taught the perceptible citizen

that unincorporated government serves the special interests at unconscionable cost to the public interest, we, in the public interest, urge the public interest, and boards of surrounding villages to enact annexation referendum ordinances which, upon voter approval, would immediately annex all the unincorporated area in the East Maine School District.

In reply to Mr. Epstein's request, board member Allen Schwartz offered a motion to the board requesting that the conference of village officials be reconvened. The conference met in August at the invitation of East Maine School District 63 to discuss joint problems relative to zoning and accelerated housing development in the area.

The motion asked for a reconvening "to discuss the problems of unincorporated areas in School District 63 as it relates to a petition for the formation of a village in part of the area at the request of residents for annexation of portions of the area, and for consideration of how those developments affect municipalities concerned."

A fuel oil contract alternate bid of posted price less \$.007 per gallon discount made by the Suburban Oil Company was also accepted by the board. The bid was made on the basis of not being metered. Tank compartments will be sealed at the depot and these compartments measured before and after delivery by the school custodian who should keep a log of all deliveries.

Mr. Schwartz reiterated the School Board's position that it
