to maintain our present educational standards.

The Nilehi educational budget for 1965-66 is \$7,096,000 while the estimated tax receipts are only \$6,538,000.

The difference for this school year will be made up by borrowing money.

This deficit financing cannot be extended beyond the present school year.

When the 87 cent tax limit was set in the 1957-58 school year, there was only one high school in the district with an enrollment of 2,984 students.

There were 154 teachers receiving an average annual salary of \$6,300.

The assessed valuation of the township was \$319,000,000 and its taxable wealth per pupil was \$106,000.

We now have three four-year schools with 6,775 pupils.

These schools have 433 teachers with an average annual salary of \$7,997.

THE ASSESSED valuation is estimated to be \$560,000,000 with a taxable wealth per pupil of only \$82,000.

While the enrollment has increased 2.2 times in eight years, the number of teachers has increased 280 per cent and the quality of this staff has improved.

In 1957, 40 per cent of the teachers possessed advanced degrees as compared with 60 per cent today.

This coupled with the decreased student-teacher ratio, indicates why our children are receiving an education in 1965 superior to that of 1957.

THE QUESTIONS most asked about the referendum are how much the tax increase will cost each home owner, and when will we have to start paying the increase.

The assessed valuation of a house is about one-third its market value. Therefore, the taxes on a house selling for \$30,000 can be increased a maximum of \$21.

THE CITIZENS Committee urges every Nilehi voter to go to the polls November 20 and approve the proposal.

Annexation

An Open Letter To East Maine Residents and Their Neighbors:

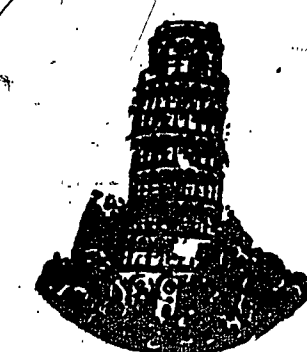
A group of citizens have filed a petition for a referendum seeking the creation of the Village of Golf Mill covering a gerrymandered fraction of East Maine's unincorporated area. Two petitions for a Park District have been filed, one to match the aforementioned gerrymandered section; the second for a larger more sensibly ordered area, substantially including the other petition's boundaries.

It is a critical period for East Maine. If past experience prevails, Facts, Truth, Sound and Sane Guidance will be drowned - in a sea of misinformation, unscrupulous deception, confusion and chaos - by the special interests and the uninformed. Men will be "expert" on the subject; every day will have an opinion on the subject. The undersigned asks the East Maine citizens to carefully examine - and challenge, if necessary, the source of the information received; the source's "expert" credentials; the source's motive; the authority for the source's statements, and the degree, if any, of the source's prior contribution to the public interest of East Maine.

The undersigned speaks as a nine year East Maine resident - a former East Maine School Board President, whose six year Board service saw the construction of five large schools, and the doubling in size of the three "older schools" - all at a record breaking rate to keep pace with East Maine's explosion growth. The undersigned was one of the first citizens many years ago to foresee and act on the impact and peril of the zoning breakdown and the resultant chaotic congestion of East Maine's strange city without government. The undersigned was a chief witness in a farcical, fruitless Illinois Commerce Commission hearing seeking reductions in the unincorporated area's exorbitant water rates and a participant in an effort which resulted in an annexation referendum for a 220 acre section. The undersigned saw the referendum defeated 570-351 and the consequent construction in that area of East Maine's first apartment high rise at Golf and Washington, the breakthrough for the high rises presently under construction and the many to come.

The undersigned's record of service in the public interest of East Maine has not been insignificant. Therefore, the undersigned respectfully makes the following appeals, in the public interest, to the respective parties as follows: To the city councils and village boards of Des Plaines, Glenview, Morton Grove, Niles and Park Ridge: immediately enact annexation referendum ordinances to include all the unincorporated area in the East Maine School District, to the extent legally permissible. To the Golf Mill Village Petitioners: Permit and support the annexation referendum if enacted.

2 Legal Questions At Heart Of TAM Petition

The fight to preserve Tam O'Shanter Country Club for public recreation has raised two complex legal questions, one of which was the subject of a petition sent to Washington Monday, according to the Sun-Times.

At issue is the Niles Park District's condemnation proceedings against the 120-acre golf course at Howard and Caldwell, purchased earlier this year for private development by J. Emil Anderson and Sons, Inc., for \$3,300,000.

The condemnation petition, filed in August, has resulted in charges by the Anderson firm that the park district has violated the Illinois public meeting law.

At the same time, the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency has urged that the park

district violated procedural requirements in its condemnation action and thus endangered its bid for a purchase grant.

School District 64 Vetoes School Bond, Building Fund Issues

Residents of school district 64 overwhelmingly opposed a \$2,450,000 school bond issue and a 12.5¢ School Building Fund increase in referendums Saturday. Nilesites at the Jefferson School turned down the tax rate by almost a 2 to 1 vote, opposing it 437 to 226. However, the building bonds lost by a less amount, 398 to 265.

It was the largest number of voters in the history of the

The increase raised the rate from \$.8791 to \$1.091 per \$100 assessed valuation. The money will be used to provide salary increases and the hiring of new teachers and counselors.

This is the first increase since 1958 when voters approved a 21 cent increase in the education fund tax rate. Enrollment then was 3,401 in the one high school. Today, the enrollment is 6,760 at three schools. Since 1958 faculty has increased from 191 to 434 while property valuation has increased from \$359,000,000 to \$549,000,000. Valuation per pupil since 1958 has declined from \$105,000 to \$82,000.

School District 63 Review

A. At the bi-monthly meeting of School District #63 Tuesday proposals for 2 research surveys were seconded and approved by the board members.

1—Dr. John M. Ducey, of the Institute of Urban Life, of Loyola University, was retained to survey the social, educational and financial aspects of the annexation of 40 acres of land, called the W.J.J.D. Site, to the village of Niles. The fee for said survey shall not exceed \$3500.

2—The team of Drs. Michael D. Usdan, Lee F. Andersen, and David Miner, from Northwestern University were engaged to do a preliminary study of the educational resources, buildings, materials, money, current and future needs of the school district; land use, development, public activities and political responsibilities of the school district. Fee—\$1950.

B. It was agreed unanimously that all social workers and nurses for the school district be reimbursed for gasoline usage, a flat rate of \$25 per month, and to start retroactively back to the start of the school term last September, with the exception of Mrs. Marie Connor, whose employment didn't start until October.

C. Sergeant Frank Wichlach of Niles was appointed Truant officer for School District #63.

D. Ratified sharing responsibility for the cost of a Supervisor for teachers of the Deaf Class, based on pupil enrollment.

ment in each school district. District #63 has 22% of the total enrollment (12 pupils) and their share is \$38.50.

E. A request from the March of Dimes Drive to allow the children of District 63 to participate was rejected by the Superintendent. And Board member A. Kapp asked that the school participation in the Red Cross Drive be reconsidered also. Since only one fund drive is allowed per year, he suggested it be on a broader basis than the Red Cross. That will be discussed in a later meeting.

F. Purchase of floor waxing machines were authorized.

G. Transfer of funds for Science Library materials was explained by Dr. Tobin and passed.

Chief Hoelbl Reminds Residents To Check Heating System

The artistic talents of Jack Frost on the window pane may represent artistic value to some, but to the firefighter it means the beginning of the most hazardous fire season of the year.

With the coldest part of the winter season yet to come, Nilesites were reminded to check their heating systems for safety's sake.

Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbl said defective or overheated heating equipment accounts for almost 25% of home fires annually, resulting in unnecessary property damage and loss of life.

Chief Hoelbl cited a few simple rules of preventive maintenance to avoid needless tragedy.

1. Nothing burnable should be within 18 inches of top, sides or rear of your furnace.

2. Flue Pipes should be clean, and hole-free.

3. Chimneys should be checked for loose bricks or cracks.

4. Keep portable heaters out of halls, and away from stairs and doors.

5. Keep heaters away from curtains, clothes racks, upholstered chairs.

6. Keep furnace filters clean, and changed often. Dirty filters cause overheated furnace motors. Keep motors well-oiled. Have units checked by a qualified repairman.

7. When using a portable heater, make sure it rests solidly on the floor, or has automatic shut-off.

8. Sleep with bedroom or hall door closed; these precautions can hold back fire until you can escape.

9. Turn heaters on low or off at bedtime.

10. Know your escape route, and know it well.

Although fires can occur at anytime, winter seems to be the most common time. If fire strikes, leave the house and call 827-2121 for help, Chief Hoelbl advised.

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Down By The Old Mill Run

Khig Dhegh (Ki Dee) is a name of mystery and intrigue as is the face attached to the name. The familiarity of the brutal and vicious psychologist of the "Manchurian Candidate," the sedate Korean instructor in "Time Limit," play and movie, and the many-time cruel Japanese officer, cannot be missed. What can be overlooked are the softened features of his part in "Teahouse of the August Moon" and the two parts he now plays in "Flower Drum Song" at the Mill Run Playhouse. As Professor Cheng and Dr. Lu Fong Khig Dhegh adds to the characterizations of Master Wang and Dr. Li, he has played in other presentations of the same play, "Flower Drum Song."

New Jersey born, New York bred, this American of Egyptian parents, excels in Oriental, Hindu, eccentric and exotic parts. "I've never played an Egyptian, they'd probably say I'm not the type," says Khig.

He has often been mistaken for the Kurate expert and henchman of Goldfinger, from the picture of the same name. "I wanted to invite him to dine with me and tell him of the many compliments I have received for his acting. But after searching for him, I found he was a resident of England and not an actor, but a Japanese Karate instructor who had been hired for the part."

Director, actor, playwright, lecturer, student, hypnotist, authority on Oriental and Primitive cultures, the facets of Khig Dhegh remain innumerable. He is a most fascinating and erudite man of the ages. He will hammer at any barrier that withholds the secrets he searches for, until those same secrets are his. That is the true mystery of the man called Khig Dhegh.

But there is warmth, charm, gaiety and gentleness in him, too; he is not super-engrossed in the depth of his knowledge. Khig and his wife have adopted two of their grandchildren and as all modern parents must do, he hied himself out to buy some arithmetic books—to help his grandchildren with their new-fangled arithmetic homework. For shame—even you, Khig?

The part of Master Wang is played by Chao Li, a philosophy student. "Acting puts butter on my bread, but philosophy will teach me the meaning of life and I must find the meaning," says Chao, who seems to be searching for the universal goal—a meaning to life.

Chao Li was born in Shanghai and came to the United States after the Japanese occupation of Shanghai in 1939. He settled in New York and has been there since. He has a beautiful command of the English tongue and

a deep knowledge of his native Chinese with its intricate meanings and symbols. Quiet and rather shy, Chao Li can be drawn out easily by conversation on his one love, philosophy, and its varied potentials. He prefers his studies, but sometimes is necessary to coast ones' bread so he acts when he must.

Flower Drum Song, playing at the Mill Run Playhouse until December 11, has a delightful story to offer its viewers, but some of its cast are just as delightful to meet, aren't they?

If the annexation referendum effort fails, move to encompass all of the East Maine unincorporated area in your petition.

To All East Maine Residents: A contributing factor to East Maine's school and community problems has been East Maine's fragmentation by five municipalities and the unincorporated areas. A sixth new born municipality—particularly one locking out East Maine's remaining unincorporated area—might bring more problems than it would solve. The five existing municipalities are long established experienced government bodies with offices, organization, resources and know-how.

Clear, cogent logic argues that we first strive vigorously for local self-government by annexation. If our annexation efforts fail, we will be left with no alternative but to strive just as vigorously for self-incorporation for all the unincorporated areas. For it is a fundamental democratic concept that local self-government provides the highest opportunity and most suitable vehicle for the serving of the public interest, the control over the course of public events and the influence of building development. An authoritative document dated July 4, 1776, contains the following wise words pertinent to East Mainettes: "All experience has shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed," and "To secure rights, governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed."

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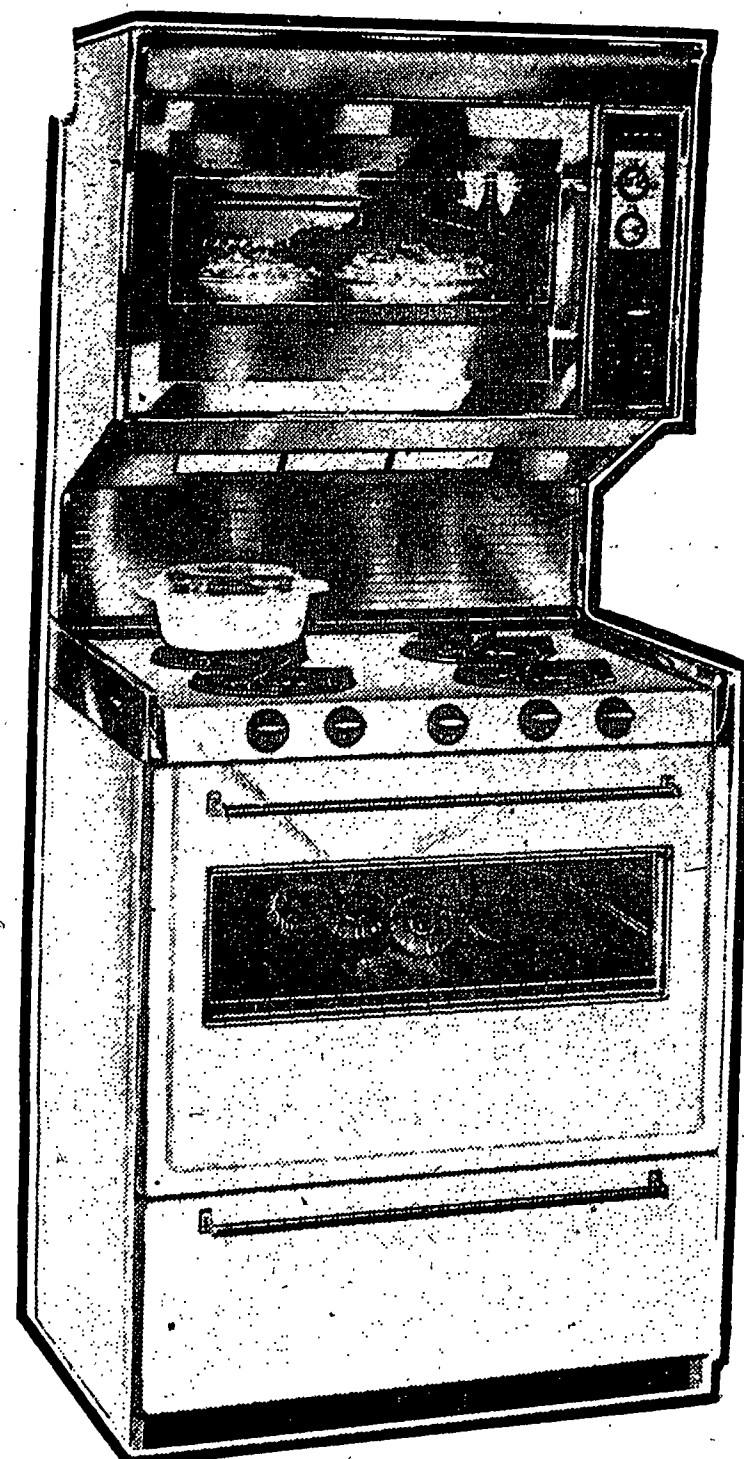
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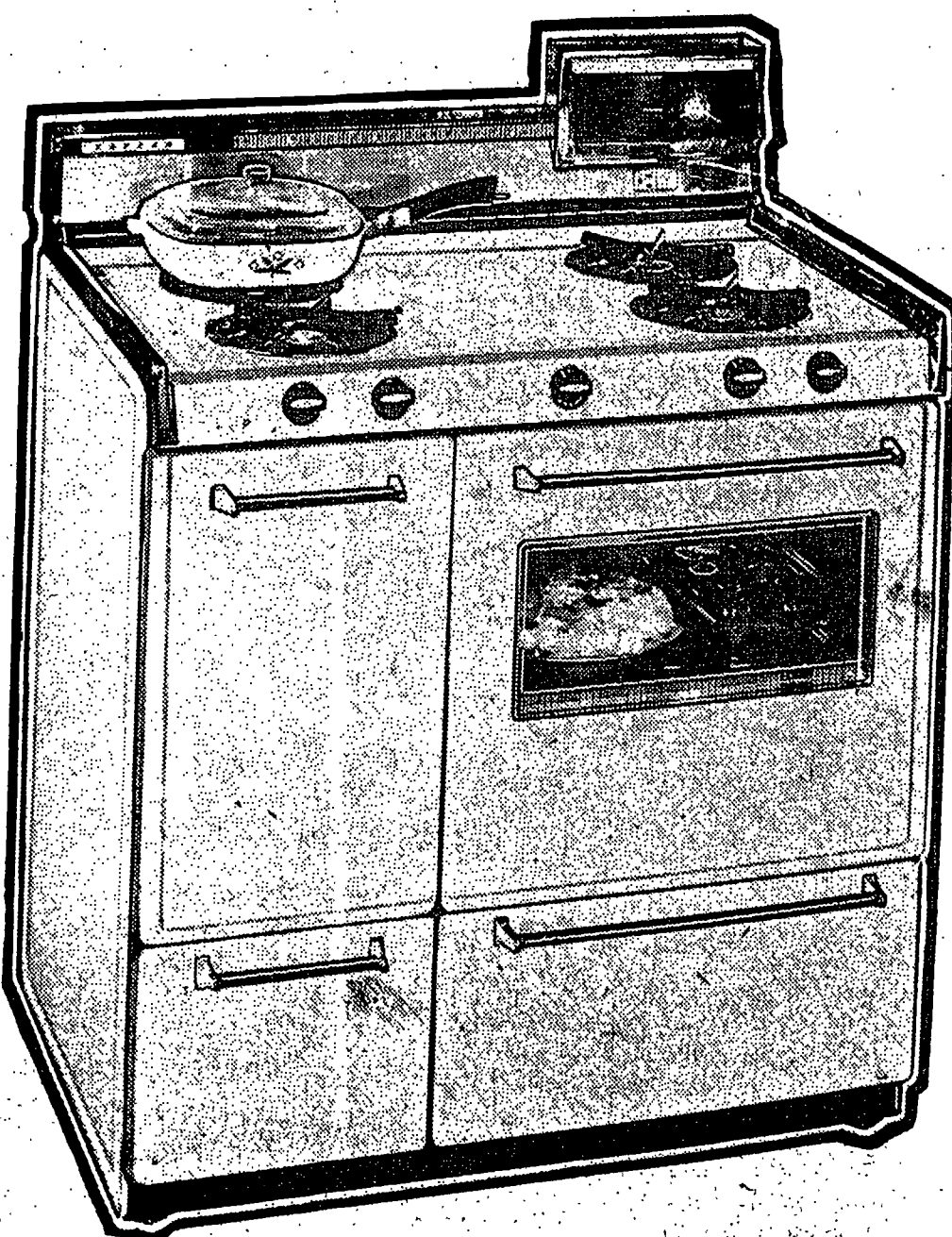
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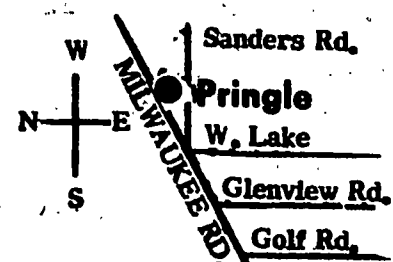
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George Dooms At East Maine Baptist

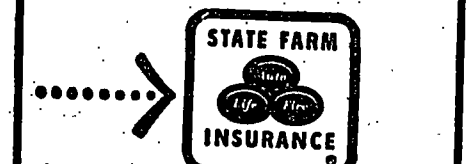
