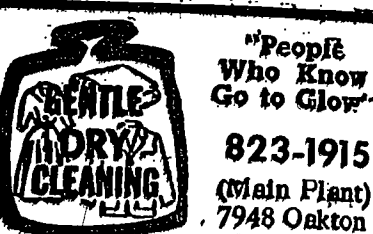

"It is our goal to raise \$1,000 for the scholarship fund this year," said Mrs. Robert Curradi, coffee chairman.



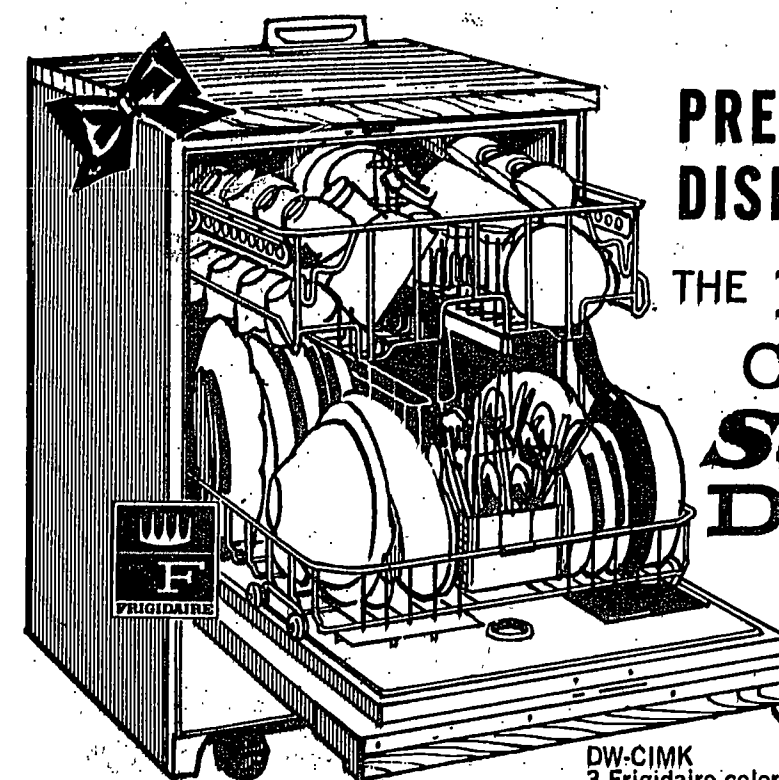

part", in the area in and about the school district. He said the group agreed there were problems in the district, they hoped for a possible comprehensive plan, but no solution was in sight then.

Schwartz recited how the area was led into believing it would become a part of the Niles Park District, but after petitioning, was turned down. He cited how the area next to Glenview rejected a referendum to annex into that town. He also commented how a letter from the water company in the area said the villages did not want to supply water in the area, ignoring this area, which led to it taking over the water franchise.

It was Schwartz's contention no leadership was shown in this area, and while the people were told to take over the leadership void, they did not. Schwartz said more leadership was required from the political leaders in the whole area.

He said when some 85 persons filed to incorporate the Golf Mill area not one surrounding village official filed an objection to it. He said such an opportunity for orderly annexation in the area may have been gone had not others objected to the petition. (Schwartz, in opposing the petition contends the area is being gerrymandered, creating a C-shaped village which has been implied is beneficial to builder Susan, the major builder in the community).

Mayor Blase countered Schwartz's review by stating perhaps village officials were being castigated too severely. He reminded the Board he initiated looking into "piecing up" the unincorporated area three years ago but the proposal "never got off the ground". Blase said Niles would likely be interested in such a study. Blase added there are many questions surrounding this area, and that "home rule" could be the answer to the area's problems, and objecting to the annexation petition might not be in the spirit of "home rule". Blase said the school board should have alerted the surrounding villages about these problems.

Schwartz told the officials, "By your inaction you have created action (the petition for the Golf Mill incorporation)."

Schwartz re-iterated there was a need to act now. Pointing to the immediacy of the problem he asked the six surrounding villages to express an

School District 63 OK's Two Surveys

Two proposals for research surveys to investigate the problems arising in School District #63 relative to rapid and large-scale development in East Maine were approved by the Board during the Nov. 23 semi-monthly meeting.

The proposals were presented to the administration of District 63 by a team of professors from the Northwestern University departments of education and political science, and by the Institute of Urban Life located at Loyola University. They will cost the district \$1950 and \$8500 respectively.

In explaining the need and desirability for 2 separate surveys, Dr. G. William Bullock, superintendent, told the Board:

"The Institute survey is concerned with fulfilling an immediate objective of the School District related to the annexation of the property commonly known as the WJJD property at Ballard and Greenwood Roads. It will give us immediate information as to the fiscal and social impact of the proposed development on the district's operation and provide us with a 'position paper' with which we can make a decision as to the Board's position relative to the annexation of this property by the Village of Niles and the development of high-rises.

"The Northwestern study, on the other hand, is pointed in a different direction and is more comprehensive in nature. It focuses on specific problems in our district both educationally and non-educationally and should furnish data that the administration can utilize in seeking governmental funds for a thorough community survey embodying all aspects of community development.

The Northwestern study will deal with:

1. Educational resources as they relate to existing and probable future needs.
2. District decision-making processes and other factors that facilitate or deter effective planning and optimal use of resources.
3. Land use and development and the relation of future de-

velopment to district fiscal resources.

4. The pattern of governmental jurisdictions in the community, overlaps and voids, and possible devices for common action, coordination and integration.

5. Public attitudes, ways to measure satisfaction and dissatisfaction for improving and extending the base of public support.

The Board acceptance of the twin surveys followed an earlier motion made and accepted by the Board at its Nov. 10 meeting, to reconvene an emergency session of the Conference of Village Officials. This body, composed of the villages of Glenview, Morton Grove, Niles and Park Ridge, School District #63, the State Board of Economic Development, the Northeastern Illinois Metropolitan Area Planning Commission and the Cook County Board, as a result of a resolution by the School Board inviting governing bodies, civic and welfare organizations and private parties in and adjacent to East Maine to sit down together and attempt to suggest solutions to their joint problems relative to the unincorporated areas of East Maine.

During the first meeting, Conference members suggested several possible avenues toward solution to East Maine problems, including a comprehensive plan for the area or annexation by adjoining municipalities. The Conference was told at the time by Peter Sonnenfeld, district manager of the State Board of Economic Development, that the School Board would not be eligible for state monetary assistance to have a comprehensive plan drawn up. State aid is available to municipalities of 50 thousand or less, or counties of any population. Mr. Sonnenfeld said that the municipalities surrounding the unincorporated area could receive aid for professional planning in the area if they agreed to a joint venture.

Somehow nothing ever fits, nothing is right in place until the actual night of the performance.

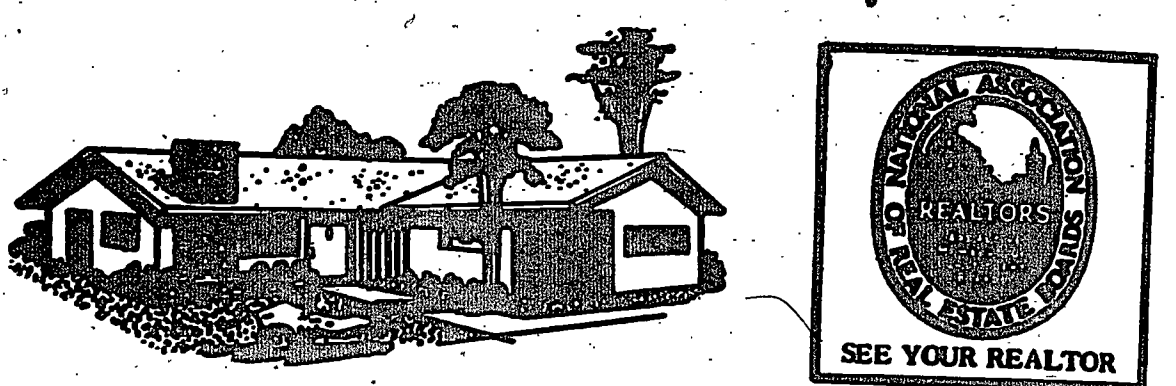

feeling such a creation would help to "bring us together".

Resident Carol Massey asked the difference between the Council and a Commission and was told the former was a voluntary group with no official authority, while a Commission would be under the sanction of the village board, with authority vested in the officials. Trustee Ed Berkovsky emphasized this very point, which he said he believed to be pertinent.

Other comments included those from residents Bill Keener, Dick Gruenwald, Joe Miller, Joe Salerno and Joe Kowalski. Kowalski claimed the meeting was a "packed meeting" and not an objective one; Keener's remarks were not in sympathy with what he called "the underprivileged"; Gruenwald mentioned the need to relieve tension; Miller asked the academic question about the effective use of government, presumably in this area of human relations, while Salerno, Niles Electrical Commissioner, asked what have been the accomplishments of the present Niles Human Relations Council.

President of the Human Relations Council, Ron Pinkowski, cited the five meetings conducted by the group the past year, noting the educational aspects of its goals. He said the 5 subjects covered included, "What Is Human Relations, The Ecumenical Conference, Shared Time, Open Housing and Youth Problems".

Pinkowski said nobody in the audience listened to the other side. He said he asked the audience to try to think, and not act with emotion.

Father Zawadowsky, St. John Brebeuf, criticized attorney Sutton for arousing the emotions of the crowd, and said the crowd only listened to their own emotions, after Sutton finished.

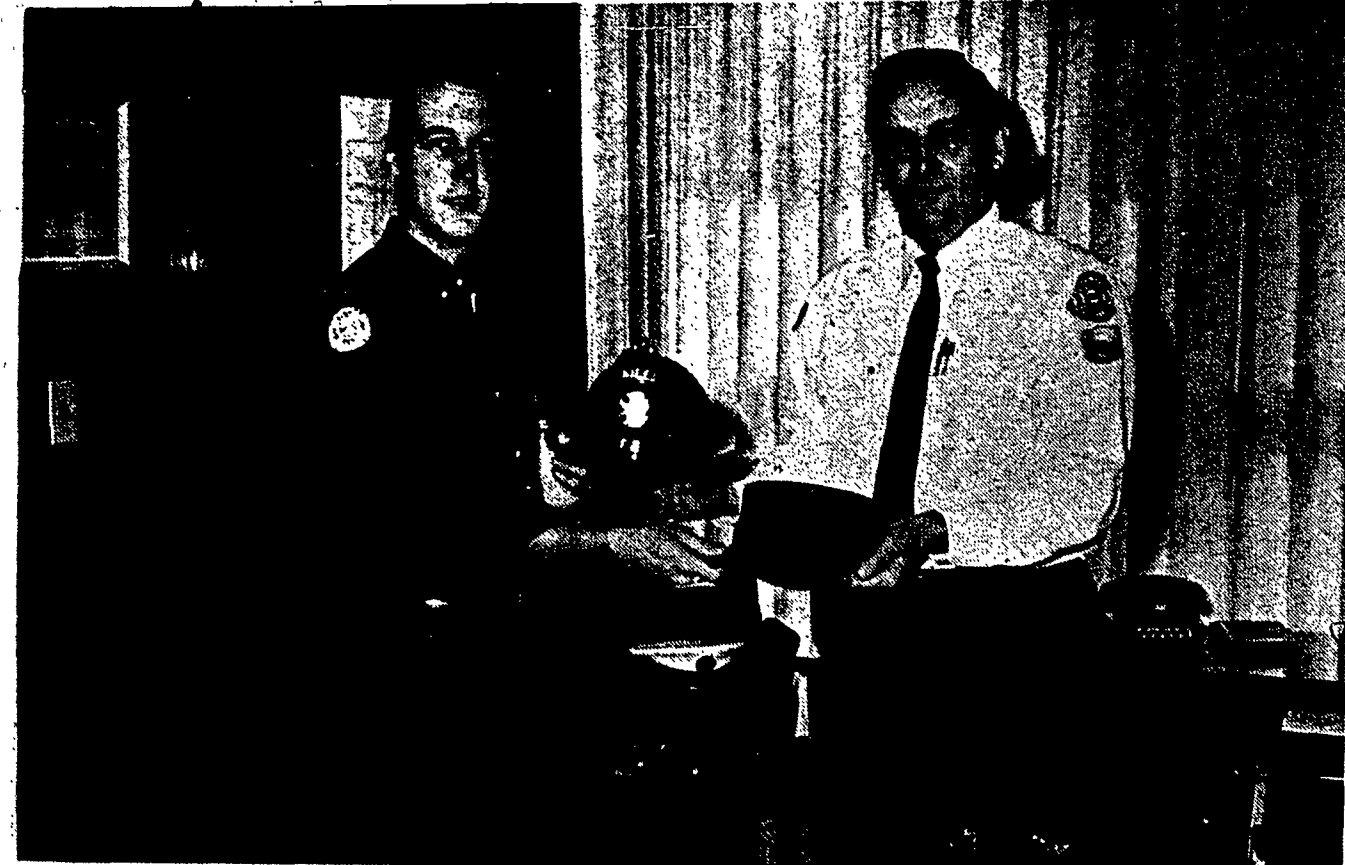
Mayor Blase then said an open discussion, hearing both sides express themselves would be most welcome. It is likely such a meeting would be held at a future date.
