in the policy-making circle of Democratic doings in Illinois.

The Wessel candidacy, like all opposition for any committeeman post, will be based on who can best lead the Democrats during the coming years. Local Demos have long muttered the present leadership has been inactive and the theme of stirring up the natives thru more active efforts will be paramount during the coming campaign.

Interestingly, Wessel and Bradley both come from strong Republican areas, Des Plaines and Park Ridge respectively. And while they're likely to control the votes in their home areas their chances for success are dependent on the Niles-Morton Grove-East Maine unincorporated locales. The ability to beat the bushes in these areas will determine who is the next Democratic committeeman.

Des Plaines figures to bring in more Democratic votes for Wessel, the hometown boy, then Park Ridge will garner for Bradley.

Thus, both men must look to the unincorporated area, where the election is likely to be won and lost.

Candidate number three is likely to break from the starting gate with an equal amount of votes in his home-area, as either of the other two candidates, but the overwhelming Democratic strength in the East Maine area will be where the major skirmishing will take place.

Since the unincorporated area will be courted during the coming months this will be a golden opportunity for the residents there to seek favors from the committeeman candidates' areas to help them. If they desired annexing into one of these towns where the candidates live, this would be the time to press for action. This would be one of the rare times when the politicians would have to put their "mouths where the votes are", which in this case would benefit residents who are in need of help.

In Niles Township announced candidate Jerry Lerner will be battling incumbent Ray Krier in what is likely to be an even more active dogfight. Attorney Lerner missed being elected four years ago when he and Bill Segal split the opposition vote. Lerner hopes to pick up most of this vote in the two-man race this time, allowing him to be the new committeeman in Niles Township.

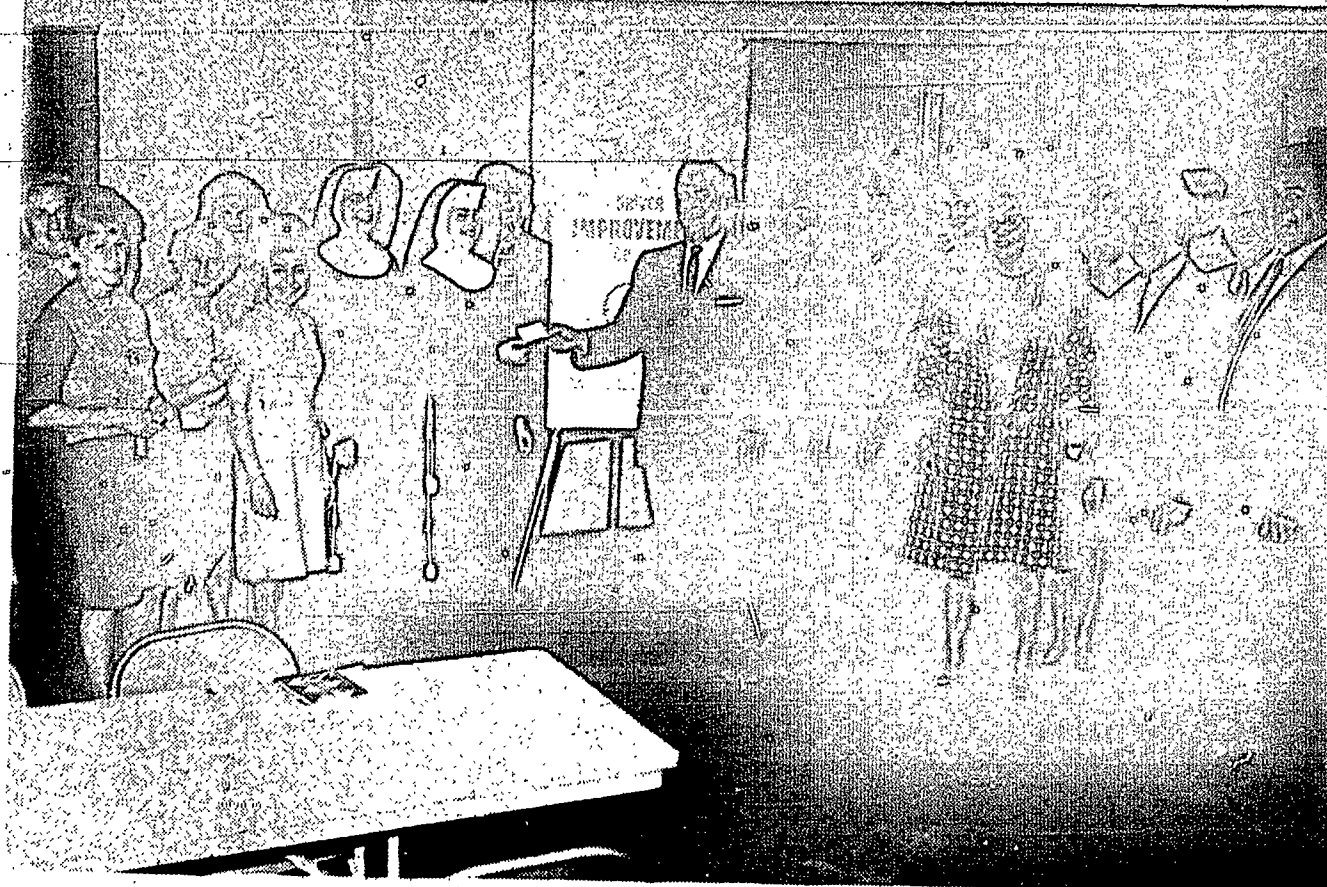
The contrast of the two races should be interesting. Whereas Republican Maine Township generally is apathetic about the committeeman races Niles Township, with its preponderant Democratic strength, turns out in force for this race. And yet, the serious opposition in Maine Township, with the new Democratic vote in the East Maine area, may light up the political skies there, similarly to their neighbor to the west. And while Joe Citizen may wonder what all the fuss and feud is all about the men with the ambition, the guys looking over the political ladder, will be driving hard for their futures.

Instructors Fred Potenza and John Sebastian, who expressed their extreme satisfaction at the turn-out for the four 2 hour sessions, were on hand to congratulate their students after the graduation which took place at the Niles Public Works Building.

Graduating were Mr. & Mrs. Peter Capellani, Mrs. Lenore Cochran, Mr. & Mrs. John Friewer, Dean Eklund, Mrs. Ruth Hanson, Dee Kavanagh, Tony Kress, Pat Potenza, Sister M. Francis, Sister M. Niles Safety Council President, Fred Potenza, invited all students and graduates of the course to join the council in its monthly meetings to try to bring about a consciousness of safety in all its aspects—home—school—as well as traffic. He invited all to attend

the meetings on the second Thursday of each month at the new Niles fire house on Dempster street. Mr. Potenza also said that notice will be given shortly as to when the courses of Driver Improvement will be offered.

Niles. These would be for senior citizens and the rentals would be approximately \$50 or less. If the need is apparent, the CHA will request funds for the project from the Federal Government. In the meantime continued study is necessary.

....Operation Standby, sponsored by the Niles All America City Commission, under the guidance of the girl scouts of Niles and their leaders collected 3,550 cans of food and 50 blankets which have been stored away until needed.

....Trustee Marcheschi requested an ordinance be drawn up aligning our Fire districts with our zoning codes. Fire District #1—will be R3, R4, B1, B2, and M—Industry, business, etc. Fire District #2—will be R1-R2, residences. This proposal is in accord with the suggestion of the National Board of Fire Underwriters which advises that all villages and cities be so aligned for the best possible service and coverage.

....Trustee Wente motioned the plat of subdivision Bel Mar, a 25 resident lot on the northwest corner of Milwaukee and Ballard be approved. It was seconded by Trustee Marcheschi.

....Mayor Blase asked for a resolution concerning the more and more common sight of house trailers and boats on the property of local dwellings. The Mayor recognizes the right of Americans to enjoy the benefits of our affluent way of life, but the sight of trailers and boats scattered around the village needs some further investigation and subsequent provisions thereof. He asked the zoning board look into the matter.

In an empty store at 8118 Milwaukee Avenue carpenters are pounding their nails and setting up what looks like headquarters for some type of organization. Rows of chairs are neatly lined up in rows of eight and two maps of Maine Township, with all the precincts marked off, are pasted on the south wall.

The intrepid reporter from THE BUGLE rushed back to the office, after gleaming this information, and immediately went back into the newspaper's research department and dug out the election calendar for 1966. Noting Niles has a school and library election this spring he dwelled on the possibility of the new office being created for one of these elections. But being politically-wise he discounted these thoughts. Studying the 23 page election calendar booklet he noted June 14 has one local election, that one for township committeeman. Knowing Des Plaines and Park Ridge candidates are vying for the Democrat's Maine Township post he began dwelling on a third candidate who might run for the post.

Rushing into the editor's office he brought all his evidence with him. Reciting the empty store with the rows of chairs, the maps on the wall, and citing the one local official election worthy of setting up an office, he began studying the evidence.

"If the office is in Maine Township... and in Niles... then there must be a candidate from Niles vying for the post", he noted with short gasps of breath.

"And since the post which is most susceptible to change is on the Democratic ticket, then Mr. Candidate must be a Democrat" (pause by the intrepid reporter). In Niles trustees Bruno and Wente and Mayor Blase are the only public officials in Maine Township... and lo and behold (that's the way reporters talk before a holiday) all three of them are Democrats".

Intrepid reporter burst from the office, rushed back to research and assessed the three potential candidates. Remembering hearing Wente refer to his leader, Mayor Blase as "Chief", he knew no man condescending to that term would run for a post of leadership. And knowing Bruno has not made a decision since he took office six years ago he was sure the candidate couldn't be Bruno. Then remembering the Mayor champs on a cigar, often sits with his feet on his desk, growls and grunts and gnarls like those politicians did at the turn of the century, intrepid reporter knew he had his man.

FEDERAL GRANT FOR TAM DENIED



Chamerski: "Due To Politics"

A request for 1.5 million dollar federal grant to help the Niles Park District buy Tam O'Shanter golf club has been rejected by the federal housing and home finance agency, Steve T. Chamerski, Park District president, said yesterday.

Chamerski blamed "political pressure" although he said he was told in a telephone conversation with an agency spokesman that the park district had moved to condemn the land before applying for the grant.

"We were worried about the price going up," he said, "We must buy property according to the last selling price, and we've had problems with guys selling land to their wives at inflated prices just to get more money out of us."

A letter confirming the grant rejection is on its way from Washington, Chamerski was told.

The denial of the money may not be too great a blow for the Park District, Chamerski said, because the district still can raise enough money for the golf club purchase through the sale of revenue and general obligation bonds.

Hearing on the condemnation suit will be held Jan. 11 before Judge Charles S. Dougherty in Circuit Court. The Niles zoning board of appeals will hear a request by the club's owner J. Emil Anderson & Co., on Jan. 6 to reclassify the property as a light manufacturing district rather than a residential area.

The Anderson firm, a developer, acquired the golf course in May from the estate of George S. May, former owner. The reported purchase price was 3.2 million dollars for the club's 122 acres at Caldwell and Touhy Avenues.

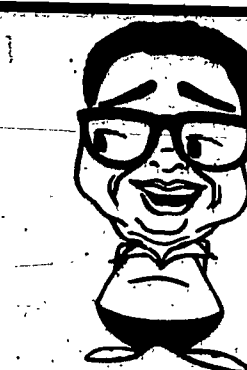

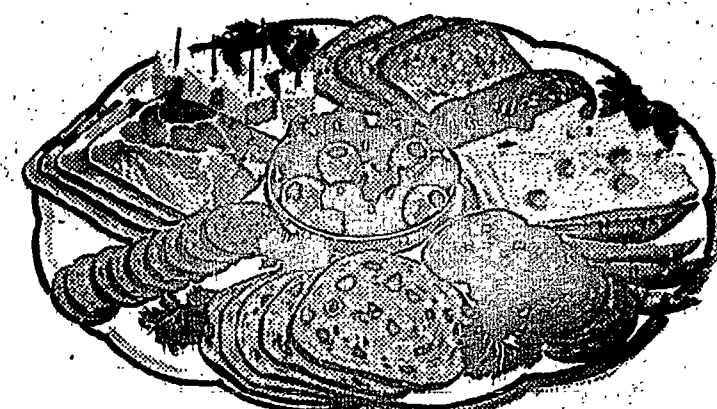

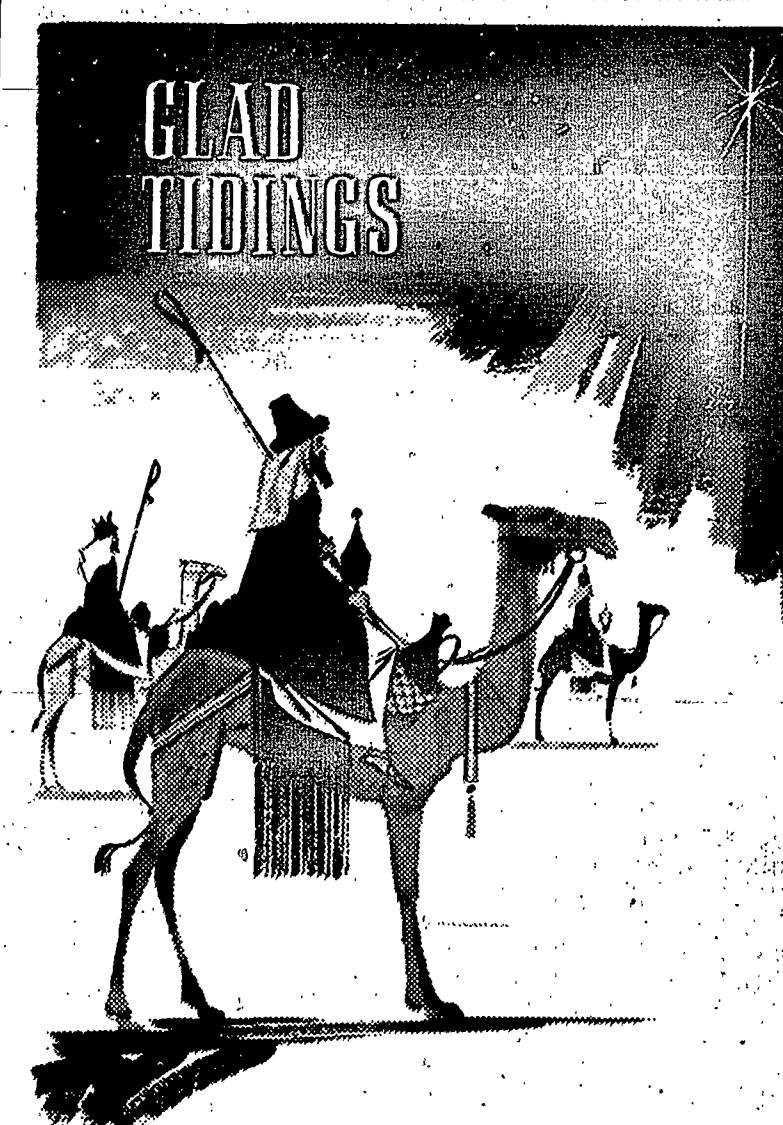
Mrs. Schroeder also reports that money from the Philanthropy Fund will be given to needy families in the village.

Nancy Frankenberg In 3 Concerts

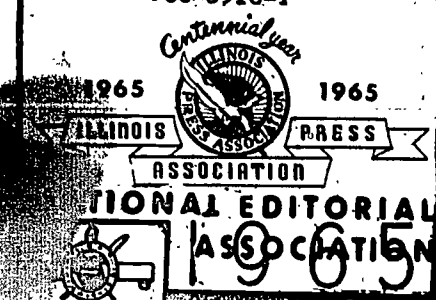

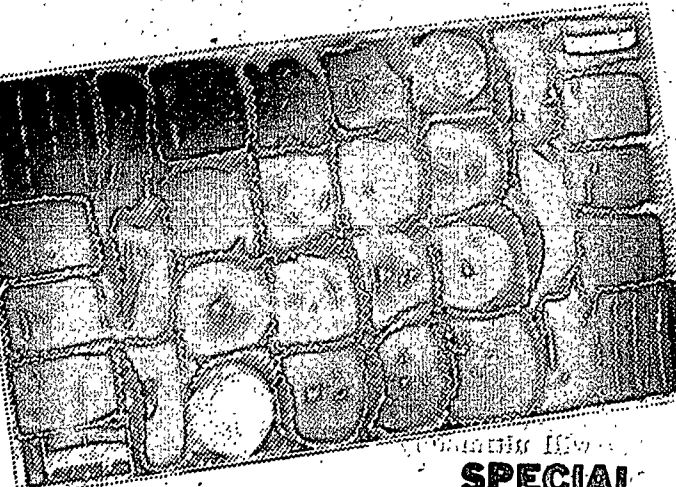
They first met at Northwestern University where he is a

Open Letter From Blase

Open Letter To Residents Of The Unincorporated Area:

During the past few months a great schism has divided the people in the unincorporated areas with reference to adequate representation, incorporation, education of the young, and the other growing pains that usually confront an area rapidly adding new homes and an influx of newcomers to suburbia. Quite recently, these problems have reached such proportions that they have attracted the notice and attention of the entire northwest suburban community.

As Mayor of the Village of Niles, I have been deeply concerned not only with the immediate problems of the Village but of those persons who live in the unincorporated areas surrounding the Village of Niles. We must all recognize that we do not live in a vacuum and that if our neighbors are in trouble, if there is discontent and hostility and confusion surrounding our Village, then this will ultimately have a direct bearing upon the welfare of the people of this Village.

Moreover, if one community of citizens can help its sister community in solving its problems in giving the advice, direction and encouragement that may be needed, then we are truly preserving the spirit of local government acting in concert without outside interference or control from government far removed from the people. We, in Niles have experienced these problems, and frankly, there are still many problems which we ourselves must solve. Therefore, we sympathize with the sincere efforts of those citizens living in our

neighboring community who are seeking a redress of their grievances and are striving for a better place in which to live. We share their hopes and aspirations. We recognize their concern.

With this in mind, it has been our desire to offer our good offices in whatever help that we may give to the people of the unincorporated areas without interference or any attempt to meddle in their affairs. However, it has been our desire to bring together the different points of view, to heal whatever breaches which might have occurred, to provide a meeting place to collectively discuss the merits of the various factions, and to impartially attempt to achieve some basic understanding and unity of thought among the people of the unincorporated areas which may lay the ground work for a consensus in which the problems can be satisfactorily mediated without resorting to methods which might cause irrevocable harm, but to surround communities as well including the Village of Niles.

I therefore call upon the good people of the surrounding incorporated areas to remember that in local government, we all share the responsibility of achieving satisfactory compromises. No one point of view, no one faction can have all the answers. Only with patience and with tolerance and with sincerity and with diligence will a just solution be reached.

Anonymous Phone Calls

Dear Bud:

Since I have been on the school board I have had many phone calls from parents in the district (usually with legitimate complaints), but last night I received my first anonymous phone call.

The background is this: (1) My wife as program chairman for our PTA invited Abner Mikve to speak on the subject of open occupancy, and considerable vocal opposition from a small minority in our area claimed that he should not be invited because this would be the first step towards having open occupancy in our area (which according to these vocal critics would in itself be some kind of a tragedy), and (2) the heating unit in Melzer School broke down the first cold day (yesterday). A thermostat did not function properly, and as a result a number of rooms in one part of the school were quite cold—a legitimate cause for complaint.

Now it may seem that these two things are not connected but you will see the connection that was made by the anonymous caller.

I had just concluded my 3rd phone call with the administration and other board members regarding the heating problem and the immediate steps that were to be taken to correct the situation, and I had been assured that it would be taken care of with all possible haste when the phone rang. The anonymous lady on the other end said "If we had open occupancy in our area, which you want us to have, your house would be picketed now just as Mayor Daley's house was picketed, because there is no heat in our school and my child is sick."

I want you to understand that this is merely a capsule summary of what she said. I was harangued for about 3 minutes. I was not given an opportunity to explain what we were doing about it, and the party hung up.

I would like your readers to know that the school board was made aware of the situation at Melzer immediately, and that everything humanly possible was being done to correct it prior to my receiving her call. These anonymous callers are phoning the Chicago newspapers about the heat at Melzer, and it seems to me if these people are honestly concerned about civic affairs (open occupancy and the heat at Melzer) they ought to shed their cloak of anonymity and show their faces so that open discussion can be held in the TRUE tradition of the Republic which they claim to love.

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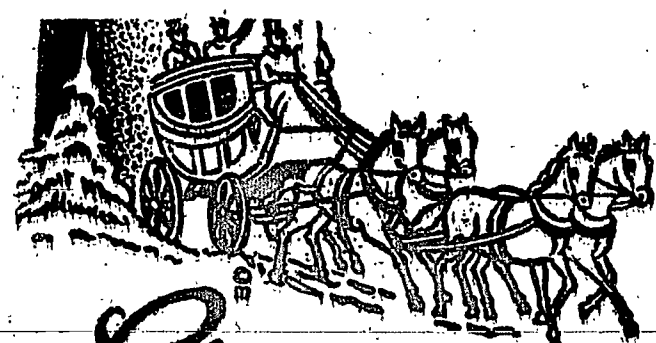

The call was for ushers, usherettes, stage hands and all the human element that goes into massive preparations for a theatre opening—and the young blonde boy wanted a job as an usher. He got a job—as house manager!

Frank Shepard Jr., has had experience directing in Dallas, Texas, in Fort Wayne, Indiana and with a group that toured the Orient. Trying to be an actor, firstly, proved somewhat less than a totally exhilarating experience. Financially it meant a starvation must eat, at times. Wanting to work as an usher, to increase his knowledge of theatre mechanics (his ultimate goal is directing) Frank has had more than ample opportunity to insinuate himself into the very cornerstone of a theatrical venture. He has been part and parcel of the load of bricks, glass and marble that went into the edifice that now is called "Mill Run Playhouse." Frank may not have laid the first stone, but he certainly was present at the finishing touches of the building.

What is a building but stone, brick and glass—until a soul and the warmth of a heart give it life. Frank was the spark that fused the building with a soul and a warm heart.

High pressured bosses, temperamental casts, and aggravated trivia that piled up daily into mountains of problems notwithstanding—Frank kept his equilibrium—until he reached the privacy of his home, late at night. He was an integral part of the theatre—12-14 hours daily, 7 days per week. Of course the explosions had to come—and they did—but no one ever suffered because of them.

"At home, late at night, facing the wall, I blow off steam and then feel better," says Frank

It doesn't seem possible that anyone could maintain such a calm exterior all the days of his tenure at a position, but Frank Shepard Jr., managed his theatre, his workers, his casts, with gentleness, and inestimable patience and understanding. A household with five people in it, becomes a lifetime project in self-control. Can you imagine a housing for 1600 people, plus assorted oddballs with a propensity to mishaps and misadventure? Frank coordinated the realistic world with the fantasies of the theatre progeny. Pinpoints of fire may have brimmed dangerously in his eyes, but he spoke softly.

Frank is leaving Niles, the Mill Run Playhouse, to embark on another massive project—a newly completed 3,000 seat

theatre in Dallas, Texas. In Texas all things are done on a giant scale so the welcome should be a warm one. The theatre is sold out for the first 17 weeks. Can you blame them for wanting to see Frank Shepard Jr., in Person!

You know something Frank, we're going to miss you awfully, or had you guessed. Everyone here wishes you the very, very best—and wants you to have a successful and most gratifying life all the rest of your days.

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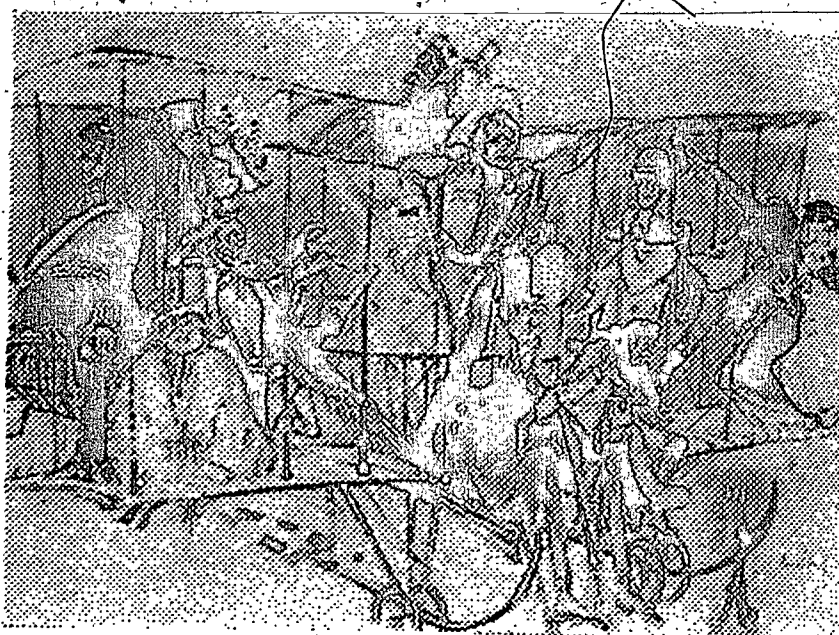
Special Show At Mill Run

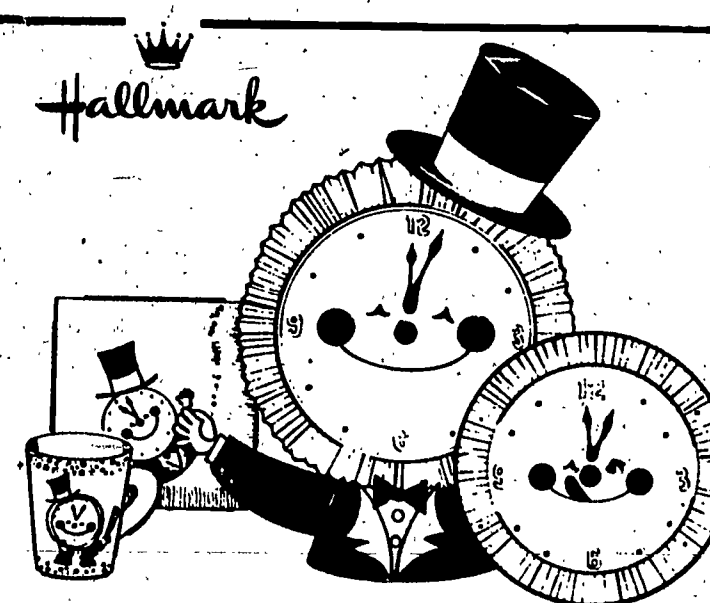

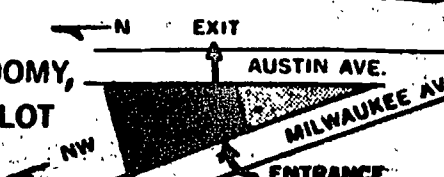
