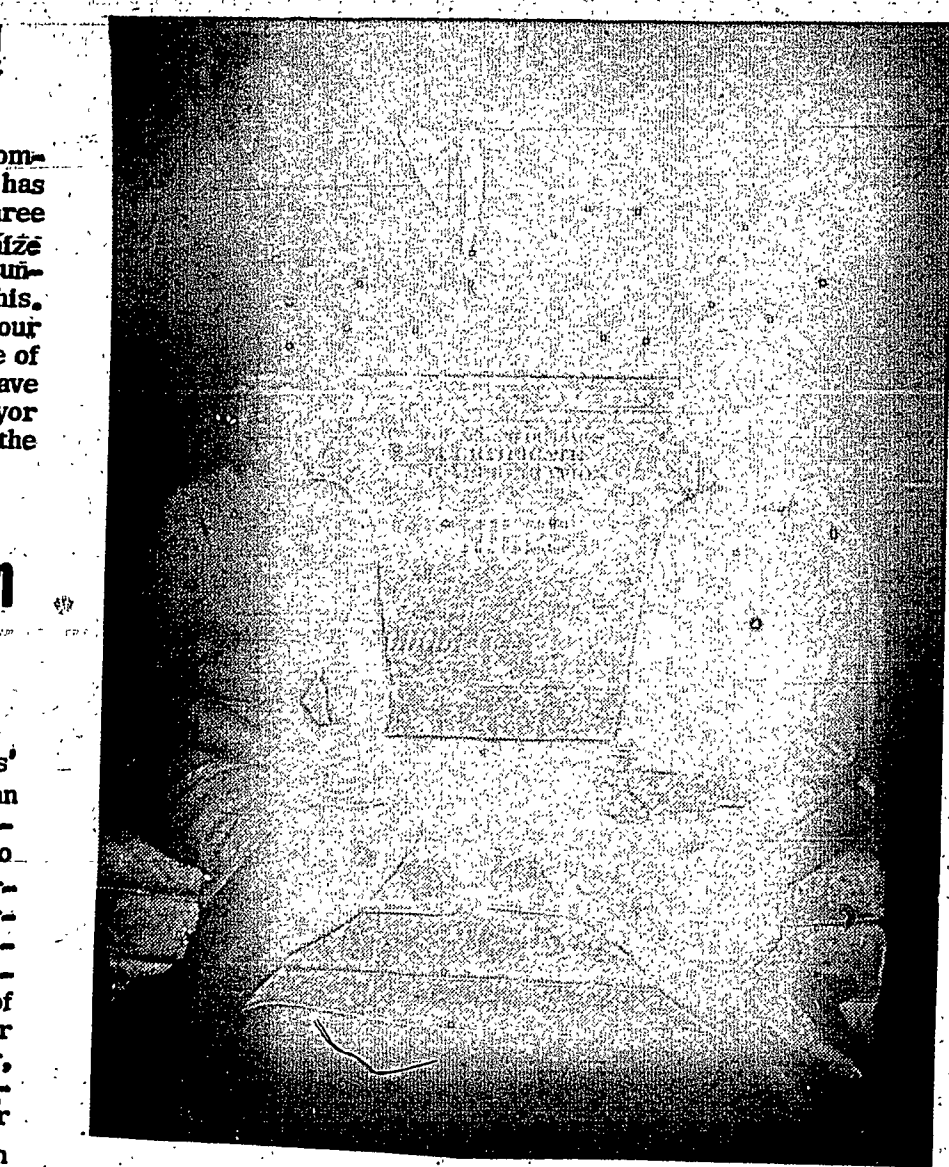
Troop 378 Indulges In 'Brownie Magic'

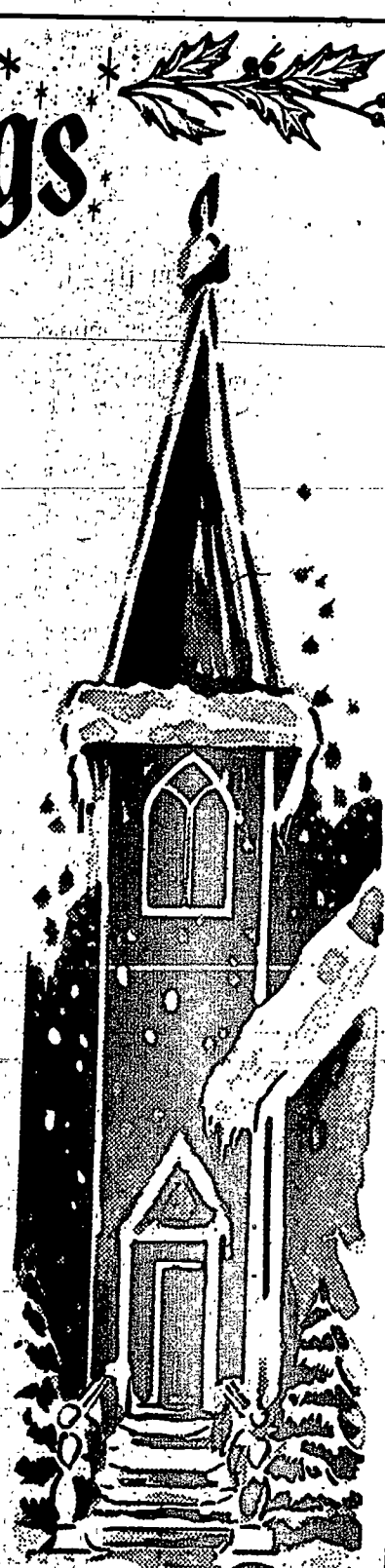

Frieda On Doctors

Dear Bud:

You seem to be troubled over the lack of doctors in an emergency.

"This is a dire problem in our community, which we have been writing about for years—and it's time something was done about it"—your words, aren't they?

The problem is so simple, it is inevitably overlooked. You see, what the public has sown, they now reap. The family doctor is out, the specialist is in. There is a specialist for the left tonsil, a specialist for the right tonsil; should the area in between swell or ache, the local doctor (or family doctor) who fails to respond to the "emergency" is a villain.

My deepest sympathy to anyone who really needs a doctor and cannot reach one. But hospitals are always available—we do not live in a desert. However, any doctor who refuses an emergency on his doorstep (which I cannot believe possible) is not worthy of his title—Physician and Surgeon. On the other side of the coin, any doctor allowing himself to be used purely for emergencies is not worthy of the dignity of a man. Legally, no doctor is obligated to care for anyone, unless he wishes to do so. Those who feel a moral obligation are often victimized (see "Another Morn"—Another Yawn") and the most deep-seated idealism cannot outlast some of the injustices heaped upon a person, while serving "humanity".

There is always one way to be fairly assured of good medical care. Have a family doctor who will care what happens to you, who will coordinate your ailments and be the first to send you to the specialist you need; he will also be there when the rest of you requires his care.

Naturally, I am the wife of a physician, one who is always accessible to his patients. My husband does have one specialty—not making calls for specialists.

At the Niles Village Board meeting, Tuesday evening, Mayor Blase wanted it made perfectly clear that there will be a future public meeting with reference to the voting over a Human Relation Commission. "It is not a dead issue, there will be another public hearing before a vote is taken by the board," said the Mayor. The last meeting was quite a spectacle and nothing was resolved.

Trustee Scheel wanted it read into the minutes that a testimonial dinner was being given by the village of Niles for Mrs. Edna Walger, who has been instrumental in almost all phases of the development of Niles. The dinner dance on January 27th will be given at the Bunker Hill at a cost of \$3.50 per person. Trustee Bruno advised that it would be fitting to make a contribution to Mrs. Walger for her civic efforts on behalf of Niles and Mayor Blase told him the plans had been only recently made for that exact proposal but without any sort of fanfare and now Trustee Bruno had let the cat out of the bag. Therefore since it had been brought into the open the motion was voted and passed.

A special vote of thanks was suggested by Trustee Scheel for the efforts of the Public Works Department of Niles for their snow removal on Christmas Day. "No other village had that kind of devotion to duty" and there should be an extra recompense voted in the new year for all the services of Niles who have helped make Niles the All American City, i.e., the Police, the Fire and the Public Works Departments.

Trustee Bruno said specifications were completed by Village Engineer Harold Olson for a scale for weighing trucks—that is overweighted trucks. The bids should be opened on the next meeting of the Village board, in January, 1966. This would be a 50 ton—four section motor scale and the company receiving the bid will train the policemen in its

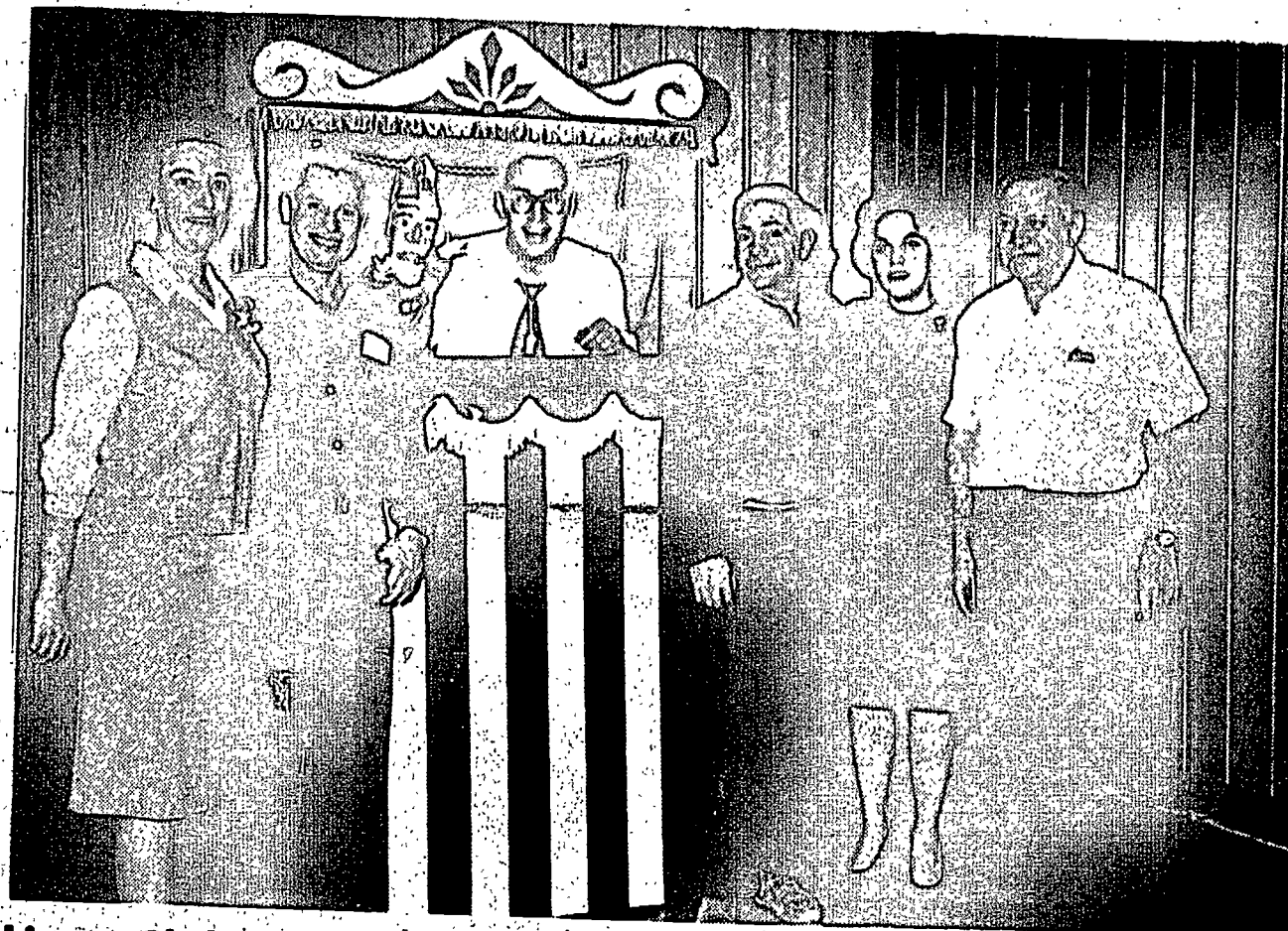

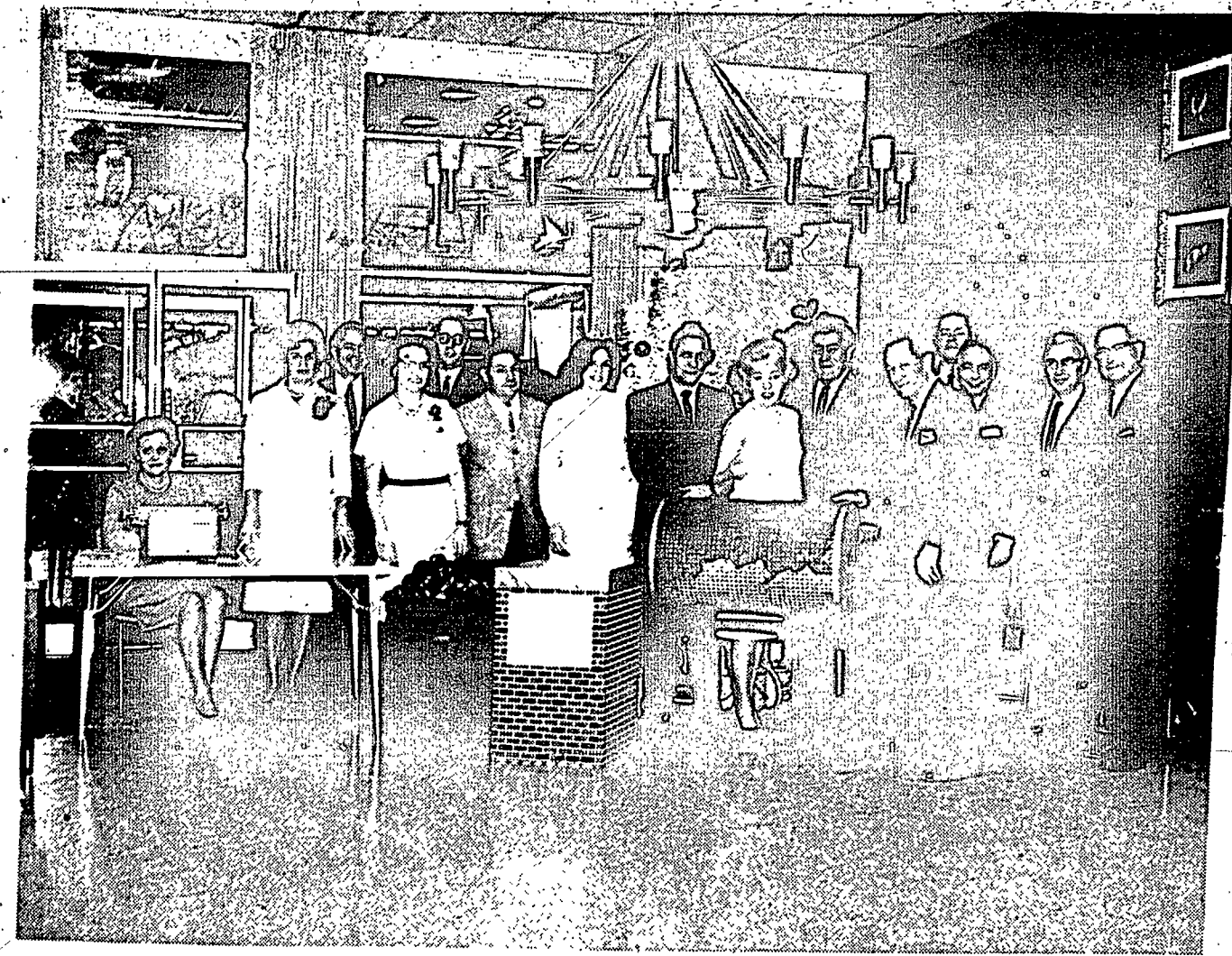

Nilehi Supt. Clyde Parker To Attend Conference

Nilehi Superintendent Dr. Clyde Parker will participate February 12 to 16 in the annual meeting of the American Association of School Administrators in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Attending the conference for professional school administrators with Dr. Parker will be Nilehi Board Members Dr. Francis Saunders and Ernest Iden, and Nilehi Business Manager Dr. Ted Hughes.

A past vice-president of the organization, Dr. Parker will be chairman of a closed circuit television panel show on "The Role of the Business Manager in the Instructional Program of the School System."

With Dr. Parker on the panel will be Charles Foster, executive secretary of the National Association of School Business Officials, and S.C. Joyner, director of Business Affairs for the Los Angeles City public schools.

The television shows are

held daily during non-meeting times and are carried to all hotel rooms in Atlantic City for the more than 25,000 members attending.

Dr. Parker, who was a member of the executive committee of the AASA for four years, will also serve as an official host during the conference.

Last year, Dr. Parker was chairman of the television presentation on "Keeping up with Curriculum." Three years ago he participated in the show on "A Close Look at the Airborne TV Experiment." He also was a participant in the panel on the "Rightful Role of the School Business Official in the Public Schools."

Dr. Parker, who has been a superintendent of schools for about 25 years, started his career in education as a teacher of history in the public school of Dugger, Indiana.

Illinois Bell Announces Rate Reductions

Illinois Bell customers will realize an estimated savings of \$49,000,000 in 1966, Jim Rex, local manager said, with the first step in the elimination of the federal excise tax on telephone service effective on January 1. It is the largest telephone bill reduction in the history of the company.

On January 1, the tax is cut from 10 per cent to 3 per cent. On January 1 of 1967 and 1968, further reductions of 1 per cent each will become effective and the tax will be eliminated in 1969. The full amount of each reduction is being passed on to customers as it becomes effective.

Rate reductions highlighted 1965 for Morton Grove telephone users, Rex said.

On June 19, a rate reduction introduced lowest, or "night rates" for station-to-station calls within Illinois all day Sunday and from 8 p.m. to 4:30 a.m., Monday through Saturday. Low "evening rates," previously in effect from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m., Monday through Saturday, were extended to apply all day Saturday.

"This Illinois Bell rate reduction program was supplemented by Bell System long distance rate reductions on out-of-state calling," Rex said.

"These rate reductions are made possible by the great strides forward in the field of telephone technology and continuing efforts to increase efficiency and cut costs. Research and development in Bell Laboratories and the contribution made by Western Electric, the manufacturing and supply arm of the Bell System, were significant in providing

these customer savings," Rex added.

Customers' eyesight was relieved of strain with the distribution of a more convenient easier-to-read telephone directory. A new local section was added to the front of the directory, ahead of the yellow pages. It was designed to make it easier for customers to find the numbers for nearby, local area calls. The usual regional white pages were relocated at the back of the directory, following the yellow pages. Both the local and the regional white pages were printed in larger type than had been used in previous telephone directories.

During the year, an average of 123,000 telephone calls were placed each weekday in this area.

"Emergency calls during 1965 proved again that help is as close as the nearest telephone," Mrs. Mildred Avery, chief operator said. "Operators handled over 4,000 emergency calls in this area throughout the year."

"Operators will always be right behind the dial, ready to help with calls even though most calls, including long distance, are being dialed by telephone customers themselves," Mrs. Avery said. During 1965, over 70 per cent of all long distance calls made from this area were dialed by customers, the chief operator said.

At the end of the year, there were about 33,800 phones in service, said Ed Sullivan, wire chief, who is responsible for the installation and maintenance of equipment. Approximately 2,000 new phones were added during the year, he said.

It was 5:30 and the doctor was home for dinner before returning to the office for evening hours, hospital calls, etc. He hadn't time to come to the table when the phone rang and the front doorbell chimed furiously. Both were for the same emergency. A man in the next block was having a heart attack. The doctor rushed out and was in the house on the next block within seconds.

Using all the necessary measures at his disposal for reviving the patient, guiding the oxygen administered by the ambulance attendants, standing by until the patient showed signs of survival, took the better part of an hour. The patient's daughter told a story of her father having been recently released from the hospital after three months of recuperating from the first heart attack.

"Did you call his attending physician?" asked the doctor drawn in for emergency care.

"Yes, but he's a heart specialist and doesn't make calls. He said to get a neighborhood doctor," she was not at all perturbed by the fact, only rather pompous, that her doctor was too important to worry about his patients once they left the hospital.

After calling the hospital where the patient had stayed previously arranging for the ambulance to bring him back to the hospital, the doctor started out the door.

"Aren't you riding to the hospital with my Dad?" asked the daughter angrily.

"Of course not, I've done all I could do," and he left the house, returning immediately to his office, any thoughts of dinner forgotten.

Two weeks later he received a letter from the Medical Society, enclosing a copy of a complaint they had received about his conduct, and requesting an explanation. The two complaints were: 1.—The doctor refused to ride to the hospital with my Dad and my Dad is now dead. Fortunately, he is still living today. 2.—The doctor refused to send me a bill of charges after the emergency in which he is obligated to help people.

After the doctor's wife and he were left, the following conversation took place: (only the first follows).

"We find Doctor—So & So—to have handled himself beyond reproach; to have given the patient care above and beyond the call of duty and suggest you pay his bill, to which he is definitely entitled."

The fee submitted by this "money-hungry" doctor?—\$8.

2.—The office was full of patients and one emergency was brought in before any other. The patient could be taken. The office bell rang and rang and two hysterical people stood banging on the door, unable to talk, except "Come quickly, come quickly!"

"I must finish this patient, then I will come," said the doctor and when he had done so, he went to his car and the two were waiting to show him to the emergency.

He was directed to a house, two blocks away from his office and the crowd of neighbors gathered to let him through.

When this chest X-ray is obtained, a special card will be given to the individual. This card must be on the premises at all times when the employee is working at his establishment.

The Health Board further stated that this is a village ordinance and failure to comply will subject the persons involved to penalties.

For those considering employment as a food handler or those who are just to begin in a job involving food and who do not yet have a chest X-ray, the Board advises that the Tuberculosis Clinic of Suburban Cook County at 1999 Dempster in Park Ridge will perform this TB service without charge. The hours of the X-raying unit at that location are 12 noon to 8 p.m., on Mondays and Fridays; and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

A food handler is defined as anyone engaged in the handling of any kind of food or beverage such as waitresses in restaurants or snack shops, cashiers and clerks in groceries and delicatessens and any other persons who are engaged in the handling of food or beverages such as bakers, cocktail lounges, drive-ins, etc.

Lutheran General Puts Ninth Floor In Service

The new ninth floor at Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, has been designed with the patient in mind. With the opening of the new 23-bed intensive care unit and the 46 medical-surgical beds, Lutheran General will have open 393 beds of the planned 587 total.

A 23-bed intensive care unit is located at the east end of the floor. The west end of the floor has four private rooms. In between, there are 21 semi-private rooms.

The basic double corridor plan of Lutheran General has been retained. Each room continues to be independently air conditioned and ventilated. A newly designed air register filters and sanitizes the air as it circulates through the room with the air completely changed six times each hour.

Improved ceiling lights are another feature. The multiple-purpose light provides individual reading lights, examining lights, television viewing lights and a night light.

A new style of electrically operated beds provides easier operation for the patient and the nurse. The bed can be raised and lowered into five different positions.

Improved nursing station increases efficiency for the nursing staff. A new type of call system provides improved communication between the pa-

tient in his room and the nurse at the station.

For patients who like to view television in the hospital, miniature television sets can be installed at the corner of the bed to allow the patient closeup viewing. The patient can change the volume, channel and adjust the set. A disposable earphone provides privacy for the patient.

"The excellent design of the original Lutheran General has been shown by our retaining the basic plan," said T. L. Jacobsen, executive director. "What we have done, is to improve an already good design."

Patients on the south side of the building have an added advantage. On a clear day they can see the Chicago Loop skyline.

Rooms are painted in cheerful pastel colors. A visiting lobby is provided adjacent to the elevators. Two additional elevators are now in service to provide improved service for patients and visitors.

The ninth floor is one of three new floors being opened up at Lutheran General. The tenth floor is now being used for employee eating facilities. The eighth floor, a psychiatric floor, will be opened next.

The seven story wing being built on the west side is scheduled to open in mid-1966. Total cost of the expansion is \$6,200,000.

Clerk-Carrier Positions Available

Postmaster, Harry H. Semrow, announced today, that beginning January 4, 1966 and continuing until further notice applications will be accepted for the next written test for clerk or carrier positions with the Chicago Post Office. There is no maximum age limit for these positions, but there is a minimum age limit of 18, however the minimum age requirement is waived for high school graduates. They may be appointed when they reach their 16th birthday provided local child labor laws permit.

These applicants will be scheduled for examination, and may be considered for appointment ahead of those, who file later.

A non-committal attitude by parents is not sufficient action for children not to fear people of other cultures.

LWV Sponsors 'Water Use' Program

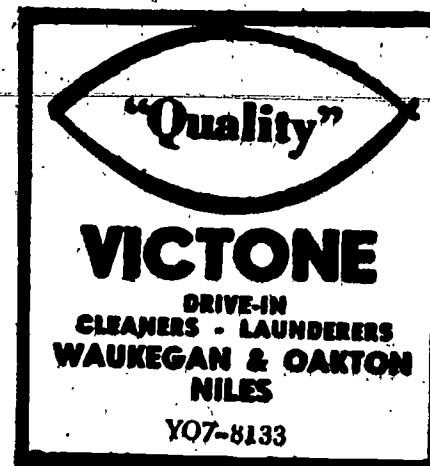

The Board meetings are held at 7:30 P.M. in the East Maine Junior High School Music Room, Greenwood and Ballard Roads, Niles.

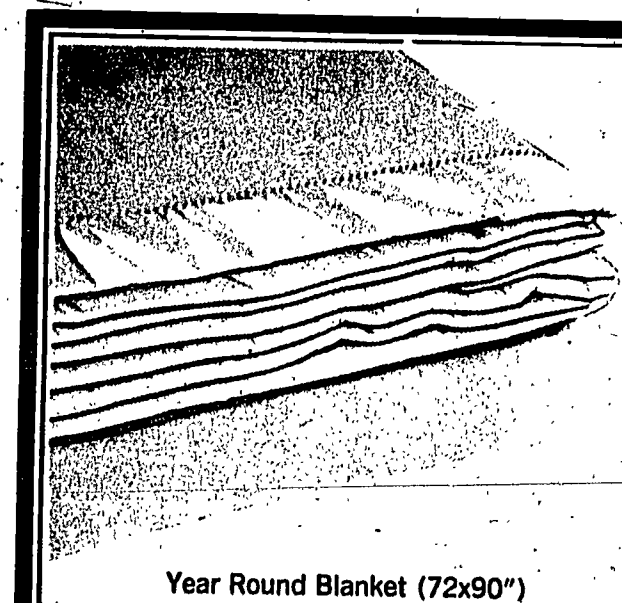

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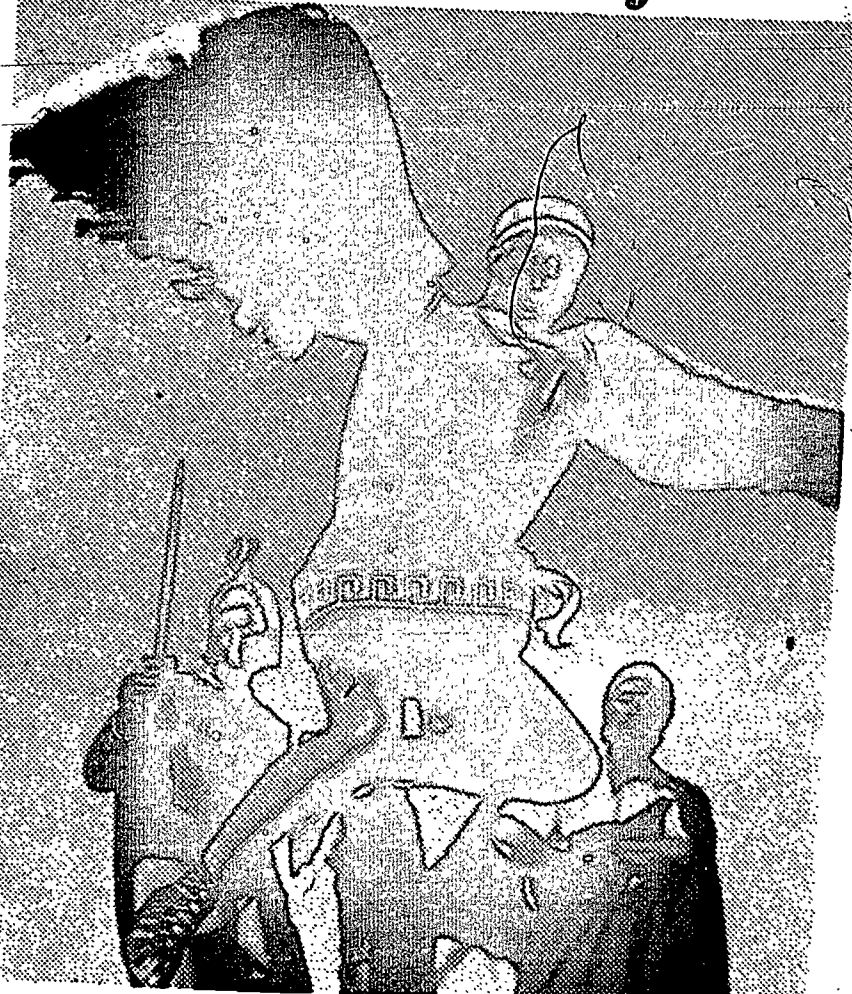

OK Another District 63 School Site

The Board of East Maine School District No. 63 during the December 8 meeting moved to approve purchase of school site fronting on the north side of Ballard Road, just west of Woodview Avenue. The eventual school will be built on a tract of slightly less than 5 acres. Stated price for the site purchase was \$171,000.

The Board also approved the dismissal of condemnation proceedings on an irregular "L" shaped site just north of the approved-purchase site. A portion of the site purchased was an original part of the land affected by condemnation suit.

Purchase of the Ballard Road site was necessitated by the increased density of population in this section of the East Maine incorporated area the Board stated.

In other action, the Board authorized architect Orput-Orput and Associates, Inc., of Rockford, Illinois, to advertise for bids for the new Shelley Nathanson School following the Board's approval of the design and specifications for the building. The bids will be opened at public meeting January 5, 1966 in the Ballard School gymnasium at 8 P.M. Completion date planned for the school is August 15, 1966.

The Board authorized the administration to purchase new library shelving, library equipment, and new pianos for several school buildings. Dr. G. William Bullock, Jr., noted that this is a further step in

the administration's program to develop libraries in all District #63 schools.

use and there will have to be 24 hour coverage for the site and use of the scale.

"Why do we have to build a scale to weigh in trucks that will come from all other parts of the city. Are we trying to do what other villages won't do," said Trustee Scheel.

"We do not follow, we lead," said the Mayor. "Other villages follow our example—we were the first to come up with the utility tax, now Evanston has one and Skokie is planning one. The truck traffic is extremely heavy on our streets and they will damage our highways; if they are weighed in and found overweighted, then they will be less of a detriment on our streets. The fines coming in from these trucks are not our first consideration, it's the maintenance and care of our streets. And the MFT can be used for all the streets of Niles, not just a few that are overused. We are allowed \$10,000 per year for maintenance of our highways."

....The codifying book has just been received—a looseleaf note book (hard cover) with all the village ordinances in it and room for every new one the future will bring. A project the governing board of Niles has been working on for the last five years—another first—and many other villages are planning to follow this example too.

It has been many years, but no word of thanks has yet reached the doctor from any of the family. Oh yes, not able to forget the tragedy or the suffering of the parents, the doctor could never bring himself to send a bill for his services.
