Health Board Advises Dog Owners



continued from page 1 among clergymen of the same denomination. Lusk said the spirit of unity and good will of working together was supported unanimously by the clergy. He said the group passed two resolutions, not to allow the group to be divided by the problem and for the high school to hold an inter-faith ecumenical baccalaureate service.

Resident John W. Hand said the prayer ban of the Supreme Court has nothing to do with the invocation by clergymen. He noted the U. S. House and Senate start their sessions with prayers citing this as an example of the feeling of the

Carl Tagges, Morton Grove American Legion, noted letters from three local Legion posts representing 1500 families favored the prayer.

Rosalie Kirschner, Emma Lazarus Chapter, Skokie, said in America people have the right to choose when and where they should pray. She stated, "It is a sorry thing if one night's prayer would determine the making of good human be-ings". She said the prayer ban in schools is the law of the land and what we are witnessing is a "power struggle".

Father Arthur Sauer, St. Peter Catholic Church, Skokie, said the issue concerned more than just Skokie, that it concerned the entire Niles Township. He said the issue was raised by Jews, who are a minority group and that the ban is not keeping faith with the majority. He said the issue concerns the entire school district. He emphasized that legally you can't prove anything.

Father Sauer said "you can't ban God from our lives". He said the Jewish people caused this issue....and that it was stupid to have started the issue. He said "this is a ghetto idea....from Europe". He then suggested there should be two prayers.....and that everyone should be tolerant.

Board president Mau said Niles Township is a "pluralistic society" and he supported the prayer ban because "pluralism requires respect for the individual".

Board member Littrell and former president made the motion to rescind the previous ban, after speaking of the need for stability in the community, and that it would be presumptuous to interpret law.

Board member Osborne, who favored the silent devotion, seconded the motion. Board member Bloch called the roll call, casting the seventh and deciding vote against rescinding the original prayer ban.

After the meeting small clusters of people formed several groups in the auditorium lobby. While the anger was contained the discussions were intent.

Clarification By Father Sauer

In clarification of the statement that I made before the Niles Township High School Board meeting on March 28th. regarding the prayer ban at graduations, I want to set the

First, I did not mean to assess blame upon the "total Jewish community" for precipitating the matter. On the contrary, I think a small organized minority of Jews plus a few others pressed the matter. In the same way, a small minority of non-Jews and Christians responded vigorously. Obviously, too, the Board decision was made by a predominantly non-Jewish Board. All people of various religious backgrounds and outlooks have a right to ask the Board to assume a position against or for prayer at graduations. I recognize that the Board has a right to make a decision it believes to be best. This right never questioned on Monday

Controversy and division, which we all regret, seem inevitable in such matters, but we should strive to keep them to a minimum. You may say then why did I make the statement that I did. Well, I honestly believe it is necessary at this juncture to really pinpoint the real reasons for stress and tension. If it smoulders, as it has been, greater evil can come about. Now that it is in the open, it is my hope that we will come to understand one another better....and get along better, if everyone is honest in these matters. In that spirit I make this effort

I regret that some people have tried to use my words to further battle and have tried to use my words to suit their own purposes. I am the same Father Sauer today as in the past. I have love and good will for all people; but I am also interested in truth.

I believe that both Christians and Jews should re-evaluate our local American life and lay down the hatchet in word and deed, and realize that all... i.e., both sides, must convince themselves that consideration and respect for the religious feelings of one another is in order. This they must do in the good old American way of respecting the other fellow in word and in feeling.

This statement is to appear in all the local papers and is an effort on my part to clarify this issue and, hopefully, to lead to absolute frankness in an area of difference in the Jewish-Christian relationship

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

High School \$\$\$ Crises: Wiltse

The high schools in Maine Township face a crisis. This is the conclusion that Dr. Earle W. Wiltse left with the Des Plaines Lions Club, Thursday, March 17, where he was guest speaker. "We need more facilities for a growing high school enrollment that will reach 12,000 by 1970--just four years from now--and for more teachers for this coming population. Both of these will cost money," Wiltse said.

The speaker showed a table based on reliable studies that predicts the annual high school enrollments through the 1974-75 year, at which time there will be 13,500 pupils in high school. "This means we should begin at once to plan new facilities--either by expanding the ing a fourth high school, or both," Wiltse said. While the predictions are based on present elementary school enrollments and demographic studies of population trends there are many variables which are difficult to assess. Among them, Wiltse cited the increasing number of private school pupils that are attending the public high schools, the effect of high rise apartment construction, and the recent drop in the birth rate. A Lions Club member recalled that it was only five years ago that population studies indicates a high school enrollment of 9,000 by 1970. This figure will be next eptember, four years early,

The speaker told the club that two years ago, upon advice of a Citizens Committee, the

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Board of Education requested, and the voters approved, a 15¢ increase in the Education tax rate, With the opening of Maine South this increase is used up. Additional money is needed to pay for more teachers and to keep salaries competitive with neighboring school sys-

Of the two pressing needs, bonds for buldings and a hike in the tax rate for teachers, Dr. Wiltse said, "Money for teachers is the most important, Educational quality is directly related to good teaching. At the March meeting the Board of Education voted to submit a 12¢ tax referendum to the voters with the April 9 School Board

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Martin Ashman Candidate For School District 63

A careful guarding of the public's money and a need for a fiscal watchdog on the Board of Education was cited by Martin C. Ashman, 34, of 7932 W. Churchill Street, Morton Grove, independent candidate for a vacancy on the School Board of school district #63, at a coffee meeting Saturday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Zuckerman, 7903 Palma Lane, Morton

Ashman has been campaigning at various Meet the Candidate nights and coffee hours on a platform stressing fiscal mat-

Ashman charged the board with wasting \$15,000 in a recent land acquistion at Ballard Road west of Woodview Lane in the unincorporated area. "The board waited 10 months before filing a condemnation suit for the land thus allowing the builder to pour afoundation for which the district was obliged to pay \$15,000" said Ashman, He proposed that the Board prevent such waste by constantly reviewing its resolutions to see if the administration has been implementing them. He also called for tightening up purchasing procedures and instituting of competitive bidding on many items not presently covered.

Ashman proposed that more than one insurance broker make presentations to the board with regard to insurance, Ashman said, "For the last 6 years only one insurance broker has been given the opportunity of selling insurance to the District. We will never know if his prices are right if we don't compare."

On nonfiscal matters Ashman complimented the Board for re-

and the teacher in service program but questioned the ability of the District to maintain continuity becasue of the loss of two school superintendents in two years, Ashman asked, "How many top notch educational administrators will make themselves available for a job which recent history shows is subject to board tensions and dismissal or resignation after a short period of time?"
