

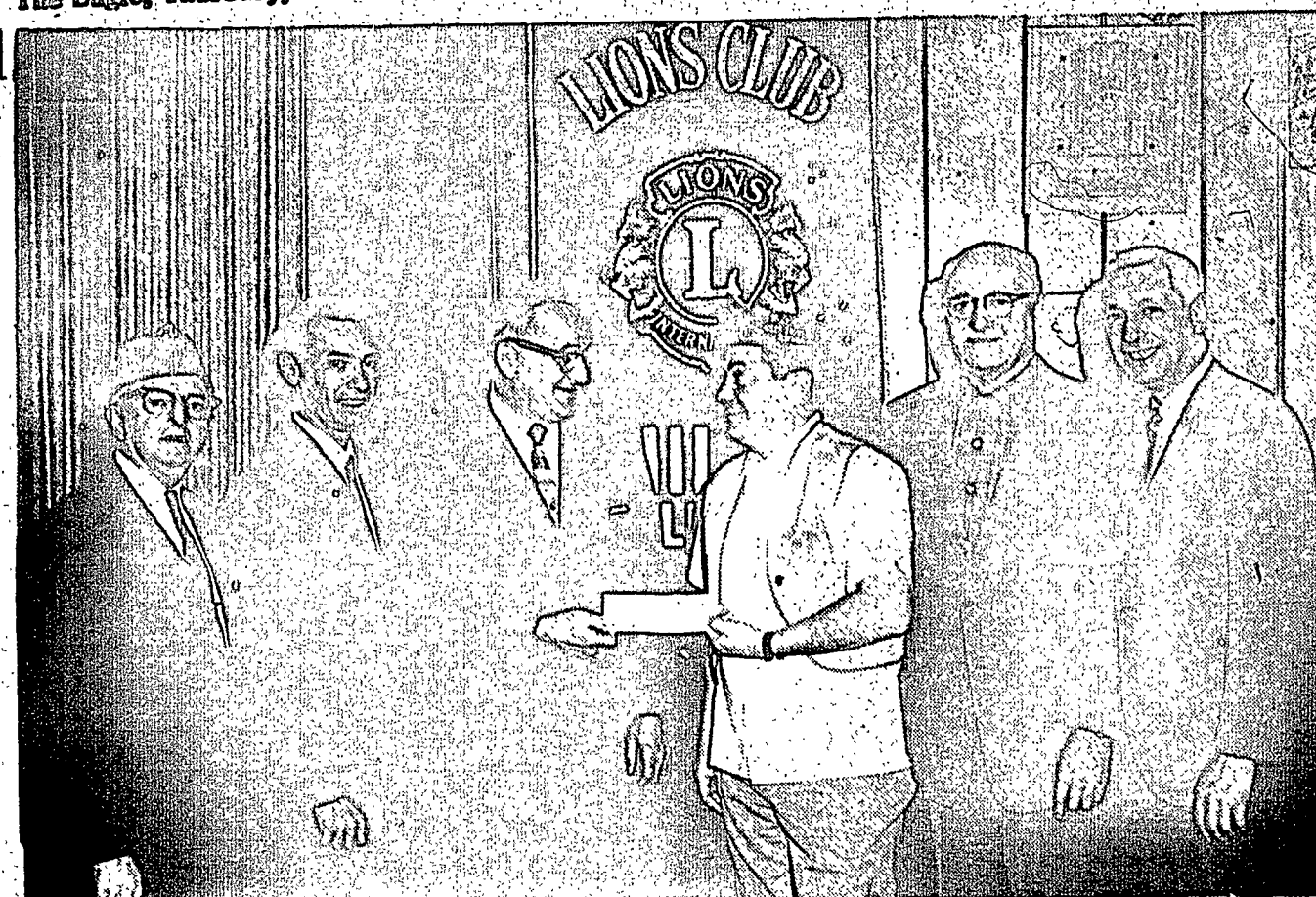
## Health Board Advises Dog Owners

among clergymen of the same denomination. Lusk said the spirit of unity and good will of working together was supported unanimously by the clergy. He said the group passed two resolutions, not to allow the group to be divided by the problem and for the high school to hold an inter-faith ecumenical baccalaureate service.

Resident John W. Hand said the prayer ban of the Supreme Court has nothing to do with the invocation by clergymen. He noted the U. S. House and Senate start their sessions with prayers citing this as an example of the feeling of the country.

Carl Tagges, Morton Grove American Legion, noted letters from three local Legion posts representing 1500 families favored the prayer.

Rosalie Kirschner, Emma Lazarus Chapter, Skokie, said in America people have the right to choose when and where they should pray. She stated, "It is a sorry thing if one night's prayer would determine the making of good human beings". She said the prayer ban in schools is the law of the land and what we are witnessing is a "power struggle".

Father Arthur Sauer, St. Peter Catholic Church, Skokie, said the issue concerned more than just Skokie, that it concerned the entire Niles Township. He said the issue was raised by Jews, who are a minority group and that the ban is not keeping faith with the majority. He said the issue concerns the entire school district. He emphasized that legally you can't prove anything.

Father Sauer said "you can't ban God from our lives". He said the Jewish people caused this issue, and that it was stupid to have started the issue. He said "this is a ghetto idea...from Europe". He then suggested there should be two prayers, and that everyone should be tolerant.

Board president Mau said Niles Township is a "pluralistic society" and he supported the prayer ban because "pluralism requires respect for the individual".

Board member Littrell and former president made the motion to rescind the previous ban, after speaking of the need for stability in the community, and that it would be presumptuous to interpret law.

Board member Osborne, who favored the silent devotion, seconded the motion. Board member Bloch called the roll call, casting the seventh and deciding vote against rescinding the original prayer ban.

After the meeting small clusters of people formed several groups in the auditorium lobby. While the anger was contained the discussions were intent.

## A Clarification By Father Sauer

In clarification of the statement that I made before the Niles Township High School Board meeting on March 28th, regarding the prayer ban at graduations, I want to set the record straight.

First, I did not mean to assess blame upon the "total Jewish community" for precipitating the matter. On the contrary, I think a small organized minority of Jews plus a few others pressed the matter. In the same way, a small minority of non-Jews and Christians responded vigorously. Obviously, too, the Board decision was made by a predominantly non-Jewish Board. All people of various religious backgrounds and outlooks have a right to ask the Board to assume a position against or for prayer at graduations. I recognize that the Board has a right to make a decision it believes to be best. This right I never questioned on Monday night.

Controversy and division, which we all regret, seem inevitable in such matters, but we should strive to keep them to a minimum. You may say then why did I make the statement that I did. Well, I honestly believe it is necessary at this juncture to really pinpoint the real reasons for stress and tension. If it smolders, as it has been, greater evil can come about. Now that it is in the open, it is my hope that we will come to understand one another better...and get along better, if everyone is honest in these matters. In that spirit I make this effort at clarification.

I regret that some people have tried to use my words to further battle and have tried to use my words to suit their own purposes. I am the same Father Sauer today as in the past. I have love and good will for all people; but I am also interested in truth.

I believe that both Christians and Jews should re-evaluate our local American life and lay down the hatchet in word and deed, and realize that all...i.e., both sides, must convince themselves that consideration and respect for the religious feelings of one another is in order. This they must do in the good old American way of respecting the other fellow in word and in feeling.

This statement is to appear in all the local papers and is an effort on my part to clarify this issue and, hopefully, to lead to absolute frankness in an area of difference in the Jewish-Christian relationship in the future.

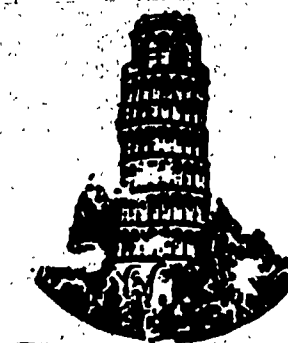

## Blase States Goals For Unincorporated Area

Nick Blase says he can help the unincorporated area of Maine Township. He made this statement at a recent gathering of the residents of this area, as part of his campaign to be elected as Democratic Committeeman of Maine Township.

"The many problems of the unincorporated area can be traced to one big factor—the people have no local government. They have no one to go with their problems except the County and the State, and it is no secret that big governmental bodies such as these are sometimes slow and impersonal. In order to get things done the people of the unincorporated area need a strong representative... a Democratic Committeeman who knows their problems and makes a sincere effort to get them solved... a man who will fight the impersonal machinery of big government to get the job done."

Nick Blase went on to say that he feels that he can do it. He spoke of the leadership needed for the Committeeman's job, and of the interest he would take in the problems of the unincorporated area. "Let's look at these problems," he said. "Has anyone tried to do something about the high water rates? Has anyone done anything about the spotty building inspection that has caused large scale building code violations? The answer is NO. The leadership hasn't been there to even attempt to solve these problems."

Then Nick Blase discussed the biggest problem of all in the unincorporated area... the problem of zoning.

"Without local government to pass good zoning ordinances, this area has been saturated with residential developments. Without a balance of industry

## High School \$\$\$ Crises: Wiltse

The high schools in Maine Township face a crisis. This is the conclusion that Dr. Earle W. Wiltse left with the Des Plaines Lions Club, Thursday, March 17, where he was guest speaker. "We need more facilities for a growing high school enrollment that will reach 12,000 by 1970—just four years from now—and for more teachers for this coming population. Both of these will cost money," Wiltse said.

The speaker showed a table based on reliable studies that predicts the annual high school enrollments through the 1974-75 year, at which time there will be 13,500 pupils in high school. "This means we should begin at once to plan new facilities—either by expanding the three existing schools, or building a fourth high school, or both," Wiltse said. While the predictions are based on present elementary school enrollments and demographic studies of population trends, there are many variables which are difficult to assess. Among them, Wiltse cited the increasing number of private school pupils that are attending the public high schools, the effect of high rise apartment construction, and the recent drop in the birth rate. A Lions Club member recalled that it was only five years ago that population studies indicated a high school enrollment of 9,000 by 1970. This figure will be next September, four years early.

The speaker told the club that two years ago, upon advice of a Citizens Committee, the

Board of Education requested, and the voters approved, a 15¢ increase in the Education tax rate. With the opening of Maine South this increase is used up. Additional money is needed to pay for more teachers and to keep salaries competitive with neighboring school systems.

## Edison Company Offers Free Wiring

The improved facilities will boost the horsepower to more than six times that of the old-fashioned two-wire service, Boyd said.

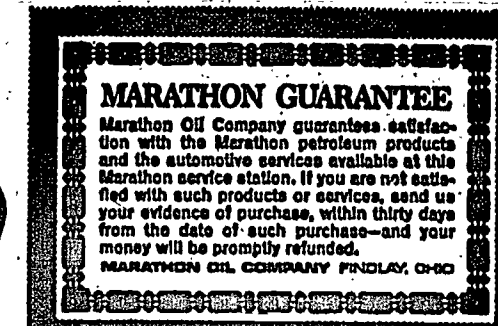

## Martin Ashman Candidate For School District 63

A careful guarding of the public's money and a need for a fiscal watchdog on the Board of Education was cited by Martin C. Ashman, 34, of 7932 W. Churchill Street, Morton Grove, independent candidate for a vacancy on the School Board of school district #63, at a coffee meeting Saturday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Zuckerman, 7903 Palma Lane, Morton Grove.

Ashman has been campaigning at various Meet the Candidate nights and coffee hours on a platform stressing fiscal matters.

Ashman charged the board with wasting \$15,000 in a recent land acquisition at Ballard Road west of Woodview Lane in the unincorporated area. "The board waited 10 months before filing a condemnation suit for the land thus allowing the builder to pour a foundation for which the district was obliged to pay \$15,000," said Ashman. He proposed that the board prevent such waste by constantly reviewing its resolutions to see if the administration has been implementing them. He also called for tightening up purchasing procedures and instituting of competitive bidding on many items not presently covered.

Ashman proposed that more than one insurance broker make presentations to the board with regard to insurance. Ashman said, "For the last 6 years only one insurance broker has been given the opportunity of selling insurance to the District. We will never know if his prices are right if we don't compare."

On non fiscal matters Ashman complimented the Board for recent

upgrading of curriculum and the teacher in service program but questioned the ability of the District to maintain continuity because of the loss of two school superintendents in two years. Ashman asked, "How many topnotch educational administrators will make themselves available for a job which recent history shows is subject to board tensions and dismissal or resignation after a short period of time?"

Recruitment of more experienced teachers and teachers with advanced degrees is another plank in his platform. "Our district has the lowest percentage of teachers with advanced degrees than any north suburban district from Des Plaines to Lake Michigan."

Ashman also asked for continuous exploration and experimentation with a bag lunch program. "So long as it does not drain money from educational purposes," and proposes to watch the team teaching experiment in the Nathanson School closely as to its effectiveness.

Ashman and his wife Betty, a former Evanston school teacher, have two children, Deborah, 7, and Kenneth, 5. He is a partner in the law firm of Ashman and Jaffe, 134 N. La Salle Street, Chicago, Illinois. He graduated from DePaul University Law School in 1953, licensed to practice law that year, was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States in 1959. He is a member of 4 bar associations, various professional organizations, the Bnai Brith and Open Hearts for Retarded Children.

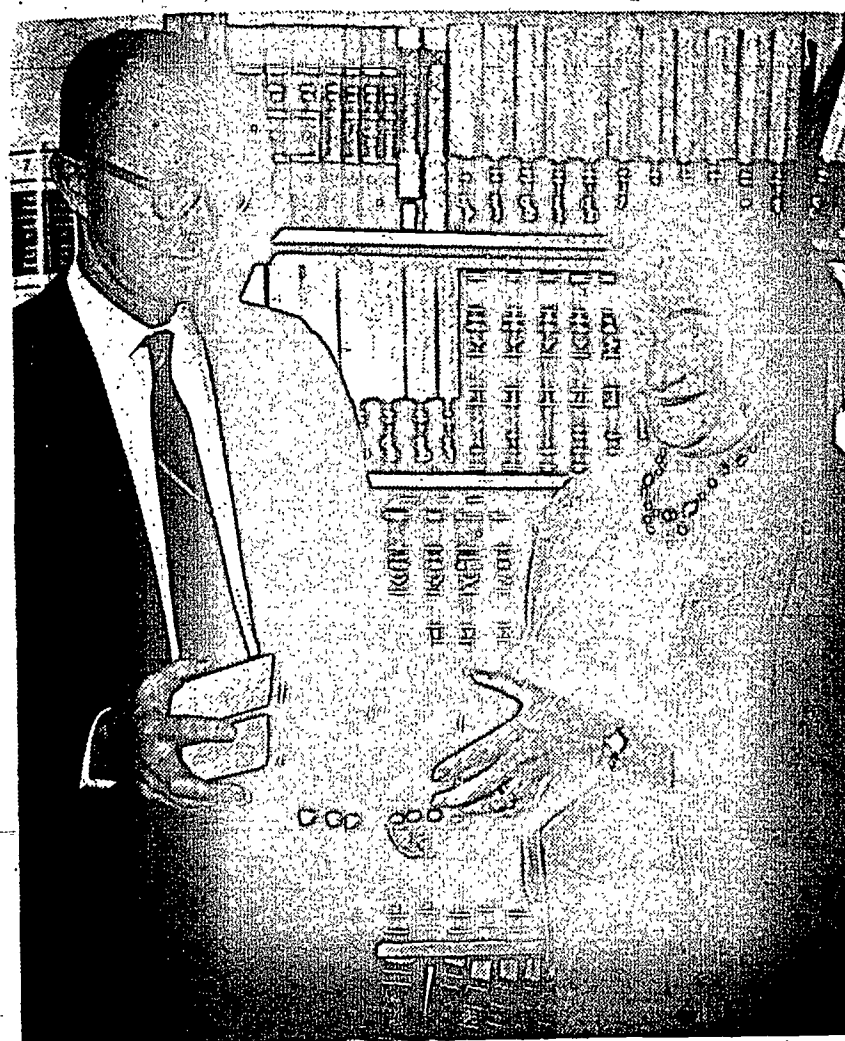

## LWV Lists Factors Contributing To Juvenile Delinquency

What are some of the factors contributing to the rise of juvenile delinquency? This question was posed by the Welfare Committee of the Morton Grove League of Women Voters as it studies this vast problem from three angles: as a worldwide phenomenon; through the Illinois Youth Commission; through interviewing the Youth Officers of Morton Grove and Niles.

The Welfare Committee of the LWV, headed by Mrs. James Plonke, has found several factors contributing to juvenile delinquency. They are:

1. The importance of the "Father image" to the average male adolescent (they greatly outnumber the female). One authority stated that the lack of a strong father image is central to delinquency and that most delinquents had unsatisfactory father relationships.
2. The effect of idleness and boredom (particularly on males age 14 through 17), and

importance of Constructive work to help the boy feel more of a "man".

3. Violence—the increasing emphasis of violence and brutality on TV, movies and comic strips, and its reflection in actions on our children should be the concern of every thinking adult.

4. Tolerance toward children and their deviant actions—and the harm of too punitive an attitude at the wrong time.

5. The importance of the example of the parents.

6. The harmful effects of the delinquency label to a child who has lost his way.

7. Effect of shifting population on family solidarity.

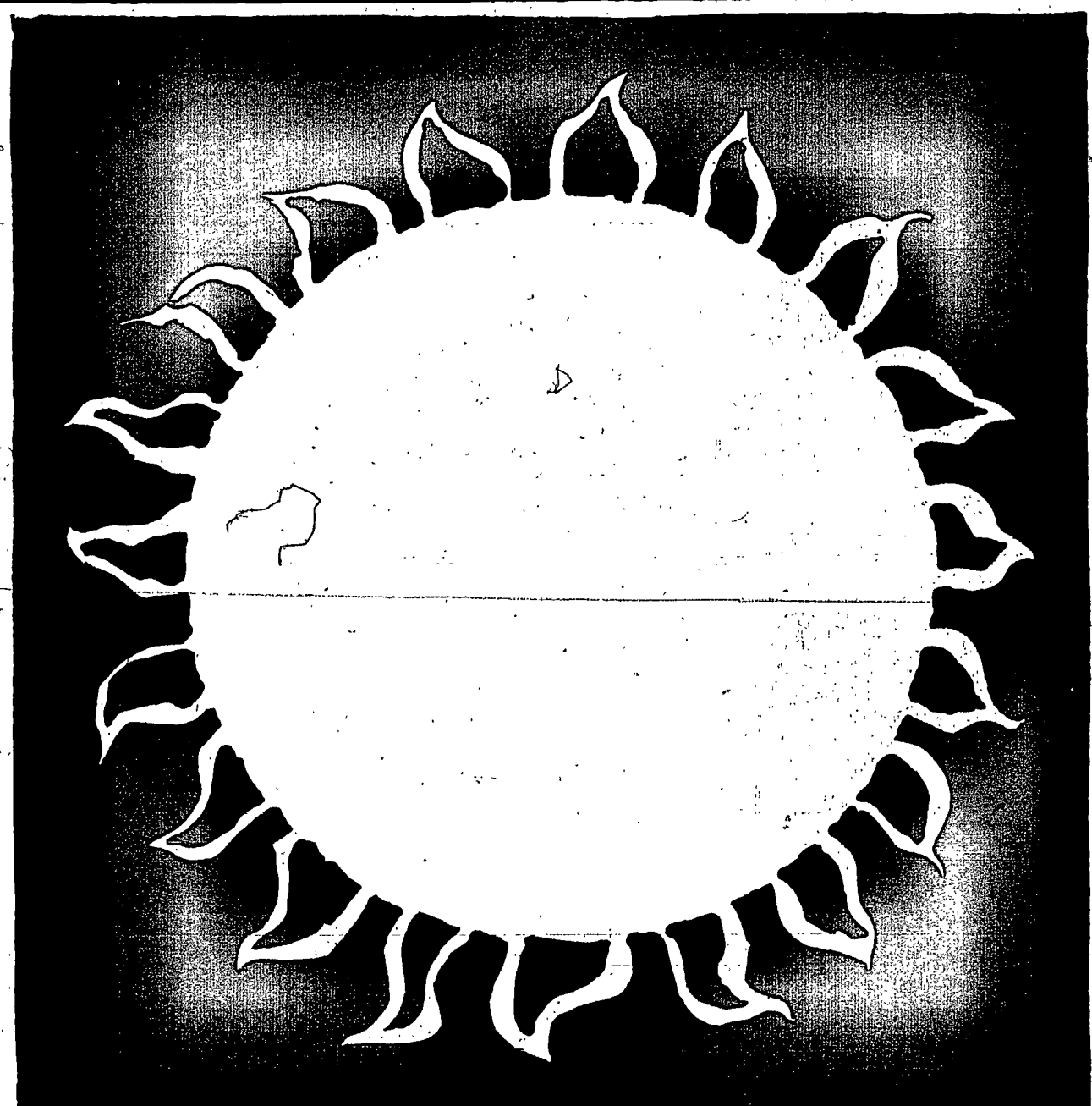
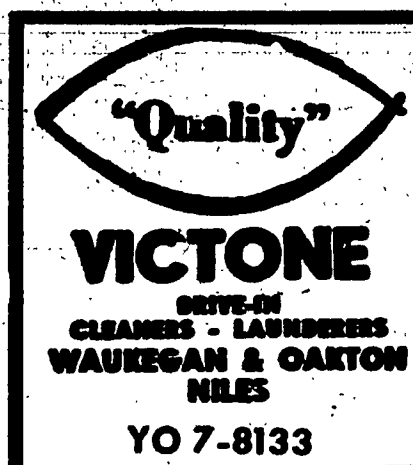

## School District 67 Increases Teacher's Salaries

William Stout, district superintendent, announced the change following the vote at the last board meeting.

**Dist. 63 Board Extends Lunch Program, OKs Bond Purchase**

Members of the school board of District 63, at their meeting last Tuesday night, took action on items ranging from formal approval of the letter of withdrawal from the superintendent by Acting Supt. Dr. William Bullock to extending the trial sack lunch program in the district. They even opened the restrictions a little on that program.

While extending the lunch program for another 60 days or,

until the end of the current school year, board members approved a motion to allow the children of working mothers to eat their lunch in school. If the mothers were employed prior to the launching of the original 60-day trial lunch program.

Board members also approved a new salary schedule for secretaries, raising the beginning yearly salary by \$40 per month with yearly increases of \$12.50 per month; awarded a contract (not to exceed \$44,000) to the Franklin-Lee company of Chicago for furnishings for Shelley Nathanson school; approved contracting with W & W Co. to level and remove six vacant buildings now standing on the district's school site at Ballard and Woodview (cost \$3500); authorized the Knights Stevenson Co. to conduct a survey of the roofs on all school buildings to include information on present condition of roofs and recommendations for repair with a budget estimate, and awarded the purchase of building bonds totaling \$220,000 to low bidder Shearson, Ham-mill & Co. of Chicago.

The \$220,000 in building bonds is to cover cost of building and equipping the addition to Melzer school at an estimated cost of \$80,000 and completion of the Shelley Nathanson school at an estimated cost of \$140,000. The bond sale was authorized by a majority of the district voters during the Dec. 12, 1964 referendum.
