From The Left Hand

This is somewhat of a week for surprises. On the village level Rich Hartzak's candidacy for trustee caught us with our typewriter ribbon astray. But a greater surprise was the announcement Maine High School Board's decision to go for the whole ball of wax in seeking \$15,000,000 in a referendum March 11.

Back in November plans were being made to seek about \$7,000,000 for additions to the present high schools. While the land for the future Maine-North was under contract, plans for its building were earmarked for 1971.

The plans for the three additions to the present schools allowed for Maine South and Maine West to hold the line at 3,000 to 3,500 students for the future. But in Maine East, the addition would be used for 4,500 students. While temporary interested persons in the East Maine area school district (63) were concerned with the building now of the new high school.

Last Thursday night board members from the district 63 school board urged the Hi School Board to include the additions and the new school in one referendum. Without spelling it out the implication was clear they feared voters would not OK the additions for \$7,000,000 this year and then come back next year and approve another \$8,000,000 for the new school.

The District 63 board members are a very dynamic group, daring as well as imaginative in their tackling problems. While they urged the Maine High Board to think big they're doing the same at the elementary level. On the same March 11 the high school board is pursuing their bond issue district 63 also is asking voter approval of \$5,000,000. They point out rather than go to the voters every year as they've done in the past they would use what they claim is a more economical approach in financing schools by seeking voter approval and then using the

\$15,000,000 MAINE HI REFERENDUM

Hartzak To Run With Marcheschi, Berkowsky For New School & 3 Additions

Richard Hartzak, 8437 Oketo, owner of Hartzak's Sausage Shop, is a surprise third candidate joining hands with incumbents Berkowsky and Marcheschi on a village trustee ticket for the April election.

Two-time trustee Sam Bruno, who was the announced third candidate last week (by Marcheschi) will not seek a third term. Increased business responsibilities is among the reasons for his decision.

Former trustee Len Szymanski, presently a member of school board 71, is also expected to seek election. Present Park Commissioner Jack Leske is undecided whether to seek re-election to the park board or join with Szymanski in the formation of a second village slate.

Szymanski, along with present trustees Scheel and Wentz, had led the way for the New Era victory in 1961. Together they carried every precinct, carrying unknown Nick Blase into the Mayor's chair.

When the opening on the incumbent ticket was known Szy-

manski was considered for the third opening. However, Hartzak, a personal friend of Marcheschi and Blase, was chosen.

Hartzak, along with Blase, is a director of the Bank of Niles. He has also served as a director in the Niles Lions Club, is presently a Chamber of Commerce director and is an appointee on the Village Liquor Commission and the Housing Committee for Senior Citizens.

Garbage is picked up from the curb or alley once each week, and it has to be placed outside by 7:00 A.M. Garbage should be in bags or wrapped in newspaper, placed in a 20 gallon regulation metal can, which must be kept in good condition and tightly covered.

Maine High School Board 207 Monday night approved a resolution calling for a \$15,000,000 referendum March 11 for the building of a fourth high school between Golf and Central at the tollway, and for additions on the present three schools. The new school would cost approximately \$8,000,000 while the additions would cost in the neighborhood of \$7,000,000.

The high school referendum will be run the same day as a \$5,000,000 district 63 referendum.

The tremendous influx of students into the high schools during the next 8 years has resulted in Monday night's decision. Today, present enrollment in the three high schools is 9,253. Next year it is expected to reach 10,400, followed by years of 11,100, and then 11,700 until it reaches about 14,000 in 1975.

Golf Junior High School Extends Pilot Film Study

An extension of last year's pilot film study has been launched at Golf Junior High School.

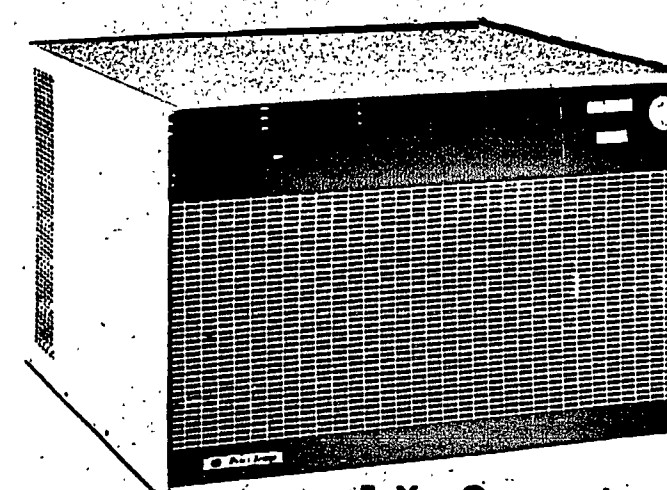

Nilehi West's Band To Perform At NIU

Nilehi West's concert band has been invited to perform at Northern Illinois University's annual Band, Wind, and Percussion clinic Saturday, February 18.

Directed by Charles Groeling, the 85-member Nilehi West band will be featured on a two and a half hour contemporary music symposium moderated by Gunther Schuller, one of America's foremost composers today.

The Nilehi West band was organized in 1961 with 48 members. The 85 musicians the band has today are drawn from a total band enrollment of 180 students representing the communities of Lincolnwood, Skokie, Niles, and Morton Grove.

According to Groeling, about 130 of the school's band members are now studying music privately in addition to their music work in the high school.

The Niles West band, Groeling said, received a superior rating last year in the Illinois State Music contest, and the music department won the sweepstakes runner-up trophy, having totaled the second highest number of points in a field of 40 participating suburban high schools.

Included in the Northern Illinois, DeKalb program will be an original composition for band by Duane McDowell, the school's orchestra director. McDowell is a composition graduate of Northwestern University.

Schuller, Groeling explained, is currently serving as president of the New England Conservatory of Music. He is widely known as a French Hornist formerly with the Cincinnati and metropolitan opera orchestras. Groeling said, and that as a composer Schuller's works have been widely performed in both the United States and Europe.

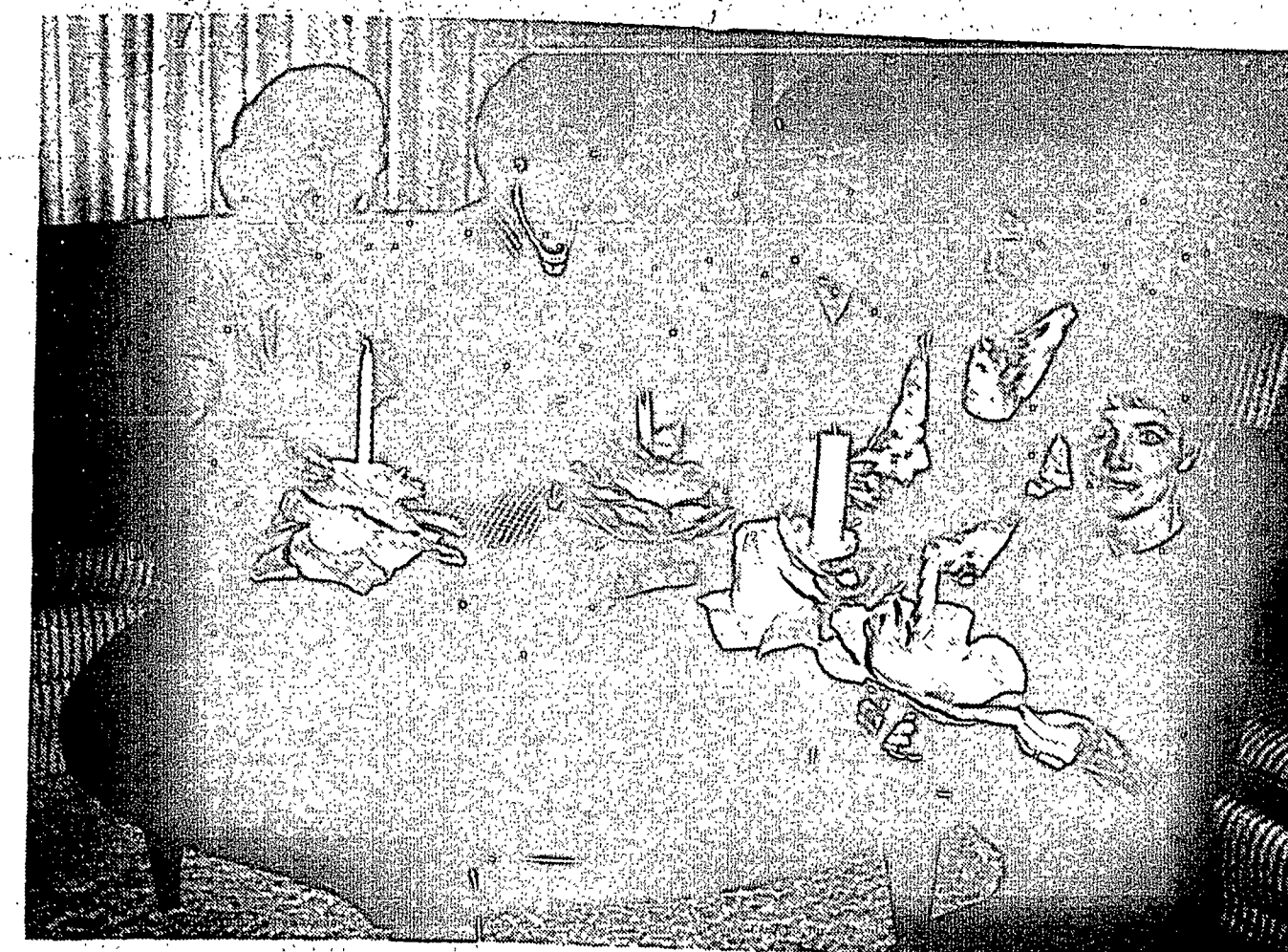
Center Steve Orser and Forward Barry Hentz controlled the second quarter boards and the rest of the Dons increased their lead of 12 points 38 - 26 at the half.

\$4,945,000 Bond Referendum Vote In District 63 March 11

A formal resolution calling for a special election March 11 to vote on a \$4,945,000 bond referendum and including increases in the Educational Tax and General Building Fund rates was passed Tuesday night, January 10, by the board of East Maine School District No. 63 at a semi-monthly meeting.

The proposed increase in the Educational Tax rate is from \$1.60 to \$1.81 and from 25 cents to 37 1/2 cents in the general Building Fund Rate.

The resolution also included proposed construction plans for the next five years. It lists construction of a new school building at the intersection of Ballard Road and Woodview Avenue, purchase of about 15 acres and construction of a new school and additions to Washington and Nathanson schools.

The board also passed a motion to apply for a federal grant for Operation Bootstrap-Interwewa, a project provided for under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The project, an expansion of Operation Bootstrap in which the district is presently participating, would utilize UHF television to disseminate inservice instruction to District No. 63 schools and other schools in the area desiring the service.

Dr. John F. Tobin, assistant general superintendent, explained that by participating in Operation Bootstrap, which involves the introduction of innovative techniques in science, mathematics, social studies and language arts instruction, teachers and administrators in this district will have gained new information significant to other schools. "The big problem is how to disseminate this information to others once it is learned," he said, "Even to schools in our own district."

Some 6,801 pupils are enrolled in schools in the district, according to a report for January. Ballard lists 515; Melzer, 783; Nathanson, 791; Nelson, 851; Oak, 752; Mark Twain, 842; Washington, 518; Wilson, 618; and East Maine Junior High School, 1,131. Some 1,194 children are enrolled in kindergarten.

In other action, the board

awarded a contract of \$4,697 to Henry Centracchio Sewer and Water Co. for installation of plumbing for the mobile classroom at Nathanson School. Another contract for electrical work in the mobile classrooms at Nathanson School was awarded to Bengel Electrical amounting to \$3,588.

The board assigned the following formal designations: Mrs. Harriet Papp, chairman of nurses; Miss Dorothy Maloney, chairman of social workers; Mrs. Katherine Anderson, chairman of speech therapists; and Mrs. Dorothy Balcom, coordinator of psychological services and special education placement.

In routine business, the board made five appointments to teaching positions, accepted four teacher resignations and adjusted the salary of one teacher. The resignation of Mrs. Ann Dragus as secretary at East Maine Junior High School was accepted, and Mrs. Eileen Wise was appointed secretary at East Maine Junior High School.

Chief Hoelbl Officer Of Fire Chiefs Association

The standardization of fire-fighting techniques, equipment, training methods and radio procedures is the goal of a newly-formed association of local area fire chiefs.

The organization, known as the Illinois Professional Fire Chiefs Association was formed last Nov. 7 by the chiefs of the Des Plaines, Mount Prospect, Morton Grove, Niles, Park Ridge and Skokie departments.

Officers of the group are Fred Arndt, Des Plaines, President; Raymond Redick, Skokie, vice-president, and Albert Hoelbl, Niles secretary-treasurer.

Members of the Board of Directors are Norman Brown, Park Ridge; Edwin Haberkamp, Mount Prospect, and Christ Hilbrandt, Morton Grove.

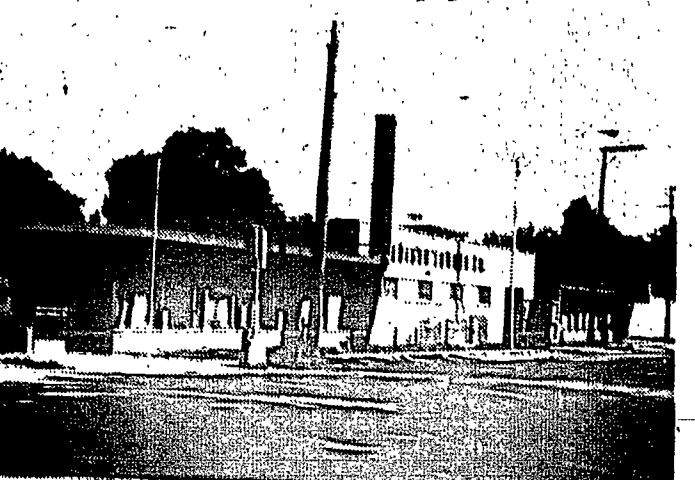
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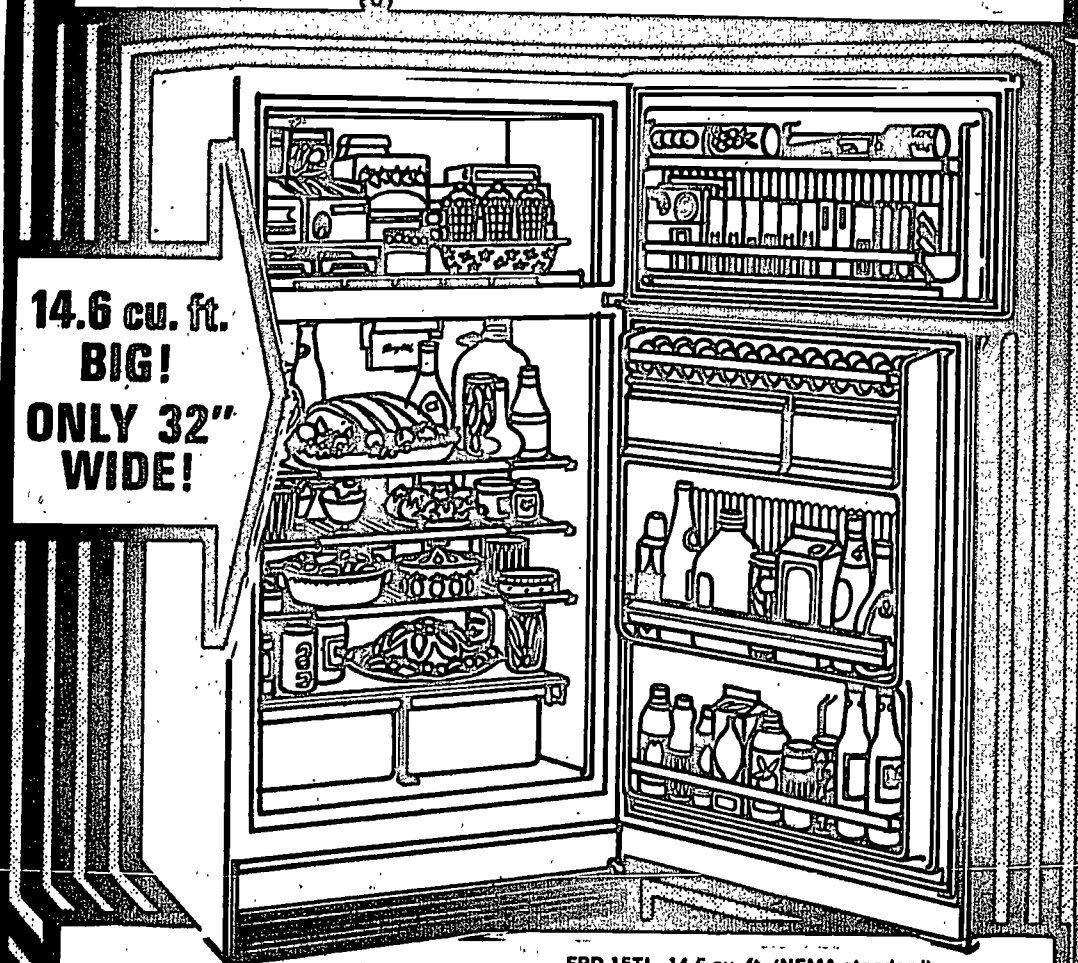
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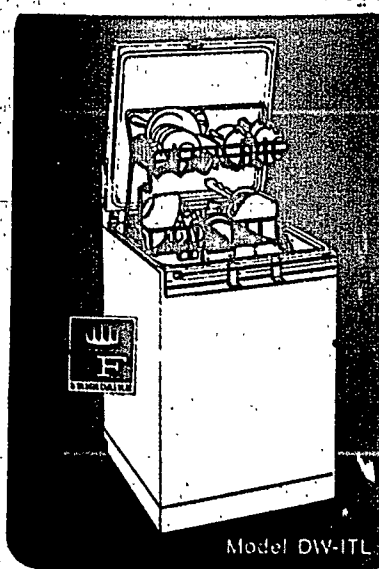
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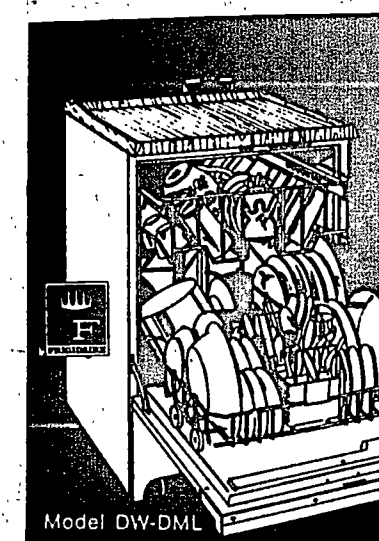
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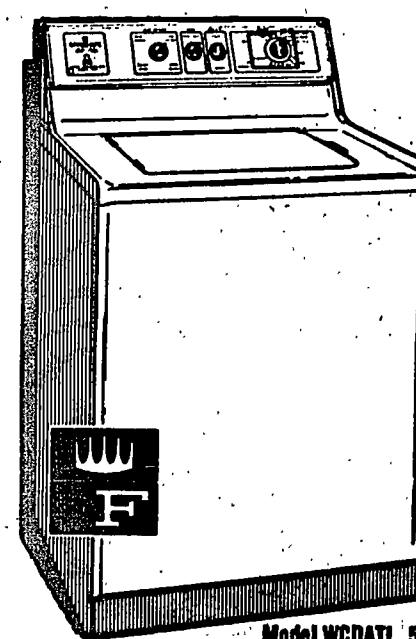
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Teens Swing At The Opening Of Youth Center

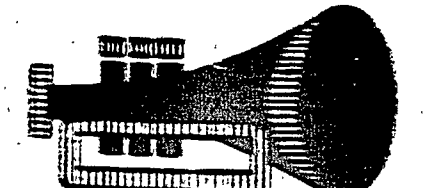
