Among the articles which can be donated are sporting equipment, books, candy, gum, cigarentes, games, and shoe shine kits. Records, razor blades,







Residents Meet Monday Regarding North Shore Junior College

ship residents is being called to meet for the first time Monday. January 30, to plan ways of informing the public about the proposed North Shore Junior College district.

Establishment of a North Shore Junior College moved closer to reality last week when the Illinois Junior College Board approved a petition signed by more than 3,000 citizens calling for an election in the proposed

Six North Shore high school districts make up the proposed junior college district, including Niles Township, Evanston, New Trier, Lake Forest, Highland Park, and Glenbrook.

Meeting at the Niles East High School's assembly room of Mulford Street, Skokie, at 8 p,m, the newly formed committee is to hear a progress report on plans for establishing a Junior Col-lege from Dr. John Speer, 8040 Long, Morton Groye,

Dr. Speer is vice-chairman of the Steering Committee, which consists of two delegates, a public relations person, and the high school superintendent from



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The group will also have time for questions and answers, will elect officers, and will establish

The report, which was approved by the Illinois Junior College Board, now goes to the State Board of Higher Education for study, Approval by this State Board is necessary before public hearings or an election

If approved at the State level a tentative time schedule of events calls for a public hearing during the week of March 6, 1967 and a referendum Saturday, June 3, 1967.

Approval by the voters in the six townships to establish a junior college district for the six North Shore communities would lead to an election of a district Board of Education probably sometime next fall.

Only after a district Board of Education is elected can site location for the Junior College building be started;

The need for a Junior Col-lege in this area has been studied intensively by the school superintendents and school boards of the six school districts. They have been aided by the findings of a professional study made by Englehardt, Englehardt and Leggett, a survey firm engaged to up date an earlier survey report made in

Results of the study showed that there is a major need for a Junior College on the North Shore, Actual 1965 figures show that 76 per cent of the district's high school graduates go on either to a two- or fouryear college. The study showed that by 1970 the earliest date that a physical plant could be

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ready, an enrollment of about 4,000 students could be ex-

As contemplated by its pro-ponents, the two-year college would be a Class I facility, Its major emphasis would be on the transfer program. Standards would be such that they would meet the requirements of the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges and other appropriate agencies. Successful students could enter the junior year of a four-year college without ques-

Technical programs in areas not designed specifically for transfer would be offered, leading to an associate's degree or diploma. The school also would offer technical courses which would enable workers to stay abreast of developments in their fields.

Under the 1965 Junior College Act passed by the General Assembly, the state would pay a part of the estimated \$18,516,000 cost of buildings, land, equipment and furnishings leaving \$4,600,000 to come from local funds. Work would probably not get underway until late 1967.

"Hospital For Niles"

Committee Forming

Many rumors have circulated throughout the Village con-cerning the Franklin Blvd. Hospital and how it affects you. The intent of this letter is to distinguish fact from rumor. The question is raised---do we want or need a Niles Hospital. This decision rests with you, the Niles Citizens.

The Franklin Blyd. Hospital, presently located on Chicago's West Side, was seeking a second site to build another hospital. They had secured a promise of a 3 to 5 million dollar loan using their present building as collateral. In tax dollars it would not have cost us, as taxpayers, one cent. Regardless of location, whether it be Maine or Niles Township the tax base is immaterial. Two prime factors were not in their fayor, One, the location, they wished to build on, Milwaukee, Oakton. The Milwaukee Oakton home Owners circulated a petition squashing any zoning hoard de-cision for the hospital site. Second, they never had and still do not have the Greater Chi-cago Council for Hospital Planning approval for building in Niles. Without this permit you cannot build a hospital particularly because Blue Cross and Blue Shield will not sponsor your prepayment guarantee of payment. Pressure was exerted from Lutheran General Hospital in addition to citizen pressure from Niles adding to the councils negative decision. Franklin Blyd, and the loan are ooth out of the picture. The question now arises -- shall we pursue the issuance of a permit and how would this affect you as

a Niles Citizen.

We must remember we live in a nationally recognized village, [5] an All America City, Honors have benn bestowed upon the Village quite recently, for example, our distinguished fire department has received National Honors, Our Police Dept. is also consistently gathering honors. Niles is the focus point recently for quite a bit of publicity. We can serve as an outstanding example to other communities in what we do. There are several questions you must ask yourself. Executive Director for the Hospital Planning Council in a letter of October 24, 1966 addressed to the Franklin Blvd. Hospital stating his reasons for refusal to consider Niles as a site said, "We feel that the beds that will be available along with other hospital facilities in these hospitals will adequately provide for the people living in this area. In the December II issue of the Life Newspaper the following article appeared. 'Hospital Has Waiting List." 'Despite the opening of new facilities, Luther an General Hospital, Park Ridge, still continues to have the highest percentage of occupancy in the northwest suburban area according to a report released by the Chicago Hospital Council. The council report noted that Lutheran General had a medi-

cal surgical occupancy rate of 100.6%. All of these figures are high for the area. Can the council still maintain their po-sition or can we with proper evidence and petition as an or-ganized force have them issue us a permit to build a hos-







At that time Dr. Short said that he was anxious to present the public with all the facts related to the bond issue. To do this he stated that he will prepare a series of articles in an effort to inform the citizens in such a way that the issue will be made clear.

Of the total amount, \$6,838,000 has been allocated for renovations and additions to the three existing high schools - Maine East, Maine West, and Maine South, as follows: \$2,888,000 for Maine East (to permit 4,500 student capacity), \$1,850,000 for Maine West, and \$1,350,000 for Maine South, In addition \$750,000 is needed to equipthis expansion, Diagrams and architectural drawings will be published prior to the vote on March 11 showing the exact areas of each school to be

\$8 million has been designated for Maine North, The difference between the two totals and \$15 million is \$162 thousand. This amount will be used towards the payment of

School boards are in a difficult position, Plans for a school cannot be prepared without authorization, and a board of education cannot contract for plens unless they have the mo-

Can Maine North be built for \$8 million? The school board of Dist. 207 -feels that it can be done. The cost figures of some of the neighboring high schools are available. These schools were built recently and are comparable in size and facilities to the Maine schools.

District 214, which includes such communities as Elk grove Village, Mt. Prospect, and Arlington Heights, is now building a sixth high school, the John Hersey High School. The superintendent, Dr. Edward Gilbert, states that for a school population of 2.750 students, the cost of site development. construction, and equipment will be \$7,250,000 to \$7,500,000. The Elk Grove High School recently completed in the same district was built for 2,500 pupils at a cost of \$6,500,000.

The Chicago Daily News on October 14, 1966, reported that construction costs for New Trier West, planned for 2,500 students, were financed by en \$8,750,000 bond issue.

In the past 23 months Evanston residents have approved \$15,050,000 in bonds to renovate and increase the size of Evenston Township High School, The proposed \$8 million figure is comparable to the costs experienced by Dist. 214 and are below some of the other Maine Township neigh-

Another approach to estimated construction cost is related to the number of square feet per student required to house an instructional program. The proposed expansion will provide between 125 and 130 sq. ft. per student in the existing high schools. It is planned that a comparable space allotment will be made for Maine North.

Maine West which opened in September, 1959, cost \$16.27 per square foot; Maine South opening in September, 1964, cost \$17.28 per sq. ft. Therefore, a conservative increase to approximately \$18.00 per sq. ft. would allow construction for a 3,500 capacity building at approximately \$8 million.

Board members feel that with

the experience of two schools behind them, with a local architectural firm in charge, and a firm resolve to get the most from each tax dollar, they can build Maine North with the \$8 million designated or that construction. Board m mbers believe that the \$8 mil ion is a good middle of the r ad figure which can provide the kind of quality school facilities omparable to what now exists.
