

Register Now For Maine Adult Evening School

Judo, Sculpture, Poetry, Introduction to Plastics, and Management Looks at Unions are new classes added to the wide variety of some 280 courses offered in the Spring curriculum of the Maine Adult Evening School. Glassblowing and Japanese Flower Arranging, new last fall, and Basic instruction, will continue with classes at an advanced level, as well as classes for beginners.

New courses for college credit include Marketing, Basic Speech, Electronic Principles, as well as a number of courses in the field of Education.

Beginning dates for non-credit classes are February 2, 6, 7, and 8, while most of the university extension courses from Bradley, National College of Education, Northern Illinois University and the University of Illinois start during January.

An innovation this term is the formation of a "Gold Card Club" which entitles residents of Township High School District 207 who are 65 years or older to half-price tuition for many classes in the Adult Evening School. Among the articles which can be donated are sporting equipment, books, candy, gum, cigarettes, games, and shoe shine kits. Records, razor blades,

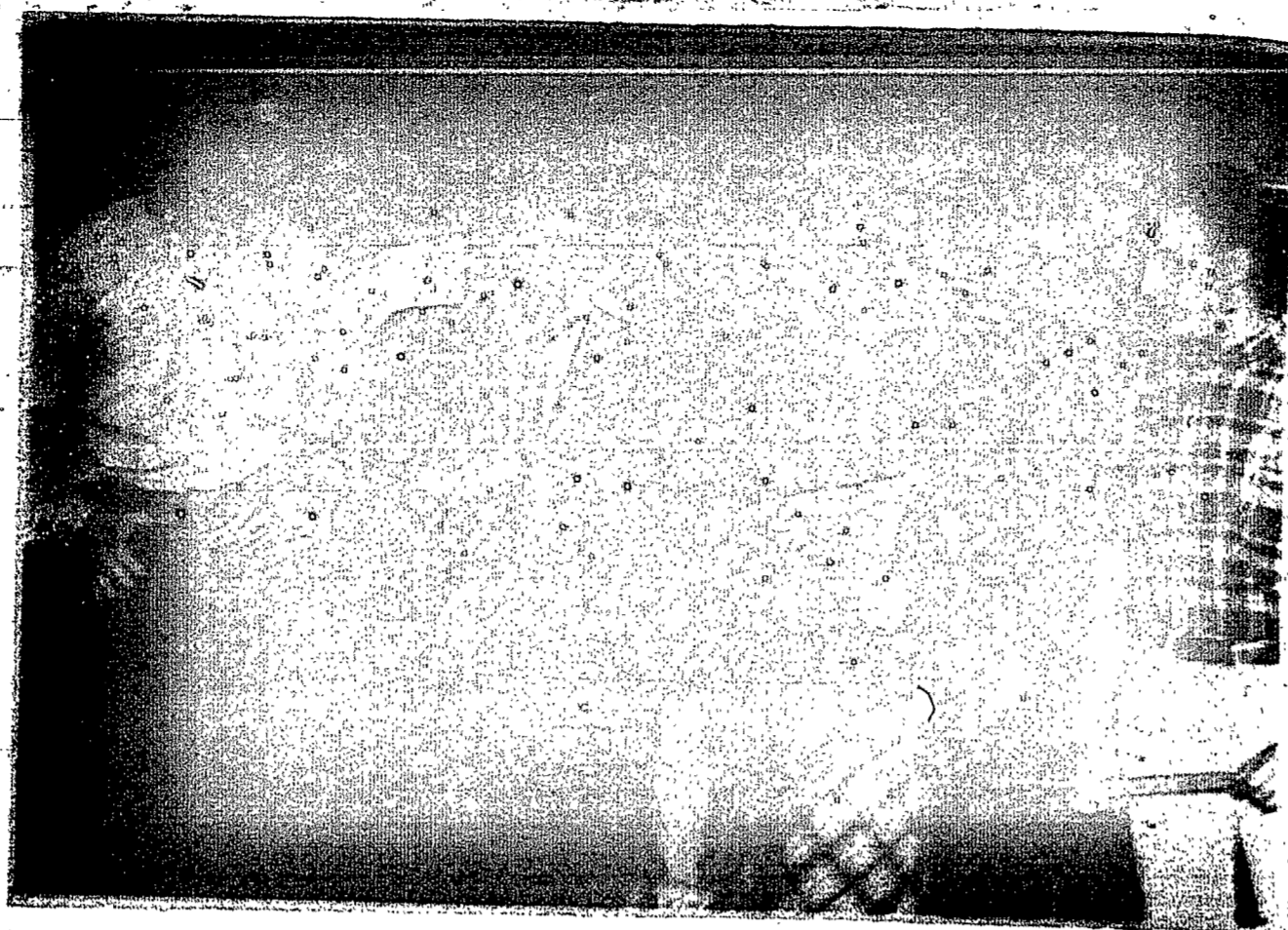
and non-perishable foods can also be left in the cloakroom of the school's auditorium lobby, Andi said.

Will Fill Two Vacancies

Caucus Screening Committee Recommends Five Candidates

The Niles Township High Schools Caucus screening committee Monday night unanimously recommended five candidates to the full Caucus Committee for two vacancies to be filled.

Joseph Gump, Caucus chairman, who headed the 14-man screening committee through its eight days of deliberation, said the five were:

Lee R. Casino, Lionel B. Gilbert, H. Verne Loeppert, Harvey Marmel and Lawrence M. Martin.

They will appear before the Caucus members Monday, Feb. 20 at North High at 7:30 p.m.

Two of the five will be selected to replace Francis Saunders and Raymond Osborn, both of whom are retiring from the school board, Saunders after 9 years of service, Osborn after three.

Many had expected Osborn to seek a second term, but he declined because of growing demands being made on him by business commitments.

Casino resides at 4309 Howard, Skokie, and has lived in the community for 11 years. He and his wife have 2 children, John and Susan, both attending East Prairie School.

Holder of a master's degree from Northwestern, Casino is western division sales manager of Bodine Electric Co. of Chicago.

He is active in the East Prairie PTA, a past treasurer of the St. Lambert's Men's Club, and a past president of the Bodine Engineering Society.

Gilbert has resided at 9716 Keeler, Skokie, the past 7-1/2 years. He and his wife have 7 children, one at North High, another at Highland School, and pre-school twins.

He is president of Great Lake Structural Steel Co., of Skokie, and immediate past president of the Skokie Chamber of Commerce.

Last fall Gilbert was general campaign chairman of the Skokie Valley United Crusade, an arm of the Crusade of Mercy.

Gilbert's formal education was received at J.T. Northwestern and Miami (Fla.) Universities.

He is a member of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association, the Executives' Club of Chicago, and the Skokie Rotary Club.

Loeppert has resided at 1501 Central in that portion of Glenview in Niles Township since 1949. He and his wife have three children, two in North High and one in the Golf School.

He has an engineering degree from Northwestern and a master's in business administration from Chicago. He is president of the Boyd-Wagner Co. of Chicago, a machine tool firm.

Residents Meet Monday Regarding North Shore Junior College

A committee of Niles Township residents is being called to meet for the first time Monday, January 30, to plan ways of informing the public about the proposed North Shore Junior College district.

Establishment of a North Shore Junior College moved closer to reality last week when the Illinois Junior College Board approved a petition signed by more than 3,000 citizens calling for an election in the proposed district.

Six North Shore high school districts make up the proposed junior college district, including Niles Township, Evanston, New Trier, Lake Forest, Highland Park, and Glenbrook.

Meeting at the Niles East High School's assembly room of Mulford Street, Skokie, at 8 p.m., the newly formed committee is to hear a progress report on plans for establishing a Junior College from Dr. John Speer, 8040 Long, Morton Grove.

Dr. Speer is vice-chairman of the Steering Committee, which consists of two delegates, a public relations person, and the high school superintendent from

each of the six participating townships.

The group will also have time for questions and answers, will elect officers, and will establish work committees.

The report, which was approved by the Illinois Junior College Board, now goes to the State Board of Higher Education for study. Approval by this State Board is necessary before public hearings or an election can be held.

If approved at the State level, a tentative time schedule of events calls for a public hearing during the week of March 6, 1967 and a referendum Saturday, June 3, 1967.

Approval by the voters in the six townships to establish a junior college district for the six North Shore communities would lead to an election of a district Board of Education probably sometime next fall.

Only after a district Board of Education is elected can site location for the Junior College building be started.

The need for a Junior College in this area has been studied intensively by the school superintendents and school boards of the six school districts. They have been aided by the findings of a professional study made by Englehardt, Englehardt and Leggett, a survey firm engaged to update an earlier survey report made in 1962.

Results of the study showed that there is a major need for a Junior College on the North Shore. Actual 1965 figures show that 76 per cent of the district's high school graduates go on either to a two- or four-year college. The study showed that by 1970 the earliest date that a physical plant could be

ready, an enrollment of about 4,000 students could be expected.

As contemplated by its proponents, the two-year college would be a Class I facility. Its major emphasis would be on the transfer program. Standards would be such that they would meet the requirements of the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges and other appropriate agencies. Successful students could enter the junior year of a four-year college without question.

Technical programs in areas not designed specifically for transfer would be offered, leading to an associate's degree or diploma. The school also would offer technical courses which would enable workers to stay abreast of developments in their fields.

Under the 1965 Junior College Act passed by the General Assembly, the state would pay a large part of the estimated \$18,516,000 cost of buildings, land, equipment and furnishings leaving \$4,600,000 to come from local funds. Work would probably not get underway until late 1967.



LWV Forms Study Group Of Michigan Watershed

Let's prevent Lake Michigan from becoming another dead lake such as Lake Erie has become! That was the singular thought in the minds of League of Women Voters representatives from Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan, Wednesday, January 12th at LWV offices in Chicago, these women formed an Inter-League Study Group of the Michigan Watershed. Their purpose is to create wider public understanding of Lake Michigan water problems and possible solutions. Procedural agreements were set up and officers elected. Chairmanship is held by Mrs. Russell Bonnyge, Jr. of Wilmette and other officers are representatives of the other states.

During the afternoon session, the group was enlightened by an address presented by Mr. William Kehr. He is the Project Director for the Great Lakes Illinois River Basins Project for the Federal Water Control Administration on Problems and Opportunities for Management of Lake Michigan.

Mrs. Herbert Hibnick, representing Morton Grove, beamed with pride as Mrs. Ezra Levin, Illinois League of Women Voters President, bestowed praise on the Morton Grove League for the ingenious poem written by member, Mrs. Edward Anderson. The poem, originally written for the Morton Grove League Log (a monthly bulletin), has been reprinted in bulletins of local LWVs throughout Illinois. We in League are equally proud and share in Mrs. Anderson's following sentiments.

WHY DON'T I JUST QUIT?

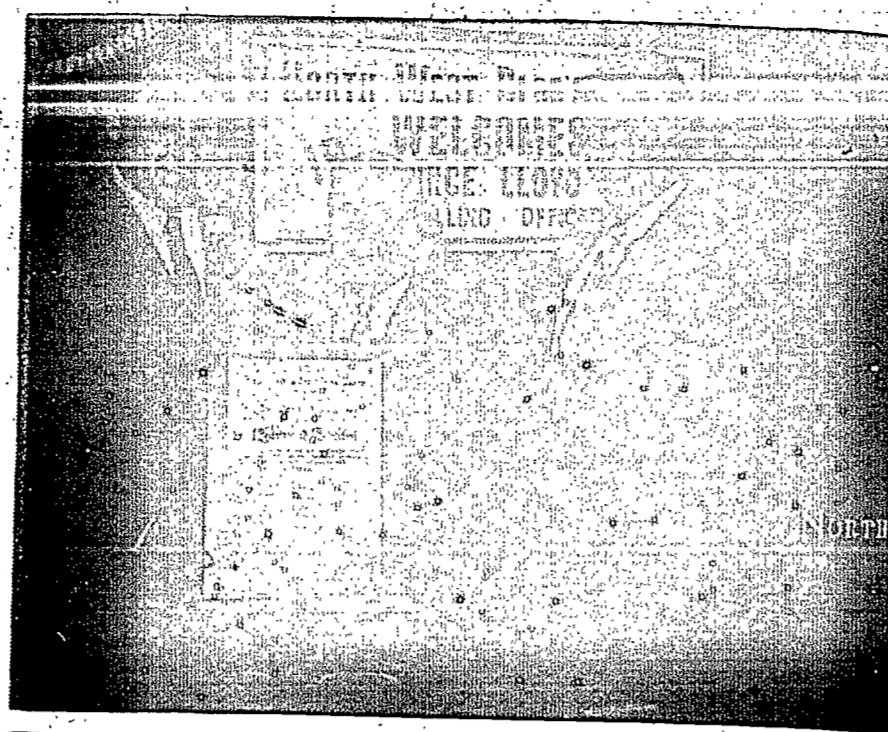

In 1966, 49,535 patients received care at Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, according to figures released by the hospital's medical records department. That's over 4,300 more than were treated in 1965.

The total includes 14,446 adults and children admitted, 2,465 babies born, 21,352 emergency patients and 11,272 outpatients. In 1965, 45,152 were cared for at Lutheran General.

Other areas in the \$6,200,000 expansion program scheduled to open during the coming year include a greatly expanded outpatient department, laboratories and additional patient floors.

"About 15,000 patients were treated in 1960, the first year the hospital was open," Nast said. "This number has tripled and is still climbing."

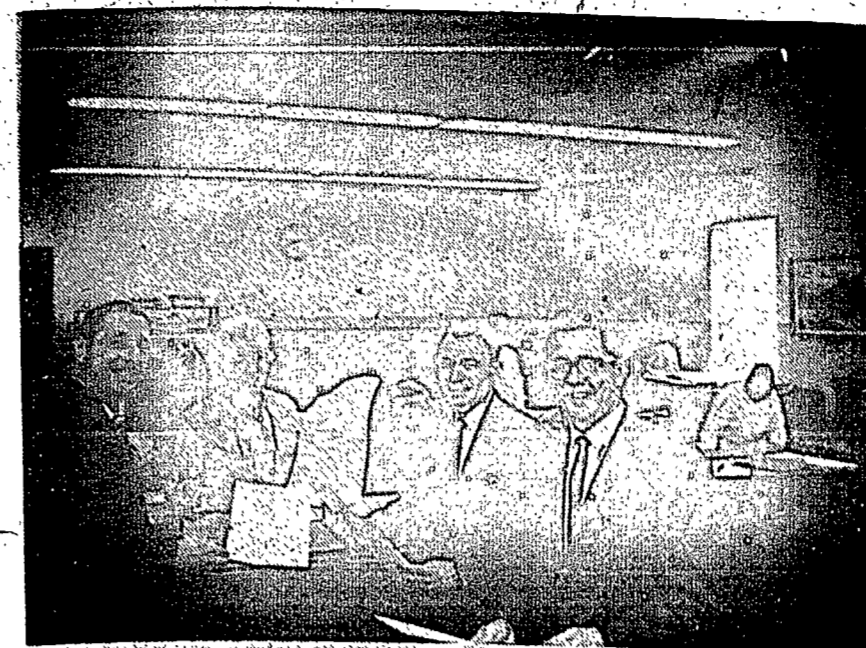

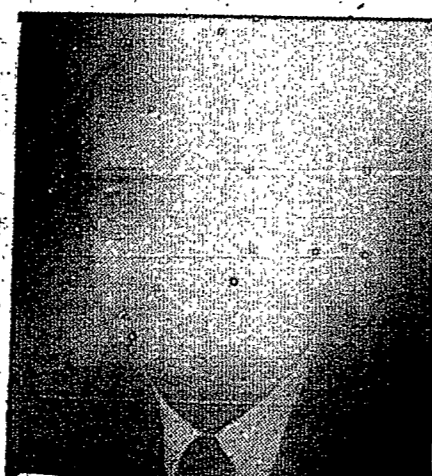

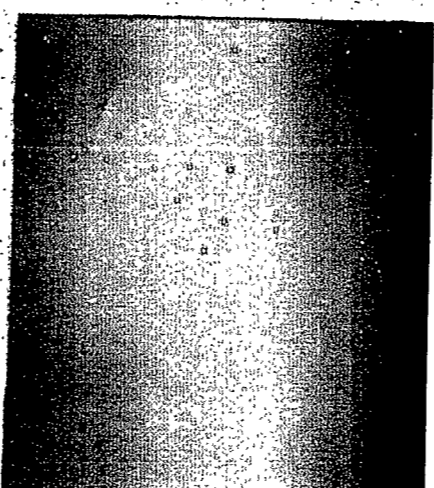

"Hospital For Niles" Committee Forming

Many rumors have circulated throughout the Village concerning the Franklin Blvd. Hospital and how it affects you. The intent of this letter is to distinguish fact from rumor. The question is raised—do we want or need a Niles Hospital. This decision rests with you, the Niles Citizens.

The Franklin Blvd. Hospital, presently located on Chicago's West Side, was seeking a second site to build another hospital. They had secured a promise of a 3 to 5 million dollar loan using their present building as collateral. In tax dollars it would not have cost us, as taxpayers, one cent. Regardless of location, whether it be Maine or Niles Township the tax base is immaterial. Two prime factors were not in their favor. One, the location, they wished to build on, Milwaukee, Oakton, The Milwaukee Oakton home Owners circulated a petition squashing any zoning board decision for the hospital site. Second, they never received Chicago Council for Hospital Planning approval for building in Niles. Without this permit you cannot build a hospital particularly because Blue Cross and Blue Shield will not sponsor your prepayment guarantee of payment. Pressure was exerted from Lutheran General Hospital in addition to citizen pressure from Niles adding to the council's negative decision, Franklin Blvd. and the loan are both out of the picture. The question now arises—shall we pursue the issuance of a permit and how would this affect you as a Niles Citizen.

another hospital submitted formally to the council might well change its mind. Citizen action can move mountains.

Are you willing to resist public pressure and petition for a permit to build a hospital in Niles. If you are in favor of a Niles Hospital and are willing to work for a "Hospital for Niles" committee, please call 965-2791 or 823-7120. We can arrange a meeting in the near future.

We must remember we live in a nationally recognized village, an All America City. Honors have been bestowed upon the Village quite recently, for example, our distinguished fire department has received National Honors. Our Police Dept. is also consistently gathering honors. With the ever increasing demand for hospital beds, are there sufficient beds in this area? Mr. Hiram Sibley, Executive Director for the Hospital Planning Council in a letter of October 24, 1966 addressed to the Franklin Blvd. Hospital stating his reasons for refusal to consider Niles as a site said, "We feel that the beds that will be available along with other hospital facilities in these hospitals will adequately provide for the people living in this area." He referred to the Lutheran General Hospital expansion program. In the December 11 issue of the Life Newspaper the following article appeared, "Hospital Has Waiting List." "Despite the opening of new facilities, Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, still continues to have the highest percentage of occupancy in the northwest suburban area according to a report released by the Chicago Hospital Council. The council report noted that Lutheran General had a medical surgical occupancy rate of 100.6%. All of these figures are high for the area." Can the council still maintain their position or can we with proper evidence and petition as an organized force have them issue us a permit to build a hospital.

David Besser, Editor and Publisher of the Niles Bugle in an October 27 editorial supported the idea of a hospital stating many of my thoughts and I refer to an active campaign on behalf of the community, backed by evidence for the need for

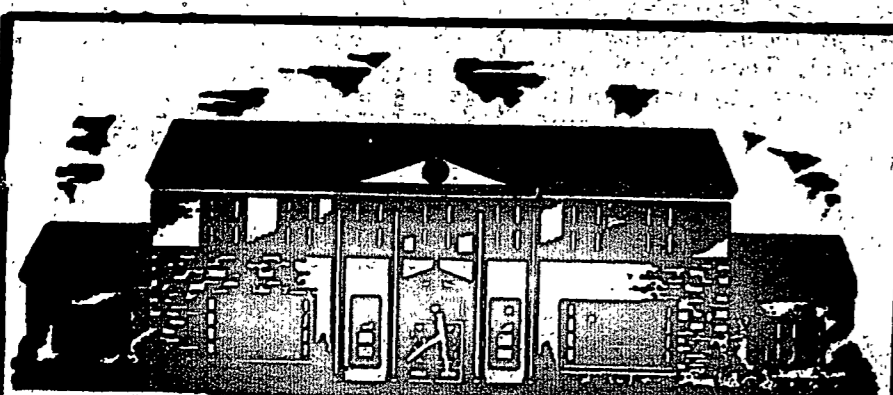
An inner city school in Chicago has come to the rescue of Viola H. Nelson PTA by helping its members get a brand new project underway.

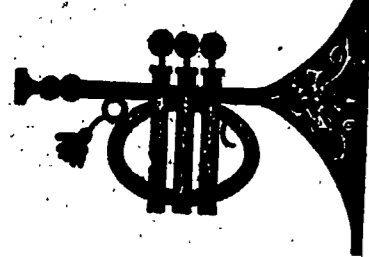

Vote On Maine Twp. Bond Referendum March 11

\$8 million of the \$15 million bond referendum to be presented to the voters on Saturday, March 11, 1967, is the amount to be used to plan, develop, and construct Maine Township High School North, according to Dr. Richard H. Short, superintendent of Maine Township High School Dist. 207.

An explanation of how the board

arrived at that figure was given by Dr. Short in an open meeting held at Maine South prior to the Jan. 16 school board meeting.

At that time Dr. Short said that he was anxious to present the public with all the facts related to the bond issue. To do this he stated that he will prepare a series of articles in an effort to inform the citizens in such a way that the issue will be made clear.

Of the total amount, \$6,838,000 has been allocated for renovations and additions to the three existing high schools - Maine East, Maine West, and Maine South, as follows: \$2,888,000 for Maine East (to permit 4,500 student capacity), \$1,850,000 for Maine West, and \$1,350,000 for Maine South. In addition \$750,000 is needed to equip this expansion. Diagrams and architectural drawings will be published prior to the vote on March 11 showing the exact areas of each school to be constructed.

\$8 million has been designated for Maine North. The difference between the two totals and \$15 million is \$162 thousand. This amount will be used towards the payment of architectural fees and site development.

velopment.

School boards are in a difficult position. Plans for a school cannot be prepared without authorization, and a board of education cannot contract for plans unless they have the money.

Can Maine North be built for \$8 million? The school board of Dist. 207 feels that it can be done. The cost figures of some of the neighboring high schools are available. These schools were built recently and are comparable in size and facilities to the Maine schools.

District 214, which includes such communities as Elk Grove Village, Mt. Prospect, and Arlington Heights, is now building a sixth high school, the John Hersey High School. The superintendent, Dr. Edward Gilbert, states that for a school population of 2,750 students, the cost of site development, construction, and equipment will be \$7,250,000 to \$7,500,000. The Elk Grove High School recently completed in the same district was built for 2,500 pupils at a cost of \$6,500,000.

The Chicago Daily News on October 14, 1966, reported that construction costs for New

Trier West, planned for 2,500 students, were financed by an \$8,750,000 bond issue.

In the past 23 months Evanston residents have approved \$15,050,000 in bonds to renovate and increase the size of Evanston Township High School. The proposed \$8 million figure is comparable to the costs experienced by Dist. 214 and are below some of the other Maine Township neighbors.

Another approach to estimated construction cost is related to the number of square feet per student required to house an instructional program. The proposed expansion will provide between 125 and 130 sq. ft. per student in the existing high schools. It is planned that a comparable space allotment will be made for Maine North.

Maine West which opened in September, 1959, cost \$16.27 per square foot; Maine South opening in September, 1964, cost \$17.28 per sq. ft. Therefore, a conservative increase to approximately \$18.00 per sq. ft. would allow construction for a 3,500 capacity building at approximately \$8 million.

Board members feel that with

the experience of two schools behind them, with a local architectural firm in charge, and a firm resolve to get the most from each tax dollar, they can build Maine North with the \$8 million designated or that construction. Board members believe that the \$8 million is a good middle of the road figure which can provide the kind of quality school facilities comparable to what now exists.
