


### Lions Corn Beef And Cabbage Dinner At Bunker Hill

The total cost of the bond referendum and tax increases per \$100 assessed valuation will be 29-1/2 cents, according to Supt. McGuigan. Cost per \$100 assessed valuation for the bond and interest fund will be 7¢; the educational fund, 10¢; and the building fund, 12-1/2¢. The present levy for \$100 assessed valuation is \$2,2281. 29-1/2 cent increase would raise that figure to \$2,5231.

Although a 21¢ increase is being requested for the educational fund tax rate, the board of education has stated publicly that it will not levy more than 10 cents when it next establishes the tax rate.

The educational fund increase will provide the money necessary to buy supplies, equipment. teaching services, etc., for the increased and increasing number of students. The building fund increase will pay for maintenance of the new buildings and for the additional care required at some of the older buildings.

### Supt. McGuigan Tells Cost Of District 63 Bond Issue

A resident of Dist. 63 owning a home with a market value of \$30,000 would pay an additional \$2.95 a month in taxes to finance the proposed \$4,945,000 bond referendum and 12-1/2 cent. increase (25 to 37-1/2 cents) in the building fund rate and 10¢ of the 21¢ increase (\$1.60 to \$1.81) in the educational fund rate according to Supt Hugh E. Mc-

The referendum being presented to voters Saturday. March 11th, will support a five year construction program expected to solve the district's student population expolosion problem for the present and oreseeable future.

Building plans include two elementary schools, a junior high school and major additions to two existing elementary schools (Washington and Nathanson) to be constructed during the next 5

greatest increase in students yet to come in the next 4 or 5 years.

The report estimates an in-

crease of 1,941 school children in the district by the school year 1970-71. The report shows some 7,565 children enrolled in elementary schools and the junior high school in Dist. 63 by 1967-68; 8,106 children by 1968-69: 8,500 children by 1969-1970; and 8,736 children by 1970-1971. With 6,795 children enrolled in the district this year, District 63 is already overcrowded by more than 500 children.

Short 21 classrooms this year, schools in the district are using basement rooms. school kitchens, mobile classrooms and special area rooms for classroom space. Two schools, the Wilson and Mark Twain schools, are using air vent closets as libraries.

"While we're interested in presenting the raw data concerning student enrollment in-

creases and finance, we shouldn't lose sight of the basic issue," Supt. McGuigan pointed out. "We now have 6,795 children attending our schools. By 1970 we will have almost 9,000. These children have a right to a good education. Our proposal provides only the basic necessities of housing and instructional services and supplies for these children."

Asked what alternatives are being considered should the bond referendum and tax increases not pass on March 11. Supt. McGuigan replied that the board of education has no alternative other than to submit the same issues to the public again. "Our requests contain no frills and no extras." he said. "We are asking for funds to carry on a very basic classroom construction program and a reasonable, but good educational program for the children. If these issues do not pass it is entirely possible that we will have to consider split sessions as a way of accomodating our pupils."



A public hearing regarding the establishment of a proposed North Shore Junior College will be held Thursday, March 9 at, 8 p.m., New Trier West High School, 7 Happ Rd., Northfield (Just off Edens Expressway).

The North Shore Junior college Association will present the legal requirements, need for the college, and proof of support and enthusiasm of the communities involved. Questions will be answered and objections will be aired; according to John Speer of Morton Grove. who is the vice-chairman of the North Shore Junior College steering committee,

The proposed Junior College would encompass Lake Forest. Highland Park, Glenbrook, New Trier, Evanston, and Niles Township high school districts. After the hearing March 9, a referendum will be held for final establishment of a proposed junior college district, perhaps in early June.

The North Shore Junior College steering committee has already received approval from the Illinois Junior College Board, and from the State Board of Higher Education for establishment of a junior college in this area. The state will pay up to 75% of the cost of the physical plant, and operating expenses are expected to be obtained from tuitions, state aid, and local taxes. The steering committee estimates that a junior college would add about \$15 yearly to a tax bill of

A survey made of the feasibility of a junior college in this area substantiates the great need for such a college. All high school boards, superintendents, and present citizens groups in the area heartily approve of the establishment of such a college.

The purpose of the college would be to provide area students with quality education at a nominal cost within easy commuting distance. John Speer has stated that this college would provide the cheapest possible higher education for district students. It would provide college placement for students of the district, even with the crowding of present Higher educational facilities. In the long run, having a Junior College in the district will be less expensive than paying tui-







### NFD Warns Of New Blanket As Fire Hazard

A new potential fire hazard. has cropped up in Niles', it was learned recently by the Niles Fire Department.

The new life hazard is a loosely woven thermal-type blanket, which can be ignited within seconds by even a cig-aret. The blanket is composed of several different materials. the most common of which is usually rayon, cotton, and acrylic. It is manufactured under several different trade names, but in all cases, the cause of its loose type weave and light weight,

According to Niles Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbl, the blanket was discovered in one Niles store, and after a test at headquarters, where one-fourth of the blanket was completely involved in fire within seconds the store voluntarily removed the merchandise from its shel-

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The proposed Junior College would encompass Lake Forest, Highland Park, Glenbrook, New Trier, Evanston, and Niles Township high school districts. After the hearing March 9, a referendum will be held for final establishment of a proposed junior college district, perhaps in early June.

The North Shore Junior College steering committee has already received approval from the Illinois Junior Gollège Board, and from the State Board of Higher Education for es-

tablishment of a junior college in this area. The state will pay up to 75% of the cost of the physical plant, and operating expenses are expected to be obtained from tuitions, state aid, and local taxes. The steering committee estimates that a junior college would add about \$15 yearly to a tax bill of

A survey made of the feasibility of a junior college in this area substantiates the great need for such a college. All high school boards, superintendents, and present citizens groups in the area heartily approve of the establishment of such a college.

The purpose of the college would be to provide area students with quality education at a nominal cost within easy commuting distance. John Speer has stated that this college would provide the cheapest possible higher education for district students. It would provide college placement for students of the district, even with the crowding of present Higher educational facilities. In the long run, having a Junior College in the district will be less expensive than paying tui-

### NFD Warns Of New Blanket As Fire Hazard

A new potential fire hazard has cropped up in Niles', it was learned recently by the Niles Fire Department.

The new life hazard is a loosely woven thermal-type blanket, which can be ignited within seconds by even a cigaret. The blanket is composed of several different materials. the most common of which is usually rayon, cotton, and acrylic. It is manufactured under several different trade names, but in all cases, the cause of its loose type weave and light weight.

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



### Physical Education At Niles **Elementary Schools**

Our nation's great requirement of "a sound mind in a sound body" is being fulfilled at the Niles Elementary Schools. The Board of Education, school administration. physical education, and health and safety staff have developed an excellent and very broad physical education program.

At the present time, extensive plans are being researched and studied to further develop and equip outdoor physical education areas, to develop afterschool intramural programs, and to improve remedial physical education.

The goals of the program are to develop physical and mental and good health and safety habits, along with social and emotional development for each individual student. The program is continuous from kindergarten through the eighth grade and is coordinated with the high school physical education and athletic programs. The physical education program is designed according to the progressive development of each individual boy and girl.

Activities at the primary and intermediate levels emphasize: rhythm, dance, balance, coordination, relays, basic manipulative skills developed in gymnastics, games, and sports ac-

tested and evaluated, and as muscular strength, coordination and manipulative skills improve, they progress to such activities as: soccer, flag foot-ball, speedball, basketball, dance, handball, gymnastics, volleyball, badminton, tennis, wrestling, softball, track and field, and physical fitness activities at the upper grade

Competitive sports with other schools are also provided in basketball, cheerleading and track.

The president's physical fitness tests are given at the beginning and at the end of each school year to measure certain areas of physical fitness and development. Twenty - three children ranked above the ninety-fifth percentile on the president's physical fitness test. The average of all the students tested was well above the national average.

In 1965, Randall Jarrell, wrote a masterpiece called "The Animal Family'. "The Animal Family" is a fantastic story of amazing beauty, great longing, and warm humor. It has elements that make it similar to some other books "Robinson Crusoe", for instance) but truly it is in a class apart, It requires the imaginative genius and poetic artistry of a man of the late poet Jarrell's stature to create such a strangely wonderful piece.

It is the story of the hunter. He and his parents were wrecked on an uninhabited coast. Eventually they grew old, and then the hunter was alone. His is an aloneness that will cause the reader to share his aching.







His statement was corroborated by architect Salk. To Trustee Marcheschi's inquiry regarding landscaping, Mr. Freedman affirmed complete landscaping for the project including shrubberies and trees. Residents would be provided with an area. to plant flowers. Trustee Scheel asked what provisions had been made for a ten story building and garbage collection. Mr. Freedman said this and snow clearance would be taken care of by the C.C.H.A. Trustee Wente, inquiring on building commission jurisdiction was informed that the building must and will comply with all the Village Department ordinances. Trustee Scheel continuing the questioning, "Who decides on the applicants? Mr. Freedman explained, "The Village Board will determine criteria regarding residency eligibility. Cook County Housing Authority determines criteria regarding financial status for eligibility.

Trustee Scheel, "What about

people who have lived here since the village was a pup?" Mayor Blase, "Can eligibility be done in terms of length of people living here?" Mr. Freedman repeated that the government requirement of an applicant be that he not have an annual income of over \$3400.00. In the case of a couple, the income cannot be over \$3800.00. Income tax returns are checked every two years to make sure of the eligibility. In the case of residual assets, unless they are considerable, this will not be a cause for the denial of an applicant, the monthly rental of an apartment would come to approximately \$50.00. Because this building will have individual meters, an allowance of \$7 is given the resident, so that the rent would then be \$43.00. The rent is determined by the amount of income the individual resident gets. The rents pay the operating expenses and salaries involved. In terms of the Village Board and eligibility for residence. Niles senior citizens. residing in Niles for at least 2 years have first preference, then the parents of Niles citizens, third citizens of Maine Township.

Mayor Blase then asked for opponents from the floor to speak Donald Jahns, electrician 9216 Ashland said he objected to such a building being loca-ted in a good residential area. "A cheap housing project and low income people together would produce a ghetto. Mr. Freedman replied. The project is a \$2,000,000 luxury building. The "instant slum" type of people does not merit a reply." In reply to Jahns coninuing question (amid gasps of disgust) as to why the project was needed in Niles, Mayor Blase replied that of 7,000 inquiries covering approximately that many homes in Niles, 600 replies had been received. Mayor Blase communed." "Niles is a young community and so many of our citizens have perents eligible for the project. This community owes it to the people. We have an obligation to provide decent housing for our senior citizens.

Trustee Berkowsky inquired about the senior citizen reaction to the proposed project, and Mr. Freedman replied simply, "They love it." Trus-tee Peck informed the Board at this juncture that he had visited such a project and was most impressed with it. "The people there are happy not only with the units but the friendship and recreational facilities. The one I saw was terrific." Mr. Louis Nowicki, Golf View

H.O.A. stated, "I am not against it, I think it is wonderful, but, what about we residents in the area? We have no side-walks, our kids have no parks. Where are the senior citizens going to walk? And what about other locations?" Mr. Freedman, "We examined other parcels of land, but on the basis of the required criteria. near shops, medical building, and all manner of entertainment this is the best area. We have provided sidewalks for the entire length of the property."The statement was endorsed by architect Salk. Mayor Blase assured Nowicki that sidewalks would be put in their area, but that they would have to pay for

Mr. Honold, Harts Road, questioned the Open Occupancy Housing Act, which, he claimed would limit occupancy to Niles

Mayor Blase, "Lets get down to basics. We have one Negro family in our Village. He and his family have the same rights as other Village citizens."

Another citizen claimed that older people became senile, "and what about that in a houssing project?" Mr. Freedman. "Such a situation had not arisen, I'm getting on in years, but I don't believe I'm semile. (much laughter) This is not a nursing home. If people take ill a family will care for their parents and in terms of low income families there is Welfare Agency care." In answer to a query regarding why the project had to be highrise. Freedman said that this had proven the happiest situation in terms of recreation and friend-

#### On Dist. 207 Bond Referendum

Dear Editor:

This is an appeal for a "no" vote on District 207's \$15 milllion take-it-or-leave-it building bond package March II.

The reasons are many, but here are a few:

1. By presenting the matter of additions at Maine East, West and South and the construction of Maine North in one package the board is denying the taxpayers the opportunity to express themselves on the separate issues. Don't they trust us to make an intelligent choice on each of these issues sepa-

2. What happened to the board's own timetable for submission of the Maine North issue about a year from now, since by their own account site preparation and need for classroom space are such that this part of the bond issue doesn't bear a

3. Behind the statistics on increased student capacity at each school is a mighty big camel being crowded under the West tent. The board's "fact sheet" says space for 900 more students at South will cost \$1,500 per student; for 1,400 at East \$2,035 each and at West for 700 students, \$2,642 each. Part of this much greater cost, no doubt, will go to build a vast spectator gym to provide three physical education class areas. This is the same construction that voters had turned down in the past.

Nowhere in the glowing prospectuses is there any mention of an administrative center for the school district. Is this because there is none planned? Or is it because this is another camel? If one is planned just to free a few more classrooms at East, is it a more economical solution than building a few more class-

5. The published explanations of how the amount of a Maine North bond issue was determined seem to go this way: Take what we paid for Maine South and add a percentage for increased costs and wind up with \$8 million. This assumes that we want to build another educational balance. I submit that many voting taxpayers would rather see economy, not luxury, the theme of any building project undertaken. Why should we go to Texas to hire another architect and try towin another design prize?

6. Since Parkinson's law applies to school building projects (any undertaking will cost all the money available), why do we tempt our board and architects (who work on a percentage) with \$8 million. Why not start them out with an economy figure instead of a luxury one? This point is a quarrel

with the District 64 elementary school board, which took official action urging approval of the bond issue. submit, is going beyond their statutory authority and I defy any member of that board or anyone else to show where the School Code makes endorsing the bond issues of high school districts one of the duties of an elementary school board.

One might ask, what then do I recommend? The answer:
(1) Vote "no" on this take-itor-leave-it \$15 million issue. (2) Let the board resubmit as soon as legally possible a bond issue for expansion of classroom space in the existing high schools, with all the frills and unnecessary building eliminated (3) Let the board stick to its original schedule for submission late this year or next of a Maine North construction bond issue, with the plans scaled down to an econo-

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
