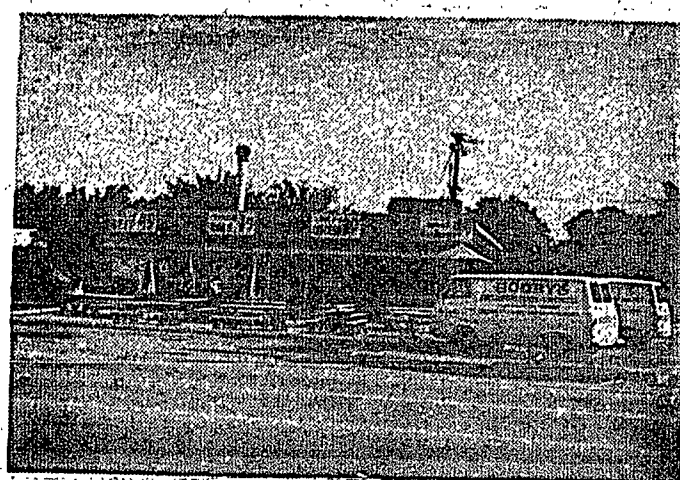

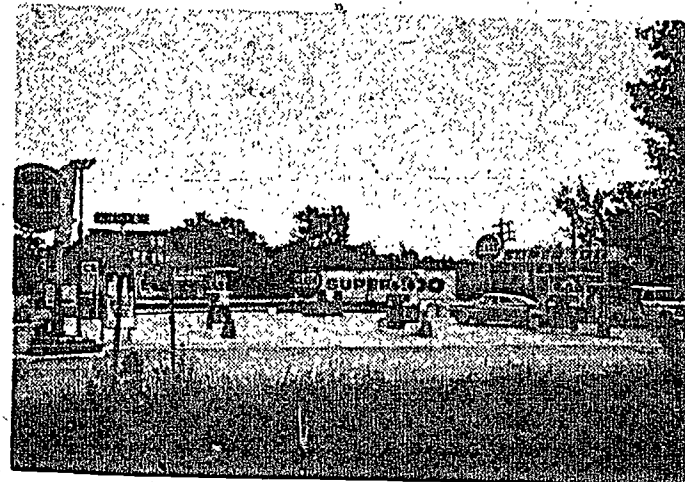

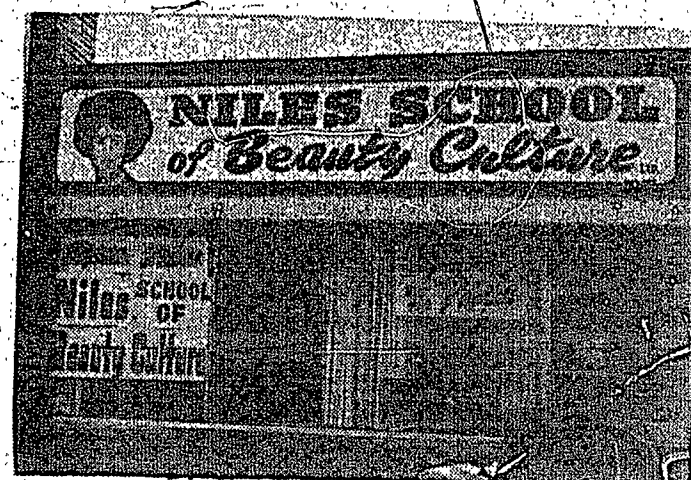

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Outline Park District Planning Study Report

The much-awaited preliminary planning study for future Niles park needs was released Tuesday. The following is the summary:

A. GENERAL

The preliminary report contains recommendations for recreation facilities that are needed immediately. The total planning study, being prepared

by Alper and Alper, Architects, will deal with short range, medium range and long range goals. This report contains only short range, immediate requirements.

B. GENERAL RECOMMENDATION

1. The short term goal of the

Park District should be to provide a playground within 2 blocks and a playfield within 4 blocks of each child in the community.

2. The short term goals for older children should be to provide a recreation park at no more than 1 mile from any point in the village.

3. The short term goals for adult

activities should be to provide outdoor recreation areas both active and passive plus community meeting space and indoor activity areas.

C. SPECIFIC RECOMMENDATIONS

The report calls for the development of a recreation park, improvements to existing parks, and new parks. In order

to accomplish these goals Alper and Alper have recommended that the Park District cooperate with all school districts to jointly develop all open space which is presently owned by the Schools or the Park District.

An outline of immediate programs as recommended in the report are as follows:

From The Left Hand

On April 9, 1964, "The Left Hand", in its finite wisdom, stated, "The most important need (regarding school board candidates) is to have the very best qualified candidates serve on the Board, regardless of their address". The reference was while local residents often voted for their neighbors it seemed to make more sense the address of the candidate was secondary to voting for the best qualified candidate. We then suggested district 63 voters cast one of their votes for William Gurolnick, who we said stood "head and shoulders above the remaining candidates who represented themselves at the Candidates meeting". Now, in 1967, Gurolnick has proven an excellent Board member and we hope residents will support him again.

While Nilesites are a minority on the district 63 Board they will be well represented on the Maine High School Board with the election of Roy Makela. Roy joins Wes Hartzell there, the first time Niles has had two members on the Board at one time. And interestingly, while Maine Township Board has for many years had Niles members on the high school board we don't recall the village of Niles being represented on the Niles Township High School Board in the 14 years we've lived here.

The Caucus system, which is often under fire around school election time, is being viewed with a jaundiced eye by several of the school members in district 63. Last year one of the school board members was not selected by the group, and this year two of the incumbents did not receive its approval.

Vote For School Board Members



Maine and Niles Township voters go to the polls Saturday from 12 Noon to 7 P.M. to vote for candidates for their township high school boards and for their elementary school districts. Voters will cast their votes for all candidates at their grammar school poll.

In East Maine district 63 four candidates are vying for the three board openings. Incumbents Bill Gurolnick, 7921 Wilson Tr., Morton Grove and Sylvia McNair, 8855 Greenwood, Niles, and newcomers Reverend William Allen, 1601 Lincoln Avenue, Park Ridge and Glen Hostler, 56 Stacy, Glenview are seeking election. A fifth candidate, incumbent Allen Schwartz, withdrew from the race for personal reasons after announcing he would seek reelection.

In district 67 incumbent Norton Goodman, 7023 Carol, Niles and Joan D. Johnson, 7022 Palma Lane, Morton Grove are unopposed in this Niles-Morton Grove-Golf district.

In Morton Grove district 70 incumbents Kenneth Bick, 6121 Elm and Samuel English, 8826 Menard are unopposed in their area.

In Niles district 71 incumbents Adolph Foss, 6846 Keeney, Rudolph Hill, 7608 Nora and Leonard Szymanski, 7748 Waukegan Road are joined by Vin-

Dist. 63 Awarded Grant For Library Material

East Maine School District No. 63 has been awarded a federal grant of \$15,564.80 to purchase library materials for District 63 and two parochial schools, St. Isaac Jogues, 8101 Golf Rd., Niles, and St. Matthews Lutheran School, 9198 Milwaukee Ave., Niles.

The funds, allocated under Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, bring the total monies being received by the district this year through federal grants to more than \$70,000.

About 75 per cent of the funds will be spent for books and the remainder for audio-visual equipment.

District 63 will administer the parochial school's portion of the funds.

The acquisition of the library material was formally authorized by the board of education of District 63 at the regular March 28 board meeting.

The board also approved a codified manual of school board policies and bylaws presented to the board by Supt. Hugh E. McGuigan.

Supt. McGuigan said the man-

ual consists of existing policies which he has codified, in addition to recommended new policies. He said he spent several months collecting information on all existing school board policies and bylaws of District 63 which had existed in a variety of forms.

At Supt. McGuigan's request, a committee consisting of board members Mrs. Irene Luck and Arnold Kapp was appointed to review the policies.

"This is the first time East Maine School District No. 63 has had one codified set of policies," Supt. McGuigan said.

In other business, the board approved payment of the current bills for March amounting to \$43,732.86 for the educational fund, \$9,453.86 for the building fund and \$2,506.10 for the transportation fund. Reimbursement to the imprest fund for \$2,193.94 was also approved.

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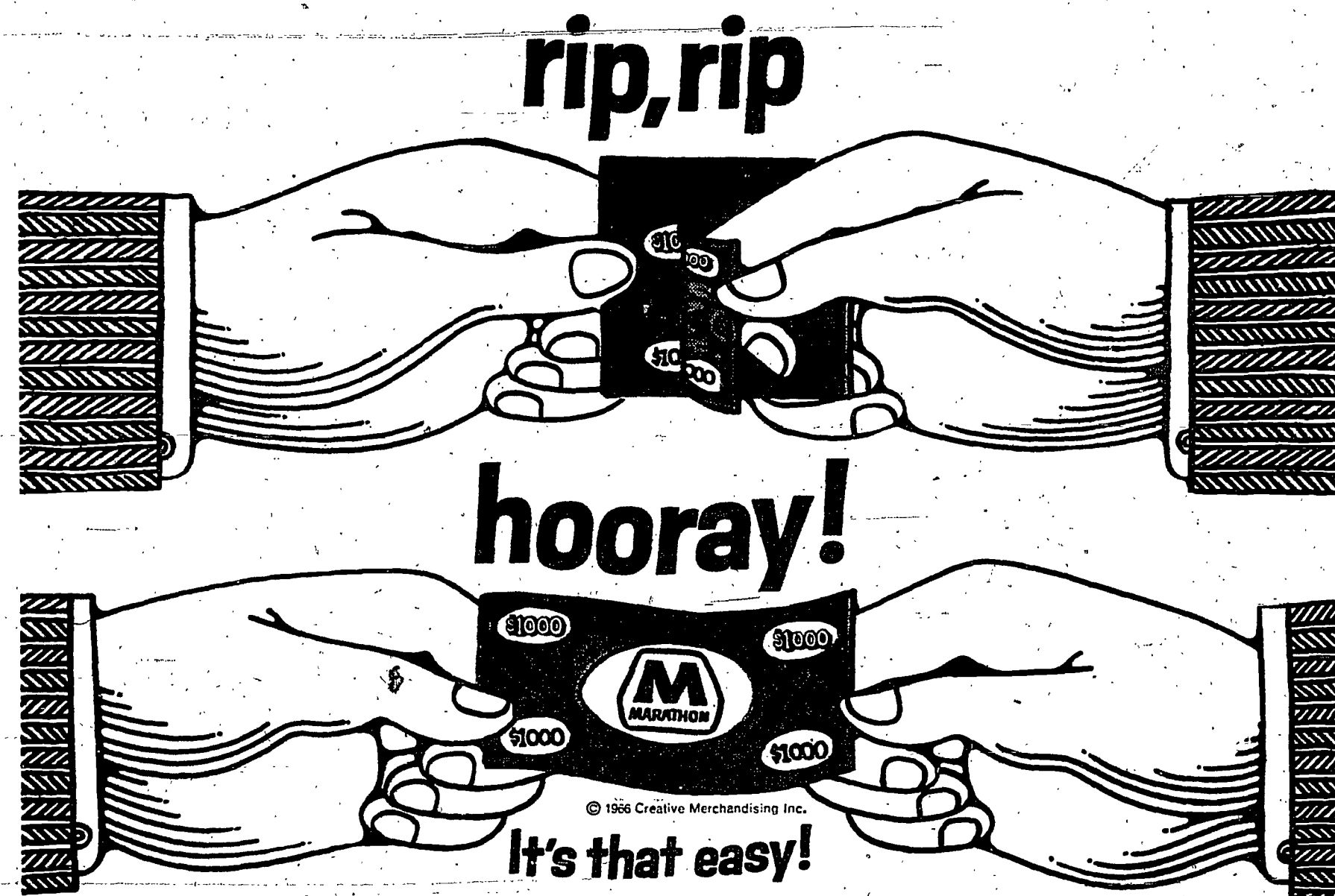

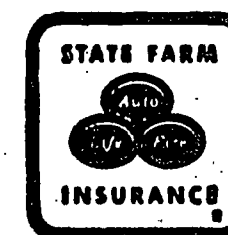

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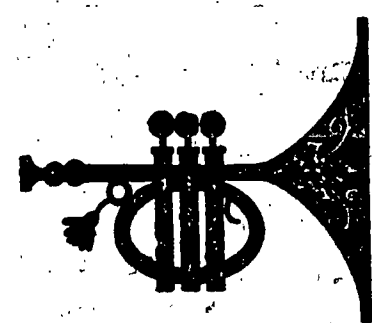
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Cub Scout Pack 283 Graduates Webelos

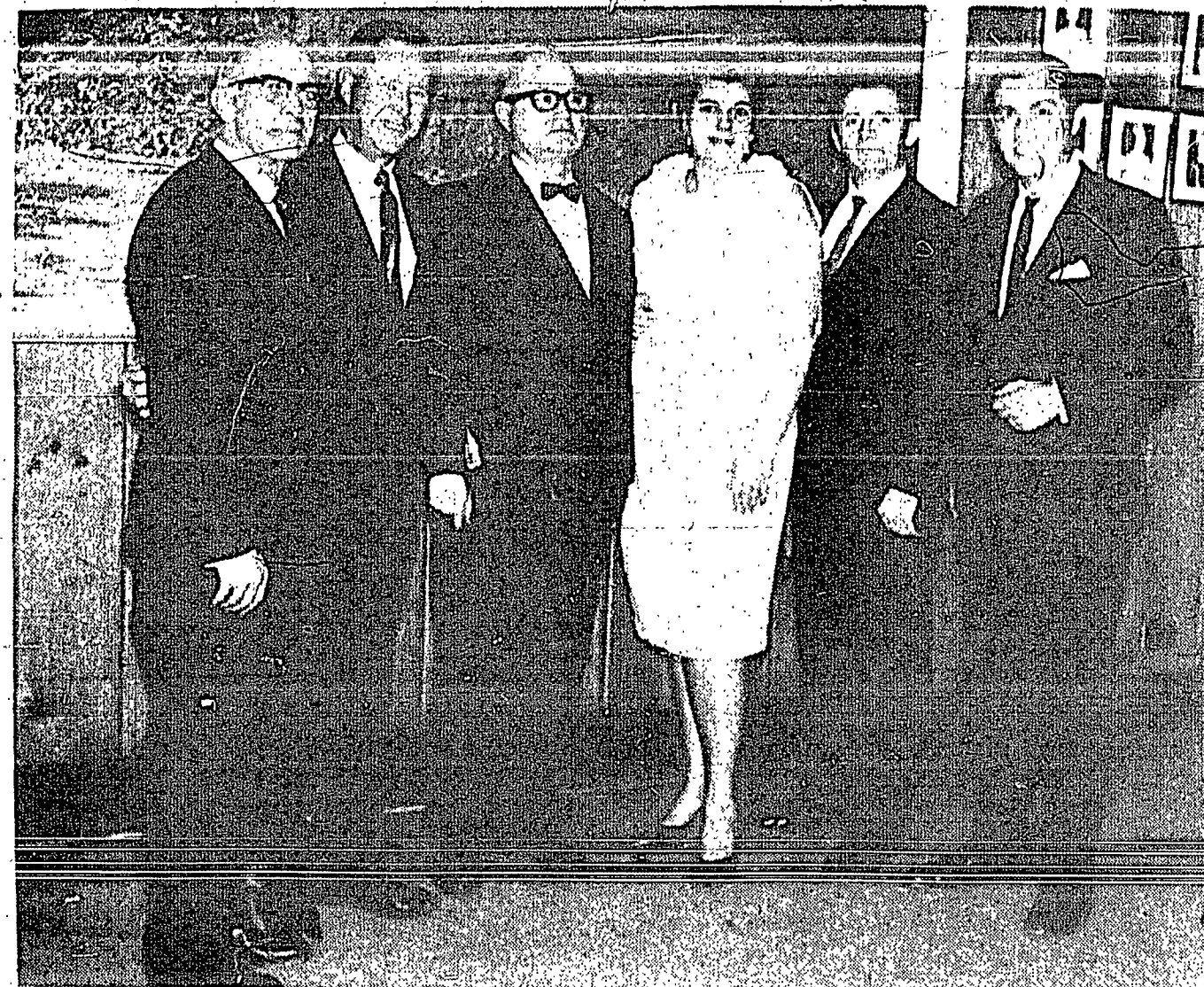
The meeting ended with each Den leading a song. Singing and fun was enjoyed by all.

Defensive Driving Protects Children

The actions of children - like the wind - are unpredictable, John T. Sebastian, Chairman of the Niles Safety Council said. "There is no excuse for a child to be maimed or killed because a careless driver forgets to look for the child who suddenly dashes into the street or the youngster on a bicycle who suddenly turns in front of his car", Chairman Sebastian warned. Sometimes the driver at the steering wheel forgets. His hands grip the circle of plastic but his mind is miles away. Any boy or girl may try to beat the first bell and will not remember how he or she was taught to cross a street. When children are playing on the sidewalks or near the streets (sometimes in the street), a driver must go slowly, extra slowly, Chairman Sebastian cautioned.

school zone means stop - children are crossing - or about to cross the street. Where school patrol boys or adult crossing guards are on duty, they are present for one purpose only - to protect children crossing the street! The defensive driver will always expect the unexpected from children! He will always be on the alert for children both on city streets and country roads. The presence of children means that he must lower his speed, be prepared to stop.

"One of the most hazardous actions of children playing near a street is to run into the street from between parked cars",

Chairman Sebastian emphasized. There are two things a defensive driver will do when he observes children playing near parked cars at the curb. First, he will slow down and be ready to stop if a child should dash into the street from behind or between parked cars. Second, he will look under the parked vehicles for a pair of little feet that indicates the presence of a child who may, and often does, run out in front of him.

A child's fate may be in your hands when your hands are on the steering wheel of a car", Chairman Sebastian emphasized.

A father suffering his son's adolescent bull-headedness when he reads across fifty centuries that a Babylonian boy caused similar anguish, may smile a little, and feel far safer than had he only to depend upon the clear scientific statements of some child guidance counselor.

A young wife in her husband's strange community may read of Ruth in the alien corn and learn that troubles need not be disasters. A man stopped in mid-career by the awful emptiness of mere achievement may be refreshed by a novelist's exploration of the mind of another man with a similar problem. Anyone puzzled by his or her own private uniqueness may find in a study of human experience and behavior, a realization that difference need not be disaster. One may be alone without being forsaken. One may be troubled or triumphant. The grandest plans may go stale before use. The immortality of youth will be stolen by ten thousand and paltry days and yet nothing is wholly lost. Whatever the nature of the things that plague us, whatever the fears that beset our nights, the renewing magic of the book is always close at hand.

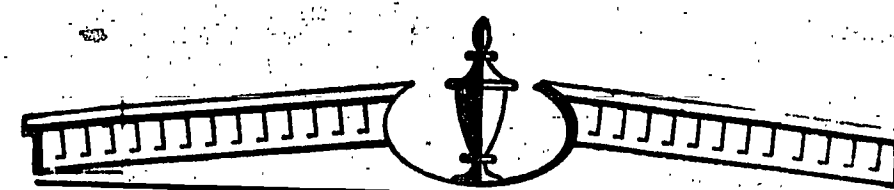
WHAT DO WE READ? If you're between five and ninety "Adventure at Mont Saint Michel" by Napoli.

This is a mood piece that captures the quiet, powerful beauty of the tidelands of the Normandy Coast. A little girl wanders where the sea lapped at her doorstep. The child sets out upon the sands to find her answers and is trapped on a rise by the returning tide. Though this tale of a child caught by the incoming waves is tense and exciting, the author also manages to inject a note of confidence.

The design of the book is exceptional and the patterns that swirl and reach across the pages capture the viewer and make him share the girl's wonder and love of the sand and sea.

The artist uses tempera and photographs to capture the immensity, the sweep, and the detail of the world of sand and sea. The people are shown as featureless but attitudes show their moods quite clearly and the effect is to subordinate the humans to the sweep and majesty of the natural surroundings. The artist manages to bring both the people of the story and the reader into tune with the beauty and force of the setting.

This unusual book presents an aspect of a fishing village that is uncommon and which should interest and entrance youngsters. This is a fine example of the imaginative and talented use of varied techniques to create a picture book that is noteworthy.

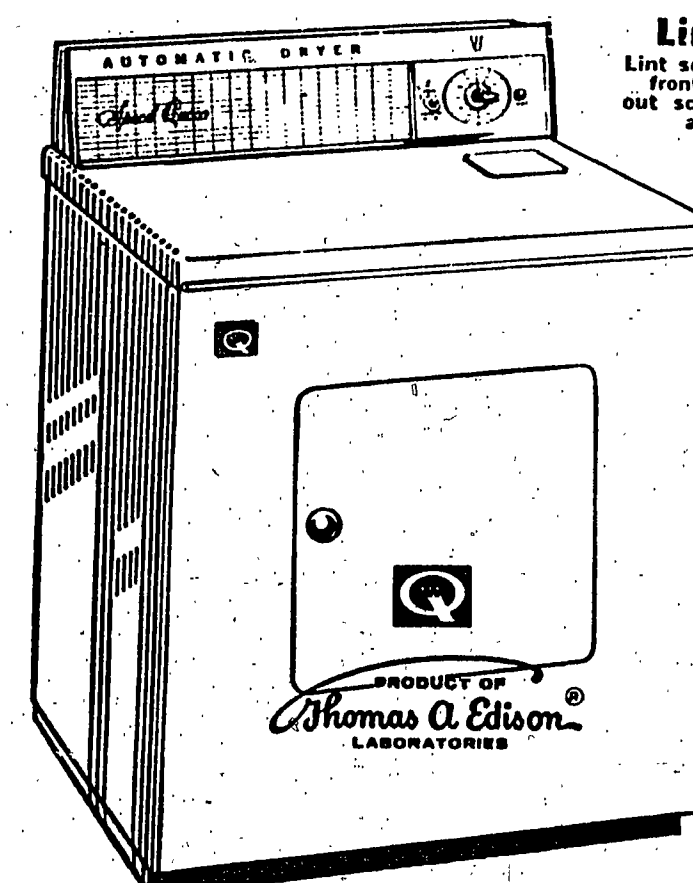

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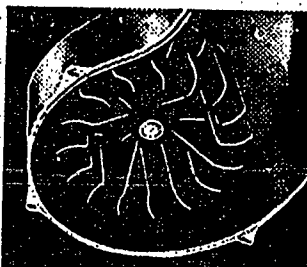
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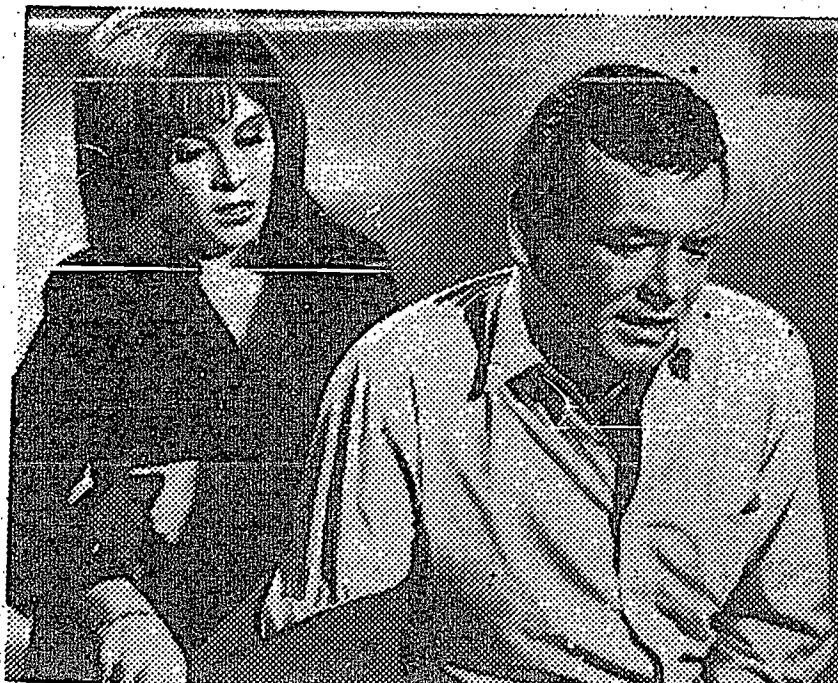

Unannounced, closed meetings as presently exist must be abolished, because interested citizens have a right to know what is going on in their village. In addition, the regularly scheduled village board meetings must be gathered

ings where public officials engage in true debate concerning the merits of issues.

YOUTH PROGRAM

Our present administration has almost totally ignored the importance of our citizens of the future. We will work vigorously towards a Junior Citizens Project which will include a Youth-Community Center and village-sponsored Youth Centers located throughout the village.

These are the issues that we believe pose the biggest problems in the village, and these are the problems that we would gladly help solve if only given the chance.

Our opposition, we are delighted to say, was so convinced by the argument we gave concerning one of these issues, namely the conflict of interest issue, that they are beginning to see things our way. At the meeting on Tuesday, March 28, 1967, which was sponsored by the Gremman Heights residents one of the members of the opposition finally admitted the value of a conflict of interest ordinance and even went so far as to say that he would introduce a resolution to pass such an ordinance! Then another member of the opposition admitted that he would vote in favor of such a resolution! Now this is no slight alteration of opinion, since these same individuals rejected a resolution for a conflict of interest ordinance only a short time ago.

We are pleased to see that our opposition has at last conceded the importance of such an issue, and we are gratified to know that we have been instrumental in a change of thinking that will ultimately benefit the common good.
