



A.C.T. Candidates Give Facts

"It's time to clear up some of the false information our opposition has been throwing around." These words were spoken by Ed Berkowsky in a "candidates night" meeting on April 7th. Berkowsky, an incumbent, is running for election as Niles Village Trustee



along with incumbent Angelo Marcheschi and Dick Harczak as the Active Citizens Ti-

"Throughout this campaign our opposition has been making baseless and irresponsible charges," said Berkowsky, "It's time that this was stopped.

anyone is guilty of conflict of interest, it's our opposition. After talking against industry throughout their campaign, they solicited Niles industry for campaign funds. If this isn't conflict of interest, I don't know what is, If they were elected, how could they be impartial in their judgment if an industrial firm wanted a zoning change and this firm has been one of their contributors?" "Our opposition has been pat-

ting themselves on the back because they found out that a Code of Ethics is to be considered by our Village Board. They have taken credit for forcing our Board into drafting this ordinance. They would be very interested to know that we have had a committee working on this ordinance for almost a year and a half. As a matter of fact.



Book Muse

PEOPLE, A NEED, BOOK. Do you know someone a relative or a neighbor, who used to enjoy reading but has had to give it up because he or she - cannot read books. magazines or newspapers in standard print? It is estimated that there are over four million former readers with reduced vision who will benefit from the most recent venture in commercial publishing - the manufacture of books in large print.

What is large print? It is usually described as print in 16 or more point size. Most large print books now being nublished are in 18 point type. Standard print varies from 10 to 14 point in size. (This is 10 point type).

Two names, Keith Jennison and Frederick Thorp, stand out in pioneering the commercial publication of large print books. In America, Jennison has developed a photo enlarging process which retains the quality of the type used by the original printer. Jennison books are published by Franklin Watts, a division of Grolier, Incorporated. Their first title. John F. Kennedy's "Profiles in Courage" has been followed by other popular works.

In England Frederick Thorpe. a retired publisher from Ansley, Leicestershire, was at the same time designing a series of books "to fill the great need of those whose eyes have gradually deteriorated over, the years, but who are not blind". Thorpe's books appear under the label Ulverscroft, Ulverscroft books are issued in a bold, dark print.

Harper and Row in 1966 joined the large print publishing program with a series entitled Harpercrest Books. Titles in the series include Fred Gipson's "Old Yeller" and Leo Rosten's "The Return of Hyman Kaplan".

The size of Keith Jennison. Ulverscroft and Harpercresi Books is 8 1/2 by 11 inches, a rather bulky size, but the paper weight and binding have peen kept as light as possible.

This current commercial publication of large print was preceded by a somewhat similar attempt under the auspices of the American Printing House for the Blind in Louisville, Kentucky. Pioneering work was done by a volunteer group in San Francisco. The National Aid to the Visually Handicap ped, and the Stanwix House in Pittsburgh, However, these publishing activities were printing primarily textbooks for the benefit of visually handicapped children in schools. The National Aid to Visually Handicapped using large print type-writers had begun to publish works in addition to textbooks, including fiction and popular non-riction for children and

In the past some similar-ily printed books have been prepared to be used in churches for reading aloud in Rituals and Ceremonies. The Bibles, Orders of Sekvice and other religious works were intended primarily to be placed on lecterns so that the clergy or readers could stand and read. Although these books were not initially intended for this purtheran Church, Glenview, pose, many of the publishers. Among these are the American Bible Society, which now issues several editions of large print Bibles; The First Church of Christ, Scientist, with large print "Science and Health": and the Augsburg Publishing House with a selection of hy-

Current large print publica-

tion has been extended to include "The World Book Encyclopedia" in thirty volumes and "The Reader's Digest" published by the Xerox Corporation. The New York Times has announced publication of a large type weekly edition to be limited to twenty-four pages in two column tabloid form. The publication will emphasize information in "News of the Week in Review" and articles from various sections of the New York Times Sunday edition. It will also include the popular Times crossword puzzle.

People who have been discouraged from reading because they cannot read standard size type need to be introduced to these publications and services and encouraged to resume reading activities. Many others will find they can do more reading if some of it is in the easy-toread format.

The Niles Library is proud to announce that what started with a small investment in this type of reading material will be added to this year by the Lion's Club and your columnist, personally, would like to express his thanks to these generous people for the culmination of a special project that began over two years ago when a concerned parent brought a visually handicapped young daughter to the library.

Special thanks, too, to Niles Library Board member, Mrs. Diane Hanson who acted as intermediary for this bequest. from some people who had a need and found a book.

The conflict of interest charge alleges village officials should not solicit village employees for private gain. Incumbent Angelo Marcheschi has defended the action contending his business effort is not with the village but with private individuals, and that the business in no way in conflict with any action he takes as public official.





about industry in Maine Township she was unprepared to offer a sensible answer to such a basic question.

Among the ACT candidates, Rich Harczak will be seeking election for the first time. We always considered him his "own man", a rather outspoken guy, who will show an independent tack on the Board. His many civic interests in the years we've known him is proof of his interest in the community and we believe he'll make a valuable contribution to the village board.

Political pundits, educators and writers have all expressed their views of the conflict-ofinterest doctrine. As it is an issue in the current political campaign here in Niles, we talked with Nilesites everywhere, asking them if they would care to express an opinion on the subject, and how they felt regarding a conflict-of-interest ordinance, Some people said they had no opinion, and a very few were undecided. Here is how Nilesites answered the

Mr. and Mrs. B. Firmiss, "The conflict-of-interest issue is too thin a line to pin down, when you have so many people who work and live in the community and still want to serve their community. I believe it would eliminate good working people from office."

Virginia Sydney, "I do not be-lieve that a contractor or realestate man should run for office. It is possible that issues may arise whereby he could benefit himself. I feel that we should have a conflict-of-interest ordinance."

R. Becker, "I believe that in our village, a trustee is a do-gooder. He lives in the village and works for his community. If he seeks political prestige, well, we all have a goal. As we elect him to office, I believe that we should give him the benefit of our trust.

Don Martin, "I believe that our businessmen should be involved in the administration of the village. I do not see any conflict-of-interest against the interest of Niles policemen, as has been claimed. If there is to be a conflict-of-interest ordinance, I will be very interested in seeing how it is

Bill Curtin, "No one should use the powers they have in office to solicit business...this is a very vague grey line....A conflict-of-interest ordinance would protect the administrator in business, and eliminate the unethical person."

R. L. Biewold, "The conflict-of-interest ordinance is the only way to insure that our government is working in our interest. There is a statute which states that it is illegal for a school board to deal with a school board. It is primarily a moral and ethical position."

Mr. and Mrs. D. Huebner, "Senator Arrington introduced a conflict-of-interest statute into the State legislature, and we feel that it should be established in local government, for the protection of people in office and the people who elect

Mr. R. Pinkowski, "A trustee's livelihood should not be penalized because he is in office. A conflict-of-interest ordinance may have value as a protective measure for the individual in office, in avoiding suspicions regarding his liveli-

B. Hedrich, "A conflict-of-interest ordinance should be passed so that people would know that their interests are protected. When we relect a grant has a stratification and onest. person to office, we hope and assume that he has integrity, but we also know he is human."

Ted Nott, "There is no conflict-of-interest here, it's much over-rated all over the country, believe that as long as business is done in an open bid basis, a conflict-of-interest ordinance does not merit - it would eliminate too many good qualified men from govern-

Mr. B. Rosen, "I'm in favor of a conflict-of-interest ordinance in terms of protection for the individual in office."

Viv Egan, "A conflict-of-interest ordinance is not the answer. I'm in favor of businessmen running for office, but, by the same token they should not use their business as an in-

L. Zmich, "Regarding a conflict-of-interest ordinance, yes and no, because when we elect a man to office, we are electing him with our trust. If he betrays our trust, then we must vote him out of office."

T. Bavaro, "After hearing both sides, I don't believe that we have a conflict-of-interest issue. The village does not pay the policemen's insurance, they pay it out of their own pockets, and the important thing is the service, in giving them a good deal. A local business man in local government should not be

Mr. D. and Carol Freeman, "I believe that we should have a conflict-of-interest ordinance. it is something that people can refer to in black and white. Most people are honest, but you must always remember the doubting ones."



Lawn Care Tools Available

Bright gardeners observing the arrival of spring are busy now planning their plantings and laying in supplies of fertilizers and gardening needs, says Mr. Ed Styer, Owner of the A to Z Rental Center at 7457 No. Milwaukee Ave. Niles, Illinois.

Planning includes equipment needs, he states.

"For instance, the week-end gardener and lawn groomer already is making rental reservations for needed tools and equipment," he says. "Power lawn combers top the list of items desired by homeowners at this time of the year. These motorized units "comb" or rake up thatch in no time at all. Rollers, tillers and tractors also are high on the list."

These and other lawn care tools are available at reasonable rentals by the hour, day or week. Sprayers, dusters, cultivators, and pruning says are among items requested.

Tips on the use of equipment are part of the service

For instance, Styer tells his customers to avoid wheel ruts when using mechanical spreaders. Therefore, he advises them to work only on firm ground. Another tip is to use a power tiller to really turn over the ground where the lawn has been damaged and heavy re-

He also points out that some spring lawn activities represent wasted effort. Some can even be harmful to the grass.

For instance, one harmful practice, he points out, is that of top-dressing lawns with soil. This practice is not universally a good idea. Adding a topdressing of soil to blue grasses and fescues encourages shallow roots which may result in the roots being injured by drought.

He also warns that soil purchased for top-dressing purposes must be treated soil; if not, it likely contains weed seeds that may ruin the lawn.
