
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



Members of the District 63 Board of Education unanimously approved a motion by Board ember Ted Davis at the March 21 special meeting to adopt the $i/\bar{t}/a/$ method on a The Initial Teaching Alphabet

consists of 24 standard English

characters combined with 20 symbols which resemble the standard alphabet. Children taught the i/t/a/ have been found to learn to read more rapidly than children

alphabet. The children taught i/t/a/ then make an easy transfer to tra-ditional English during the last two or three months of the first

taught with the regular English

The method was developed by Sir James Pitman of Great Britain, grandson of the originator of the Pitman shorthand method. It has been used in this country in a limited number of school systems. The elementary schools of Lehigh-Bethlehem, Pa. conducted a three-year investigation of the i/t/a/ method.

Comparison of first grade pupils in Bethlehem using the i/t/a/ method with pupils using the traditional materials revealed that the i/t/a/ group was ahead in reading. One fourth of the group were reading and comprehending third grade material; one half had completed second grade reading material.

Some 36 teachers and principals from District 63 attended

an i/t/a/ workshop last Feb. 21 and 22 held in Lincolnwood. Their response was enthusias-

The District 63 Board of Education also approved at the March 21 meeting a resolution to provide funds to conduct a one-week in-service training program on the i/t/a/ method this summer for some 15 teachers who will be teaching i/t/a/ during the 1967-68 school year. It has been found that teacher can confidently use the i/t/a/ method with workshop.

The classes using i/t/a/ will be open to children whose kin-dergarten teachers feel it will be of benefit. The parents of children tentatively enrolled in



New Notre Dame Principal Stresses Totality

The authorities of the Holy Cross Fathers, who administer Notre Dame High School for Boys in Niles, have announced the appointment of the Rev. William B. Simmons, C.S.C. as the new principal of the school.

Father Simmons, who will assume his new duties on July 1st, brings an impressive academic and administrative background to the Niles school. His undergraduate degree is from the University of Notre Dame with graduate degrees from the University of Michigan and the Catholic University of America.

For the past three years he has been principal of Holy Cross Preparatory School on the campus of the University of Notre Dame. The thirty-nine year old native of Lubbock, Texas has taught languages at the University of Notre Dame and the University of Michigan.

For the past six years Norre Dame High School, under the guidance of the Rev. Joseph E. O'Neill, C.S.C., retiring principal, has made great strides in deepening curriculum and in applying both modern educational and ecclesiastical principles to secondary education. All departments have progressed with the introduction of film study programs, global approach to history and new ad-

vanced placement courses in math and science. New and experimental programs in literature, as well as preparatory science and music workshops, have been established.

Father Simmons, the new principal, in a recent visit to the school and in meeting with the faculty stated that he "planned to continue the excellent programs already in existence and would strive to enhance the atmosphere of intellectual, cultural and social development growth evident in the school. He further stated that he "hoped to see and to be able to inspire further dynamism. both intensively and extensively, towards a totality in education which would have as its goal the development of the entire student and teacher personality in all its facets".

The seven deadly sins of criticism, if we are to avoid them and not one of us completely does, require a constant reassessment of our motives. There is, for example, the critical sin of covetousness, which may cause the critic to seek fame at the expense of the author whose work he exploits. The closely associated sin of envy leads to the denigration of the work of others for the hidden purpose of self-aggrandizement. To indulge the sin of gluttony is to bite off more than than one is prepared to digest. denying others the right to partake. To be lustful is to indulge an inordinate desire for the gratification of one's sense of power. The deadly sin of anger leads to the loss of one's composure and sense of balance during the inevitable exchanges of differing opinion. The deadly sin of sloth is to repeat accepted lies about an author or a body of work because one is too lazy to dig out the truth. The critical sin of pride is to hand down judgments from on high with a godlike assumption of infallability, and to assume, along with the robes of the judge, the axe of the executioner.

If the critic - or the librarian - is lucky enough to parallel, at one remove, the risk of discovery the reputable artist sets himself when he undertakes any piece of writing then he's arrived at the midpoint of find and keeping.

Now he must determine what is worth keeping. Ralph Waldo Emerson's advice to the American scholar - "defer never to the popular cry' - is as much as indefensible absolute as indetensible absolute as its opposite: defer always to the unpopular cry. The middle ground of the critic's personal integrity is perhaps the only absolute of this kind that integrity is solute. that justifies our belief. Whereever his views run counter to received opinion, it is clearly one of his social obligations to stick to his conviction "that a popgun is a popgun," even though "the ancient and honor-
