"I can't get it out of my mind that I'm not a Park Commissioner anymore," said veteran Park worker Steve Chamerski. Niles' own Mr. Park District. We were chatting with Steve after the election of Tuesday April 18th. "They knock you off," continued Steve,

"and you start all over again from the bottom up."

Mr. Chamerski was knocked out, as he puts it, by 85 votes but his heart and thoughts remain with the Park.

Steve has served six years with the Park including two consecutive terms as president.

"Me, I was the only one on the board to achieve this," he points out proudly.

Steve thinks that every board member should have a turn at being president because he explained, then they would know what it is to satisfy everyone and what it means to be president. "And let me tell you,"

he added, "a president is only as good as his board—they're all good boys, I endorse them all."

Steve reminisced over the fourteen years that he, his wife Ann and their daughter Carol have lived in Niles. When he first came here, people were kind to him, helped him and he

helped them. He became active in many facets of community endeavors. He became known around town, people recognized his outspoken honesty, and his willingness. Now that the sound and fury of last week's election has subsided, many Nilesites will join with us in wondering what was accomplished by it all.

The old bromide Nilesites should be thankful a group of people came forth to compete against the "ins" would be true if the "outs" had run a more effective campaign. But unfortunately, the Caucus group was so lacking in knowledge of the community they failed to advance the welfare of Niles by stirring-up needed issues. We've long believed a political campaign should advance the cause of better government by prodding the politicians and by advancing new ideas which will spell progress for the future. Unfortunately, the past two village campaigns were utter failures due to their lack of advancing any new ideas.

THE BUGLE is always thrust into center stage during elections because it concerns itself with the local political area. This year the Caucus Party's campaign chairman came into the office and bought back copies of the preceding three months' issues. They obviously combed the newspaper for so-called "issues" and then proceeded to quote THE BUGLE at each meeting they attended, as well as in their news releases. We mention this for a second time because we stopped giving the Caucus group fodder to use against the incumbents when we noticed they were basing much of their campaign on opinions from this column.

Normally, a newspaper should prod and stir additional action during a campaign. But after seeing the Caucus group make use of THE BUGLE so extensively we refrained from feeding them more information in hopes they might initiate some effort on their own. Unfortunately they did not.

In addition to the conflict-of-interest issue which was indeed a genuine one we could have added more ammunition for the Caucus group. But their refusal to acquire even a minimal of information concerning village government caused us to hold back.

Perhaps the most serious charge which could have been leveled against both parties concerned the line-up of the Democrats against the Republicans. While both parties were equally guilty the Caucus group could have made many points had they banged away at the issue.

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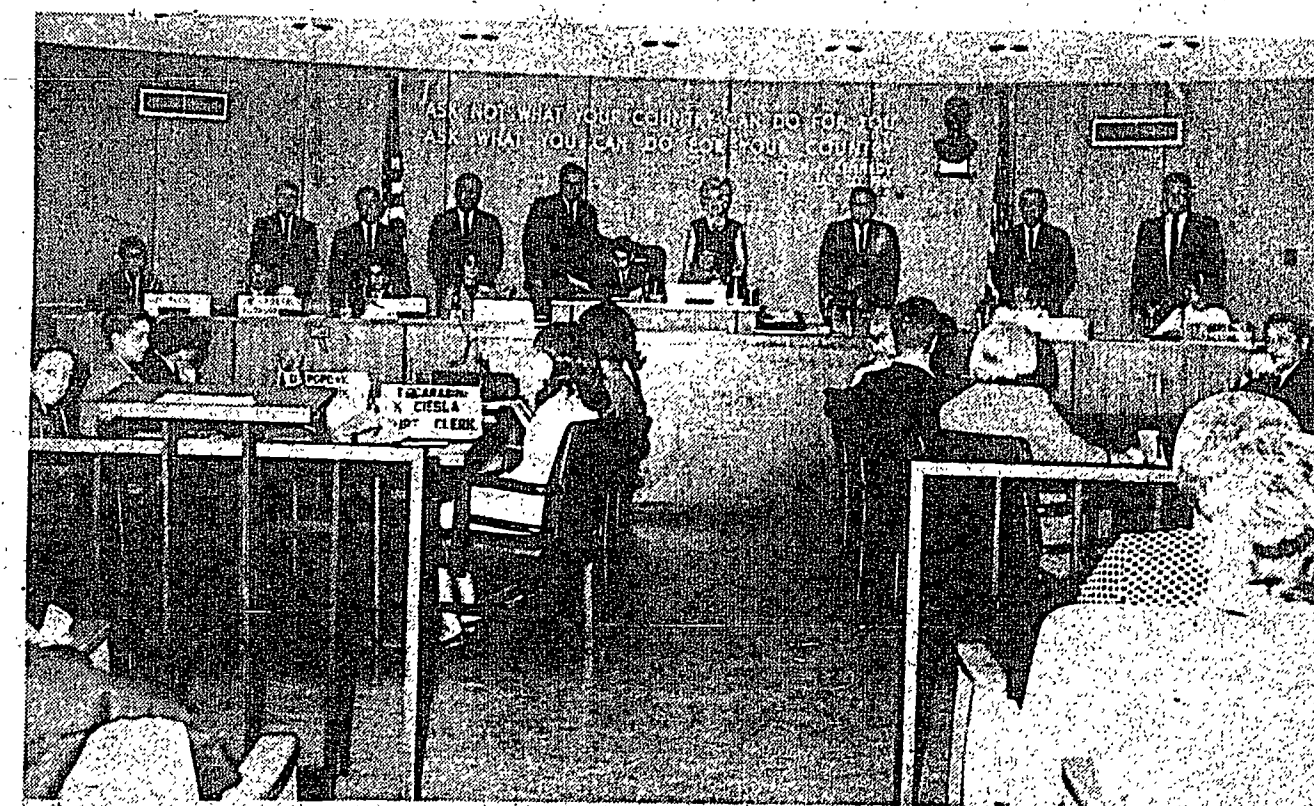

16 Students Assume Responsibilities

The problems of Niles Village officials, department heads and their men, became the problems of 16 youthful students who recently assumed these responsibilities for a day under the sponsorship of the Niles Youth Commission.

The 16 were the winners of an essay contest sponsored by the Commission for all Niles schoolchildren on the subject "The Most Influential Event in American History."

Among the offices occupied by these children were those of Mayor Nicholas B. Blase, the Police and Fire Chief, the Village Clerk, Superintendent of Public Works, and Village Trustees. A report of their observations was made to the trustees at the regular board meeting on April 11.

Pk. Commissioners Hear Teen Noise Complaints

On Friday evening of April 21, Park Board commissioners heard complaints from representatives, Senior Citizens group, president Mike Wozniak accompanied by treasurer, Harold Hoef, Niles Grandmother's Club, and Niles Baseball League representative, Richard Larson, concerning noise and vibrations emanating from teen programs at the park unhappily occurring at the time of adult programs.

Park recreation director, Petersen, said the noise could be attributed to the loudness of the current music fad of the teens. He felt that the youth programs

were as important to them, as the adult ones were to the adults. Mr. Petersen thought that a less antagonistic approach to the youth in terms of "quieter please" might work wonders. The youth programs ended by nine p.m.

Park Board Commissioners were strong in their rebuke of the teenagers who it was reported had responded rudely to the adult protestations. Youth must learn to respect their elders. A concerted effort would be made to provide a more amiable and respectful rapport between the adult and youth groups all of whom are entitled to use the facility.

Youth and smoking, the seriousness of the situation demands stern measures, commissioners agreed, and "NO SMOKING" signs will be placed in all public places, and washrooms. The notice will include, over the age of seven and under the age of 18 years no smoking allowed in public places. Offenders will receive a \$10 fine. A further approved addition to the sign will read, "Health and State Statutes 322, 323, \$50 and \$100 fines plus 30 days incarceration for persons found supplying cigarettes to such youth."

School Dist. 63 To Adopt New Alphabet

Several first grade classes at each of the elementary schools of East Maine School District 63 will use a new alphabet known as 1/t/a. Initial Teaching Alphabet, next year.

Members of the District 63 Board of Education unanimously approved a motion by Board Member Ted Davis at the March 21 special meeting to adopt the 1/t/a method on a limited basis.

The Initial Teaching Alphabet consists of 24 standard English characters combined with 20 symbols which resemble the standard alphabet.

Children taught the 1/t/a have been found to learn to read more rapidly than children taught with the regular English alphabet.

The children taught 1/t/a then make an easy transfer to traditional English during the last two or three months of the first grade.

The method was developed by Sir James Pitman of Great Britain, grandson of the originator of the Pitman shorthand method. It has been used in this country in a limited number of school systems. The elementary schools of Bethlehem, Pa. conducted a three-year investigation of the 1/t/a method.

Comparison of first grade pupils in Bethlehem using the 1/t/a method with pupils using the traditional materials revealed that the 1/t/a group was ahead in reading. One fourth of the group were reading and comprehending third grade material; one half had completed second grade reading material.

Some 36 teachers and principals from District 63 attended

an 1/t/a workshop last Feb. 21 and 22 held in Lincolnwood. Their response was enthusiastic.

The District 63 Board of Education also approved at the March 21 meeting a resolution to provide funds to conduct a one-week in-service training program on the 1/t/a method this summer for some 15 teachers who will be teaching 1/t/a during the 1967-68 school year. It has been found that a teacher can confidently use the 1/t/a method with workshop training.

The classes using 1/t/a will be open to children whose kindergarten teachers feel it will be of benefit. The parents of children tentatively enrolled in

these classes will be invited to a meeting to hear information about the new alphabet.

"A school is somewhat like a supermarket," Supt. Hugh E. McGuigan said. "We must have something on the shelves for everyone. This method benefits some children a great deal; others it benefits less. But we should offer it for those to whom it can offer an advantage in learning to read."

Supt. McGuigan was previously superintendent of Schools in Woodbury, Conn., where the 1/t/a method was introduced in limited form. It was found to be very successful, he told District 63 board members, and the method was adopted on a permanent basis.

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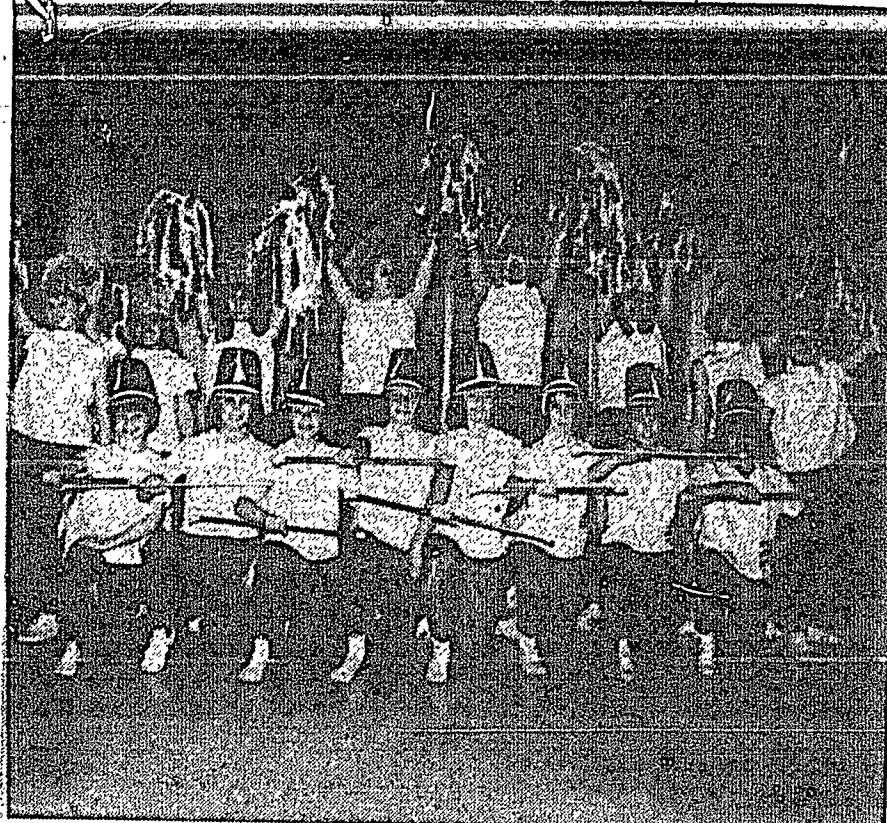
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Scouts Reserve Space For Scout-O-Rama

New Notre Dame Principal Stresses Totality

The authorities of the Holy Cross Fathers, who administer Notre Dame High School for Boys in Niles, have announced the appointment of the Rev. William B. Simmons, C.S.C., as the new principal of the school.

Father Simmons, who will assume his new duties on July 1st, brings an impressive academic and administrative background to the Niles school. His undergraduate degree is from the University of Notre Dame with graduate degrees from the University of Michigan and the Catholic University of America.

For the past three years he has been principal of Holy Cross Preparatory School on the campus of the University of Notre Dame. The thirty-nine year old native of Lubbock, Texas has taught languages at the University of Notre Dame and the University of Michigan.

For the past six years Notre Dame High School, under the guidance of the Rev. Joseph E. O'Neill, C.S.C., retiring principal, has made great strides in deepening curriculum and in applying both modern educational and ecclesiastical principles to secondary education. All departments have progressed with the introduction of film study programs, global approach to history and new ad-

vanced placement courses in math and science. New and experimental programs in literature, as well as preparatory science and music workshops, have been established.

Father Simmons, the new principal, in a recent visit to the school and in meeting with the faculty stated that he "planned to continue the excellent programs already in existence and would strive to enhance the atmosphere of intellectual, cultural and social development and growth evident in the school." He further stated that he "hoped to see and to be able to inspire further dynamism, both intensively and extensively, towards a totality in education which would have as its goal the development of the entire student and teacher personality in all its facets".

As an active principal he is aware of the many problems facing education today. As a member of the Provincial Chapter of the Holy Cross Fathers, the highest governing body of that religious order, he is acutely aware of the influences of the Vatican Council on the world of education and religion today. At his introductory meeting the faculty of the school was greatly impressed with the warmth, personableness and energy of the new principal and with his pledge to "a policy of continuity with progress."

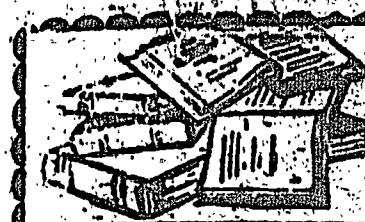

Book Muse

Every Monday, regular as clockwork, every library faces the patron with the desire to read "that book that was reviewed in the Sunday paper." And every week one or more of these spout-hearted drop the book off and disagree so violently with the critic that inspired their request.

"What are critics good for?" questioned one of these dissatisfied one day.

If you were to compress the answer, I think you could say, "To find what is worth finding and keep whatever is worth keeping (which, by the way is probably the guide line for the good librarian, too)." The critic - and the librarian - is at once the explorer and the husbandman.

I would say that in criticism as in religious ethics, there are sins venial and sins deadly.

The seven deadly sins of criticism, if we are to avoid them and not one of us completely does, require a constant reassessment of our motives. There is, for example, the critical sin of covetousness, which may cause the critic to seek fame at the expense of the author whose work he exploits. The closely associated sin of envy leads to the denigration of the work of others for the hidden purpose of self-aggrandizement. To indulge the sin of gluttony is to bite off more than one is prepared to digest, denying others the right to partake. To be lustful is to indulge an inordinate desire for the gratification of one's sense of power. The deadly sin of anger leads to the loss of one's composure and sense of balance during the inevitable exchanges of differing opinion. The deadly sin of sloth is to repeat accepted lies about an author or a body of work because one is too lazy to dig out the truth. The critical sin of pride is to hand down judgments from on high with a godlike assumption of infallibility, and to assume, along with the robes of the judge, the axe of the executioner.

If the critic - or the librarian - is lucky enough to parallel, at one remove, the risk of discovery the reputable artist sets himself when he undertakes any piece of writing then he's arrived at the midpoint of find and keeping.

Now he must determine what is worth keeping. Ralph Waldo Emerson's advice to the American scholar - "defer never to the popular cry" - is as much as indefensible absolute as its opposite: defer always to the unpopular cry. The middle ground of the critic's personal integrity is perhaps the only absolute of this kind that justifies our belief. Wherever his views run counter to received opinion, it is clearly one of his social obligations to stick to his conviction "that a popgun is a popgun," even though "the ancient and honor-

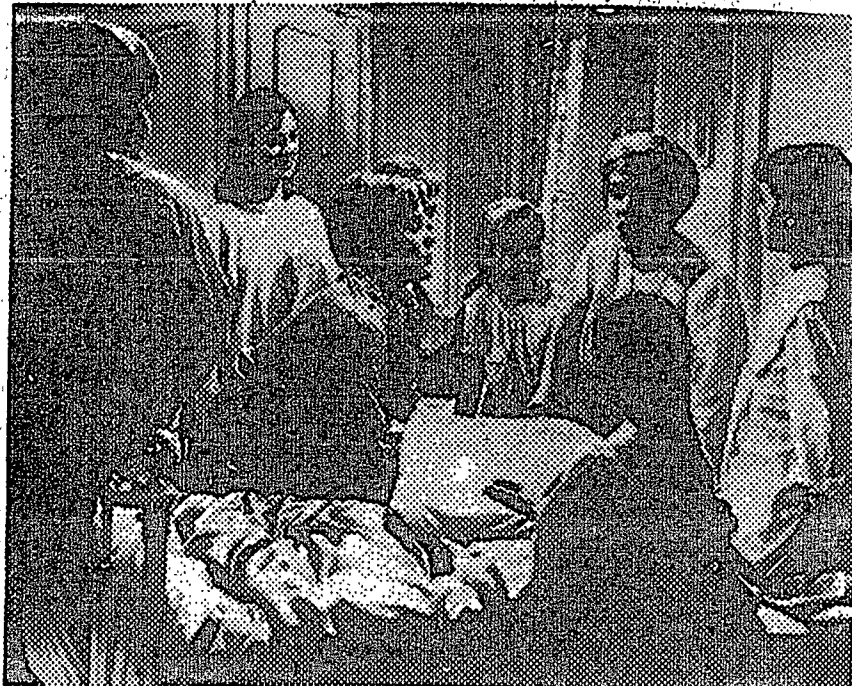

occur from an enemy attack, from the forces of nature, or from accidents in everyday life. Knowing what to do and how to do it could save YOU and your family from death, suffering, and loss of property in natural disasters, such as tornadoes, earthquakes, and floods.

TORNADO ACTIONS YOU SHOULD KNOW!

In the home: Go to your shelter or if you haven't prepared a shelter in your home to the SOUTHWEST corner of your basement. If you have no basement go to a cave, ravine, or ditch.

In a city or town: Seek inside shelter, preferably in a structural steel building. Stay away from windows.

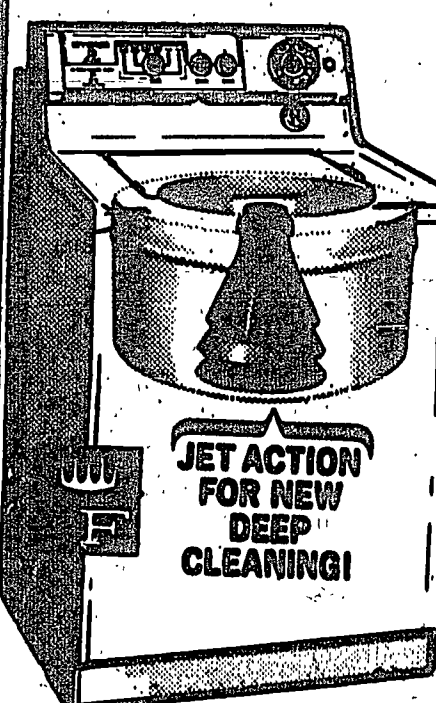
In an office building: Sit against an inside wall on a lower floor.

In school: If the school has no basement, sit against an inside wall on a lower floor. If in a one-room frame building, seek refuge in a ravine or ditch.

Other preparations you should take include, having a battery-operated radio which can be taken into your shelter. You should also have a first aid kit in or near your shelter area. You should have a 2-week supply of food and water on hand for emergency use.

Your civil defense will only work if you are informed and follow the rules of safety!

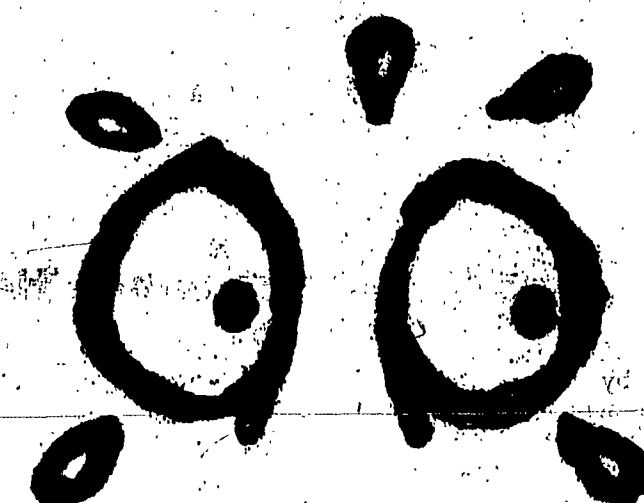
