Niles Safety Council Urges Vehicle Safety Check

"A regular vehicle safety check discovers dangerous conditions before they have a chance to cause accidents which may result in injury or death", John T. Sebastian, Chairman of the Niles Safety Council said today. He cited the following example: "A car with its hydraulic brake lines deteriorating with the driver having no knowledge that there is a weakness--without warning the line springs a leak, and he is left with no brakes!"

Chairman Sebastian listed additional examples: Headlights out of adjustment is another vehicle defect difficult to detect. From the driver's seat, in-Correct aim may not be apparent but it may be off enough to blind oncoming drivers. Defects in tire sidewalls can also reach the danger stage without the knowledge of the driver. A sudden blowout is often his first indication that something is wrong. A leaking exhaust system which is unnoticed by the driver can be the cause of an

It's smart budget-wise to keep your car in good running, steering, seeing and stopping order. Minor repair jobs caught early are easier on the pocketbook than a major repair jobs which hit you later, Chairman Sebastian said.

and injuries resulting from traffic accidents, we, as drivers, have a personal responsibility for our own driving







Vietnam, half a world away from the United States, has become closer in interest if not in physical distance as each American soldier reports there for duty and, yet, few books on the country are available for the young reader. This history is not only welcome because it fills a gap in history collections but, also, because it is substantial and readable. Starting with the earliest known facts about the Vietnamese (they are descendents from a non-chinese Mongoloid people) the author outlines the deelopment of the country. He includes brief biographies of some of its outstanding personalities- the man known as Ho Chi Minh and his chameleon-like career and the family of Ngo Dinh Diem, who tried to set themselves up as absolute rulers. The young reader gets a good picture of the present-day quicks and quality of political life in South

A SKILL. No skill is ever learned unless it is put to use. So it is with reading. To think that this complex skill is beingtaught when the child learns to reproduce the noises that are represented by marks on the page, is to miss the central point of democratic education. These noises, as we have seen many times, become words only as the child becomes able to assign accepted meanings to them. These meanings are appropriate and become useful when he can understand what the author is trying to say. 



Personnel Shortage Eased In Dist. 63 By Volunteer Talent

One of the most serious problems in education today is admittedly a shortage in personnel: a manpower crisis.

SCHOOL MANAGEMENT, a publication received by administrators across the country, recently devoted a large section to this problem.

After talking with administrators of Title I programs for the United States Office of Education and U.S. Commissioner of Education Harold Howe II, the authors concluded that state departments of education and local school administrators are "pretty much on their own as far as finding solutions is concerned."

There are indeed answers to the crisis, they say, but "one of the real bedrock problems in the manpower situation today is that far too few districts lare to be different."

One of the major solutions to the manpower crisis is the use of volunteer workers in the schools.

"It is time for us to stop talking the game of using the community as a teaching resource and to actually do it," Harold Howe II, U.S. Commissioner of Education, said. "There are commercial artists, landscape specialists. musicians, chefs, auto repair specialists and many others who would be willing, in fact anxious, to have children 'sit at their feet' and learn."

Maine Township community and East Maine School District No. 63 are doing something about it. They are daring to be different. Their answer to the manpower crisis is a pool of volunteers called the Maine Township Volunteer Talent Pool.

The Volunteer Talent Pool will eventually become the resource center for volunteer tal-

ent not only for the schools in the area, but for the hospitals, libraries and convalescent

Perhaps one of the major stumbling blocks in developing such a volunteer group is the necessity of full cooperation between school "personel and community representatives. Traditionally the school and community have remained separate entities. The structure of such a project must necessarily be a complex one involving persons from many segments of the community and schools.

"It's like trying to ride an octopus," one veteral talent pool worker from another school system commented.

The machinery of the Volunteer Talent Pool in District 63 is being put together by a group of some 20 community and school representatives. General chairman is Allen Schwartz, 8940 Church St., Des Plaines, author of the organization's charter.

Several changes in our culture made the use of community volunteers a logical means for meeting the manpower crisis in the schools. Automation permits many housewives more leisure time; early retirement and increasing longevity frees many older adults and employed persons are becoming more willing to share their knowledge with the schools.
