The additional \$500,000 sales tax bonanza which is coming Niles way may be used to lower resident's tax burden. As was reported last week the approximate \$35 real estate tax which is given to the village from your tax bill could be eliminated and even the utility tax which adds \$15 to \$25 to your tax burden could go by the boards.

Ken Scheel, who is the tightfisted finance chairman for the village is a tough cookie when it comes to inflating the budget, or spending without good cause. In bygone years prior to the Blase-New Era, the village officials used to issue tax anticipation bonds annually, to bide the village over until late-coming tax monies flowed into the village treasury. In recent years, with sound business practices and the aid of the \$500,000 sales tax return from the state. Niles financial picture has been a model for all communities. Scheel mentioned last week he feels much pride when officials from other villages now approach Niles and want to know how it keeps its ship of state on such an even

With the expected added sales tax money it would be a very formidable political coup to lower taxes. The elimination of the utility tax would not have as much future political mileage attached to this issue as the eliminating of the village tax from the real estate bill, even though the amount is nominal. And the retaining the utility tax would mean industry, that nonvoting but high-paying monolith. would still pay much of the village's bills. Furthermore, renters of apartments, who technically still pay their fair monthly rent to their landlords, would also contribute to the village by the payment of the

Despite this very optimistic picture the fallibility of the guys who're running the show here, can still be reported. Among the considerations for future purchase is a helicopter which is now under study. While its hoped such a purchase will be shared by neighboring com-munities and the federal government the first report of such a purchase sounded some-

Laymen in Niles have long been bemused by the purchase of the \$40,000 snorkel for a town like ours which seems to have little use for it. The hanging of Christmas decorations and All American signs means of using the truck seems to be its major function in Niles. While firemen will defend its need by its life-saving advantages in an extraordinary fire, outsiders have long been amazed at the inclusion of a snorkel in a one and two-story community. The purchase of a helicopter would likely top this extravagance.

While tight-fisted Scheel and friends are constantly battling inflation nevertheless the best place the \$500,000 sales tax bonanza could go would be in

McDonald's Sells Three Billion Hamburgers

gers.

The nation's biggest seller of hamburgers -- the McDonald's chain of hamburger restaurants - has just sold its three billionth burger.

That's enough hamburgers to feed a burger a day for an entire year to everybody in metropolitan New York, points out Dolores Conley, who operates the McDonald's at 7937 N. Milwaukee in Niles.

If they had been sold in Niles, nobody would have had time to eat anything else. If one person tried to eat them all, it would take 30,000 years - and that's eating one every five minutes.

As it happens, it took Mc Donald's 12 years -- since. the chain was founded in 1955. -- to sell those three billion burgers. And the chain now numbers over 900 units across the country. McDonald's figures almost everybody in the United States helped eat them.

it averages out to 15 burgers plus an extra bite for everybody in the U.S.

If all those hamburgers were laid end to end, they'd mea-sure out to 205,434 miles --enough to reach -8.1 times around the world, or to zigzag back and forth across the U.S., touching every state.

Piled up in one place they'd

duplicate Mount Rainier. If you tried to cook them all at once, you'd need a grill

the size of Texas. It took 300,000 head of cattle -- enough cattle to create full-time jobs for 2,250 cowboys -- ground up into top quality beef, to make those three billion McDonald's hambur-

It also took 230,769,228 pounds of flour baked into buns for those three billion burgers. If that flour had been baked into a loaf of bread instead, that loaf of bread would stretch from New York to San Francisco. Spread out in a single layer, it would coat the Rocky Moun-

Most of the three billion burgers were with catsup, mustard, pickles, and onions.

The pickle slices, allowing for customers who preferred theirs plain, counted out to 2,846,803,053. If those pickle slices had come from a single cucumber, that cucumber would have been 200 miles long.

The onions added up to 239, 058, enough to give everybody in Ohio a good cry. It would take a sack with a capacity of 4 1/2 cubic miles to package them all at once.

The catsup and mustard would ill the Gulf of Mexico.

Since Tam seems to be a thing of the past we feel you got lost somewhere out in left field by dwelling on this one issue and neglecting most of the

He reminded the Board he received only an average of \$2,400 annually and the Board can be expected to pay up to \$10,000 for a new attorney. Because Gauthier is employed as a corporation counsel he has devoted only part-time, as he was hired to do. He said his fees over the five years have been less than


