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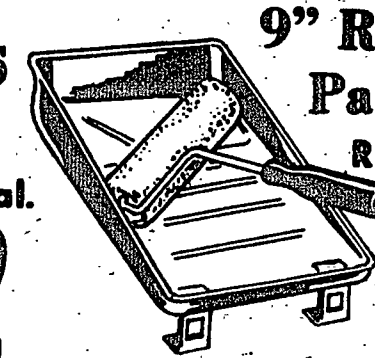
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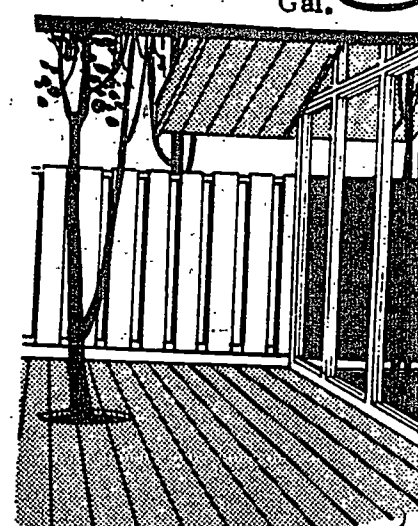

Newly elected park president Jack Leske reported at last week's park board meeting the annexation of industry in eastern Niles would add still another unexpected financial bonanza. Money from personal property taxes in the industrial area are substantial and Leske said another \$20,000 yearly might be added to the original \$20,000 annual figure Niles Park District would receive.

Because of the two month delay in receiving tax monies school district 63 will have to purchase \$800,000 in tax anticipation warrants. This means the interest on the short loan notes would cost about \$8,000 for a 3 month borrowing period.

Niles has a village youth commission, an independent group which is running a teen center in a couple of stores in Lawrencewood, a youth program under the park's auspices, in addition to youth programs in local churches and at the YMCA. And while all groups seem to have similar goals in mind the abrasions, overlapping and confusion which surrounds the efforts of the more public groups is cause for comment.

Some weeks ago one parent of a Niles teen called attention to the smoking by the youngsters, many who were pre-teens, who were frequenting the park district's youth center. When we inquired about the program park commissioner told us two of the commissioners would not allow these children to attend the park center, because of the way the program was being run.

We then sought information about the Niles Teen Center organization, which has rented store in Lawrencewood. Amidst

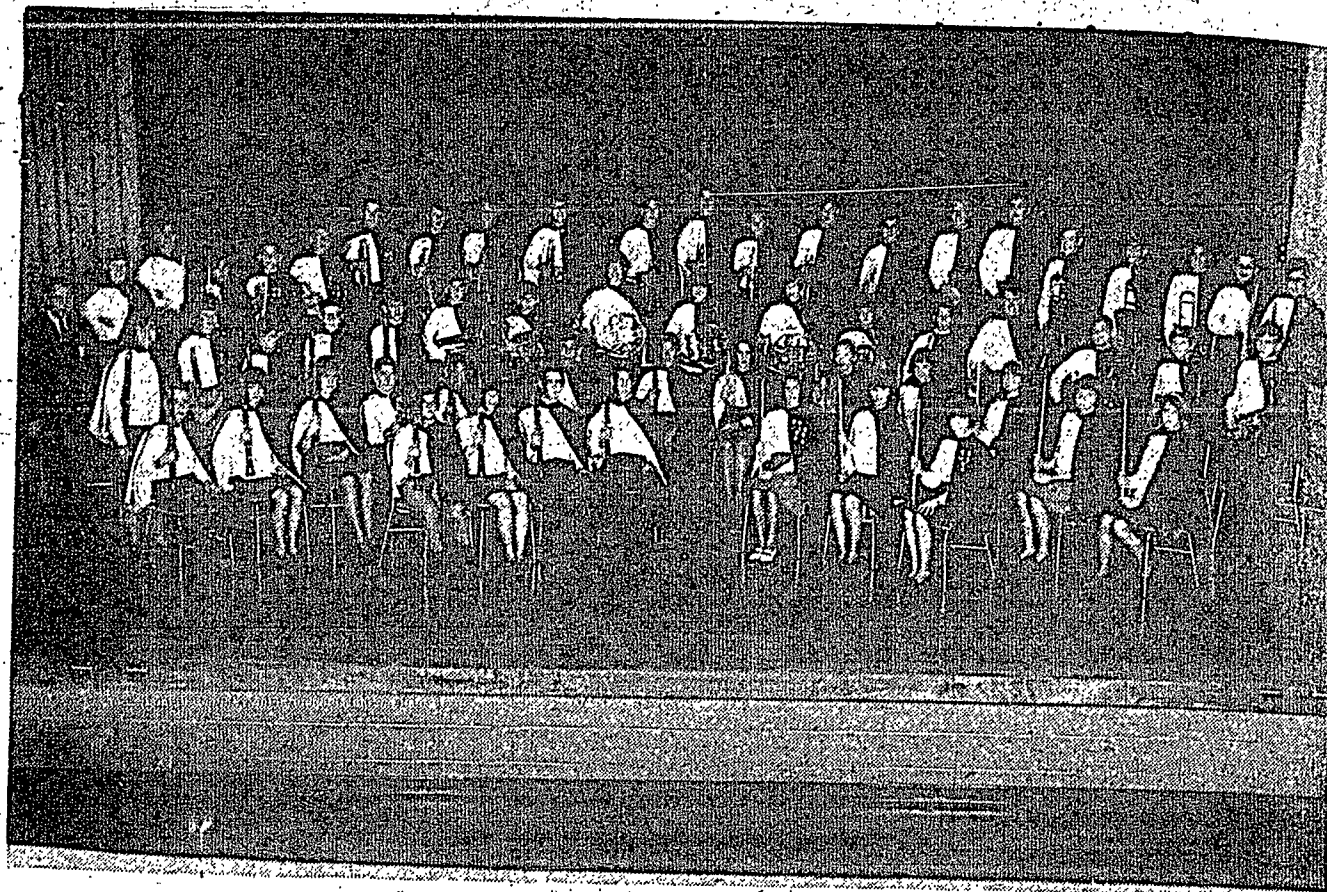

"Why Invest In A Junior College?"

Voters who expect to visit the polls on June 10 to determine whether or not a North Shore Junior College should be established, are most likely asking themselves, "Why invest in a Junior College?" The steering committee suggests some of the following answers:

An investment in a large separate, locally-controlled public junior college will insure more financial stability, better operational economy, and a much greater variety of technical, vocational and college training courses than can be provided in any other way. In addition to the direct benefit to students, higher education will also contribute positively to cultural and physical well-being of all the people of the area, according to the Illinois Board of Higher Education.

Operating costs of junior colleges, per student, are much less than those of a student at a state supported university. About \$600-\$700 is spent per junior college student whereas a lower division university student's expenses amount to \$800-\$1200.

Building costs are lower for junior colleges. Dormitories are not required, since it's a commuter-type school. High cost laboratory research facilities which are necessary for upper division and graduate work are not required. By building junior colleges, the total cost to the state and local taxpayers can be reduced considerably, by these and other ways.

On an assessed valuation of \$10,000, local taxpayers will

pay less than \$23 a year on an average tax bill — the estimated increase for this area is \$16.

A family facing the future costs of sending more than one child beyond high school education will find that the extra taxes paid over a period of ten years will amount to about a year's college costs.

Tuition fees will be modest — estimated at \$100 to \$150 per semester, which is well below tuition of private colleges and state universities.

Low tuition will mean that quality education will be available to all people within the district who desire to take advantage of the opportunity. It is further suggested that a scholarship program be made available to those in financial need.

In June, 1965, the state legislature made it mandatory for all high schools to provide a junior college education for its graduates. Where there is no junior college available, tuition money must be taken from the high school educational fund for those who desire to go on to a junior college within the state.

The Junior College district would be a distinct entity, with its own board of education and taxing powers of its own.

Primary returns of an investment in a junior college would include increased educational opportunity for all; more highly-skilled, well-trained people within the community (which would attract quality businesses and industry); lower taxes than would eventually be possible without a junior college program.

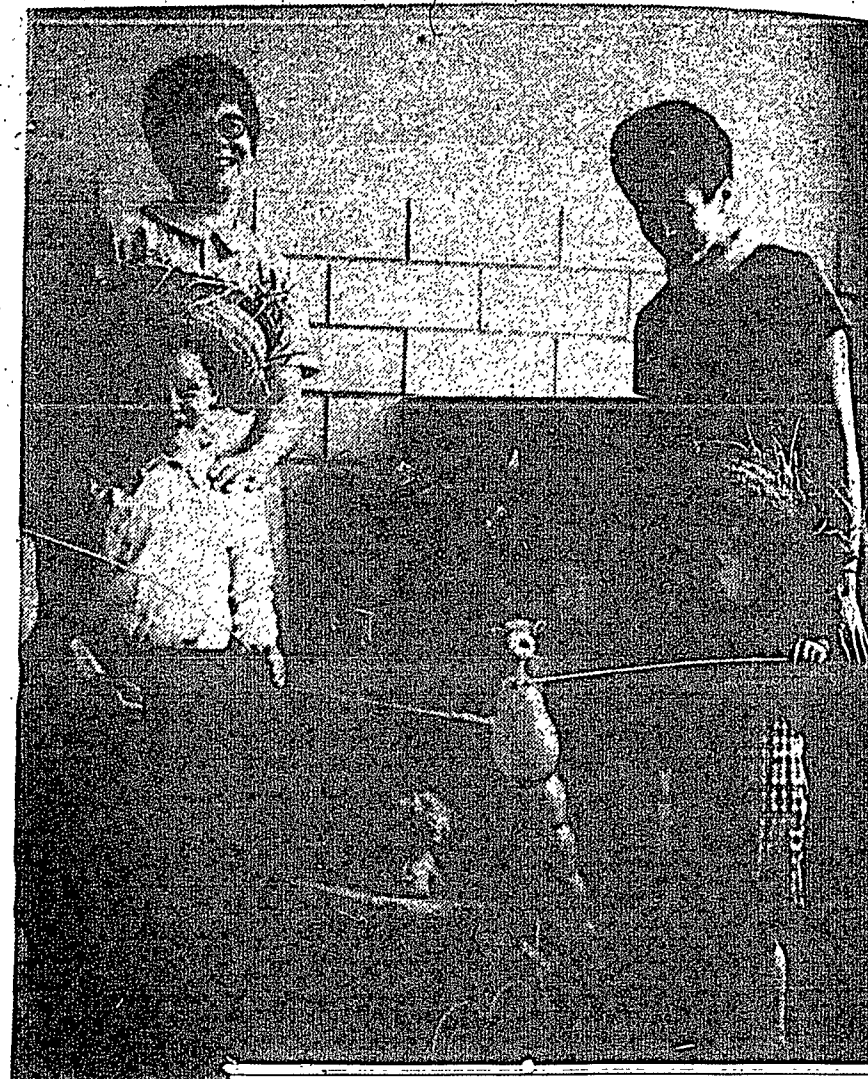
Locally, John R. Iverson, administrator of Evanston Hospital, has said, "the establishment of a junior college would have a significant impact on all seven hospitals within the district. All administrators are in favor of the junior college because there is such an urgent need to train individuals in health careers today. The training of nurses and related personnel is not keeping pace with the population growth. We look forward to persons obtaining associate degrees in nursing through a junior college program."

In endorsing the junior college program, the Communications Workers of America stated that "the right of education cannot be only for the rich and the very bright; we urge all to do their part so all children in the area will be able to do theirs."

Rabbi Charney To Attend Convention In Washington

Rabbi Lawrence H. Charney, of the Northwest Suburban Jewish Congregation, Morton Grove, Illinois, will be a delegate to the annual convention of the Rabbinical Assembly, the international association of the Conservative Rabbis, which will be held in Washington, May 28th through June 1st.

Rabbi Charney, a member of the National Executive Council of the Rabbinical Assembly, said that more than 500 delegates are expected at the convention which will discuss the pressing problems facing the Jewish communities in the United States and Canada.

One of the most pressing of these problems before a rabbi in an American community is that of interfaith contacts and so-called "dialogues". This will come under thorough discussion by Rabbi Ben Zion Bokser, author of the recently published "Judaism and the Christian Predicament", and by Monsignor George Higgins, the Executive Director of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops,

and Dr. David R. Hunter, Associate General Secretary of the National Council of Churches.

Another aspect of this problem will be taken up by Rabbi Stuart Rosenberg of Toronto, Canada, and Rabbi Seymour Siegel, Associate Professor of Theology at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, at a session called "The Jew in the Non-Jewish World".

Other highlights will be the inauguration of the Annual Rabbinical Assembly Academic lectures by the Chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary, Rabbi Louis Finkelstein, who will speak on "New Light on Hillel", and a session on resolutions where positions are expected to be taken on war and peace, with emphasis on Vietnam, church-state relations, and the ecumenical movement.

Rabbi Eli Bohnen is President of the Rabbinical Assembly and Rabbi David Pantz of Paterson, New Jersey and Stanley Rabinowitz of Washington, D.C., are convention co-chairmen.

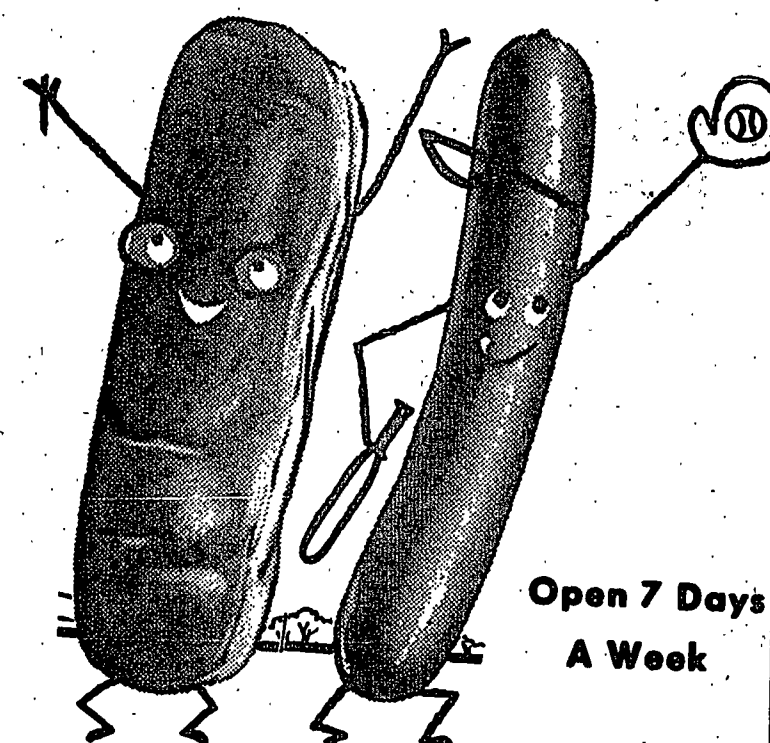

known as "LIGHT UP AND LIVE!" during four recent holiday driving periods and substantial reductions in traffic deaths were achieved in three of them.

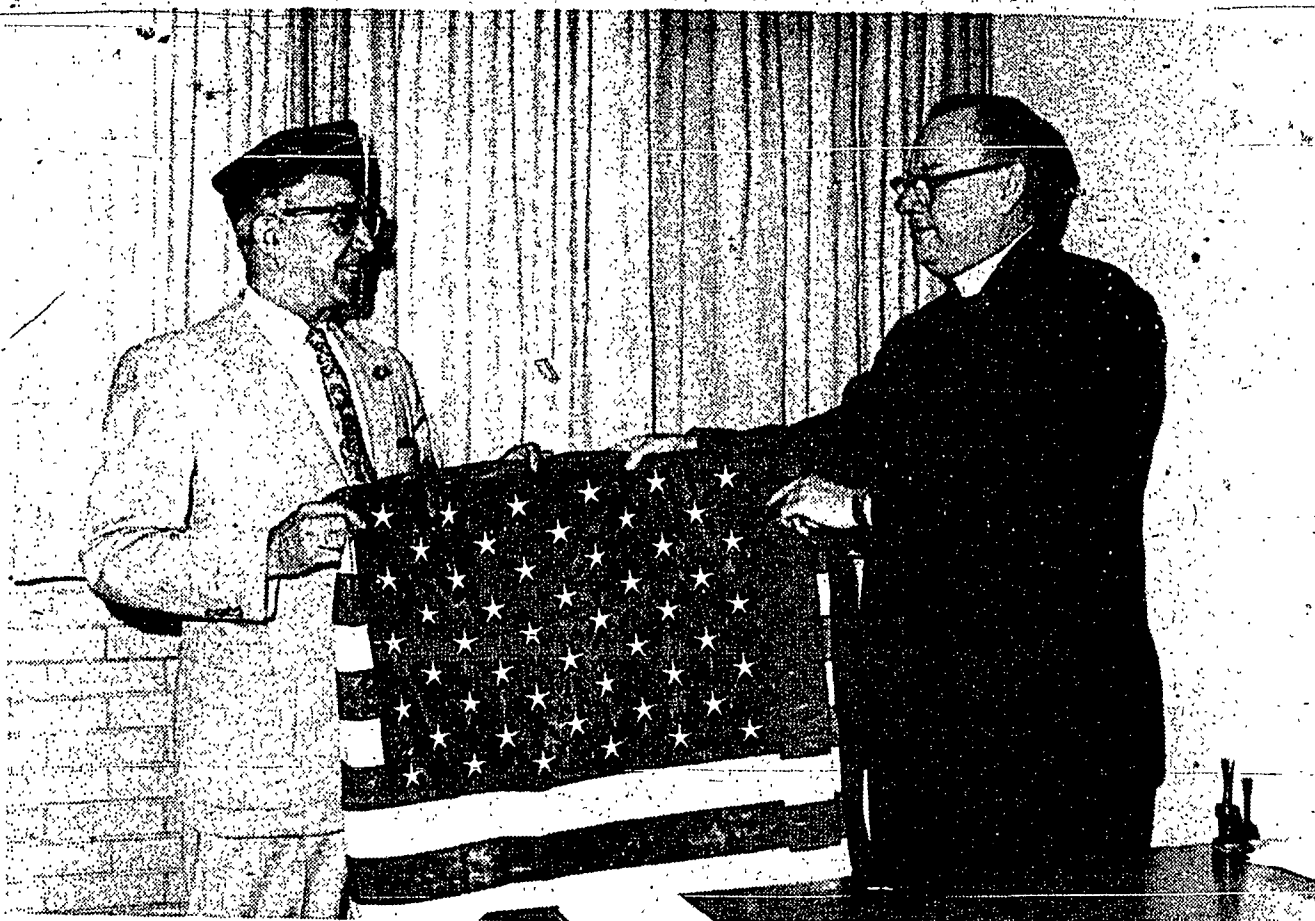

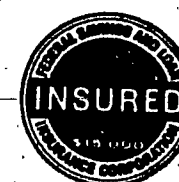
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Maine Ridge District Boy Scout News

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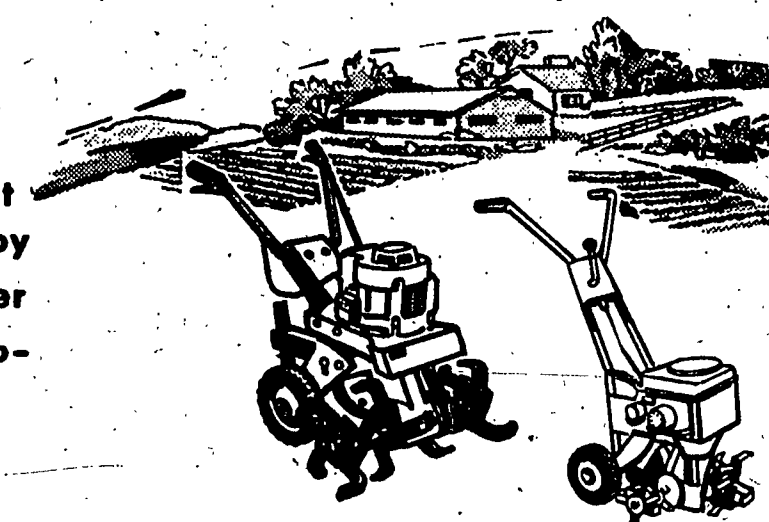

Cary Libkin Awarded Drama Scholarship

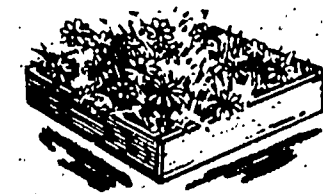

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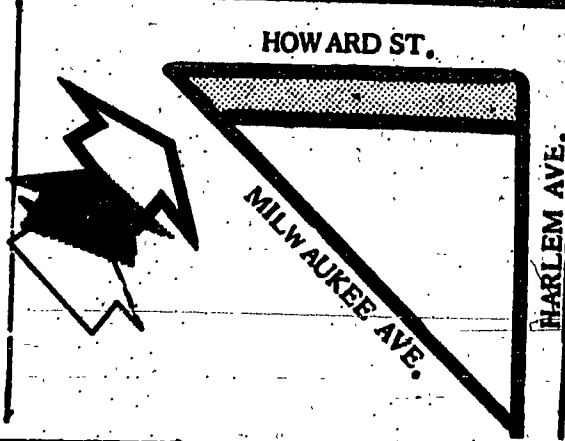

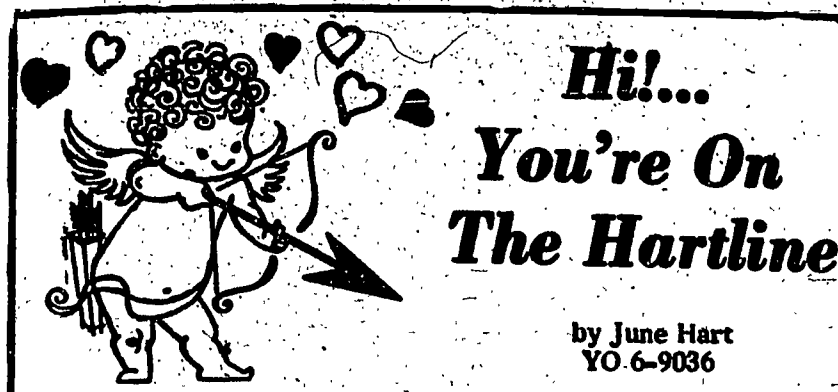
Serving Off The Coast Of Vietnam

They have a married son Jim, a pilot for Continental Airlines, and grandchildren, Scott who will be 7 in June, and Sheri who is 4-1/2. They reside in California.

Living in Niles for the past 15 years, Bill Hlavacek is a Warrant Officer - Sky-Haven Squadron with the Civil Air Patrol based at O'Hare Field. "The Sky-Haven squadron is unique, said Bill, "in that it is composed of older members with a great percentage owning their own planes. There are a few Nilesites in the Squadron too like, Lt. Harry Krause, 7434 Ottawa, Tom McGowan, 8227 Oriole, and Len Lawrence, 8050 Elmore."

The function of the Civil Air Patrol is to aid in sea and air search and rescue missions. Bill's plane is a Cessna, single engine, and can fly to a height of 8,000 to 10,000 ft.

The Civil Air Patrol is on call for duty any time of the day or night. When a search mission is instituted for a missing plane and occupants, the C.A.P. pilots are given individual grid-specific areas to search. These may measure 15 miles in length and between three to five miles in width. The pilot searches and searches over his particular area many times flying at a height determined by the terrain he covers. During the disaster floods of the Mississippi River, the Sky-Haven squadron were active reporting location of people stranded on rooftops, group sightings, and helping in the actual rescues. Should we suffer from attack by a foreign power, the Civil Air Patrol is ready for action in terms of evacuations, important personnel, military and medical, including hospital equipment, all to safer designated areas.

In the event of nuclear attack, the Civil Air Patrol is prepared to fly into the skies following reports of radio active clouds and measure radio activity. Bill's squadron, the Sky-Haven Squadron also performs orientation rides for school teachers.

Bill Hlavacek is a youngish looking man, having a charming smile and noticeably keen searching eyes. Next to his Josephine, Bill's love is flying. Born and raised in Chicago, as a very young man he worked with the original car salesman

of used airplanes. In 1929 he flew a J.N. 47, commonly known as the "Jenny", and has been flying ever since. When on the ground, Bill was concerned with (and though retired still owns) the Portage Park Service Station. Mrs. Hlavacek sometimes indulges in a flight for pleasure with her pilot husband, Bill claims that his only fear is driving to the airport. Once in the plane, he asserts he becomes part of it, and it is grand, grand.

The Hlavacek's son Jim graduated in journalism from the University of Illinois. He has seen service with the Air Force as a Tanker Pilot, operating refueling procedure over the Atlantic and Pacific.

As a Volunteer in Service to America, Corcoran, 20, will spend one year working with the Erie County Community Action Organization in Buffalo.

After his graduation in 1964 from Notre Dame High School in Niles, Corcoran spent two years at Lorain College in Iowa and then transferred to Northern Illinois University. An English major, he has interrupted his studies at the University to pledge himself to a year as a VISTA Volunteer.

Corcoran has had a variety of employment experience during his summer vacations. Last year he worked as a packer for Welch Scientific Co. in Skokie, and in previous summers he was employed as a laborer, stockroom worker, and sales clerk for firms in Morton Grove and Glenview.

During the six-week training program, Volunteers complete classroom study and gain field experience by working near the training site on a project similar to the one to which they will be assigned.

VISTA, the volunteer corps of the Office of Economic Opportunity, sends workers to projects that request aid in poverty pockets within the United States and its territories. They serve for one year, although they may extend their term of service at the end of the year.

VISTA Volunteers are now serving in every major city in the nation. They also serve in rural and Indian projects,

migrant worker camps, Job Corps camps, and projects for the mentally handicapped.

Those over 18 are eligible to join VISTA. There is no maximum age limit, minimum educational requirement, or entrance examination. Volunteers receive medical care, a subsistence allowance that includes \$75 a month for personal needs, and a stipend of \$50 a month, which is set aside until completion of service.

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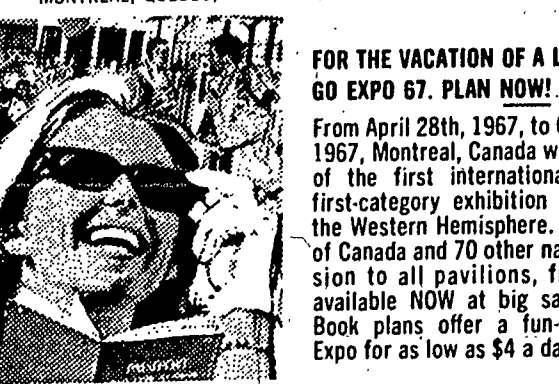

wealth Edison Co. said that they monitor the United States Weather Bureau and also use a private meteorological concern and are constantly on alert for any severe weather changes which might affect their overload system. He also explained that a Blackout, as in New York, could hardly happen to the Chicago area because of such safeguards as equipment to start generators and the joint co-operation of a power network which extends to the Dakotas. Each cooperating utility company will furnish current to any company which has been shut down because of a disaster. In any disaster, the gas, electric and telephone companies give immediate service to hospitals, fire departments and police departments before anyone else.

Mayor Fred Dumke of Oak Lawn, told how one family "an older couple" who threw everything through their windows and although there was slight wind damage inside, the frame itself was still intact after all the surrounding houses were flattened. Mayor Dumke praised the Civil Air Patrol, Red Cross and the Salvation Army who were of great assistance. And the National Guard who prevented "the vultures" from taking advantage of a situation such as this.

He was asked about being criticized by anyone for the kind of job he did. Said Dumke, "there are always people who

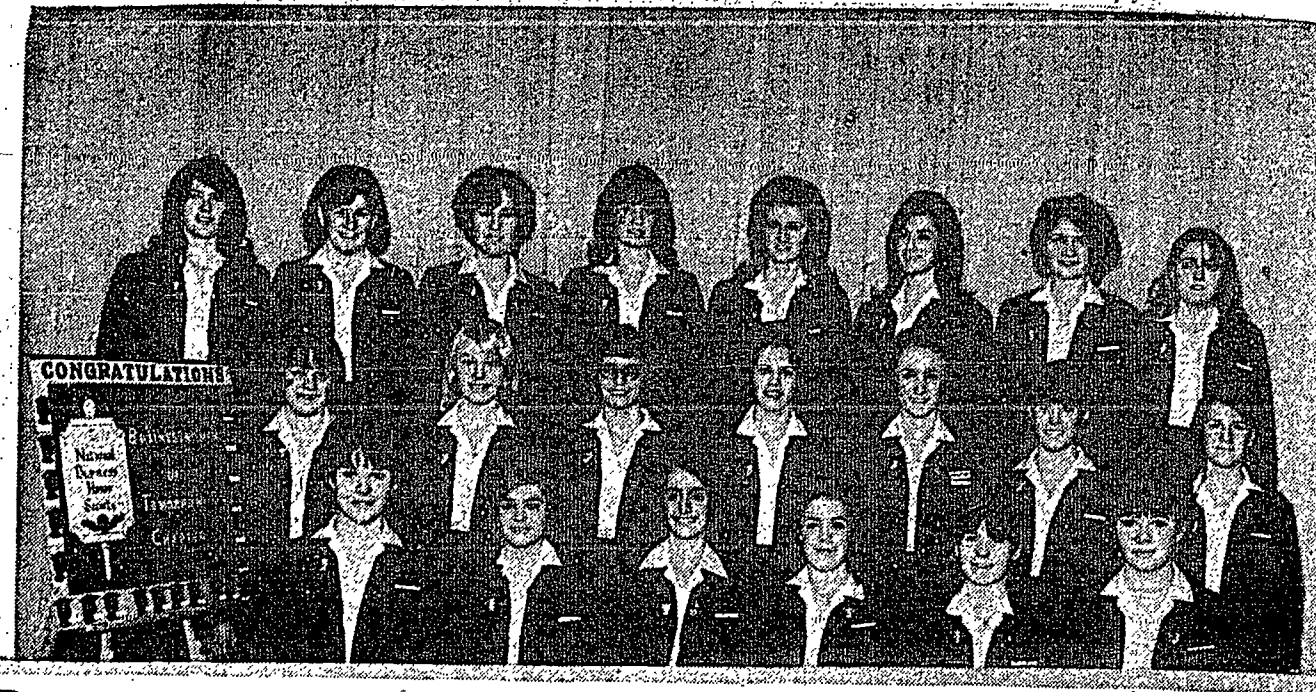

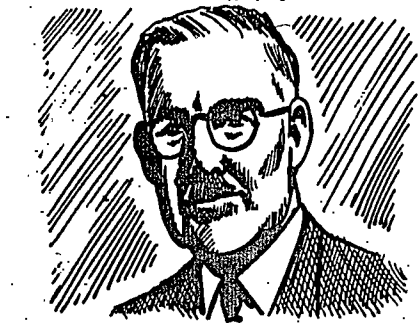

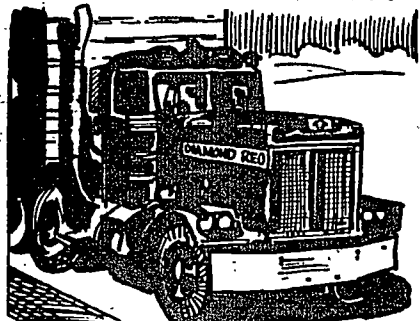

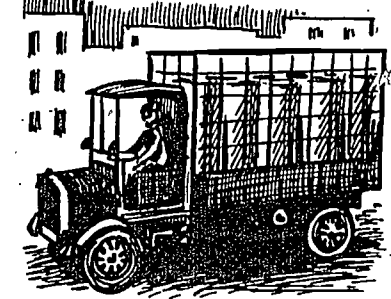

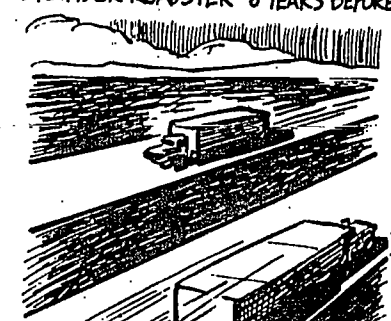

many conflicting stories we've heard the American Legion originally received \$7,000 for a youth center. The group is not involved, but rather one of its members, Chuck O'Grady has carried the ball in forming the teen center. Using the Niles Days money he spent about \$4,000 for the stores and as of now, the operation of the center cannot be considered a success. According to the reports more than 40% of Niles Days money for the coming year is committed to the center, though there is much resistance to giving the money for such an unproven activity.

The third group, the Niles Youth Commission, is a village-sponsored group which is looking at the broad spectrum of youth activities and problems, interesting itself in a program of summer job placement, juvenile problems and concerning itself with overall youth needs in Niles.

Several months ago the Youth Commission surveyed more than 1,000 teens and submitted general recommendations, which unfortunately seemed to be ignored by the teen groups. The Commission suggested the teen center should work with the park district, should have a defined direction and purpose, seek to increase its very limited enrollment and create by-laws which the group could use. According to one Commission member the Teen Center group had no experienced

personnel, and dealing with teen groups requires trained people to deal with their needs. After these many months it's reported the teen center group has just hired a person to oversee its program.

The question of the location of the Teen Center near merchants who are not too happy with its presence, and in a corner of Niles which requires private transportation to the Center has made its success difficult.

The Youth-Commission member also said O'Grady had initially talked about 200 to 300 teens being highly enthusiastic about such a program but at their recent by-law meeting 30 children were in attendance and 15 pre-teens walked out of the meeting leaving only 15 members left to vote on the new laws. Considering the many thousands of dollars expended and the few teens involved the program as yet has not proven itself. And the likelihood of it being continued is dependent on the coming year's Niles Days funds.

O'Grady, who has been aptly described by one person we spoke to, as a being like bull in a chinapop, is a well-meaning guy who was responsible for the wonderful Niles Days parade three years ago. But according to our Youth Commission correspondent, it

takes well-trained experienced people to work out a teen program.

Last week at the park board meeting Leske made it plain the park director "Butch" Peterson was the number one man in charge of its program. He is a graduate in this field and will have the backing of most of the park board to run the show there in the future.

It seems the Youth Commission recommendations that the park district be in the youth recreation picture, and that experienced personnel handle this very vexing problem may be resolved in Peterson's new-found authority.

The Youth Commission has some very able people doing some very heavy work in this field. Combining their talents with the park district's talent, experience and facilities, would seem the answer to what up to now has been a pretty sticky wicket.

District 67 Kindergarten Registration Lower Than Last Year

The number of children registering for fall kindergarten is lower this spring in School District 67.

In the two days of sign-up during the first week in May, a total of 162 5-year-olds checked in for future kindergarten classes.

Last year, 233 young ones were registered at a comparable time. This means a drop of 71.

For kindergarten classes at Golf Grade School, 65 are enrolled to start this fall. Nine of them are from the village of Golf, 23 from Glenview and 33 from Morton Grove.

For classes at Hynes Grade School, the total is 97. Fifty-four are from Niles and 43 from Morton Grove.

According to District 67 Supt. William Stout, school officials are now evaluating this new enrollment in terms of what it means to the community served

This decline in enrollment continues a lowering trend shown last year.

Kindergarten registration is a significant portent in public school population. It indicates what may be class size for the grades in later school years.

Tickets for the 1967 event, sponsored by the Maine Township Regular Republican Organization, are \$3 per person. They include admission to the park, a smorgasbord dinner, a full night of harness racing and door prizes.
