Fire Lawyer In Tam O'Shanter Case

Plaintiffs in a Circuit court suit challenging the rezoning of the southern two-thirds of the former Tam O'Shanter golf course to make way for an industrial park have fired their lawyer. According to the Chicago Tribune, the action followed their refusal to accept his recommendation to abandon the case and accept an out-of-court settlement from one of the defendants.

John Biestek of Biestek & Facchini, 120 W. Madison st., appeared before Judge John Lupe at 2 p.m. Wednesday in Circuit court and asked to be relieved of the case. His request was granted.

Biestek also announced that

5 of the original 14 plaintiffs asked that their names be dropped from the complaint. Those removing their names were Mr. and Mrs. Karl Honold, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Glos, and Dominique Nocchi.

Case Is Continued

Representatives of the other nine plaintiffs appeared before

Judge Lupe and got the case continued until 2 p.m. July 3. They were instructed by the judge to seek new counsel immediately and were told there would be no further continuance for any reason.

Last September the 14 residents filed a suit against the village of Niles and J. Emil

Anderson & Son, Inc., 1809 Balmoral av., objecting to a village board zoning changing the Anderson-owned Tam O'Shanter property from residential to light manufacturing.

In letters to the plaintiffs dated May 26, Biestek said he

Mid-Month Meanderings

Despite the loss of the North Shore Junior College Referendum Saturday, the idea for a college district here might actually have been given a boost. Maine Township is presently exploring the creation of a junior college district and their combining Maine with the Niles and Glenbrook areas might result in a successful passage of a joint district. The Evanston area overwhelmingly opposed the college district idea Saturday leading the way for its downfall. Combining Glenbrook, which favored the idea, plus including Maine and Niles Townships, which already have a common bond politically, might result in the much-needed college here.

It's no consolation to those who were clobbered by the flood, but news reports mentioned Saturday night's rain was the worst flash storm the Chicagoland area has experienced in 100 years.

Courtland Park, in north Niles, was walked by the torrential rains and Chesterfield Gardens in the Dempster-Shermer area was literally swamped by the heavy downfall. Residents called to tell us of autos floating downstream in the Carol Avenue area. Cars were bumping into each other, like sticks of wood, as they floated away.

We live a block from Courtland Park and the toll there was equal to most areas. Sewers on the Niles-Morton Grove border were so overwhelmed by the sudden surge of water they backed their worst sewage into

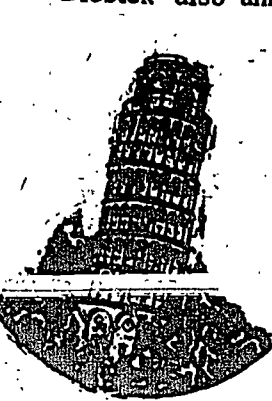

Defeat Jr. College District

The proposed North Shore Junior College district was defeated Saturday by a vote of 6,786 to 4,382.

Voters in Niles Township rejected the bid by 1,000 to 859 while Evanston voters overwhelmingly opposed it, 2,781 to 743. An organized group, the Evanston Taxpayers Assoc., actively campaigned against the issue, distributing more than 3,000 circulars in its successful effort to defeat the proposal.

Voters in three of six high school districts favored the issue: Lake Forest-Lake Bluff, Highland Park-Deerfield and Glenbrook.

\$75,000 Red Lantern Fire Had Water Problem

During the peak of Saturday evening's storm Niles Fire Department was battling a fire which gutted the Red Lantern Inn in the unincorporated area in the triangle of Golf, Milwaukee and Greenwood Streets. Fifty to 60 firemen fought the blaze which cost an estimated \$75,000 damage and was hampered by a water problem caused by a power shortage. Fire hoses had to be extended across

Chesterfield, Courtland Pk. Inundated

A once-in-a-hundred-year rain deluged the north Chicagoland area Saturday wreaking misery on thousands of homeowners in a deluge reminiscent of a flash storm in July, 1957, which inundated the area.

In Niles more than 2,000 homes had water in basements with as much as 7 feet of water

While canoes were floating down Grennan Heights streets, and life rafts were being used in other parts of Niles the Chesterfield Garden and Courtland Park areas were the hardest hit in Niles.

Reports from Chesterfield told of water smashing basement windows with such fury they quickly became inundated. The speed of the water filled basements, to the ceiling. Stairs of a piano floating upside down in lower floor rooms, of colored TV's being rendered useless and ending on the morning-after junk piles were common. Bi-level homes, not fortunate enough to have basements, had as much as 5 feet of water.

Eye-witnesses reported the water ran down Carol Street similar to a rapids and the current became so great by the time it wound up in National Avenue it knocked down all in its path. Three to four feet of water caused cars to float about the area banging into one another. Like toy autos one man was reported saved from drowning by being pulled thru his car window after the

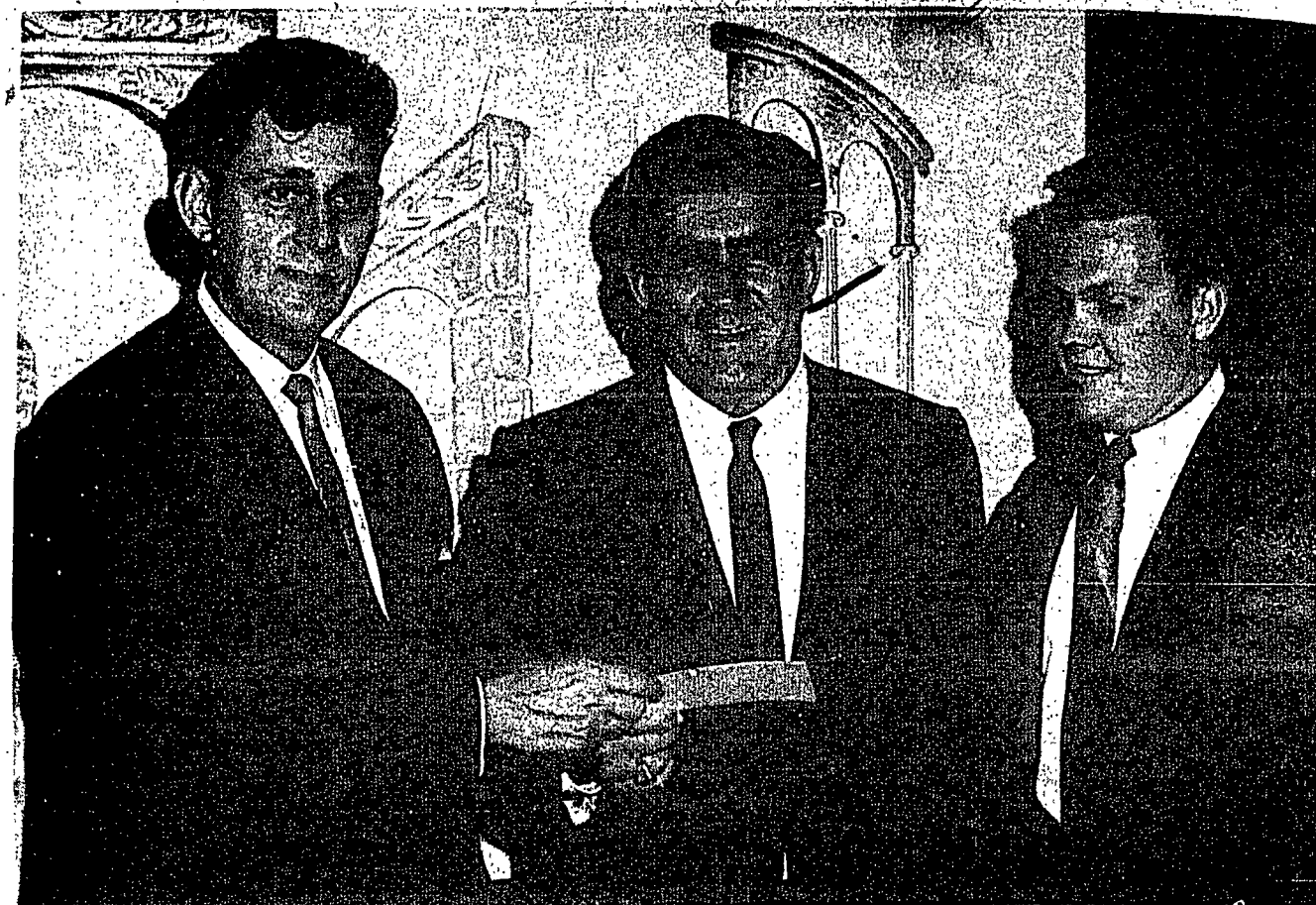

Rain Blitz Hero; A Guy Called Bob

As the rain cascaded down on Saturday eve of June 10th, flooding and floating everything and everyone caught in its surging path, Nilesites once more rallied to the cause. A while after the night of the storm had abated, Nilesite Ben Mankowsky accompanied by his wife attempted to return to his home from a function they had been attending, Mr. Mankowsky-Vice Chairman Niles Safety Commission - valiantly tried to steer his flooding car down Milwaukee Avenue. It was getting mighty hot, and he finally floated it into Bob's Gulf Service Station on 8401 Milwaukee Avenue. Here he discovered many people sheltering in what appeared to be a safety oasis in a sea of water.

Bob of Bob's Gulf Service - no one ever had time to ask him his full name - was already busy dispensing help to people pedestrians soaked to the waist, others struggling in with flooded cars, and more people elderly men and women and children, some who had forsaken their water logged cars down Milwaukee Avenue. Mankowsky said he remained at the service station "oasis" for some three hours. During that time Bob and three or four teenage helpers towed in abandoned cars, dried them out and cleaned them refusing all payment from the grateful owners. "Just try and get some of these

pedestrians to their homes," was all that Bob asked in return for his services. Mr. Mankowsky reported that some 75 to 100 persons sought shelter in the Service Station, and that Bob, towed in at least 25 cars.

Many of the people were strangers passing through Niles to Wheeling and Mount Prospect. Two clergy men en route to a Commencement stranded in the flooded street, took refuge in Bob's Gulf Service Station inquired, "Which way is Mount Prospect?"

Volunteer Talent Pool; Valuable Part Of Community

Mr. McGuigan told of his grandfather who asked him why he was unhappy and he replied that he had to read Shakespeare and he didn't like it. Before the boy realized it his grandfather was reciting for memory the very thing that young McGuigan had to learn bringing the subject alive and making it exciting. 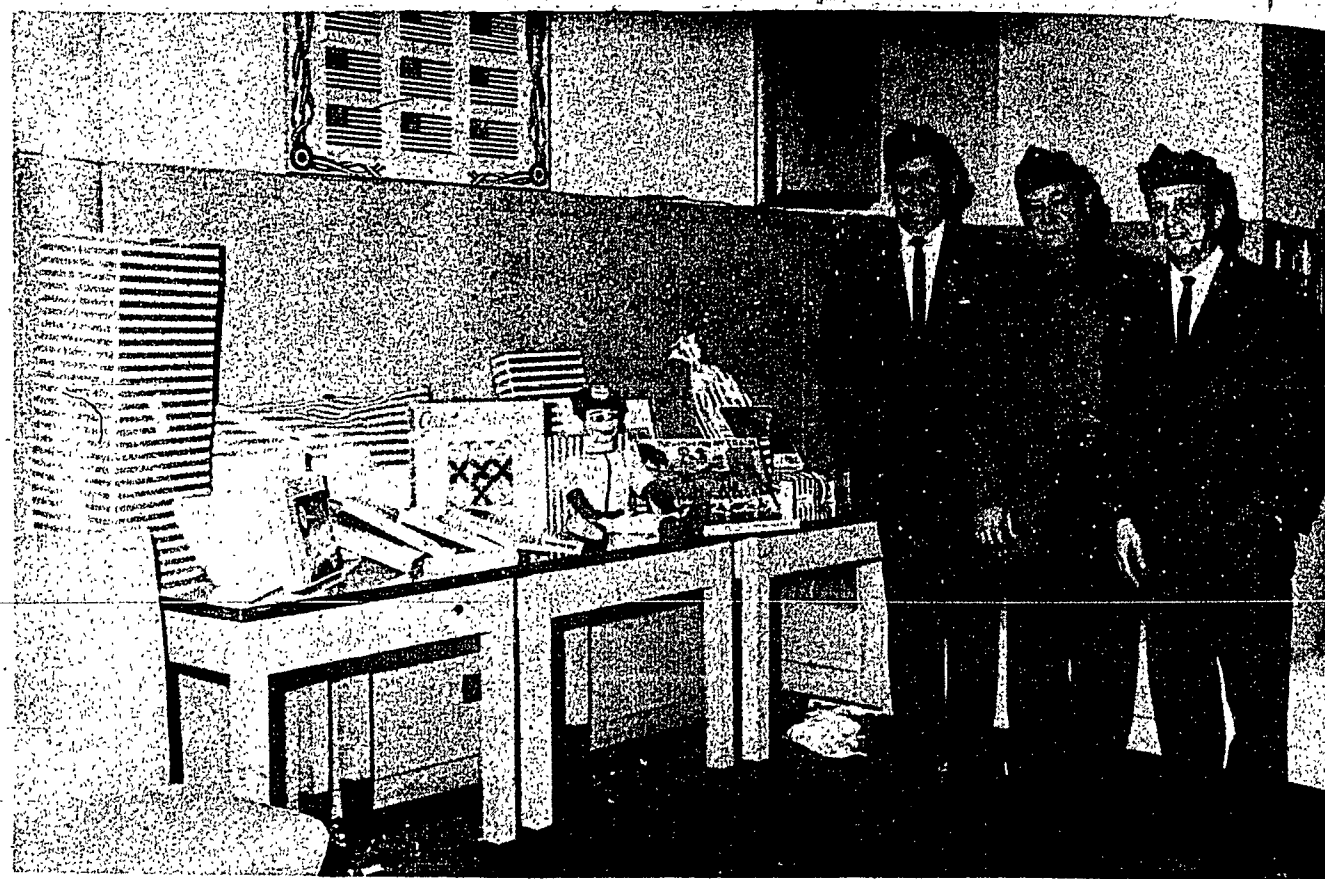
Henry Aronson also announced that Flo Krumske, captain of the famous Gossard girls' Team National Champions, is conducting similar classes for the women, at the same time.

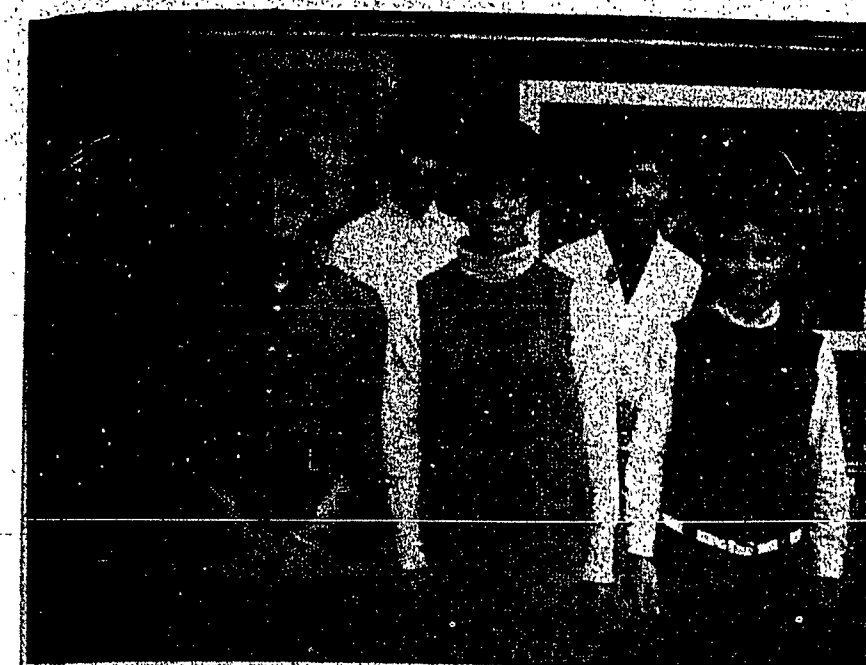

many of our neighbor's homes.

Back in 1957 a similar storm played its havoc in similar fashion during the month of July. And the same feeling of helplessness overtook the natives who stood by and watched the waters flood the basements and first floors of many homes. In those days the area across from the Grennan Heights Park and their first floors invaded by water several times. When Niles managed to tie its storm sewers into the large sewers on Milwaukee Avenue, Oakton Manor and Grennan Heights received immediate relief, which has since aided these areas during these past years. According to public officials the connection under Milwaukee Ave. was done very discreetly when a large sewer coming from Arlington Heights was sent under Milwaukee Avenue. While the legality of such action was never clearly defined.

Running storm water into pipes meant only for sewage water was verbally resisted by County and State authorities but the connection, having been accomplished, was allowed to remain.

Once again Niles Public Works Department deserves a mention for the "above and beyond" job they did during the flood period. When the rains came the entire department, 32 men plus 5 part time employees, came in Saturday night and worked into the Sunday morning hours. They then returned all day Sunday and have been starting two hours earlier during the week.

In Chesterfield Gardens North Goodman reported residents there were much impressed and thankful at the job they did Sunday morning bringing in pumps to aid the much-beleaguered residents.

Monday the department had 6 trucks and 3 tractors hauling away the refuse. It's taken to

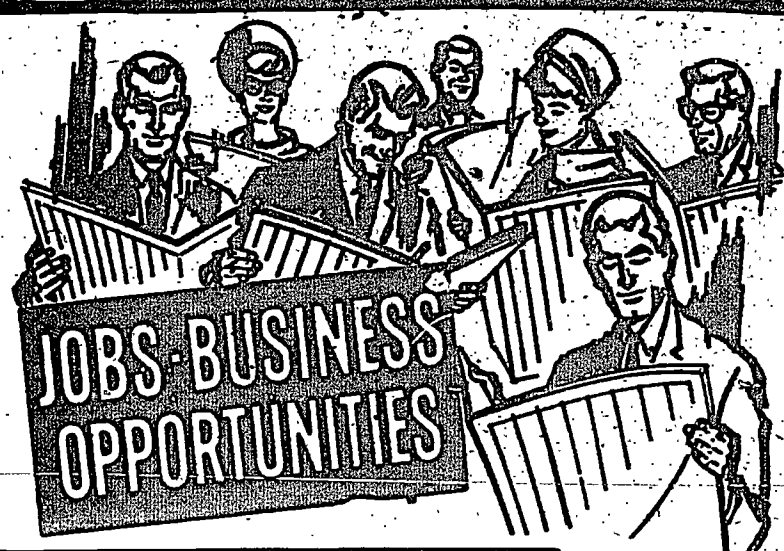

THE STORY OF FATHER'S DAY



While more than 50,000,000 Dads in the U.S. will be honored by their families on Father's Day, June 18, 1967, with a wide variety of gifts ranging from a box of fine cigars to a bottle of aftershave lotion—many might be surprised to learn how far back the custom of paying special respects to fathers goes, and how our own custom of observing Father's Day began.

The first "father of his country" was not George Washington, surprisingly, but Julius Caesar. And Roman senators were called *patres* or "fathers."

The first Father's Day in the U.S. was celebrated in Spokane, Washington, in 1910; Mrs. John B. Dodd wished to honor her father, William B. Smart, a Civil War Veteran, for his love and sacrifices in raising six motherless children.

Mrs. Dodd saw the observance of Father's Day as a good way to call attention to

the father's place in the home ... training the children ... safeguarding the marriage tie ... and the protection of womanhood and childhood.

She went to her minister, and through him to the Spokane Ministerial Association, and also wrote a letter to the Spokane Ministers Alliance which received her suggestion favorably. It was the Spokane YMCA which put the idea into active motion.

A Father's Day button was pressed in the White House by President Wilson in 1916, and it was President Coolidge who recommended national observance of the day in 1924.

Today, U.S. fathers receive more than \$1 billion in gifts each Father's Day. Among the most popular are those items which contribute to Dad's pleasure and relaxation. Many Pops receive their favorite brand of fine cigars on Father's Day—an especially fitting gift, since it was Pop who gave out the cigars when Junior was born!

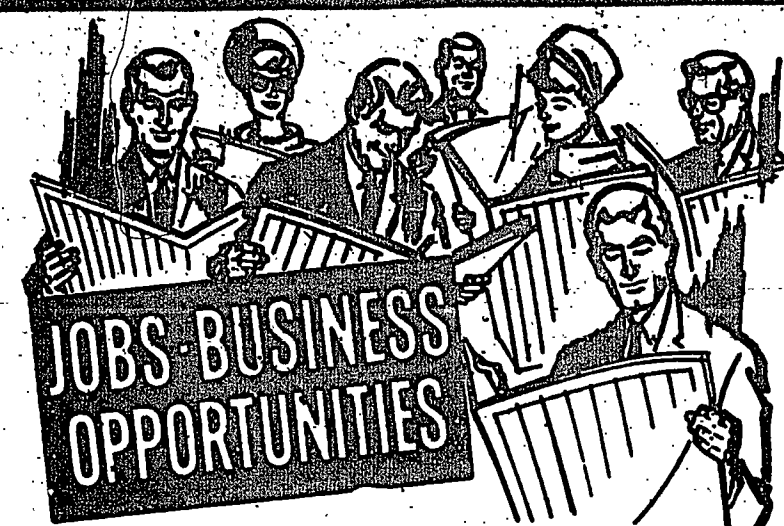

for gas and electric shut-offs.
Niles Fire Department had 38
men on duty during the crisis
period.

The Red Lantern fire-fighting

when a power failure prevented

were extended 1200 feet to Niles

could be poured on the fire.

ded to assure enrollment.

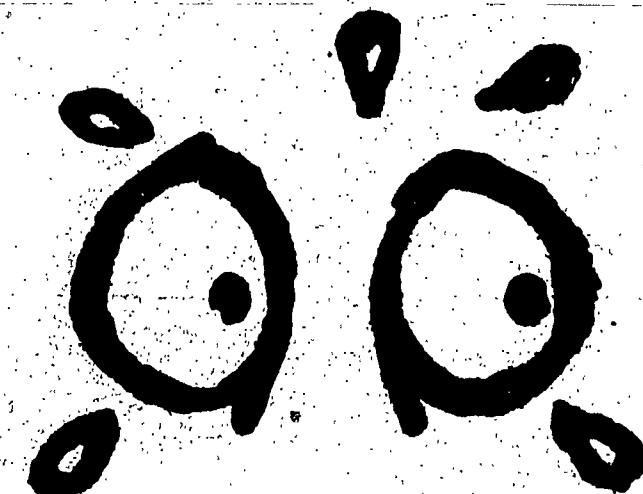

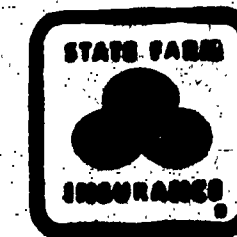
