Tell Terms of Offer

In the settlement , Anderson proposed to pay \$20,000. to the Niles park district "for capital improvements in the name of the plaintiffs," \$5,000 more to the park district for construction of a baseball diamond in forest preserve land west of the Tam O'Shanter property, and "a reimbursement of \$5,600 for costs of the suit" to the plaintiffs.

The park district had filed an earlier suit against the Anderson company attempting to condemn the entire golf course property for municipal use. The suit was turned down in court.

"We weren't looking for a settlement when we filed the suit, and we aren't now." said Mrs. Thomas Dieschbourg. 7006 Lexington lane, Niles, one of the plaintiffs who appeared in court. "The suit was an attempt to change the zoning back. not one to get money from or

"And our expenses to date are not \$5,600," Mrs. Diesch-bourg said. "They are half that \$2.800.

Niles Park District is entering an agreement with the village police department to have its parks manned 24 hours a day at a cost of \$13,000 annually. Prior to this year the park district patrolled its own parks about 5 hours nitely during the three-month summer period at a cost of about \$6,000. Now, the park district will have the services of the entire village police force which includes the juvenile officer on an all-year-round basis.

In past years the silly conflicts between the park district and the village were in part due to the park district's jealously resisting any use of village services because of the fear the park district's author-ity might somehow be usurped. Only recently park commis-sioner Ray Eagan had mentioned he wasn't interested in Mayor Blase having his finger in any park actions, a typical cry of the picyaunish attitude of those who were more interested in their own authority, rather than in the welfare of the park dis-

Obviously, the 24 hour police service is far more adequate than the part-time service previously used. And obviously, the elevation of Jack Leske to the presidency of the park district, with the support of Commissioners Jerry Sullivan and Mike Provenzano should improve park-village relations and make the park district a much-more workable unit, more beneficient to the wishes of the people it serves.

When Jack moved into the presidency he clearly outlined his approach for the coming year. Park recreation chief 'Butch'' Peterson and the rest of the park board were clearly informed Peterson was in charge of park activities and no undercutting of his authority would be tolerated.

Reuven, son of a gentle, scholarly teacher, was brought up with understanding, free discourse and enlightened guidance "it all started with a silly basebell game," Reuven Malter reminisced to his father. Reuvan was recalling the violent through the labyrinths of the softball game between his Torah-and life. yeshiva (Hebrew School) team and Danny Saunders' cohorts.

"The Chosen" is a book that should be read everywhere.

A PASSING THOUGHT: We read to learn. We read to live another way. We read to quench some blind and shocking fire. We read to weigh the worth of what we have done or hate to We read to share our awful secrets with someone we know will not refuse us. We read our way into the presence of great wisdom, vast and safe suffering, or into the untidy corners of another kind of life we fear to lead. With the book we can sin at a safe distance. With Maugham's artist in "The Moon and the Sixpence", we can discommit ourselves of family responsibility and burn our substance and our talent in bright colors on a tropic isle. But this is no child's play. In this kind of reading there is profit and loss and to take the one and sustain the other our prior investments in psychological and intellectual securities must have been considerable and sound. Our maturity must be high enough to warrant the title "adult".

While most Nilesites will write off this incident as vandalism, tactics of this sort indicate the need for BETTER HUMAN RELATIONS in Niles.

Even more important than this incident, which has possible racial overtones (and reported to Niles Police) is the apathy of Niles residents.

Apathy can be defined as indifference or lack of interest. Lack of interest in pertinent social and econimic questions can be understood. After all, a Fair Housing law doesn't affect melli Also, a lack of interest can be accepted as a fair excuse because this is really a moral question, and not necessarily a concern of

Yes, we can have a lack of interest (as evidenced by all those who didn't attend the meeting) in this topic; however, let's hope it's a genuine lack of interest and not fear! Fear .. that we might find out that Fair Housing Opportunity benefits us possibly more so than the minority groups. Fear... that the myths and tales we've

are not true. Fear ... that they're not only as good as, but possibly better than, we

If we fear this and don't take time to find out if we're right or wrong if we don't discuss our beliefs with others, if we prefer to live alone and not bother about the rest of our environment, then we shouldn't be surprised if more than firecrackers are heard at your next open meeting of the Niles Human Relations Council.





and a golden ager's dream come f true in diversified recreation areas. Some were small. others medium to extensive, but all were adequate for their designed purpose. Comm. Schreiner pointed out the extensive use of concrete and cobblestones, many colored, with a view to eliminating maintenance. The concrete and cobblestone areas were embroidered with trees encased with guarding mesh, and in some instances low concrete bordered, flower beds bedecked areas set privately for the older generation. Each facility was designed with the age group in mind.

Childrens playgrounds varied from wooden huts.
