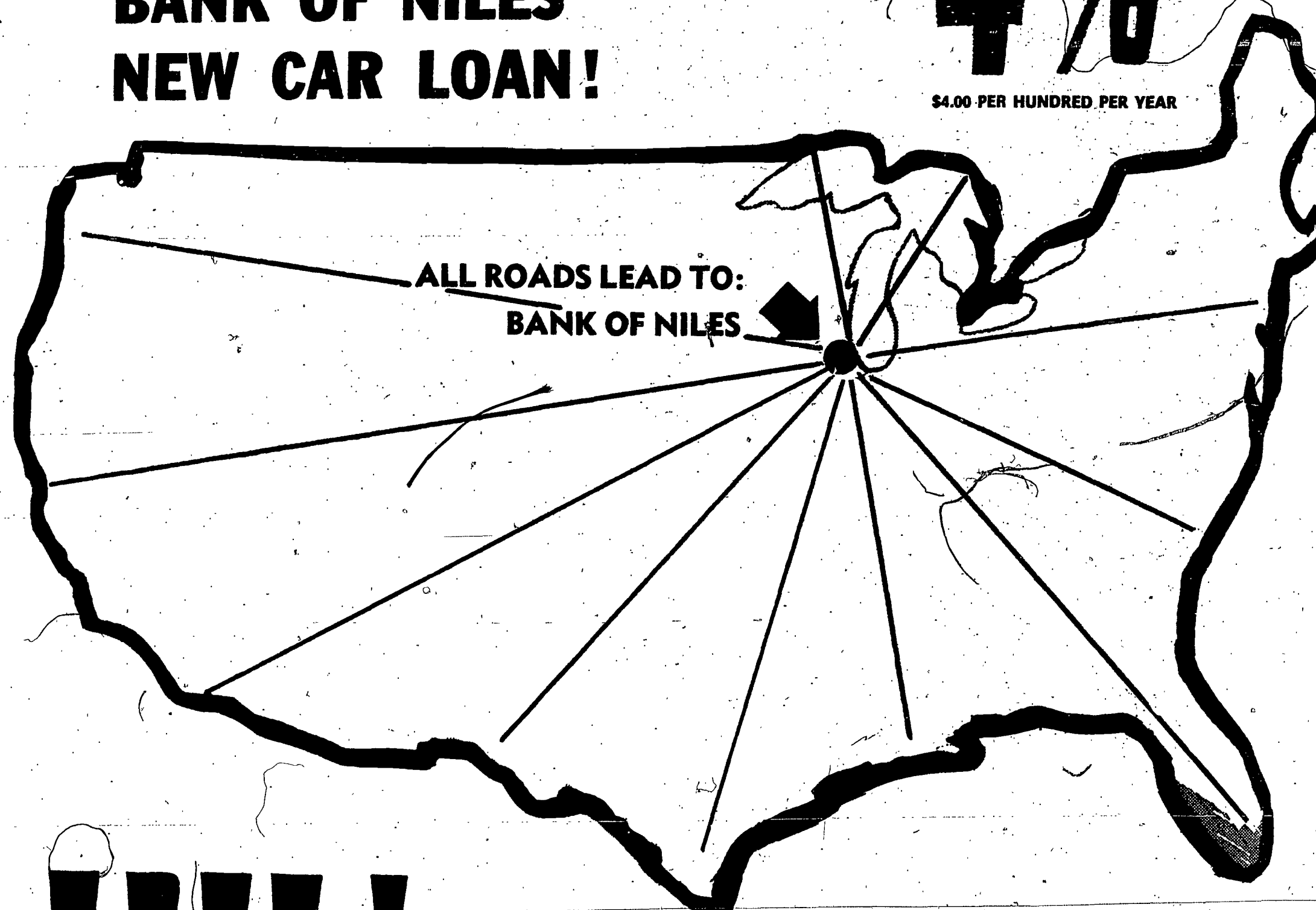

Sales Tax Increased To 5% Beginning August 1

Niles will follow the lead of most cities and villages in Illinois by tacking on a 1/4 cent sales tax to the present 4 3/4 cent bill which will become effective August 1. The \$200,000 to \$250,000 extra revenue for Niles will be used to replace part of residents, village pro-

perty tax (about \$20) which will reduce the average money from property tax coming into the village from \$40 to \$20 per homeowner.

Trustee Ken Scheel, head of Niles Finance Committee told THE BUGLE Monday a home with assessed valuation of \$10,

000 pays about \$40 of its real estate bill for village taxes.

Niles presently receives 1/2 cent of the sales tax bill. When the legislature took off the lid on the former tax in June it raised the state tax by 1/4 cent and allowed cities and villages

to increase a like amount beginning August 1.

Niles presently receives about \$500,000 annually from its present 1/2 cent tax and the increase will enable the village to receive a total of \$700,000 to \$800,000 in the

coming year.

The passage of the new village tax in July will enable trustees to reduce the present village tax levy of .408 per \$100 assessed valuation enabling Nilesites to receive their property tax reduction with next year's tax bill.

From The Left Hand

The Battle of The Budget in rapidly-expanding suburbs such as ours is a problem which increases with the years. The problem of how to hold down tax bills while providing adequate services has many realists believing outlying suburbs may be forced to become annexed into the central city.

No greater example of trying to provide for villagers with the least possible pain is illustrated in Niles tax jockeying the past couple of years. When the village added a \$15 to \$20 utility tax to your bills the thinking was industry and renters would aid the village in its tax problems. When first the 1/2 cent and now the additional 1/4 cent sales tax is added to your everyday bills the village said outsiders shopping in Niles would be paying about 80% sales tax which is returned to the village.

With the new 1/4 cent sales tax increase to take effect August 1 Niles could have eliminated the utility tax. But rather than lose the revenue from industry and renters it was felt a property tax reduction would be preferable.

Whether the economics of such action is sound, or if the countering of one tax with a reduction in another area is merely political fluff is something you'll have to determine for yourself. But politicking or not, the problem of finding revenue for ever-increasing salaries and services becomes one which merits our concern. The burden of mounting school taxes plus the problem of trying to keep our state afloat without a state income tax is reaching a point of no return... or more appropriately, its moment of truth.

The new president of the Youth Commission is Bill Sterling, a guy with a great deal to offer. Bill was one of about a dozen candidates for the park board two years ago finishing just out of the money.

\$2,655,429 Approved Tuesday

Village officials passed the appropriation ordinance Tuesday night increasing it about \$333,000 from last year to an all-time high of \$2,655,429.

Finance chairman Ken Scheel explained at a later forum which followed the meeting the village receives only about \$45 from a tax bill of \$644.29 for village purposes. Since trustees also approved a 1/4 per cent raise in sales tax effective August 1, Niles will re-coup about \$250,000 from the new tax enabling property tax bills be cut back \$15 to \$20 per homeowner.

At the after-meeting public forum Scheel gave graphic illustrations by use of charts showing the increase in personnel in the three public bodies plus the village clerk's office and the increase in equipment for the larger village, pointing to the upward trend of these services and supplies, all which Scheel said cost money. "You

Progress Reports Made On Maine Twp. Junior College

Members of the Maine Township Junior College Study Committee met on Thursday evening, June 22nd, at Maine East High School for the purpose of listening to reports of sub-committees which have been conducting surveys, contacting businesses and industries, and local citizens and students of the Maine Township area. The meeting was open to the public.

Mr. James Forkins, Des Plaines, Chairman of the Study Committee, indicated that he was surprised at the continued interest in this community project due to the recent defeat of the referendum in the North Shore Junior College area.

Mr. Richard J. Cronin, Des Plaines, Vice Chairman of the Research and Survey committee stated that questionnaires had been recently distributed among 3,875 juniors and seniors at Maine East, South and West Notre Dame High School for Boys and St. Patrick's Academy for Girls.

Students being surveyed were

asked the following questions: Are you planning on continuing your education beyond high school? 1,741 juniors said yes, 276 said no; 4 said maybe. 1,553 seniors said yes, 283 said no; 6 maybe. If no, is it because of financial reasons? 53 juniors said yes and 233 said no, 34 seniors said yes and 249 said no. Do you intend to go to a junior college? 123 juniors said definitely yes, 112 said no; 776 said maybe; 143 seniors said definitely yes; 1,347 said no; 311 said maybe. If Maine Township affiliated with a junior college within ten miles of your home or established its own junior college, would this cause you to feel more favorably inclined to attend, assuming the junior college would provide the type of program you desired? 1,030 juniors said yes; 942 said no; 10 maybe. 871 seniors said yes; 900 said no; 3, maybe.

Mr. Dan Sullivan, Chairman of the sub-committee on finance stated that the school district could count on approximately 75 % financial aid from the

State for building costs if the district were to decide to move on its own and that additional funds could be raised by issuing bonds at a rate of 5% of assessed valuation. Mr. Sullivan further commented that \$11.50 per student, for each semester hour available, could be counted on from additional State financial support.

Mr. Sullivan concluded his report by stating that the "big if" remained in what the Federal government would and could do to financially support the Junior College proposal.

Mr. Charles Wayman, sub-committee chairman of the committee on Public and Community Relations, indicated that his committee had met several times and would have a more complete report of action at the next general committee meeting to be held within the next six weeks.

Audience questions and suggestions were considered by members of the committee after

a viewing of a filmstrip, "Who Should Go To A Community College?"

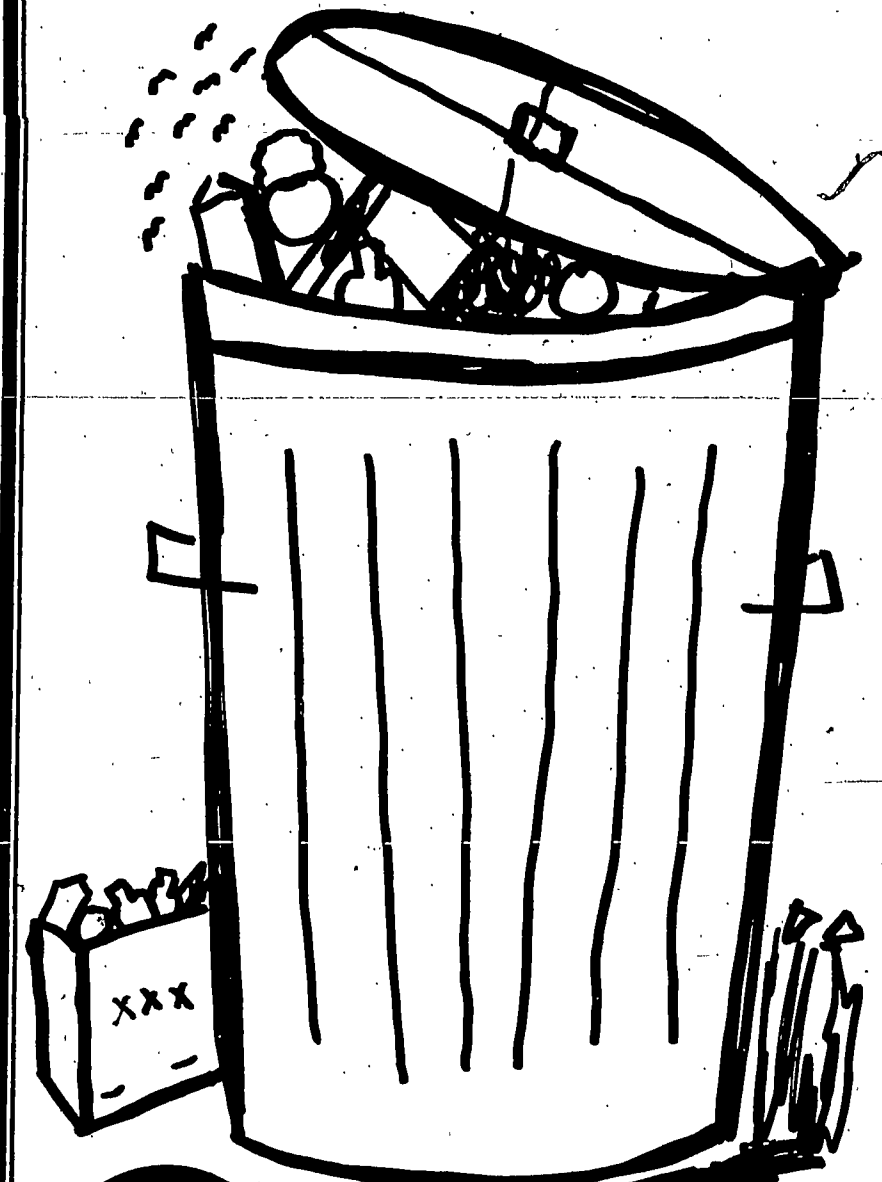

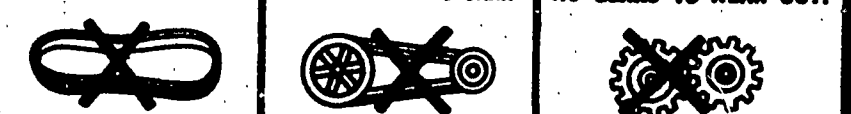

A federal grant of \$364,890 has been awarded Township High School District #207 to establish a learning center for the development of reading and communications potential, according to E. Hoy McConnell, Park Ridge, Board of Education President.

The proposal to initiate the center was recently approved by the United States Office of Education. The \$364,890 grant will fund the program for its first year of operation which will begin September of 1967.

Over a three year period, as officially sanctioned by the Office of Education, the project will provide a model program designed to prescribe and furnish corrective and remedial training for students experiencing all levels of difficulty in reading and communication. Services ranging from classroom help to a complete multi-disciplinary diagnosis will be offered public and parochial school students of Maine Township.

The major objectives of the program are: (1) to provide a successful model program, K-12 for furnishing remediation and therapy to children experiencing any degree of reading and communication difficulties through a multi-disciplinary diagnosis, prescriptive teaching, and consultative services; (2) to provide in-service training to increase teacher competence in helping disabled learners; (3) to provide an effective counseling program for parents of children with learning difficulties; (4) to reclaim drop-outs by using the remedial and therapeutic services of the Center and a work-

study program.

According to Dr. Richard R. Short, Superintendent of High School District #207, the director of the program will be Dr. Thomas V. Telder, Dr. Telder, presently an assistant professor of education at Northern Illinois University, DeKalb,

will assume his new duties early in August.

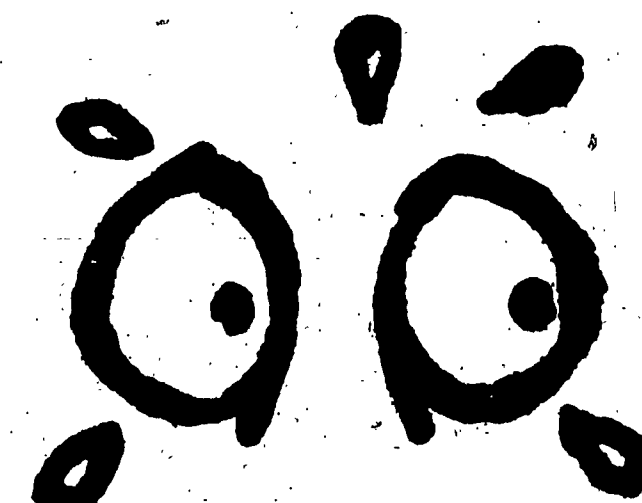

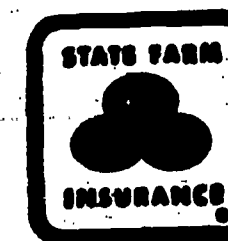

Cleveland Ave. resident Mr. Heins was told the change in disposal pick-up was due to aiding the refuse company which has had a difficult time disposing of the refuse.

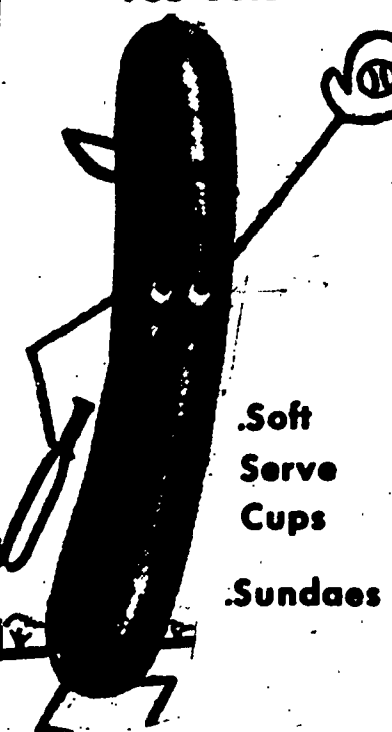
A \$6,000 village plan will aid flooding conditions in the 8400 Oak St. area.

District #63 Awarded Grant For In-Service Program

A federal grant of a third of a million dollars has been awarded to East Maine School District No. 63 to pilot a three-year in-service teaching training program beginning next year.

The program will serve District 63 schools and public and parochial schools located within a 175 square mile area of northeastern Cook County and southeastern Lake County.

The in-service program, called Operation Bootstrap-Interweave, will utilize UHF television, WFLD - Channel 37, one hour a week to broadcast instruction to teachers in participating schools in the area. An hour and a half will then be devoted at each individual school to small group discussion and demonstrations related to the master lesson.

Letters were sent to the 201 public schools and more than 30 private and parochial schools in the UHF reception area, according to Dr. John Tobin, in addition to many industries and civic groups. The response from almost all was one of enthusiastic interest, he said.

District 63 will have the major responsibility for planning and executing the multi-district, in-service training program. The eight elementary schools of the district will serve as demonstration centers where in-service ideas may be observed.

Thirty-six hour-long master lessons in the areas of science, mathematics and social studies for grades kindergarten through six will be televised. The lessons will include lectures by national authorities, plus films and other information from research groups developing innovative teaching materials.

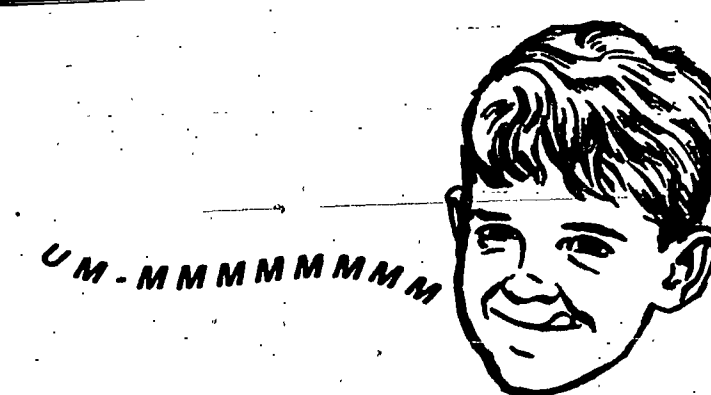
Operation Bootstrap-Interweave is an expansion of Operation Bootstrap in which District 63 is presently participating.

Nearly \$60,000 was funded this past year to pilot a weekly, in-service program for the district's own teachers. The in-service training was coordinated with the incorporation of innovative materials and teaching techniques in science, mathematics, social studies and language arts into the curriculum of the district's eight elementary schools. The schools have worked as teams - each team being responsible for planning one of the subject areas. Next year, materials selected from those examined this year will be introduced into all eight schools.

"Operation Bootstrap-Interweave is a project designed to disseminate the information we've developed this year in our pilot schools to all schools within our district and to other schools outside our district which can also benefit from this information," Hugh E. McGulgan, superintendent, says.

The Operation Bootstrap-Interweave weekly in-service program will be structured to increase teaching competence in the areas of science, mathematics and social studies with emphasis upon the inductive-experimental approach to instruction.

This approach is widely accepted. Continued on page 16

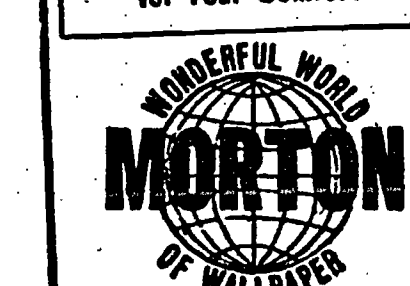
