Tobin points out, but the difficulty arises in successfully bringing it into a school system's curriculum. (The inductive-experiential approach is common to the innovative materials being developed in the areas of science, mathematics and social studies.) It attempts to involve children in the process of learning through participation, discovery and problem solving.)

The Bootstrap-Interweave in-service program is based on the belief that teacher training must be part of any plan to

upgrade instruction; that there must be interaction among teachers and scholars and meaningful activities and demonstration of ideas to create interest, understanding and security among teachers, in order to have genuine acceptance and application of a new curriculum, Superintendent McGuigan said.

The three director consultants (national experts), eight principals and 36 teachers from District 63 will plan the in-service lessons during a six-week summer program extending from July 5 to August 16.

Research groups to be utilized in preparing the in-service lessons include the University of Illinois Elementary Arithmetic Project (operating under the auspices of Educational Services, Inc.), American Book Company, Elementary Science Study and Minnemast Science Project, Social Studies Curriculum Center at Northwestern University, Northern Illinois Special Studies Center, Cooperative Educational Research Laboratory, Incorporated (CERL) and the Social Studies Project of Educational Services, Inc.

Water Pressure Tips

If you have been noticing low water pressure in any room in your home, the Niles Public Works Department recommends that residents remove and clean the strainers in the faucets to improve the water flow.

Water costs less than anything else you purchase, by gallon, cubic foot or any other weight or volume standard you may choose. This does not mean that you should overlook repairing those leaky water faucets or defective ball cocks. All leaks in your home should be repaired at once to save money on your water bill. To make a leak test in your home, turn off all faucets and watch the gallon hand on your water meter for ten minutes. If the hand continues to move, you will know you have a leak in a plumbing fixture. If you cannot locate the source of the leak call a licensed plumber to make the repairs. It is also a good practice to make a test of your water shut off valve next to the water meter to see that it works properly. In the event of a broken water pipe in your home, turning off this valve could save money in not having to replace household items that could get damaged by the water.

This will give a sharper than normal check on book stock that will be necessary for the most adequate coverage of current day questions and student assignments.

Since September of 1966 when the Library moved into its new quarters, somewhere in the neighborhood of 8000 books have been added up to mid-July of the present.

In the last week, another new innovation has been added to services: a coin-operated photocopier (ten cents a copy) for making duplicates of any written or printed material. This will be a do-it-yourself machine for the patrons.

Present 1st Disaster Loans Checks

The first of the disaster loan checks in the northwest suburban area as the result of the June 10 and 11 flooding was presented Monday morning to Mr. Mrs. Mathias J. Ulbert of South Harvey, Des Plaines, Thomas Gause, Regional Director, small business administration, with Mayor Herbehl of Des Plaines in attendance. The presentation was at the Ulbert's home.

Fifteen applications for disaster loan checks to cover damage not covered by insurance have been approved for processing by the Disaster Loans Officers. The checks were conducted over 100 interviews since establishing temporary offices at the Des Plaines Municipal Hall, June 11, and following that at the Arlington Heights Municipal Building and the Niles City Hall. An SBA loan officer will be in Arlington Heights on July 5 and 6, Telephone for appointment 253-2340; and in Des Plaines on July 7 and 8, telephone for appointment 824-3136.

Effective July 10, all disaster loan activities of the small business administration in the northwestern metropolitan area will be concentrated in Des Plaines on the 2nd floor of the First National Bank of Des Plaines Building, 733 Lee Street, Telephone 824-1000. Mayor Behrel and the Des Plaines redevelopment commission have made space available to the small business administration from their office quarters. Office hours will be 8:30 to 5:00 PM daily except Fridays 8:30 to 8:00 PM and Saturdays 8:30 to 12:00.

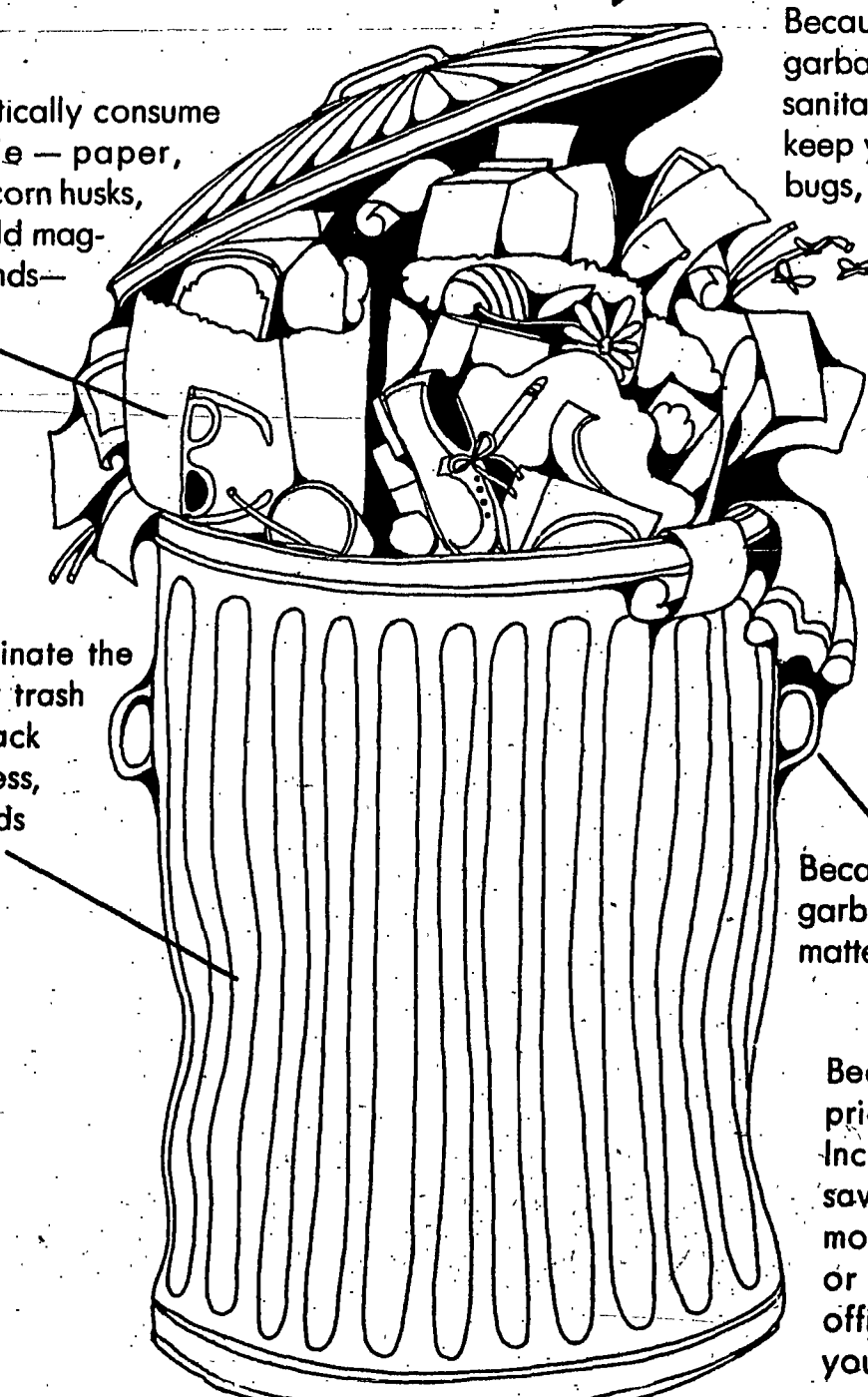

Niles Library Progress Report

The return of the annual Niles Days celebration offers a fine opportunity for the Board of Trustees of the Niles Public Library to present a progress report to the citizens of Niles. Since its establishment in 1957 as a volunteer library backed principally by the Women's Club of Niles, and the formal establishment as a District Library in 1958, the library has been a remarkable evidence of the civic interest of the people of Niles in their own cultural and intellectual development.

In less than ten years the people have built up for themselves an outstanding book collection of 40,000 carefully selected volumes housed in what has been acknowledged as one of the outstanding new library buildings in the country, truly a remarkable development in such a short time. This has been achieved through the efforts of hundreds of individuals and groups in the area.

Guided by the elected members of the Library Board of Trustees who have worked industriously without thought of any reward other than the realization of a worthwhile job well done for the benefit of their fellow citizens, the building of this library has progressed. Careful husbanding of its funds plus a generous donation from the Niles Days Committee made it possible for the Board to purchase land for the new building in 1964. Passage of a bond

issue and receipt of a federal grant under the Library Services and Construction Act produced the money needed for construction, and now the new building stands as a living monument to the civic pride and intellectual achievement of the people of Niles.

Among the many notable features of the new building is the very fine audio visual equipment including motion picture projectors, stereo and high fidelity phonograph, tape and radio equipment, obtained by another gift presented through the Friends of the Library by the Niles Days Committee.

Many smaller gifts from individuals and groups have helped in the rapid development of the library. Such groups as the Friends of the Library, the Lions Club, the Rotary Club, Niles Art Guild, Clara Blase Memorial, have given notable assistance; and gifts of books from individuals far too numerous to name have helped to build up a very fine collection. Frequently the library staff is asked why the shelves look so empty. The answer is twofold: first most of those empty shelves will be filled by new acquisitions over the next several years; second, and especially important, a tremendous increase in library use keeps at least one third of the books out in circulation practically all the time. It might be said that the most active and useful library is an empty library, for then the materials are all in use and library's big problem is to keep up with the demand. Every citizen of the Library District is invited to help present the library with this problem. It is one the library welcomes.

Nilesites Chesterfield Homeowners Told How To Seek Flood Loans

The Chesterfield Estates Homeowners Association held a meeting July 12 in the Niles Council Chambers. The subject was the need for new sewers and to discuss loans made available through the Small Business Administration.

Thomas Gaus and C. W. Sydenstricker, representing the S.B.A., told the group in attendance how to go about applying for a loan. "These loans, explained Mr. Gaus, are geared up to 30 years for repayment and are designed to restore you to pre-disaster condition." Loans will be given on the basis of each individual's ability to re-pay. In order for those renting to receive a loan, they must present a financial statement, plus a list of goods damaged due to flooding, with an estimate of their present value. If damage was to the structure, tiles, walls, etc., you must present a contractor's estimate for repairs indicated. They will be notified from 10 days to two weeks whether the loan is being granted.

Asked if an appraiser is sent, our Gaus replied "yes in order to verify damage."

Does the party have to replace each identical item," asked a member of the audience.

"In many cases we make out a joint check to you and the contractor to make sure you are not being overcharged," replied Gaus. "And if proceeds are used for any other purpose it becomes a misapplication of funds."

in Des Plaines between the hours of 8:30 and 5:00 Monday through Saturday.

Village Engineer, George Anderson explained, "after studying the Chesterfield sewer system, the Engineering Department offers the four following recommendations and if accepted will minimize the tremendous volume of water as that which hit our village the first 15 minutes on June 10th. 1.- Possibility of backup and overflow of storm sewers during a prolonged rainfall of moderate intensity could be reduced by widening and clearing of the natural ditch at the terminus of the sewer system located near Nation and Greenleaf. This would, in effect, create a retention basin that could safely hold water and slowly discharge it through the small

Heights, and Ballard Park. Other representatives were from the Notre Dame area and the Trailer Camp area.

The subject under discussion was the comprehensive planning study of the Niles Park District prepared by the firm of Alper and Alper, Architects of Chicago. Mr. Alper demonstrated with color slides, areas for acquisition, present park areas to be improved, and proposed future recreation facilities designed to accommodate new phases in recreation to suit all age groups. A future development of a planned and marked bikeway system for youth and adults covering the entire Niles area.

Were those present, for it or against it? It would appear that some folk "crying havoc" nevertheless found some points which incurred their favor. Mr. and Mrs. Richard Heins, questioned the necessity of obtaining architects to explore the recreational needs of the community, when through "self participation" the people could have investigated and reported from their respective areas. Nevertheless Mrs. Heins was in complete agreement with the architects' proposal for separate park areas for older adult population. "It would be nice to have somewhere to go and meet with our friends," she said. Mr. William Sterling, president - Niles Youth Commission felt that a Recreation consultant could have investigated the needs of the community, this was what he had been educated in.

Other folk wanted to know if the new parks in their areas would have to include its use by people outside their area.

In the Ballard Park development, Mrs. Florence Stupka, 9000 Cumberland objected to the size of the area to be involved. Owner of a six flat building she reported that the already small parking area in the vicinity of the building would be jeopardized.

Mr. Ray Devlin, Oak Street, Ballard Park, objected to the use of the School District 63 land being incorporated in the Ballard Park recreation development plan. He stated that the adjoining junior high school was having a capacity problem, and the land should be used for school room expansion. He was against a swimming pool project but was all in favor of a Recreation building and football field.

Mr. Peter Livorsi, 6921 W. Keeney, noted, "Well they're (Park District) moving forward where they should have been five years ago," and guardedly, "the plan certainly has some good features..."

A suggestion was made for separate swimming pools to accommodate youth and adults, while another citizen was all for the building of an olympic length pool.

Receiving the most acclaim was the architects proposal and plan for enlarging the present Recreation Center, 7877 Milwaukee Avenue, where an art center could be established for art, music, theatre, dance and film.

Park Board Commissioners said there would be a number of public forums in order that every citizen could avail himself of the comprehensive planning study and express his opinion. Notice of these forums will be released to the local press.

Part of Mrs. Hoffman's brother's original letter said, "We in the Army here in Viet Nam are trying to help some

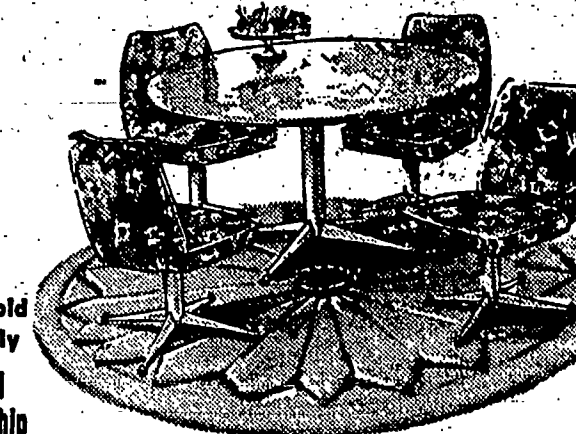

Niles VFW Member Writes
Official Iwo Jima Poem

The official poem commemorating the flag raising by US Marines on Iwo Jima during World War II, has been authored by a Niles dentist.

He is Dr. Henry J. Bekier, of 7321 Waukegan Rd., with offices at 5432 W. Devon, Chicago. Dr. Bekier is Post Surgeon of Niles VFW Post 7712.

Dr. Bekier recently returned from Independence, Mo., where he presented Ex-President Harry S. Truman, with a personally signed photograph of the historical event.

President Truman is the fourth Chief Executive of the United States to be given the photo and poem. Others were Dwight D. Eisenhower, the late President John F. Kennedy, and Lyndon B. Johnson. The poem is the only one to be placed in honor in the museums of the four.

Dr. Bekier, a captain in the US Air Force at the time of the flag raising, was so inspired by the courageousness of the six Marines atop Mt. Suribachi on Feb. 23, 1945, that he sat down and penned a tribute entitled, "A Salute to Old Glory".

In 1965, Marine Lt. Gen. Keller E. Rockey, who led the assault on Iwo Jima 20 years earlier, proclaimed the poem as the official poem honoring the event, which would be engraved in everlasting tribute to the entire United States Marines for their heroic deeds and gallant memory "which lives forever." Dr. Bekier received a plaque for this honor at a convention of the 5th Marine Division and at the same time

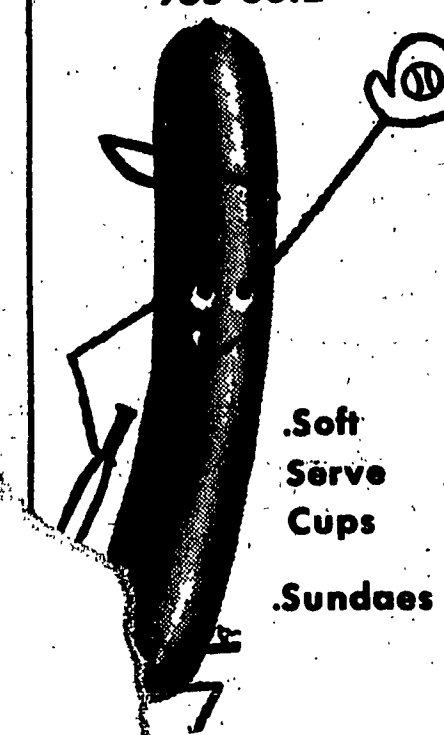

Dr. Bekier said that last year the poem was set to music which was written by Prof. Clarence Zeches, a former Nilesite and music teacher presently teaching in Georgia. Dr. Bekier said that it took two years for Prof. Zeches to write the lyrics for the poem.

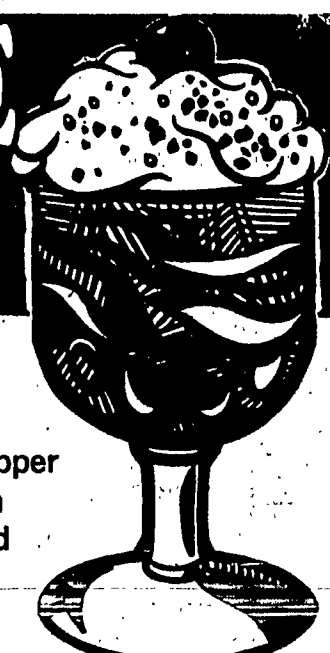

Niles Public Works Department Does Tremendous Job For All

into operation to expand water facilities. In 1962, five acres of land was purchased for the sole purpose of enlarging the water reservoir by three million gallons. This reservoir was built by employees of the Public Works department. Again in 1965 the reservoir was expanded by five million gallons.

All the water is purchased from the City of Chicago which is taken from Lake Michigan. Before being pumped into Niles, it is treated, filtered and chlorinated. By the time it reaches Niles another chlorination check is made to determine if more chlorine is needed. Niles has in existence now, four reservoirs with a capacity of 10,200,000 gallons; two 250,000

gallon elevated tanks and about 95 miles of mains, three pumping stations with a total output of 14,600 gpm.

Average daily use of water is 3,800,000 gallons and during extremely hot and dry weather about 7,500,000. These enormous figures rolled off the tongue of Betty Bacher as easily as I would tie a shoelace. Miss Bacher has been employed at Public Works for seven years and is an extraordinary young woman. Said Miss Bacher, "If people would hire a legitimate bonded sewer man to clean out their sewers, they would have a freer flow of water. Weeping willow trees are the constant cause of stoppage, plus all the other things people flush down their sinks and toilets."

She explained further about sanitary sewers: "Niles dumps into Howard St. sanitary sewers which flows east into the sanitary district and is controlled at Mc Cormick Place. It is then treated, broken up and filtered into the Chicago River and eventually ends up in the Mississippi River. The Sanitary District chose to segregate the sewers so they could take sanitary water and dump into the river. One sewer could never handle the billions of gallons of water, there would be no place to put it."

Superintendent of Sewers, Louis Hoelbl's theory about the recent flooding in Chesterfield Estates was, "when the State of Illinois widened Dempster St., instead of putting in sewers and running them east on Dempster to LeHigh, they tied into the sewers at Shermer and Dempster. Niles is on an angle and slopes downward south of Dempster, the five inch rainfall we had would have been too much even under the best circumstances."

As a result of the June 10 flooding the Public Works department was swamped with phone calls. Many asking when their rubbish would be picked up. "We knew, said Miss Bacher, that the Chesterfield area was hardest hit and began working our way from Caldwell Ave. However, the work would have been accomplished much sooner, had the people not mixed rubbish with food."

The John Sexton Dump at Central and River Rd. is used by about 30 suburbs including Chicago. It is a fifty foot deep hole and costs 40¢ a yd. for dumping. After the flood, trucks were lined up waiting to dump the refuse, this took up a great deal of time. Miss Bacher raised the question, "where are they going to dump all that in seven years? Somebody sure better come up with something pretty soon, since they can't very well burn it."

Rubbish removed, after the flood, was estimated to have filled thirty-five boxcars. Needless to say, this job of cleaning up couldn't have been done by a neighborhood crew. But the mess was eventually cleared away.

Many are misguided and misinformed as to the duties of the Public Works, like disposing of dead animals or in jest, a nagging wife or husband. The staff which consists of 35 employees have 110 miles of streets to sweep, repair and plow and serves over 32,000 residents.

In 1957 Niles entered into a contract with the State of Illinois for the maintenance and cleaning of state highways. The street department, still another vein of this organization; plow-

ing heavy snowfalls, repairing constructing and erecting all village signs throughout the year, replacing stoplights, school crossing signs, painting curbs, repairing and grading streets. Plus a great many more jobs.

The Forestry Department sprays and removes diseased and dead trees.

Rodent control, when reported by any resident, is alleviated by the usage of bait stations.

People will forever and always complain at the sound of air hammers blasting away at curbs at eight A.M. and the slamming of garbage can lids. But as we sleep, progress continues, sometimes into the early hours of dawn.

These, as this reporter has discovered, are the unsung heroes of every community throughout America and unfortunately for all, salaries are not adequate enough to lure more employees into this profession.

Hopefully, with time, people will become more aware of the need for more funds so that this department might function better than ever for our health, and well-being.
