Rockey, who led the assault on Iwo Jima 20 years earlier, proclaimed the poem as the official poem honoring the event, which would be engraved in everlasting tribute to the entire United States Marines for their heroic deeds and gallant memory "which lives foreever." 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
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

We're sure a second pool would receive strong resistance from Nilesites south of Main Street, and the support north of Main may never be forthcoming if last week's forum was indicative. To sell a \$1,000,000 plus referendum to Nilesites a genuine "need" will have to be graphically shown. Improving existing parks will not move many Nilesites to support such a plan. And the placing of a second pool anywhere will meet with resistance, but placing it on an extreme border area will kayo its passage over-whelmingly. While many Nilesites would disagree with our thinking as well, we favor a combination gymnasium-meeting room-recreation room-auditorium, perhaps located on the Grennan Heights Park property. Grennan Heights overwhelmingly resisted the last referendum. Placing such an accomodation there with a possible indoor-outdoor pool would make more sense to this radical thinker, than the less dramatic piddly-improvements in Niles present parks. When

The official poem commemorating the flag raising by US Marines on Iwo. Jima during World' War II, has been authored by a Niles dentist.

He is Dr. Henry J. Bekier, of 7321 Waukegan Rd., with offices at 5432 W. Devon, Chicago. Dr. Bekier is Post Surgeon of Niles VFW Post 7712.

Dr. Bekier recently returned from Independence, Mo., where he presented Ex-President Harry S. Truman, with a personally signed photoplaque of the historical event.

President Truman is the fourth Chief Executive of the United States to be given the photo and poem. Others were Dwight D. Eisenhower, the late President John F. Kennedy, and Lyndon B. Johnson. The poem is the only one to be placed in honor in the museums of the

Dr. Bekier, a captain in the US Air Force at the time of the flag raising, was so inspired by the courageousness of the six Marines atop Mt. Suribachi on Feb. 23, 1945, that he sat down and penned a tribute entitled, "A Salute to Old Glory".

In 1965, Marine Lt. Gen. Keller E. Rockey, who led the assault on Iwo Jima 20 years earlier, proclaimed the poem as the official poem honoring the event, which would be engraved in everlasting tribute to the entire United States Marines for their heroic deeds and gallant memory "which lives foreever." Dr. Bekier received plaque for this honor at a convention of the 5th Marine

into operation to expand water facilities. In 1962, five acres of land was purchased for the sole purpose of enlarging the water reservoir by three million gallons. This reservoir was nuilt by employees of the Pubic Works department. Again n 1965 the reservoir was exanded by five million gallons.

All the water is purchased from the City of Chicago which is taken from Lake Michigan. Before being pumped into Niles, t is treated, filtered and chlorinated. By the time it reaches Niles another chlorination chek is made to determine if more chlorine is needed. Niles has in existance now, four reservoirs with a capacity of 10,200,000 gallons; two 250,000

Nilesite Saved From Drowning

Two 18-year-old girls from Oak Lawn were credited yesterday afternoon with saving the life of a 70-year-old retired Niles contractor who was one of three men in a rowboat that capsized in Bangs lake,

The girls, Miss Joyce Biddinger and Miss Charlene Redden, stepsisters living at 5721 81st st., Oak Lawn, were praised by John Kuester, Wauconda police chief.

He said Gunnar Danielson, 8135 Church st., Niles, would have drowned if the girls had not pulled him from under the owboat. He was unconscious it the time.

Danielson was fishing about 00 yards from the east shore f the lake with his son, Wilbur 50, of 1444 Appleby st., alatine, and a neighbor, Gus ohnson, 70, of 8125 Church st., Viles. The son told police the wake from a speeding motoroat capsized their rowboat.

(Wilbur formerly lived 8117 Church. He served as a member of Niles Plan Comnission for 5 years),

Miss Biddinger said she and Miss Redden were just leaving hore in another motorboat when they saw the rowboat verturn. They sped to the scene, throwing life preservers o Johnson and Wilbur Danielon, who were clinging to the

"We couldn't see the third man," she said, "but one of the others shouted something about another person being un-der the boat. I was afraid to go under it, so I just reached and located his hand."

Danielson was pulled out, still unconscious from hitting his head when the boat overturned. Danielson regained consciousness before reaching shore. He was treated for the head injury at Lutheran General hospital, Park Ridge.

gallon elevated tanks and about 95 miles of mains, three pumping stations with a total output of 14,600 gpm.

Average daily use of water is 3,800,000 gallons and during extremely hot and dry weather about 7,500,000. These enormous figures rolled off the tongue of Betty Bacher as easily as I would tie a shoelace. Miss Bacher has been employed at Public Works for seven years and is an extraordinary young woman. Said Miss Bacher, "if people would hire a legitimate bonded sewer man to clean out their sewers, they would have a freer flow of water. Weeping willow trees are the constant cause of stoppage, plus all the other things people flush down their sinks and toilets."

She explained further about sanitary sewers: "Niles dumps into Howard St. sanitary sewers which flows east into the sanitary district and is controlled at Mc Cormick Place. It is then treated, broken up and filtered into the Chicago River and eventually ends up in the Mississippi River. The Sanitary District chose to segregate the sewers so they could take sanitary water and dump into the river. One sewer could never handle the billions of gallons of water, there would be no place to put it."

Superintendent of Sewers. Louis Hoelbl's theory about the recent flooding in Chesterfield Estates was, "when the State of Illinois widened Dempster St., instead of putting in sewers and running them east on Dempster to LeHigh, they tied into the sewers at Shermer and Dempster. Niles is on an angle and slopes downward south of Dempster, the five inch rainfall we had would have been too much even under the best circumstances."

As a result of the June 10 flooding the Public Works department was swamped with phone calls. Many asking when their rubbish would be picked up. ""We knew, said Miss Bacher, that the Chesterfield area was hardest hit and began working our way from Caldwell Ave. However, the work would have been accomplished much sooner, had the people not mixed rubbish with food."

The John Sexton Dump at Central and River Rd. is used by about 30 suburbs including Chicago. It is a fifty foot deep hole and costs 40¢ a yd. for dumping. After the flood, trucks were lined up waiting to dump the refuse, this took up a great deal of time Miss Bacher raised the question, "where are they going to dump all that in seven years? Somebody sure better come up with something pretty soon, since they can't very well

Rubbish removed, after the flood, was estimated to have filled thirty-five boxcars. Needless to say, this job of cleaning up couldn't have been done by a neighborhood crew. But the mess was eventually cleared

Many are misguided and mis-informed as to the duties of the Public Works, like disposing of dead animals or in jest, a nagging wife or husband. The staff which consists of 35 employees have 110 miles of streets to sweep, repair and plow and serves over 32,000 res-

In 1957 Niles entered into contract with the State of Illinois for the maintanance and cleaning of state highways. The street department, still another vein of this organization; plowing heavy snowfalls, repairing constructing and erecting all village signs throughout the year, replacing stop lights, school crossing signs, painting curbs, repairing and grading streets.

The Forestry Department sprays and removes diseased and dead trees.




