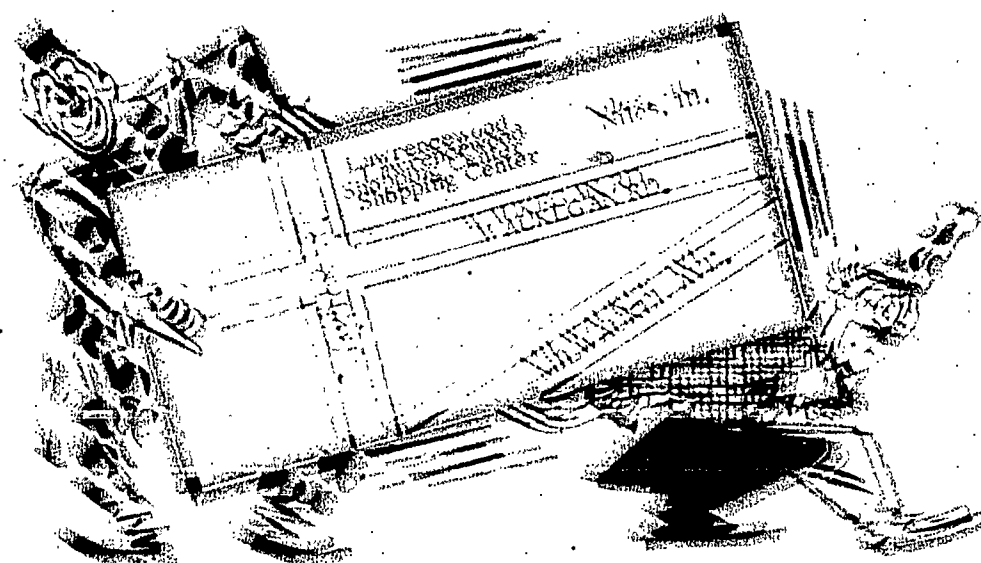

One of the busiest places in town on a 24 hour a day schedule 7 days a week is the back entrance to Lutheran General Hospital. In the front of the hospital the two lone signs point toward the back drive and is passed by countless cars every day. After all the sign is there for someone's else "EMERGENCY."

It is not unusual to see an ambulance heading toward this area hoping to save a life by getting there in time. Yet many times the person or persons come by car. Being an emergency area most of us never use it's facilities until we find we have an "Emergency" to handle.

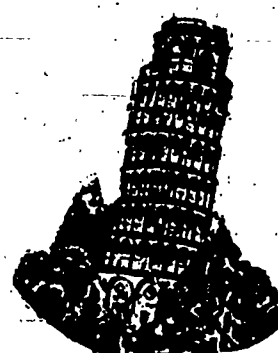
It's your first experience making the trip, maybe in the late hours of the night and you will sigh in much relief to know in less than ten minutes from Niles, Morton Grove, or E. Maine, you will have available all the best medical attention to be found anywhere (Lutheran General is in the top 2% in size).

As you drive in don't stop at the front admitting desk—you will find plenty of parking area for both ambulance and private car in the back. A quick walk up the inclined ramp and thru the door marked Emergency will put you in a large 8 bed emergency room.

As fast as you enter, doctor and nurse are at you side with a concerning eye that this type of work involves—is it a cut to be cleaned and sewn — a youngster with a broken bone — a heart condition — its enough to scare any layman and you're grateful how smooth the medical team is figuring your problem out, after all here it becomes routine, all in a days work. However, the sign Emergency until today has always seemed to have been there for someone else.

In many cases the patient will stay at the hospital because of other complications that require hospital care and further tests. At this time you begin and the patient begins to think about the cost. You have no choice now, a preliminary diagnosis has been made and you are in no position to do anything else but rest and accept treatment your doctor prescribes.

Medical Center, Gasoline Station Planned

At the Tuesday night Village Board meeting a petition for rezoning two more parcels of Caldwell Ave. and Gross Point Rd. became official by a 4 to 2 vote. One parcel will be an Industrial Medical Center and the other an Enco Gasoline Station.

The exterior of the Medical Center will remain unchanged and will accommodate parking for approximately 20 cars with off street parking.

According to Mrs. S. Johnston 7401 Caldwell, "The home being considered for rezoning is really inadequate for their needs and the change will make it difficult for us to remain there."

"The nature of the area has changed since the sale of Tam," said Mayor Blase.

Trustee Wente reminded Attorney for the petitioner, George Karczas, "there is no sanitary sewer on that side of the street, you would have to go under the road to tie one in."

Qualified approval was given with the stipulation that the septic tank would be removed and there would be a tie-in with the sanitary sewers.

Mobile X-Ray Unit In Niles August 7-11

If you are between 55 and 59 years of age — don't just walk past that mobile X-ray unit in your neighborhood this summer: WALK IN!

This is the "alert" being sounded by The Suburban Cook County Tuberculosis Sanitarium District. According to statistics recently released by The District, this age group had the largest number of TB patients at the SCTT-Hospital Sanitarium in 1966. There were 42 men and 17 women, or a total of 59 patients in the age group 55-59.

"Any age, 18 years and over, is a good time to get a free chest X-ray at the mobile unit," said Dr. Karl H. Pfuetze, General Administrator, The Dis-

trict. "But 55 to 59 are especially important years to rigidly follow the routine health check-up offered you each summer in your own community."

"All you need do is WALK IN when you see the X-ray unit in your neighborhood or wherever you might happen to see the mobile X-ray bus!" said the doctor.

The annual summer long community wide free chest x-ray service provided by The Suburban Cook County Tuberculosis Sanitarium District, which is tax supported, is in progress now. Mobile units will arrive soon in Skokie and Niles.

The Tuberculosis Institute of Chicago and Cook County (the Christmas Seal agency), the

Cook County Health Department and local health departments assist and cooperate with The District in providing this service.

Niles will host the mobile unit for one week, August 7-11. The mobile unit will be parked at the Golf Mill Shopping Center. Hours are 2:00 p.m. — 9:00 p.m. Monday, Thursday and Friday; 10:30 a.m. — 5:30 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday.

Clarence Culver Participates In Seminar

Clarence Culver of our area is attending a National Seminar on Innovation this week in Honolulu under the sponsorship of the United States Office of Education and the C.F. Kettering Foundation.

He is Superintendent at Niles Elementary Schools, #71.

He was invited to attend the seminar because of his leading role as an experimenter in new and improved ways of educating young people.

About 900 educational research and development leaders from throughout the U.S. were invited to attend the series of three one-week National Seminars. They were gathered together with national and international authorities in education and related fields to discuss, evaluate, and enlarge our national effort to improve elementary and secondary education in the United States.

The seminar participants include directors of experimentation projects funded by Title

III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act; I/D/E/A (Institute for Development of Educational Activities) fellows of the Kettering Foundation, selected as potential leaders of American educational innovation; and others concerned with programs allied to edu-

cational innovation. The U. S. Office of Education and the Kettering Foundation are sharing the seminar costs equally, except that the Kettering Foundation is paying transportation costs between the Mainland U.S. and Hawaii.

Library Closed August 7 To 12 For Inventory

In order to make the first complete inventory of its book stock, the Niles Public Library announces that the Library will be closed the week of Aug. 7 (the 7th through 12th). This will give a sharper than normal check on book stock that will be necessary for the most adequate coverage of current day questions and student assignments.

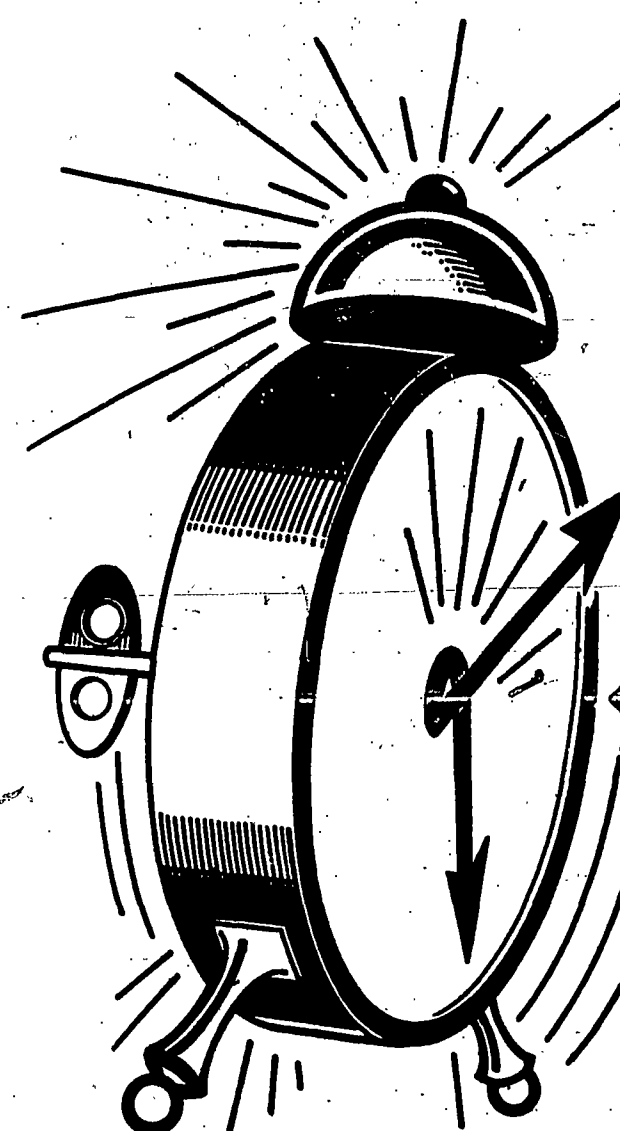
Since September of 1966 when the Library moved into its new quarters, somewhere in the neighborhood of 8000 books have been added up to mid-July of the

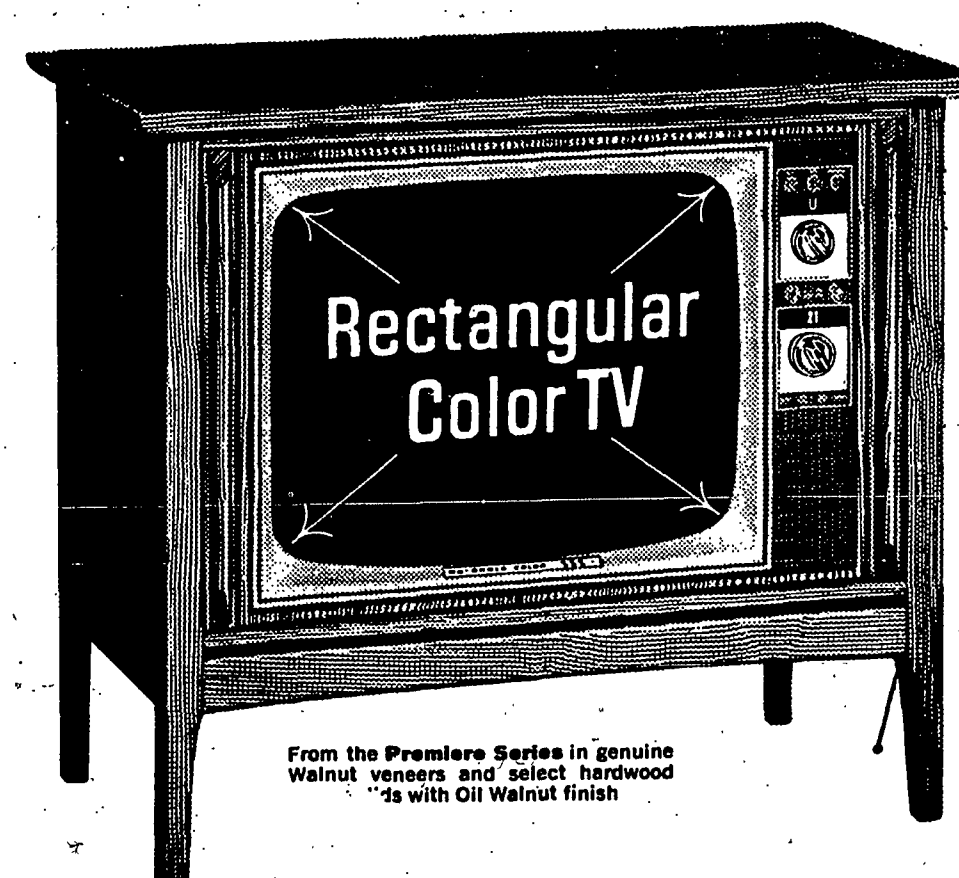

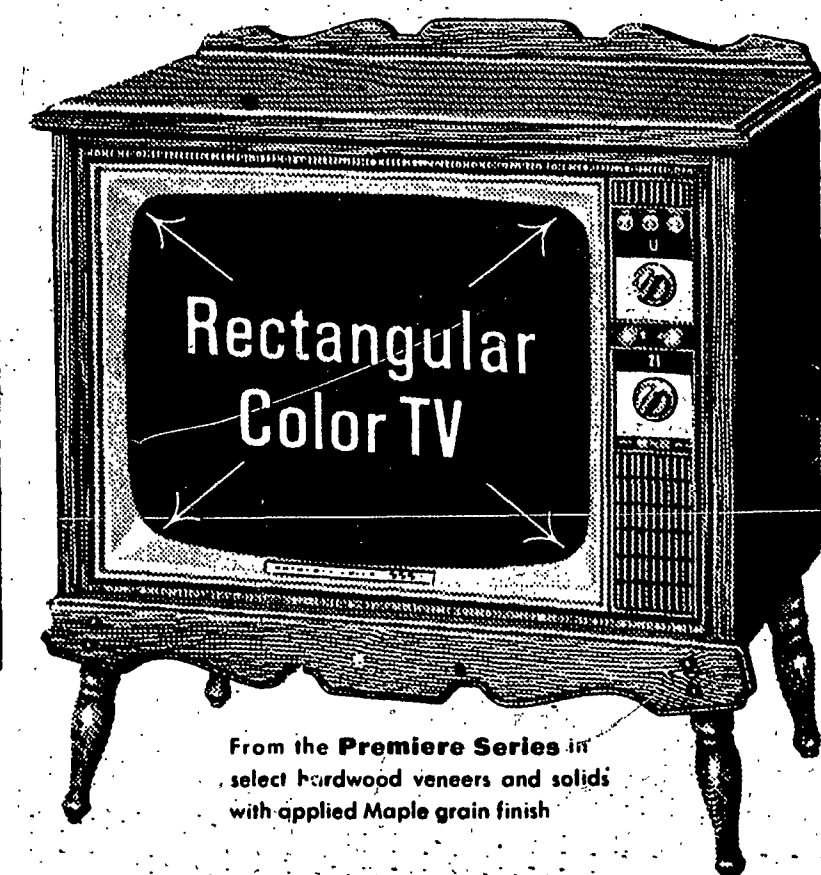

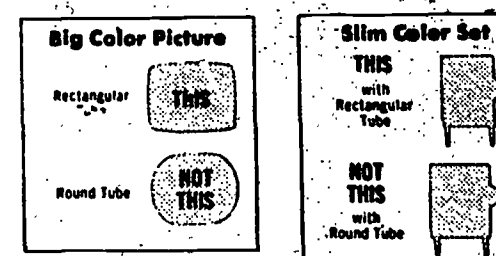

Summer Registration At Nilehi
For Transfer Students

The Niles Township High Schools will offer two different occasions for the enrollment of students who are transferring to the district during the summer. All in-coming transfer students are required to take certain standardized tests prior to actual registration. These test dates are offered as follows:

August 8-9 and August 22-23.

This summer all of the pre-enrollment testing will take place at Niles North High School regardless of the school which the student will attend.

In each of these testing programs, all students to be enrolled are to report on the first day (Tuesday). Only freshmen are to report on the second day (Wednesday) since freshmen must take more tests than sophomores, juniors and seniors.

At the close of the testing program each student will be given an appointment for an individual conference with a counselor. This conference will be held in the guidance office of the school to be attended and will deal with actual course enrollment.

Residents who have moved into the high school district or residents who are transferring from parochial high schools should arrange for the pre-enrollment testing by calling the high school serving the area of the resident.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION FOR GENERAL CORPORATE PURPOSES AND PROVIDING RECREATIONAL PROGRAMS AS PER SECTION 5-1 OF THE GENERAL PARK DISTRICT CODE OF THE NILES PARK DISTRICT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING MAY 1, 1967 AND ENDING APRIL 30, 1968

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Board of Commissioners of the NILES PARK DISTRICT, Cook County, State of Illinois:

SECTION 1: That the following sums of money, or as much thereof as may be authorized by law, be and the same are hereby appropriated for general Corporate purposes for the NILES PARK DISTRICT, and to provide Recreational Programs as per Section 5-1, of the General Park District Code, for the NILES PARK DISTRICT, for the Fiscal Year beginning May 1, 1967, and ending April 30, 1968.

Dr. Ted Hughes, business manager for the Niles Township High Schools for nearly three years, resigned last week to become an assistant superintendent in Lafayette, Indiana.

The board of education of the Niles Township High Schools accepted his resignation with regrets at its meeting July 17.

A native of Buffalo, Indiana, Dr. Hughes will leave the Niles Township school district September 15, and will assume his new position immediately.

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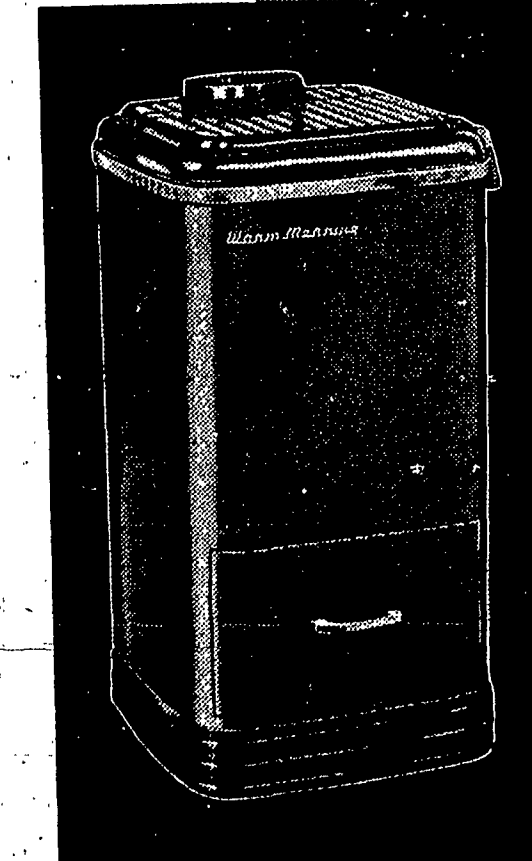
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Chesterfield Homeowners Told How To Seek Flood Loans

The Chesterfield Estates Homeowners Association held a meeting July 12 in the Niles Council Chambers. The subject was the need for more sewers and to discuss loans made available through the Small Business Administration.

Thomas Gaus and C. W. Sydenstricker, representing the S.B.A., told the group "in attendance how to go about applying for a loan. "These loans, explained Mr. Gaus, are geared up to 30 years for repayment and are designed to restore you to pre-disaster

condition." Loans will be given on the basis of each individual's ability to re-pay. In order for those renting to receive a loan, they must present a financial statement, plus a list of goods damaged due to flooding, with an estimate of their present value. If damage was to the structure, tiles, walls, etc., you must present a contractor's estimate for repairs indicated. They will be notified from 10 days to two weeks whether the loan is being granted.

Asked if an appraiser is sent, our Gaus replied "yes in order to verify damage."

Does the party have to replace each identical item," asked a member of the audience.

"In many cases we make out a joint check to you and the contractor to make sure you are not being overcharged," replied Gaus. "And if proceeds are used for any other purpose it becomes a misapplication of funds."

Further information may be obtained at the Temporary Disaster Office, 748 Pearson St. in Des Plaines between the hours of 8:30 and 5:00 Monday through Saturday.

Village Engineer, George Anderson explained, "after studying the Chesterfield sewer system, the Engineering department offers the 4 following recommendations and if accepted will minimize the tremendous volume of water as that which hit our village the first 15 minutes on June 10th.

1 - Possibility of backup and overflow of storm sewers during a prolonged rainfall of moderate intensity could be reduced by widening and clearing of the natural ditch at the terminus of the sewer system located near Nation and Greenleaf. This would, in effect, create a retention basin that could safely hold water and slowly discharge it through the smaller culvert located at Waukegan Rd. or extend the existing 48" pipe to Waukegan Rd., remove three lengths of 36" pipe and tie on to the existing 48" box culvert under Waukegan Rd.

2 - All homeowners should undertake to disconnect downspouts from the drain tiles around the foundation of their homes and provide splash plates directing run-off to natural ground where a high percentage of absorption can occur.

3 - Yard areas which, at present, are not seeded or

sodded should be completed immediately. This would eliminate the chance of construction debris and other loose objects from being washed into catch-basins and clogging up sewer lines.

4 - Homeowners should restrain from dumping grass clippings, tree branches, hot water tanks, bicycles, shopping carts and general junk into the storm ditch. All which tend to obstruct and restrict water flow.

"Found in one drainage ditch behind homes in Chesterfield, were 15 shopping carts and other debris which had blocked the drain.

Mayor Nicholas Blase, referred to the U. S. News & World Report of July 10th which the weather." According to weather experts, a basic weather change is under way due to gradual shifting of lower temperatures, air pollution and increased highly industrialized areas.

He further stated "they would contest the sewer tie-in by the State at Dempster and Shermer, since this was done with our knowledge."

Protests by homeowners that the two newly erected buildings Niles Savings & Loan and Amings being responsible was disavowed.

Trustee Ed Berkowsky reported, Village Engineer Anderson, a representative from Amings and himself had toured the area after the flood. "The property in back of Greenleaf & National is privately owned and at present we are negotiating with their Attorney to clean it up," said Berkowsky.

Nort Goodman, Association President, stated "that insurance may be obtained through Lloyds of London at 70 times the rate if there are any interested parties."

Morton Grove Post Office

Expands Parcel Post Deliveries

Postmaster Robert R. Lutz today announced that parcel post deliveries in Morton Grove, Illinois 60053, will be expanded from five to six days a week as of July 29, 1967.

This is in line with a recent directive from Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien following the signing of the Post Office Department appropriation bill by President Johnson. The legislation contains an \$8.5 million item for restoration of the six day a week delivery which had been cut back in May 1964 as an economy measure.

Nearly 5000 cities are effected, Postmaster Lutz said.

The Morton Grove Postal Office noted that the improved service will remove an inequity for many business and residential routes.

Postal customers served by "motorized" letter carriers have been receiving six day deliveries all along. They were not covered by the 1964 cut back inasmuch as carriers on vehicles can deliver parcels of any size. 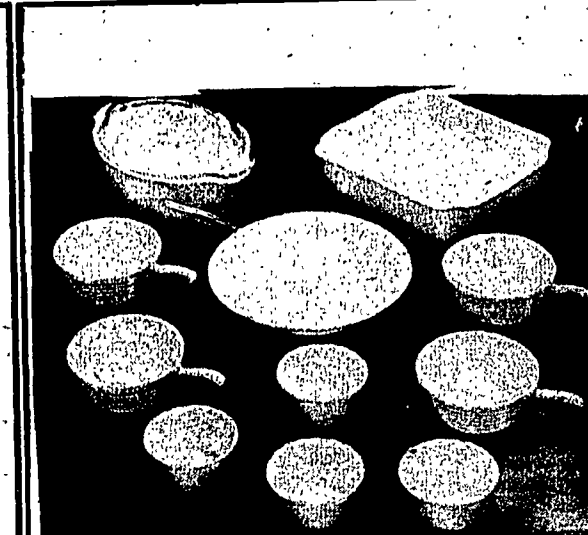

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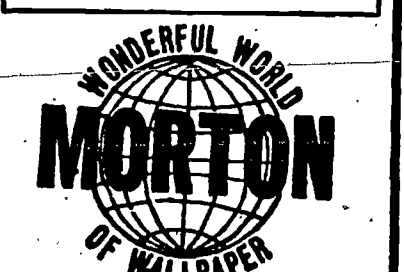
