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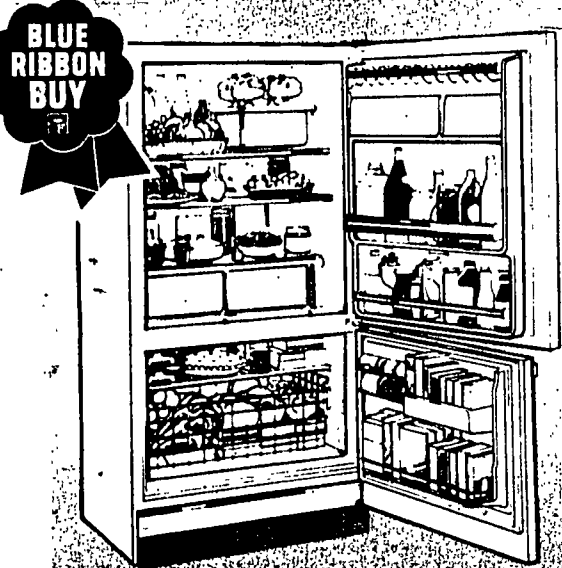
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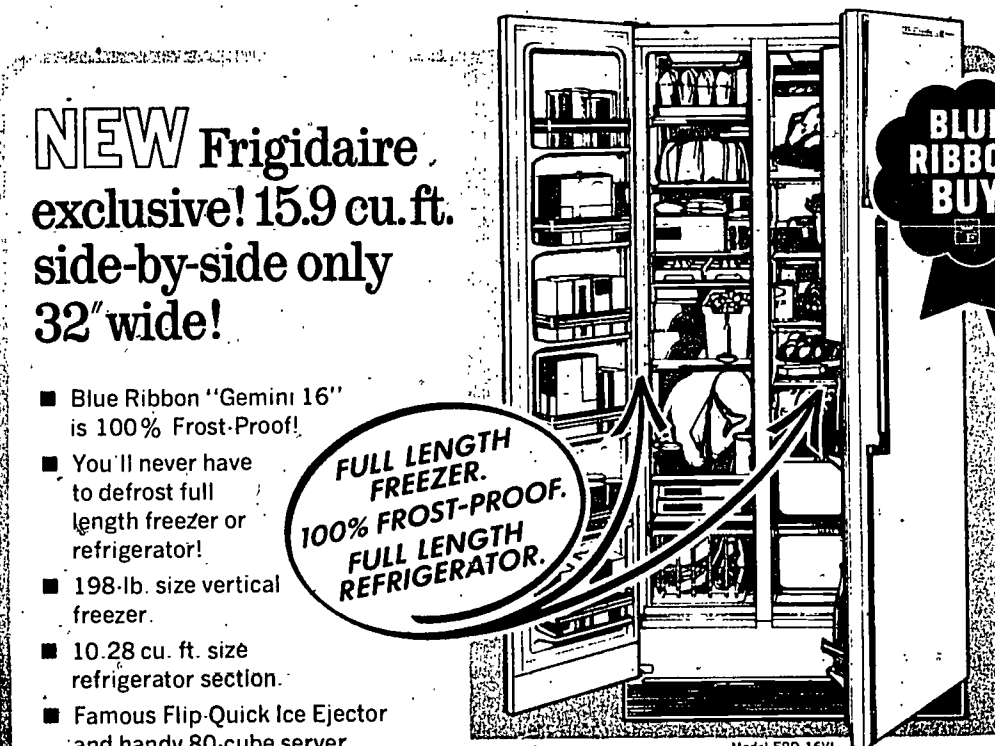
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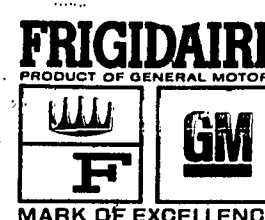


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From The

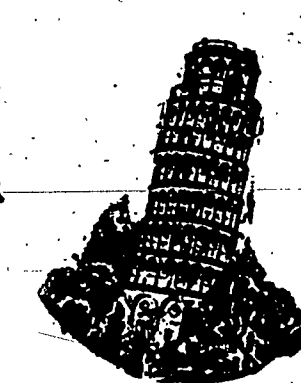
Welcome home!

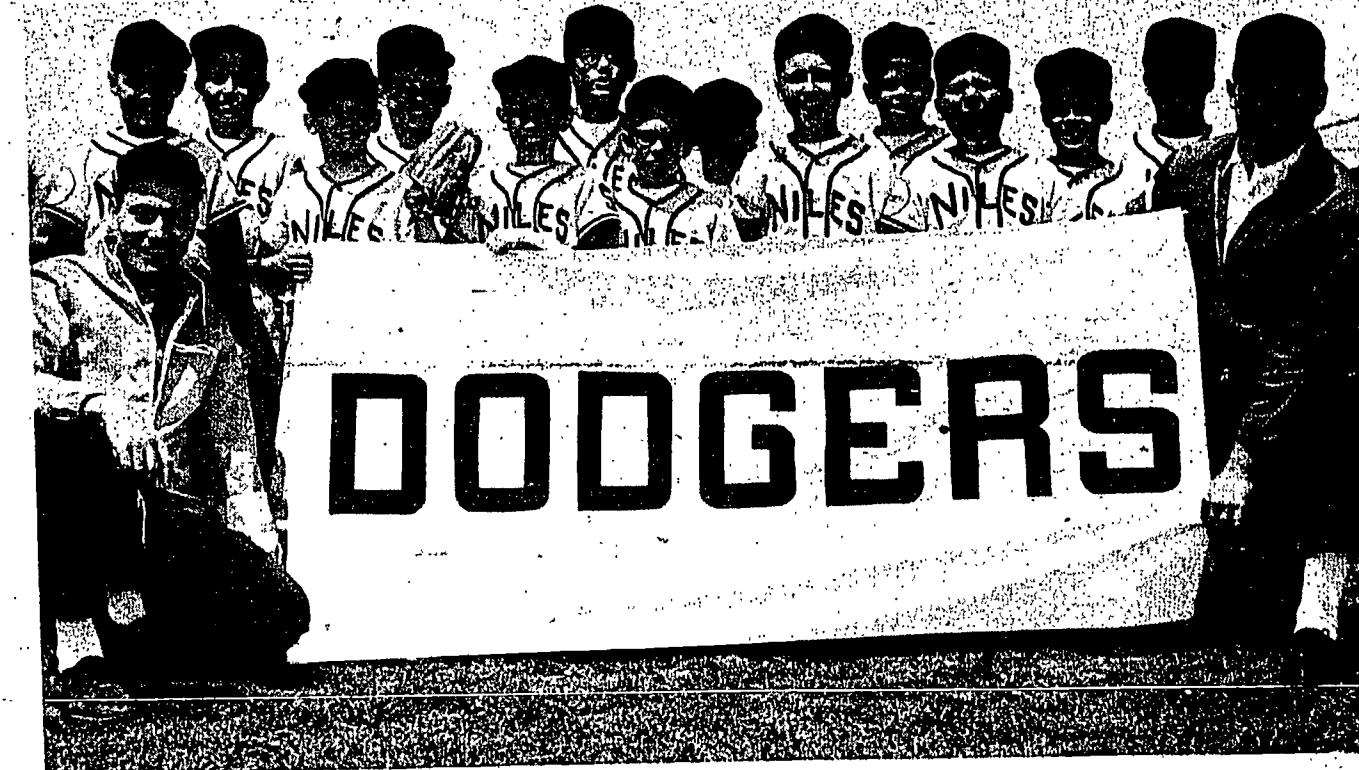

SCHEEL LONE OPPONENT OF THREE RE-ZONINGS



Opposes Med. Center, Gas Station

Trustee Ken Scheel's trilogy of "No's" were vehement at the August 8th Village Board Meeting, when the eyes of four other Trustees secured the passage of ordinances for the rezoning of areas which, in two cases had seen battle for night on seven years. Absentee Trustee was Keith Peck who is on vacation.

Ordinances passed were: rezoning Gross Point Manor Nursing Home, present facility in use, from B 2 Service District to R 3 Special Resident Use, and rezoning of area adjacent the Home at Touhy and Harts Roads to be used for the building of nursing home extension facility, from B 2 to R 3 General Resident Use.

Rezoning NE corner Caldwell/Gross Point Roads from R 1 Single Family Residence District to B 1 Retail Business District Special Use, to establish an automobile service station.

Rezoning the property at 7255 Caldwell Ave., from R 1 Single Family Residence District to B 1 Retail Business District, to establish an industrial Medical Center. Regarding the latter Trustee Scheel said he did not believe there was a dire need for such a Center. "It's just a money making project. And a gas station in that location too, this breaks up a particularly fine residential area. These rezoning petitions have seen battle for almost seven years - it's all over now - dead issue."

Trustee Scheel has steadily maintained his "no" vote on the Gross Point Manor Nursing Home rezoning petitions on the grounds that the addition of a new facility adhering to rigid building codes does not alter the fact that the existing structure is non-conforming.

On the other hand the "aye" voting Trustees claim that the

Maine East To Offer Make-Up Placement Test

Merlin W. Schultz, Coordinator of Pupil Personnel Services, Maine Township High School District 207, has announced that Wednesday, August 16, 1967, is the date set for the high school placement test to be given to those students who plan to enter one of the Maine High Schools (Maine East, Maine South, or Maine West) this fall as freshmen and who have failed to previously take the placement test.

The August 16th test will be administered from 7:45 A.M. to 12 noon in room 320 at Maine East, Dempster Street and Potter Road, Park Ridge. Students taking the test should bring two previously sharpened No. 2 lead pencils with them. All other test materials will be furnished at the Maine East testing center. Parents desiring further information may call Maine East, 825-4484, and ask for the Guidance Center.

Students should make prior arrangements regarding transportation to and from the test-

ing center. Parents are asked to discharge and pick up students at the main entrance, which faces the corner of Potter and Dempster.

All students who enter Maine Township High Schools as freshmen are required to take the high school placement test. The test battery will include the following four subtests: academic aptitude, arithmetic achievement, language arts achievement, and reading achievement. The test is designed to measure the scholastic achievement of entering ninth grade students and their potential for academic success. It is used in placing students in appropriate curricula, in grouping them according to ability, in evaluating their achievement, in identifying the gifted and those needing remedial attention, and in selecting students for special programs. It is one of the tools that counselors use in tailoring individual needs to the comprehensive curricula offered in Maine High Schools.

Unincorporated Area Voter's Registration August 23

It was announced this week by Philip Raffie, Maine Township Clerk, that voter's registration for persons living in the unincorporated area of Maine Township will be conducted from 7 to 9:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 23, at 2626 Golf Road which is the new hi-rise building immediately East of the Community Discount Store.

All persons who are not registered to vote and who will

be 21 years of age or older at the next election, who have resided in Illinois for one year, in Cook County for 90 days and in their precinct for 30 days, are eligible to register.

Law requires that a person register before being permitted to vote. Residents of municipalities such as Glenview, Morton Grove, Park Ridge, Des Plaines etc., can register in the office of their city or village clerk.

Flood Victims Urged To Check Heating Plant

Homeowners hit by flood waters this year are urged to have their heating systems checked by a heating contractor to assure proper operation this Fall.

Northern Illinois Gas Company, in making the recommendation, noted that because of the warm weather, homeowners are apt to overlook their furnace or boiler during clean-ups.

"The electric motors operating blower fans and pumps should be carefully inspected to make sure that they are clean, dry, and properly lubricated," said Morris Hursthouse, NIG's northern division manager of customer service.

"The heating plant should be cycled to assure that controls are functioning normally," he continued. "Attention should also be given to the flue and chimney to assure they are clear of leaves and other obstructions. Furnace filters should be replaced on forced-air systems."

Hursthouse recommends that homeowners arrange to have their heating plants serviced now, before contractors are swamped with cold weather calls. He suggests customers contact established contractors in the community who are experienced in providing maintenance on central heating systems.

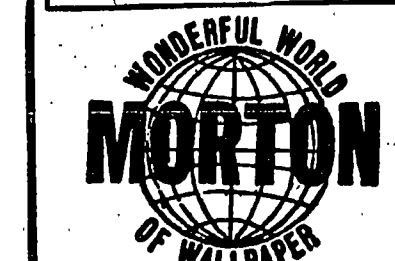


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Precinct Splits In Maine Township

....Precinct #64 divided along Rand Rd. with the North portion remaining #64 and the South portion becoming #114.

....Precinct #94 divided North and South along Hamlin Ave. with the West portion remaining #94 and the East portion becoming precinct #115.

....Precinct #101 divided along Emerson, Good, Noel and

Potter with that rectangular Northeast section remaining #101 and all the remaining portion of former precinct #101 now precinct #116.



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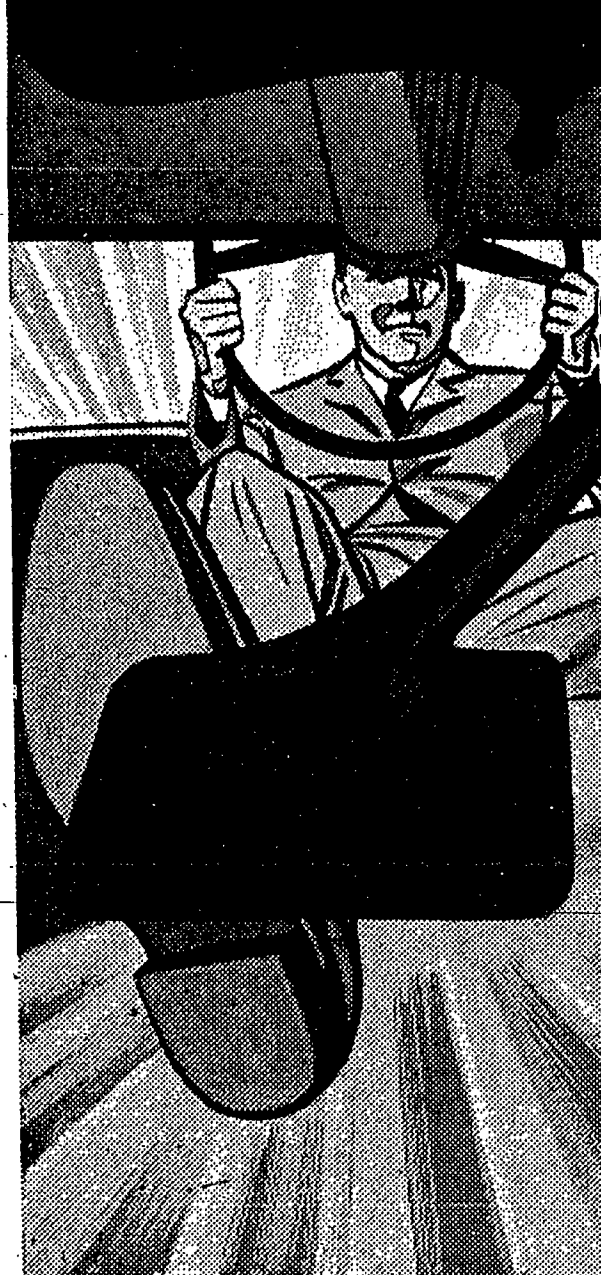
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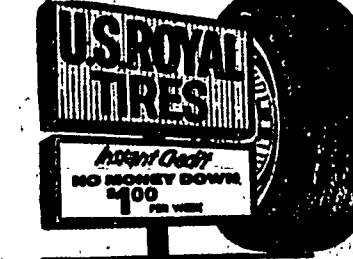
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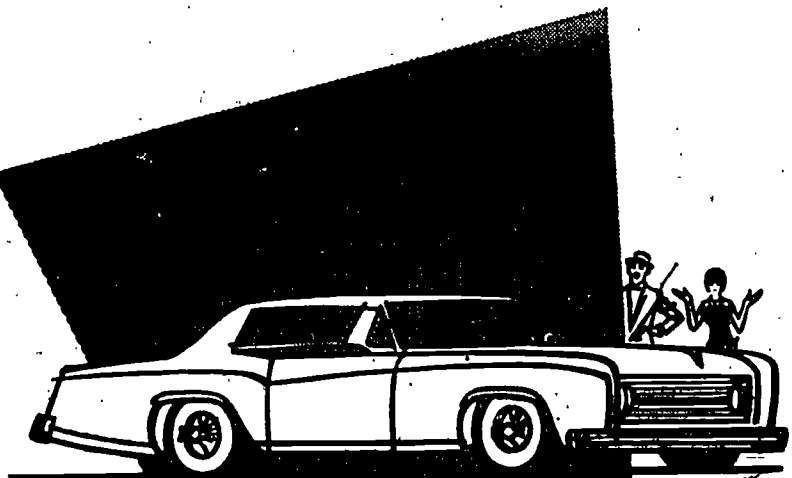
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Maine East Band Gives Final Performances

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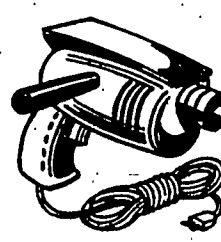

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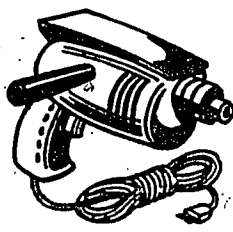
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Morton Grove Demo Picnic August 20

Over a Booby cup of coffee
the man at the end of the other
cup is Tony Guarnaccio, Niles
Health Inspector. While holding
down a full-time job Tony goes
on his inspections evenings and
week-ends. He now tours more
than 60 retail establishments,
gets co-operation from busi-
nessmen with little resistance,
giving his soft sell for better
health standards. Tony says
most complaints concern resi-
dential problems. Tony com-
pends the job is becoming in-
creasingly time-consuming and
believes the time will soon come
when the job will require a full-
time inspector.

Tony and his predecessor,
Ray Wilkins, have put Niles
best foot forward in handling
a difficult job. Niles is what
it is because of men in the
public service like Tony, who
do one whole of a job.

He stopped me on the street
and asked me about the pur-
chase of a helicopter, which
Niles is now studying. He said
Niles now has two men study-
ing to pilot the plane and left
the opinion the helicopter pur-
chase has already been decided
