You climb back into the cab-rider seat and this is what you see and hear:

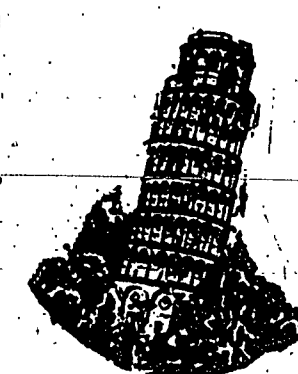
The lady is a school teacher...and a very good one...during her summer "vacation" while she tended her three kids she also went to a special 6 week session for teachers.... she wanted something new and challenging and she found it. The study group dealt with helping students who are not living up to their abilities. Next year school district 63 will have many teachers working in this field, moving from school to school helping this much-overlooked group. When the school teacher finished her course she was so enthused with this new area she requested she be transferred into this field and was granted her wish. She reports school district 63 teachers stood heads above other teachers in the summer clinic, manifesting great enthusiasm. Matter of fact the enthusiasm was so contagious that two teachers from other neighboring districts sought transfer into district 63.

Lady school teacher said the new look in district 63 stems from the leadership from the superintendent's office and the tremendous support the district receives from the very creative school board. Starting salaries in the district are now comparable to all surrounding districts and the enthusiasm engendered in the summer clinic is typical of the new look in district 63.

Over a Booby cup of coffee the man at the end of the other cup is Tony Guarnaccio, Niles Health Inspector. While holding down a full-time job Tony goes on his inspections evenings and week-ends. He now tours more than 60 retail establishments, gets co-operation from businessmen with little resistance, giving his soft sell for better health standards. Tony says most complaints concern residential problems. Tony contends the job is becoming increasingly time-consuming and believes the time will soon come when the job will require a full-time inspector.

Tony and his predecessor, Ray Wilkins, have put Niles best foot forward in handling a difficult job. Niles is what it is because of men in the public service like Tony, who do one whale of a job.

He stopped me on the street and asked me about the purchase of a helicopter, which Niles is now studying. He said Niles now has two men studying to pilot the plane and left the opinion the helicopter purchase has already been decided upon. Ballard Area Meets August 21

The Niles Park Board is to hold a series of separate meetings with home-owners assos. and residents of park areas, with a view to ascertaining the climate regarding the Comprehensive Development Plan as presented by Alper and Alper, Architects.

A kick-off meeting with Ballard area residents is slated for Monday, August 21, at 8:00 P.M. in Room 22 of E. Maine Junior High school. It was reported at the August 15th meeting of the Niles Park District Commissioners.

Delivering a lengthy report from the various aspects of his office — chairman, community welfare, and Public Relations, Commissioner Louis Schreiner said that following a meeting with Mayor Nicholas B. Blase and the Village Trustees, "the Village fathers will study the Plan and Mayor Blase will inform us on their feel of the Plan itself." In connection with the proposal in the Planning Study for the N.P.D. to seek ways for the provision of protected pathways for users of bikes, Commissioner Schreiner reported that a meeting is planned in conjunction with 7, surrounding area parks inviting their views and possible cooperation on the proposal.

A N.P.D. resident informed the Bugle reporter that he had seen such a bikeway in a portion of the State of Wisconsin. "The idea is not so far fetched," he said, "in my opinion it has great merit."

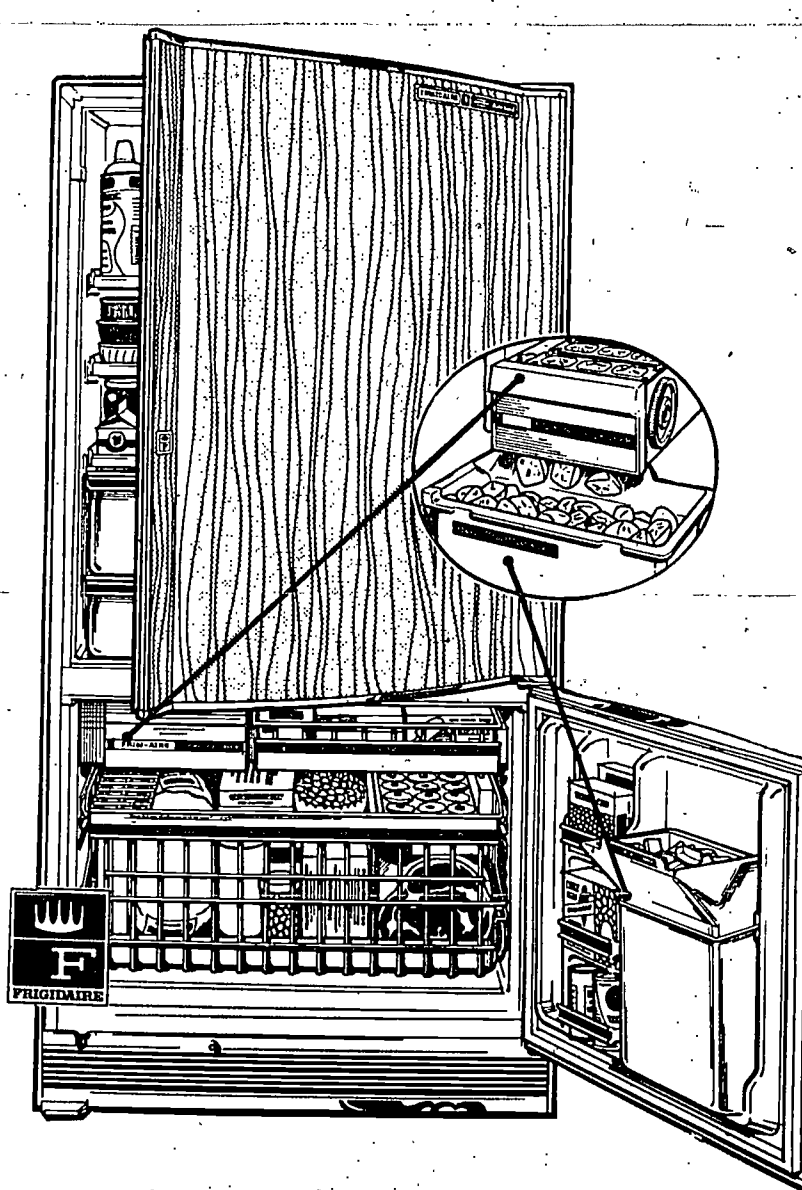

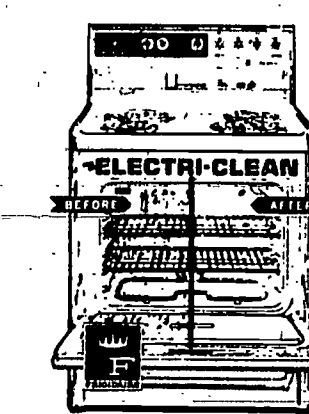

Lions Annual Picnic August 24

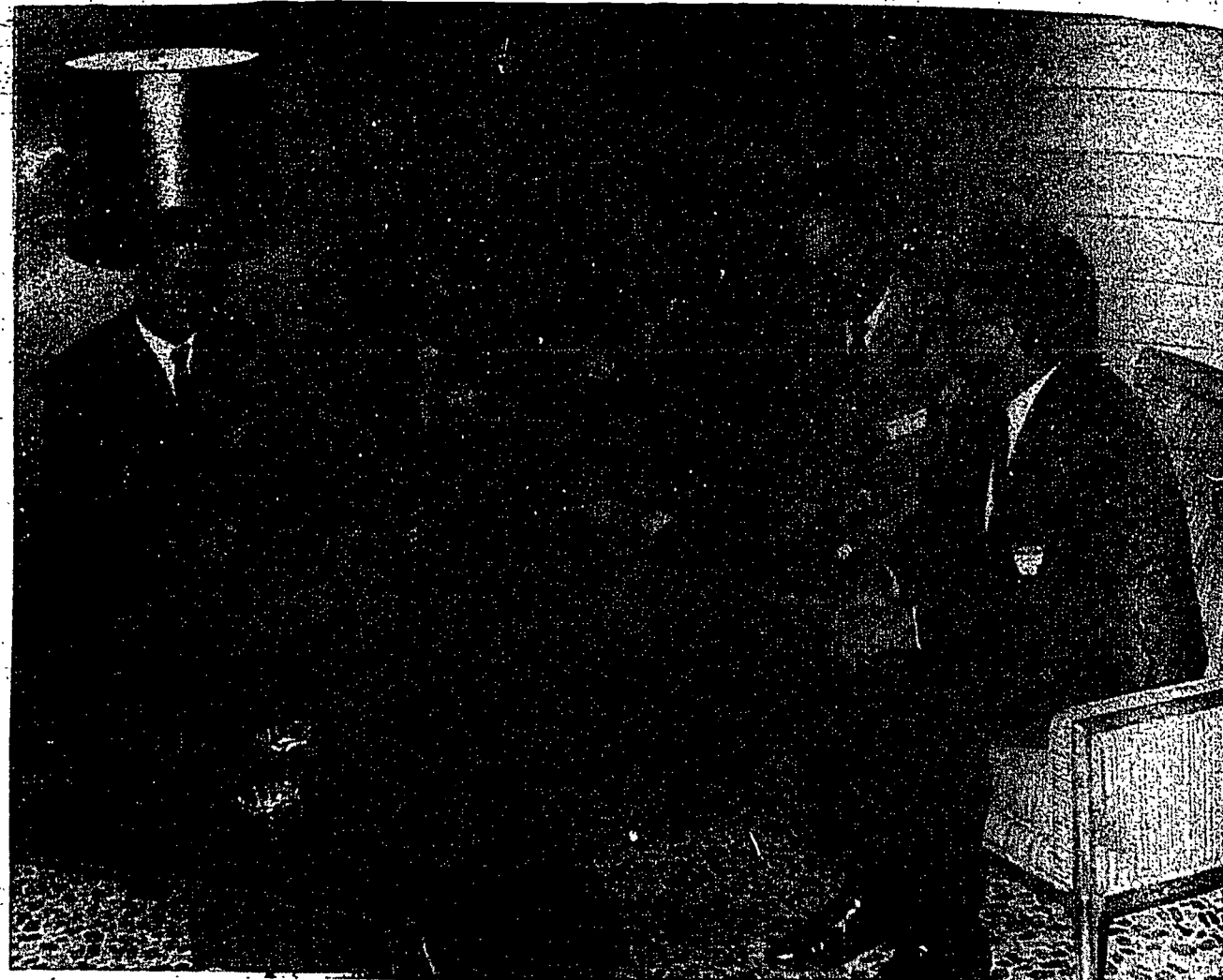

On Saturday, August 5, 1967, Commissioner Louis A. Schreiner of the Niles Park District, attended a Small Park District Conference, sponsored by the Illinois Association of Park Districts, held at the Dorchester Inn, in Dolton, Illinois.

Four Companies Seeking Western Power's Phone Holdings

Western Power and Gas Company, Inc. revealed today in a special report to stockholders that it had been approached by four companies seeking to acquire Western Power's telephone holdings.

C. H. Ross, newly elected Executive Vice President, in a letter to stockholders noted that "various rumors concerning your Company have been circulating in the financial community," and added:

"The Management of the Company has been approached by representatives of International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation, General Telephone and Electronics Corporation, United Utilities, Inc., and Continental Telephone Corporation, each of which has evidenced interest in the telephone properties owned or controlled by the Company. If any proposals are received, they will be carefully considered from the standpoint of the best interests of the stockholders."

In his letter, Ross also reported that on June 17, 1967, Judson Large, Chairman of the Board and President, suffered a stroke and will be incapacitated for an indefinite period. Large's duties have been delegated by the Board of Directors to Ross, a long-time member of the Board, during Large's incapacity.

"In the opinion of the Board of Directors," Ross concluded, "Mr. Large has built a competent organization which may be relied upon to carry on the efficient conduct of the Company's business. Revenues and earnings are continuing to increase and there is no reason to anticipate any reversal of this trend."

Niles Elementary Schools District No. 71 Open September 5

The Niles Elementary Schools, District #71, will welcome students back to school for a complete day of school Tuesday, September 5, 1967.

Parents of children who are new to the district are urged to register their children Monday through Friday, August 21, 1967, from 9:30 A.M. to 3:30 P.M., at the Niles Elementary School, 6935 Touhy Avenue, before the opening day of school. Commissioner Schreiner commended the success of the Viola Nelson school, park site development, which he said, was achieved by the coordinating of three taxing bodies; School Dist. 63, Morton, drove Park District, and the Niles Park District, "with the youngsters benefiting in the long run."

Recounting from his attendance at the August 4th Legislative Seminar also attended by 100 attorneys and commissioners, Commissioner Schreiner revealed that the Niles Park District had been selected to be host for the 1968 August, Regional Meeting. Commissioner Mike Provenzano, reporting on the investment of Park District funds stated that \$10,000 for 6 months and \$10,000 for 12 months @ rate of 5 per cent, were safely housed in the Bank of Niles.

Park secretary Ted Olsen, read a letter dated August 4th, from the County Auditor, of Cook County regarding tax delinquency on a parcel of land, Oakton Manor, to the tune of \$29,168 dating from 1955, and \$1700 tax delinquency on Jozwiak Park area. After much discussion the Board deemed it wise procedure to conduct a tax delinquency search through all nine park properties.

President Jack Leske, explained that the Park Board was not responsible for what he termed dormant taxes. Recently coming to light, they had obviously been delinquent for a number of years. As chairman of the Legal Committee of the Park Board, Commissioner Ray Eagan, was instructed to proceed with the matter.

Secretary Olsen reported that the interviews with the two prospects for N.P.D., attorney were still pending due to their being on vacation. The Board requested that the interviews be conducted as soon as possible.

On August 30th, 1967, the Niles Park Board will present its brief regarding the litigation of annexation of A. B. Dick Industrial property.

Recreation Director, D. Peterson, reported that 15,000 persons, less than last year had been in attendance at the pool. This he felt was due to the inclement weather. Fall, recreation program plans are to be released soon.

Land under study for purchase include: Touhy Ave. reservoir area of land at Touhy and Newark, Courtland Park area, and one and a half acres, Tam O' Shanter, west of Chicago River.

At the invitation of the Board, Mr. Bill Sterling, president of the Niles Youth Commission, presented some of the plans for youth, that the Commission will follow in the coming year ahead. The Board expressed an interest in Mr. Sterling's proposed Tween Program. This program had been established by Sterling when, residing in Skokie, and as a member of that area's Park District. With Commissioner Schreiner endorsing the Tween program, describing it as "one of the most successful in the State", Park Commissioners and Youth Commissioners are considering further discussion on the subject.

Banks in Niles will shortly be displaying charts of the planning study for the Niles Park District.

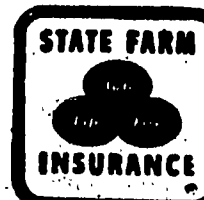

The loud cry of any parent of a teen ager today is: find something to do.

The pool managers at Chesterfield Estates found something for the kids to do. They offered live music, dancing and swimming. This was to have been an evening of good clean fun from 8 P.M. to 10 P.M. last Wednesday night.

After five songs were played by the five piece band called, "Just Us", the switchboard at the Niles Police Station lit up. Complaints of the noise came pouring in (5 altogether) out of the approximate 300 residents.

Granted the music was loud, but then so are children screaming while at play, dogs barking and lawn mowers sputtering along early Sunday mornings. Sirens, sonic booms and the normal everyday sounds which plague our battered eardrums every minute of our lives.

In an area so closely knit and especially with a private pool on the premises, one who anticipated buying or renting in the area should have had the foresight that parties might be held and there would be noise. These same complaints obviously cannot foresee their own youngsters ever growing into a teen.

Two detectives who answered the complaint said, "We'd rather see the kids gathering here than on street corners and it looks like a well-chaperoned group."

One might think the noise had disturbed only the older residents, but surprisingly enough it was two young Mothers well under 30.

How would these young women have reacted with real noise like a Molotov cocktail or shotgun blasts as did the unfortunate residents in Detroit and Watts? Most people lead such well organized lives that there

is little or no room for flexibility.

We cannot generalize and say that these kids are all juvenile delinquents, as one resident called them. An outside gathering with live music becomes a "Pied Piper" and is bound to attract instant attention from children and some adults. It's always better that the teenager diverts his energies to dancing rather than to other undesirable channels.

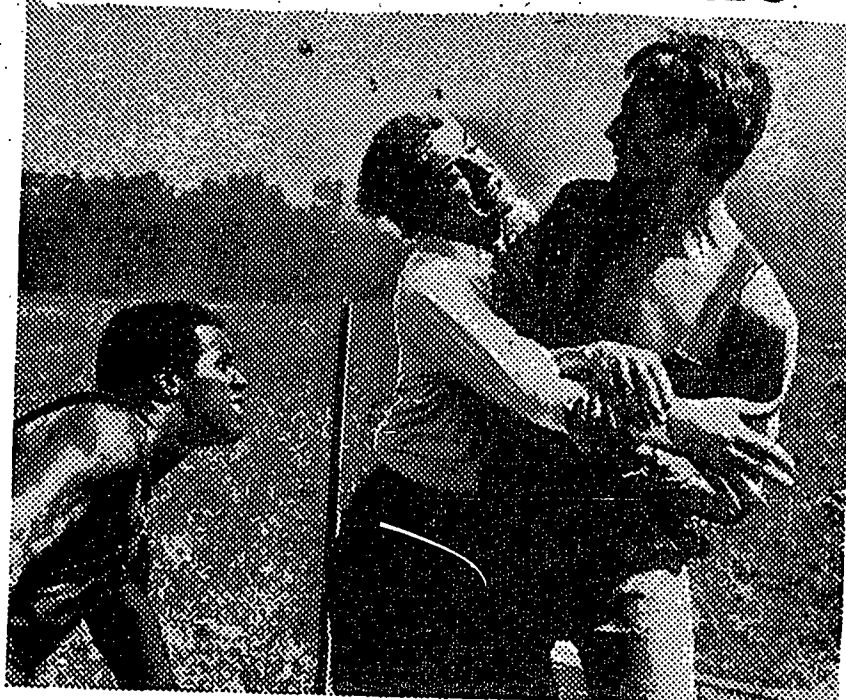
Too often the police are called unnecessarily and this can give a community a mark. We must try to remember there are few places the teen can go due to, no transportation, money etc. The conditions of our times have forced us to become more aware of the need to give our children some form of entertainment. In reality two hours of loud music can harm no-one. Unfortunately, we live among many selfish people and it would be an impossibility to try and please everyone.
