Commissioner Schreiner commended the success of the Viola Nelson school, park site development, which he said, was achieved by the coordinating of three taxing bodies; School Dist. 63. Morton Grove Park District. and the Niles Park District. "with the youngsters benefiting in the long run."

Recounting from his attendance at the August 4th Legislative Seminar also attended by 100 attorneys and commissioners, Commissioner Schreiner revealed that the Niles Park District had been selected to be host for th 1968 August, Regional Meeting. commissioner Mike Provenzano, reporting on the investment of Park District funds stated that \$10,000 for 6 months and \$10,000 for 12 months @ rate of 5 per cent, were safely housed in the Bank of Niles.

Park secretary Ted Olsen, read a letter dated August 4th. from the County Auditor, of Cook County regarding tax delinquency on a parcel of land, Oakton Manor, to the tune of \$29,168 dating from 1955, and \$1700 tax delinquency on Jozwiak Park area. After much discussion the Board deemed it wise procedure to conduct. a tax delinquency search through all nine park properties.

President Jack Leske, explained that the Park Board was not responsible for what he termed dormant taxes. Recently coming to light, they had obviously been delinquent for a number of years. As chairman of the Legal Committee of the Park Board, Commissoner Ray Eagan, was instructed to proceed with the matter.

Secretary Olsen reported that the interviews with the two prospects for N.P.D. attorney were still pending due to their being on vacation. The Board requested that the interviews be conducted as soon as possible.
