Despite the steady drenching rain on Saturday August 19th, some 64 artists set up their art exhibit paraphernalia in the most sheltered malls of the Lawrencewood Shopping Plaza on Oakton and Waukegan, in Niles

It was opening day for the first Lawrencewood Art Fair, presented by the Niles Art Guild, and scheduled for Sat-urday and Sunday August 20th,

A few hardy viewers, braving the downpour, gladdened the hearts of the artists as they peeked, inquisitively, neath umbrellas, at the exhibits while commiserating with the artists regarding the weather. In some instances pictures were bought and carefully shielded from the unrelenting rain, were hurried to waiting cars.

The Goldblatt store in Lawrencewood became a refuge for many of the artists who, damp and freezing through the wintry weather intrusion, hurriedly bought socks sweaters and mittens.

A panel of judges (Art Dir-ector - Dartnell Corporation, Chicago, and art instructors) escorted by Niles' Mayor Nicholas B. Blase, viewed each exhibit. While the judges conferred, the Mayor chatted with many of the artists and exhibits chairman - Niles Art Guild, Mr. Robert Berles, congratulating him and fellow workers for a job well done, The judges decided on a golden woodland scene in oils entitled, "Where we walked" for the \$100-Village Purchase Award, The work of professional artist Thomas St. Clair, of Glenview, this was his first art fair, and a first prize for him, Professing a natural bent for art, St. Clair said he had only been studying for the past couple of years under the direction of well known artist Peter Darrow, (formerly of North Shore Art League), and another well known art instructor, Brooke Allison. St. CLair was also awarded a ribbon bouquet for "Best of the Show".

Second prize was captured by Donna Jaggard of Chicago colored print-making,



During the 1967 summer season, the Niles Park District had in operation nine playgrounds. This was an increase of three from the previous years. A staff of twenty-four playground leaders were in charge of the various playgrounds. With the quality of this leadership being what it was, we feel the children of the village were adequatly programed for the eight week period of 6/26/67 to 8/18/67.

During the course of the playground program each playground has sponsored and encouraged special events of various types. Usually once per week each playground has presented its own special events day. Typical special events include such activities as bicycle parades, watermelon feasts, marble tournaments, and pet shows. Prizes are awarded and pictures have been taken with news releases going to the various local newspapers. On at least one occasion our program was published complete with pictures in the Des Plaines Newspaper as well as our local papers.

After careful consultation between the Director of Parks and Recreation and the Supervisor of Recreation two field trips were planned for the summer. This will increase to three or four next year. The first field trip was to a Cubs baseball game at Wrigley field. Three hundred (300) people participated in this event to make it a total success. Our second field trip was taken to Brookfield Zoo. Four hundred and fifty people (450) took part in this program. Field trips are something the older children look forward to and an anticipated increase in such events is slated for the future.

Along with the other activities, near the culmination of the summer activities, each playground holds a family night. A typical family night would include carnival type games, with prizes for the winners, a talent show, refreshments and usually a combo to play for dancing. Family nights are designed to bring the parents into contact with their childrens activities on the various playgrounds.

Our softball program on the playgrounds has become an integral part of our summer playground activities. This summer two playground leagues were organized. One for boys 8-10 and the other for boys 11-15 years of age. Inter-playground competition was keen, and each playground worked hard towards the championship.

Girls softball had a good response this year. Our girls softball team, composed of girls of the ages of 12 to 14 traveled to neighboring Park Districts to compete against other girls in their same age groups. It is anticipated that next year, Niles shall be the leader in organizing to a fine degree a Northwest Suburban Girls softball league.



Expected enrollment at the three high schools this fall is estimated to be about 7,600 students. Last year's enrollment was about 7,200.

Anticipated enrollment at each of the high schools is 2,200 at Niles East, 3,000 at Niles West, and 2,500 at Niles North,

According to Superintendent Clyde Parker, more than 80; new teachers will join the school district this fall. About 30 of them will be occupying new positions to meet the increased enrollment while the others will be replacing teachers who re-signed last June.

Teachers new to the Niles Township High Schools will begin several days of orientation programs Tuesday, August 29, when they meet in the Niles North auditorium with school officials from the district's central-administration.

James Friedman, president of the Niles Township Federation Teachers, will also address the new teachers. The teachers' union and the board of education recently completed ratification of a contract which becomes effective in September.

During an afternoon meeting on Tuesday, the new teachers will hear and view a slide presentation describing the community in which they have chosen to teach. In previous years, the new teachers took a bus ride through the township to see the industrial, business, and residential areas.

LEGAL NOTICE AN ORDINANCE RE MUNICIPAL SERVICE OCCUPATION TAX

BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees f the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: A tax is hereby imposed upon all persons engaged this municipality in the business of making sales of service at a rate of three-quarters of one per cent of the gross receipts rom any such business, in accordance with the provisions of Section B-11-5 of the Illinois Municipal Code.

SECTION 2: Every supplier or serviceman required to account or Municipal Service Occupation Tax for the benefit of this muncipality shall file, on or before the last day of each calendar nonth, the report to the State Department of Revenue required by Section Nine of the Service Occupation Tax Act.

SECTION 3: At the time such report is filed, there shall be minimum of construction and baid to the State Department of Revenue the amount of tax hereby cost, however, such soluimposed.

SECTION 4: The Village Clerk is hereby directed to transmit o the State Department of Revenue a certified copy of this Ordinance not later than five (5) days after the effective date of this cost. Ordinance.

The Policy stated, "No permits shall be issued by the Metropolitan Sanitary district for sewers to be constructed within a flood hazard area, as delineated on the maps prepared by the United States Geological Survey in cooperation with the Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission, until the local municipality has adopted a flood. plain zoning ordinance which meets the approval of the Sanitary District.

Permits in undeveloped areas will not be approved until Cook County adopts flood plain zoning_ regulations.

The ordinance shall include but not be limited to the following: 1. Restriction on residential developments. 2. Provisions for establishing permanent flood way channels through acquisition of rights of way, including easements for maintenance and improvements. 3. Requirements for flood proofing buildings within the flood hazard areas.

And so the Village of Niles has ready a Flood Plain Ordinance drawn up by. Village Attorney, James Sneider, in conjunction with Village Engineer, George Anderson, and reported Mayor Blase, "We are the first Village to have the Ordinance approved by the Sanitary District." A full report of the Village of Niles Flood Plain Ordinance of 1967 appears elsewhere in this paper.
