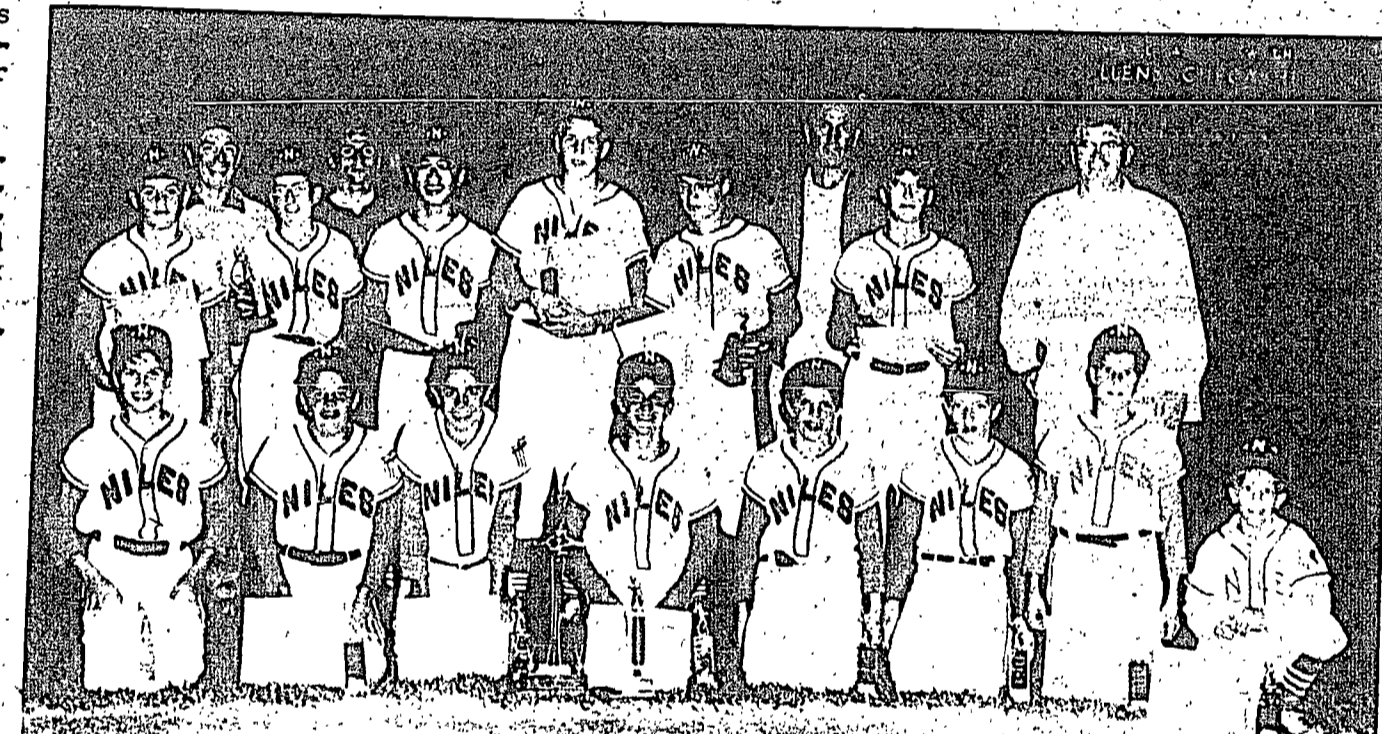
ENROLLMENT UP AT NILES, MAINE HI SCHOOLS

Only Elementary Increase In District 63

School enrollment for the 1967-68 year in local districts moved up in the high school districts and in district 63 while remaining relatively static in Niles Township elementary schools and district 64.

In Maine East High School attendance moved up to 3,631 for this year, about a 10% increase over last year's figure of 3,297.

In Niles Township High Schools the projected figure is up 300 over last year's actual figures, from 7,229 to 7,500. Niles High West increased from 2,765 to 2,981. Maine East moved up from 2,146 to 2,170 while Niles High North increased from 2,318 to 2,512.



Niles All Stars Win Thillens Tourney

The Niles All Stars received the First place Team and Individual Trophies after six straight victories in the 16th annual Thillens Statewide Tournament.

Niles victims consisted of the Skokie All Stars; 9 to 0, Franklin Park All Stars, 7 to 0, Shabbona Park All Stars, 10 to 1, Humboldt Park All Stars 3 to 2, and the Villa Park All Stars. Twice by the same scores of 5 to 2.

On Championship Night the undefeated Niles team were prepared to face last year's champion-Villa Park. Earlier in the tournament Niles had already faced this ball club and had handed them their first defeat by a score of five to two, they were back to face them again with the hopes of winning the double elimination tournament undefeated. All the way until the third inning their hopes became dimmer with Villa Park holding a 2 to 0 lead; then it happened - in the fourth inning with no outs and Niles with runners on first and second base - the clean-up batter, first baseman Fred Parker, slammed a 235 foot home run over the centerfield fence to give Niles a 3 to 2 lead. With 2 more runs in the fifth inning the 5 to 2 victory became impossible for Villa Park to upset.

Villa Park placed in second place, Kelly Park placed 3rd, and 4th went to West Chatham.

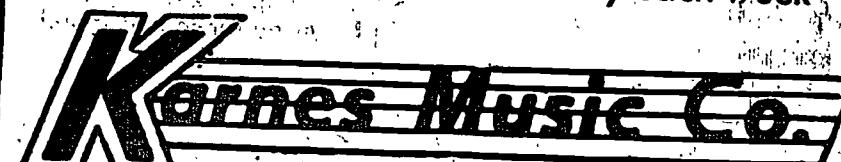

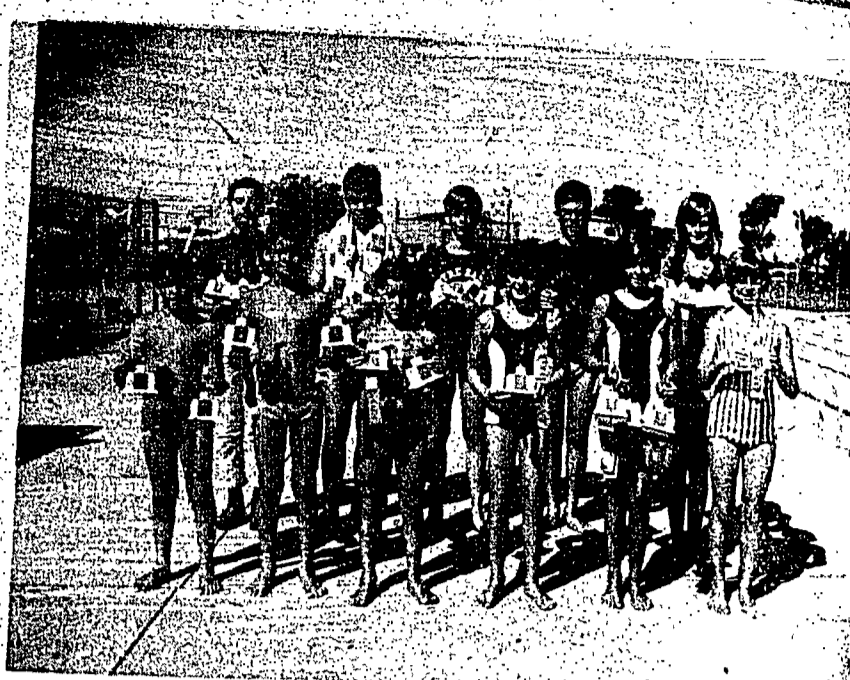

Central Telephone Distributes Phone Directory

Distribution has been completed of Central Telephone Company of Illinois' new 1967 issue of the Des Plaines-Park Ridge telephone directory. Admission for the dance is \$1.00.



Schedule Public Hearing On Niles Schools 67-68 Budget

A public hearing on the proposed 1967-68 budget for the Niles Township High Schools will be held Thursday, September 7, at 7:30 p.m. in the Niles West building, Edens and Oakton, Skokie.

Approved by the school board last month, the tentative budget of \$11,504,872 will require an estimated tax rate of \$1.6958 for every \$100 of assessed valuation.

The proposed budget, which is about \$1.1 million more than last year's budget, consists of six funds containing the financial needs of the district.

The largest is the education fund. Accounting for 68.5 per cent of the total school budget, the education fund for 1967-68 is set at \$7,880,545, an amount which is about \$850,000 more than last year's.

The bulk of the education fund is used to operate the school district's educational program, including teachers' salaries, supplies, and instructional materials.

About \$5.8 million of the total education fund is used in this operation, of which \$4.137,

835 is earmarked for salaries of the school district's more than 450 classroom teachers and other educational specialists.

Other funds in the budget are the Building fund, 15.24 per cent of the total; the Bond and Interest fund, 10.67 per cent; the Transportation fund, 2.86 per cent of the total; the Municipal Retirement fund, 1.18 per cent of the budget; and the Junior College fund, 1.55 per cent of the total.

According to Dr. Clyde Parker, superintendent of the high schools, the district is using only 33 per cent of the township's potential bonding power.

A school system's bonding power is set by law at 5 per cent of the district's total assessed valuation, which for Niles Township is more than a half billion dollars.

Almost 85 per cent of the school district's revenues to support the budget, Dr. Parker explained, come from real estate taxes, with the remaining 15 per cent coming from state and federal programs and miscellaneous sources.

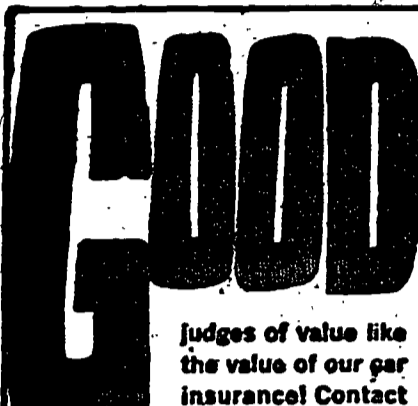

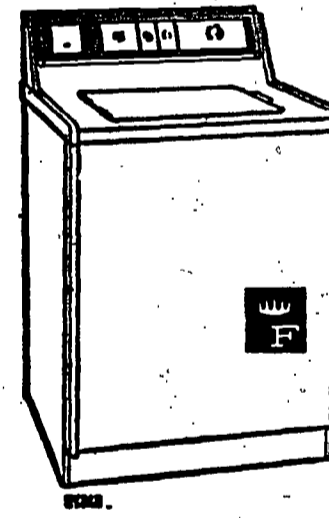

Carol Craigie Returns From Africa

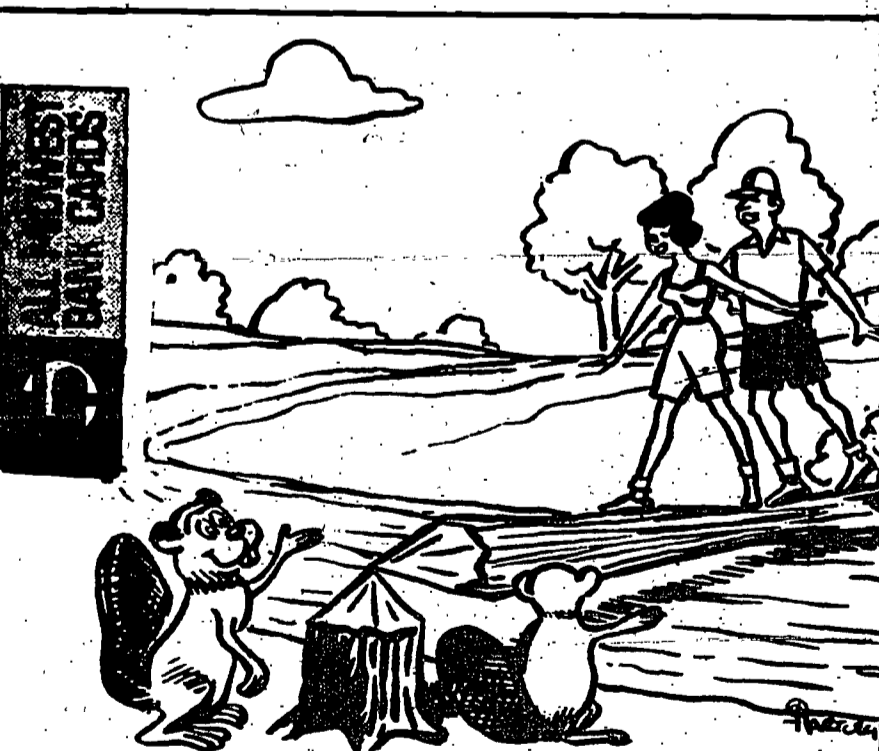
Miss Carol Craigie, 8316 N. Merrill St., Niles, Illinois returned on August 26 from participating in Operation Cross-

Niles South on Touhy had 518 while the new Niles North elementary school has 317. The figure may go up to 850 by the time the final enrollment figures are in.

In booming district 63, where the population explosion has been continuous thru recent years, the district increased from 6,790 to 7,100. In the junior high school the 7th grade went up from 591 to 647 while the 8th grade went down from 555 to 548. Oak school went down from 762 to 714; Ballard School decreased, 546 to 510; Nelson School moved from 862 down to 859; Melzer School went down from 814 to 803.

St. John Brebeuf in Niles remained constant with the approximate figure about the same as

last year, between 1,500 to 1,600.

In district 64 the total Park Ridge - Niles figure decreased from 6,596 to 6,518. Jefferson elementary school is up from 596 to 660, primarily due to 42 kindergarten transferees from Franklin School, Emerson Junior High School moved up from 554 to 574 with 298 students in 7th grade and 276 in eighth grade.

In district 67, the Morton Grove-Niles-Golf area the district remained about the same as last year. In the junior high 311 students graduated last year. This year enrollment is already at 309, 159 in 7th grade and 150 in the eighth grade. Golf elementary has 570 against 590 last year while

Hynes has 670 compared to 660 plus the last year.

In Morton Grove district 70 total approximation is 1,600 up slightly from the '66-'67 year.

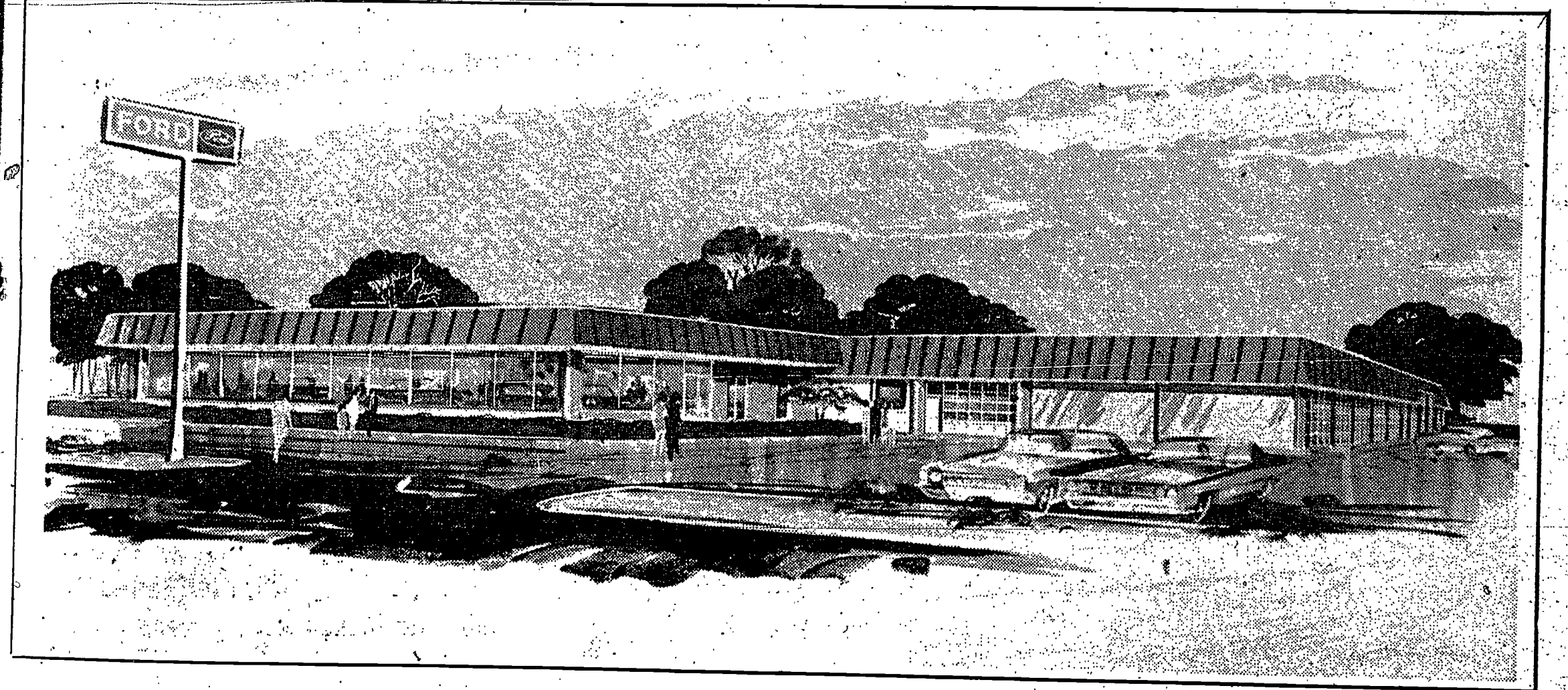

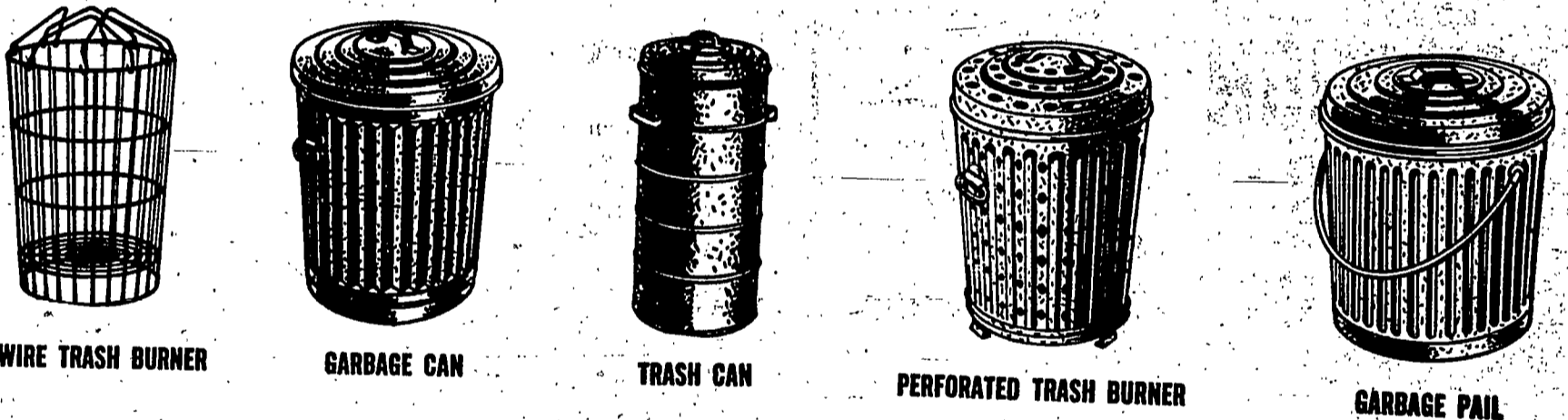

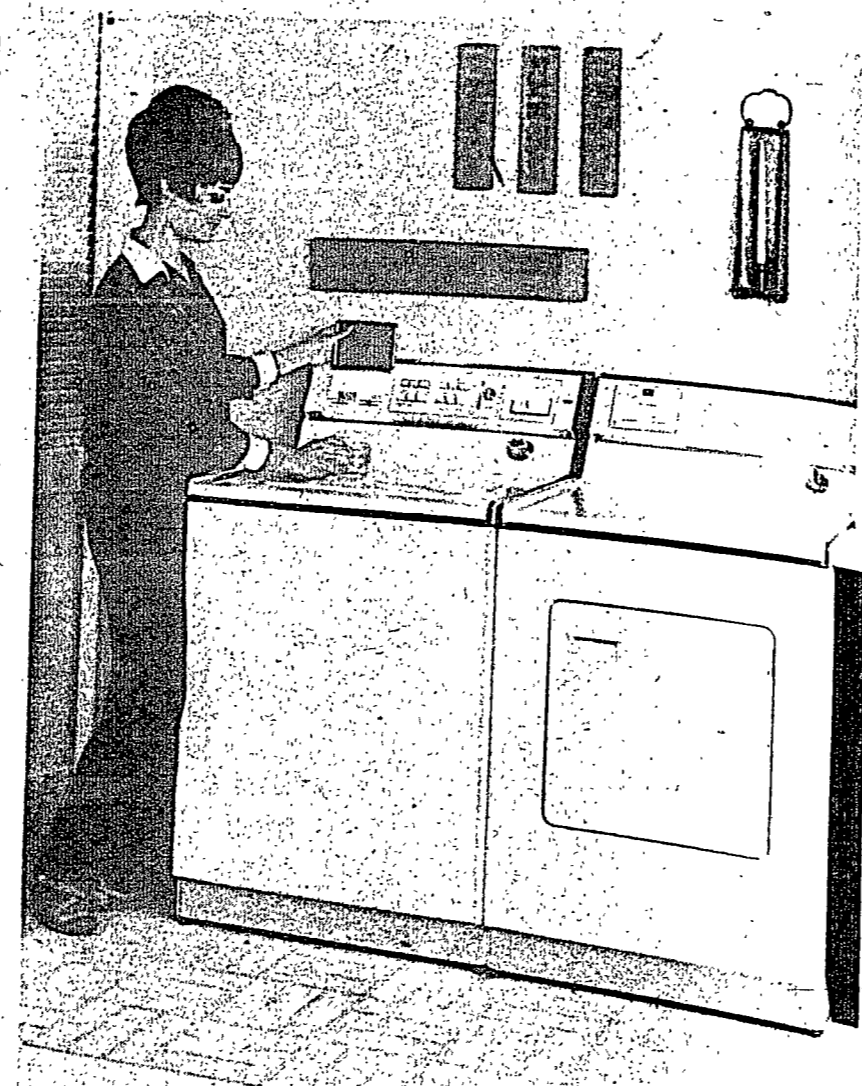

was necessary to change the Board members at the village board level. Since the revolution there the school district has leaped forward.

District 63 has always been the poor sister among its neighbors due to the lack of industry dollars and high-valued property in its area. While Niles Township school districts had as much as 4 times the assessed valuation behind each child as district 63 had, nevertheless the leap forward has been ever-present because of the enlightened Board which now administers the schools.

Both the village of Niles and school district 63 revolutions came about because citizens cared enough about these areas to do something about them. Both changes came because of grass roots efforts on the part of the "no angle, non-political citizen" who was only interested in the betterment of his community.

While THE BUGLE often needles, baits and tries to make life a bit uneasy for public representatives who aren't doing

the job, we are merely citing the two most graphic illustrations in our community, as to what can be accomplished by citizens who care.

Since both Niles and district 63 have had changes which have vastly improved these areas we throw open the question whether or not closer scrutiny should be aimed at all school boards, park boards and village boards here. As the guy who foots the bills, how can you be sure you're getting your full dollars worth if you're not watching the "store"? How do you Niles Township residents, with your tax-rich schools, know you're getting the most for your dollar? And when was the last time you dropped down to a school board meeting and asked a few questions?

To you newcomers who've fled the big city, here in suburbia you can actually get a chance to carry the ball, ... or do the blocking for the guy you want to carry the ball. It just takes a little interest, a few hours, and you too can cause a revolution which will benefit you and your kids for the many years to come.
