## Residents Ask For Local Park Improvements

The hiring of Gabriel Berrato as the new park attorney was the one bright light in Tuesday night's park board meeting.

The meeting was a continuous carping by residents who were critical of the lack of park board action in improving lo-

cal parks near their homes. A January, 1967 letter was read from the park board which promised to improve NICO Park, but as was pointed out by resident Betty Gauthier, nothing had been done to comply with the letter's promises. Ray Devlin, a neighbor of the Ballard Park area, noted the three

year old park had never had improvement since its purchase and implied the park board would have a difficult time passing the proposed Alper and Alper recommendations if local parks needs were not first attended to.

A resident from the Notre

Dame High School area was also highly critical of the drainage from the fields there and likewise pointed to the local need before any plus million dollar issue should be introduced to residents.

In another criticism two teens said they represented 75% of the

children in the park teen center program and they asked to have Dorothy Schreiner returned as their supervisor. When park president Leske said recreation director Peterson recommended the new supervisor, and said it was partly due to more specialized training for the job, Mrs. Schreiner rose, said she "loved" the children,

The computers used in programming the East Maine Junior High students last week must have got their wires crossed. A guy who lives in my house, one of the world's great 12 year olds, came home from school the first day and told me how great eighth grade is. Whenever he has praise for anything related to school matters, I automatically get suspicious. When he mentioned how great his program was, I knew something had to be out of whack. The great 12 year old then told me he had 3 lunches on Monday, 10 study periods, 6 of them in a row at the end of the day.

Last Friday he reported all program cards were returned to the office and the old method of typing out programs was used to correct some obvious goof-ups of the computers. This week the great one has returned to his old ways. His praise for the eighth grade is on a par with his past feelings for the other 7 grades and I know normalcy has returned.

In our "get the record straight" department we erroneously mentioned Niles had a high suicide rate. According to the guy who is keeper of the records at the police department, Niles has had 1 suicide reported this year. Our informant who told us about the 2-a-month rate might have been referring to attempted suicides, which is very difficult to record.

There was fire damage to the rug, chairs and light fixtures, and smoke damage to the room, which was estimated at \$500 to \$1,000.

## Polls Open 9 A.M. To 7 P.M.

Residents in District 64 will go to the polls this Saturday to vote on tax rate increases for the school system's Education and Building Funds and on a \$1,165,000 bond issue to build a new school in the northwest section of the District.

The tax rate increase in the Education Fund is primarily for teacher's salaries, according to Perry Tryten, chairman of the Board of Education's Finance Committee. He pointed out that the beginning salary for teachers in District 64 is \$7,000.

"This is really average or below for teachers in this area," he said. Beginning salaries in both Des Plaines District 62 and East-Maine District 63 are \$5,800. "The average salary of teachers in District 64 is approximately \$8,500 which is above average for this area," Mr. Tryten added. "This is the result of our salary schedule which is weighted in favor of experience and training. It could also account for our continuing to attract and keep good teachers."

requested he veto. A bill passed both houses of the legislature which would have made it mandatory that a common school district provide free transportation for all school children living 1 1/2 miles or more from their school, when there is no adequate public transportation. Since the district would fall in this category, it would have had to levy a transportation tax of about 8 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. However, because of the lateness of the year, the tax money wouldn't be received in time for this school year forcing the district to use the much-needed educational fund for this busing purpose. Presently, it costs \$55 per year for busing to the junior high. If the district had to pay for this it would have had to take about \$50,000 from education and apply it to transportation. This financial burden forced on the district resulted in its board members actively contacting the governor to veto the bill.

Actually, the school board would likely be in favor of such a law. Had the vetoed

teachers."

"The Board of Education believes it is necessary in these times to pay good salaries to attract good teachers. If we learn anything from the problems many school systems throughout the country are now having, it is that this is not the time to fall behind in this area," he said.

District 64 has the lowest rate in teacher turnover in the northwest suburban area, according to a recent informal survey conducted by the Barrington School District. It is 17 per cent compared to 33 per cent for Barrington District 1 and 31 per cent in Mt. Prospect. Arlington Heights and Barrington District 4 had a turnover of 25 per cent and Des Plaines and Palatine had a teacher turnover of 24 per cent.

"This indicates," Mr. Trytten said, "that District 64 not only attracts good teachers but also keeps them. It is to continue this program that we need and are asking for more money in the Education Fund."

The Board is asking for a tax rate increase of 21 cents in the Education Fund and for an increase of 12 1/2 cents for the Building Fund. The Board adopted on August 28 the first deficit budget for District 64 since World War II. This District is one of the few in the immediate area that operated on a cash basis, meeting its financial obligations with current income without use of tax anticipation warrants.

The bond issue of \$1,165,000 will be used to construct a new school in the area of Western and Woodland streets in the northwest part of the District. The funds will be used to purchase and develop the site, build the school, pay for all fees and furnishings. In addition \$65,000 of this money will be used to complete payment on the construction of classrooms and other facilities now near completion. Cost of this construction exceeded the \$600,000 bond issue approved in a referendum in October, 1967.

Polls will be open in the ten elementary schools of District 64 from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 23. Voters cast their ballots at the school in the area in which they reside.

## New Approach To Religion At Notre Dame High School

"Discovery, Community, and The Holy" replaced the familiar title "Religion" on the schedules of baffled students at Notre Dame this year, signaling a more basic policy change in the transformed religion department.

"It was the conviction of the department," said Rev. Donald Shoulberg, C.S.C., "that there had to be a radical departure from the traditional salvation history approach which failed to interest or involve the students in Christianity. Unless Christ becomes a part of their everyday realities, from football to Simon and Garfunkel, they will never become true Christians."

The new program, he elaborated, will be keyed to the adolescent's level of development in an attempt "to incorporate a Christian vision of service in the world."

For the freshmen, "Discovery" will focus on the adolescent's new awareness of himself, through a study of friendship, sexuality and the concept of Christ as a friend and brother. Father Langenderfer, Bro. Rodney Struble and Mr. Charles Gerwells back up their efforts with a new text, "Encountering Christ."

"Community" will be introduced to the sophomores on the traditional three day a week basis by Bro. James Wach and Miss Mary Lou Signa. Father Shoulberg describes the approach as "an expanding of horizons still working from the direct experiences of the young teen-ager."
