

Mate Seized In Slaying Of Wife

Jack Porter, 37, was arrested Tuesday and charged with murdering his estranged wife and shooting her mother in north suburban Niles.

Asst. State's Atty. Frank Fiorite said Porter, who admitted the crimes was arraigned Tuesday in Niles branch of Circuit court on charges of murder and attempted murder.

The victims were Mrs. Collette Porter, 23, who was pro-

nounced dead at Lutheran General hospital in Park Ridge, and Mrs. Beryl Roth, 43. She is being treated at the same hospital for three bullet wounds.

The shootings occurred in the Roth residence at 8818 Prospect av., in the suburb.

Niles police captain William Mehring said the shootings occurred after a quarrel in the living room involving the two women and Mrs. Poter's hus-

Turn Down All Three Proposals

School district 64 president Bushnell Fullerton said Monday night Saturday's defeated referenda will have to be resubmitted to the voters until they are passed. While there were no definite plans expressed at Monday's Board meeting it was implied there may be cut-backs in present programs. Alternative programs were requested "by the chair" to enable the school district to live within its present budget.

Voters opposed all three of the proposals on the referendum on a ratio of slightly less than 2 to 1, with the rate increase for the Education Fund receiving the most support. The breakdown of the total vote on the three proposals is as fol-



Park District Art Classes Begin October 9


The Niles Park District will offer Instructions in Art during their fall and winter programs.

Dear Mr. Besser,

1 attended School District #64's board meeting last night, and, believe me, these people have something which I'm not sure I possess.

What a thankless tob!

To begin with, I would have to attend meetings for a year or more to begin to understand all the technicalities, but I don't know whether I could tolerate trying to work for a cause I believed in - a good education for all the children in the community - when their own parents aren't concerned enough with their education to read a few facts about what other communities are doing, for example, or even to just maintain a status quo, by OKing a referendum at the polls, which is so desperately needed to avoid overcrowding and it's end-result. And sit on the board "for free" yet ---?

How would my husband and feel if, after working hard for a long period of time (at a minimum wage for the job) and then hear the boss say, "Sorry, Verne, we have to pay too much taxes, we can't afford a raise for you just now."

Many parents hold teachers entirely responsible for the education of their children, but I know from experience and from what I've read and heard in lectures, that more children than we care to admit, are illprepared to enter school in the first place, and improper handling of children in the home causes a mental barrier which makes learning difficult.

I'm not trying to protect or excuse teachers, because I believe that many of them need to sit down and do a little soul searching from time to time, but I do believe that not all problems children have in school can be laid at the school's doorstep.

Many parents feel that if they talk to their friends and

neighbors about their child's school problems and maybe discuss them with the teacher once, (sometimes with a result that does not please them) and continue to be irritated about it inwardly, that this is enough, l say this is only the beginning. Parents should take a good, long look at their child and their own ways of guiding this child thru life and stop avoiding "traumatic experiences". These are what build character - education only fortifies them for the good. It brings to mind a quotation came across recently - "No man can choose what coming hours can bring to him, of need, of joy, of suffering. But what his soul shall bring onto each hour to meet its challenge— this is in his power". (writ-ten by Pricilla Leonard)

In some of my own soul searching, one of the many recollections which come to my mind is my father's saying, "Let him who is blameless, cast the first stone." As I look back, this helped me to love my father and respect him.

People today are so con-cerned with the almighty dol-lar that they've lost sight of their own purpose on earth.
Instead of Weighing the prob-lems with the children and trying to look at them objectively and come to a constructive solution with their mates, they turn off the problems by turning on

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



With eight remaining matches and a post-season tournament, coach Bob Dollaske "looks forward to a season of success."



One of our favorites thru the vears is the new assistant superintendent in District 63, Frank Dagne, Six years ago Frank was principal at Oak School and more recently was principal at the new Nathanson School, where he instituted nongraded classes.

Monday night Frank let go with some of his marvelous enthusiasm which becomes so infectious, when he reviewed the success of the non-graded program. We could not do justice to the program by giving capsule comment here but Frank pointed out the lack of disciplinary problems he had due to the new system. By allowing a student to move at his own rate the frustration of not being able to keep up with the class was significantly lessened.

Coupling Frank's remarks with those of the head of the new diagnostic center, a revolution in non-grading is likely to come to our areas sooner diagnostic head, a Dr. Tiedler, pictured the misery of the problem child, who is a poor reader (and) or a poor learner.
