Citizens Advisory Committee Submits Recommendations

After many months of study and investigation, the Citizens Advisory Committee submitted the following recommendations to the Village Board:

1. A recommendation that, from a safety stand-point, a sidewalk program be instituted for a continuance of pedestrian walk from the south end of Niles to the North end, along Milwaukee Ave., principally from Dempster to the north end of the Village.
2. A recommendation with the regard to the elimination of unsightly public utility poles along Milwaukee Ave., from Howard to Oakton St. The committee suggested that the Village Board enlist the aid of the Edison Co., Illinois Bell, and Central Telephone Companies in removing wires and poles.
3. A recommendation for the improvement of dedicated alleys in use; vacating of alleys that are not in use; and the establishment of a lighting program for the improved alleys.
4. A recommendation that an in-

Turn Down All Three Proposals

School district 64 president Bushnell Fullerton said Monday night Saturday's defeated referendum will have to be resubmitted to the voters until they are passed. While there were no definite plans expressed at Monday's Board meeting it was implied there may be cut-backs in present programs. Alternative programs were requested "by the chair" to enable the school district to live within its present budget.

Voters opposed all three of the proposals on the referendum on a ratio of slightly less than 2 to 1, with the rate increase for the Education Fund receiving the most support. The breakdown of the total vote on the three proposals is as follows:

- Bond Referendum (\$1,165,000 proposal for a new elementary school)
YES - 1845
NO - 3104
 - 12.5 Cent Increase for Building Fund
YES - 1771
NO - 3174
 - 21 Cent Increase for Education Fund
YES - 1915
NO - 3022
- Niles voters at Jefferson School led all opposition to the three issues, opposing the bond referendum by more than 5 to 1, the building rate 6 to 1 and the educational rate by 5 to 1.

The course, Abstract Algebra, is under the direction of Dr. Halm Reingold, chairman of the Math Department at I.I.T., and carries no credit other than academic recognition on the students' school records.

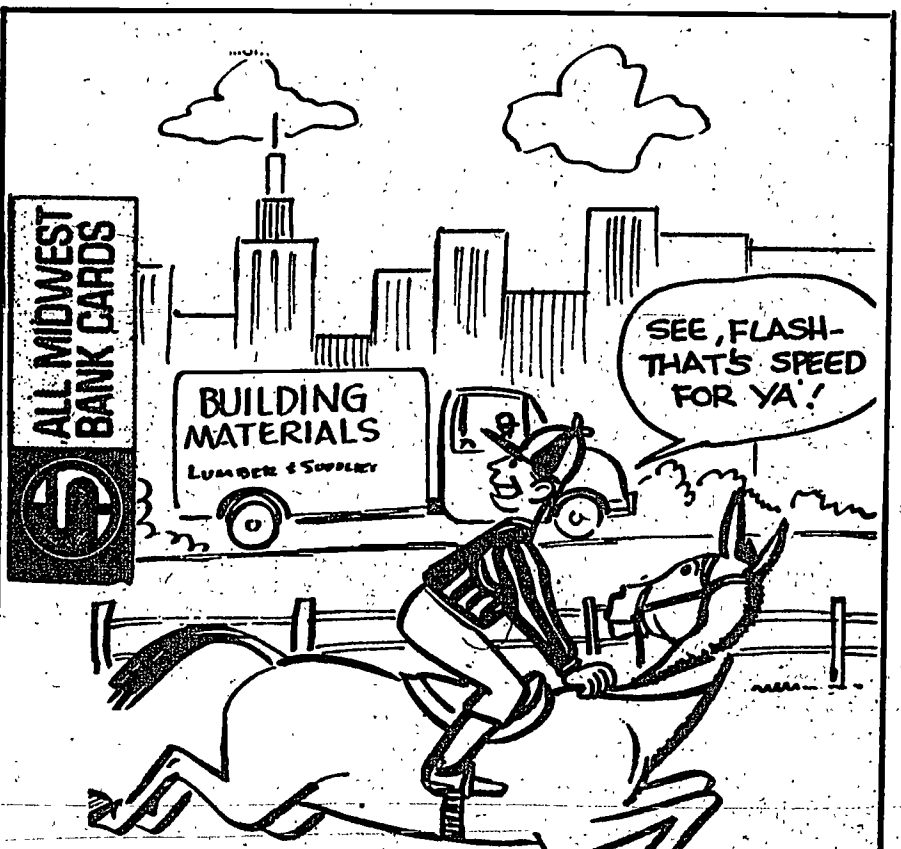
The Jefferson P.T.A. will hold their new Mother's Tea, October 4, Wednesday at 1:45 in the school's activity room.

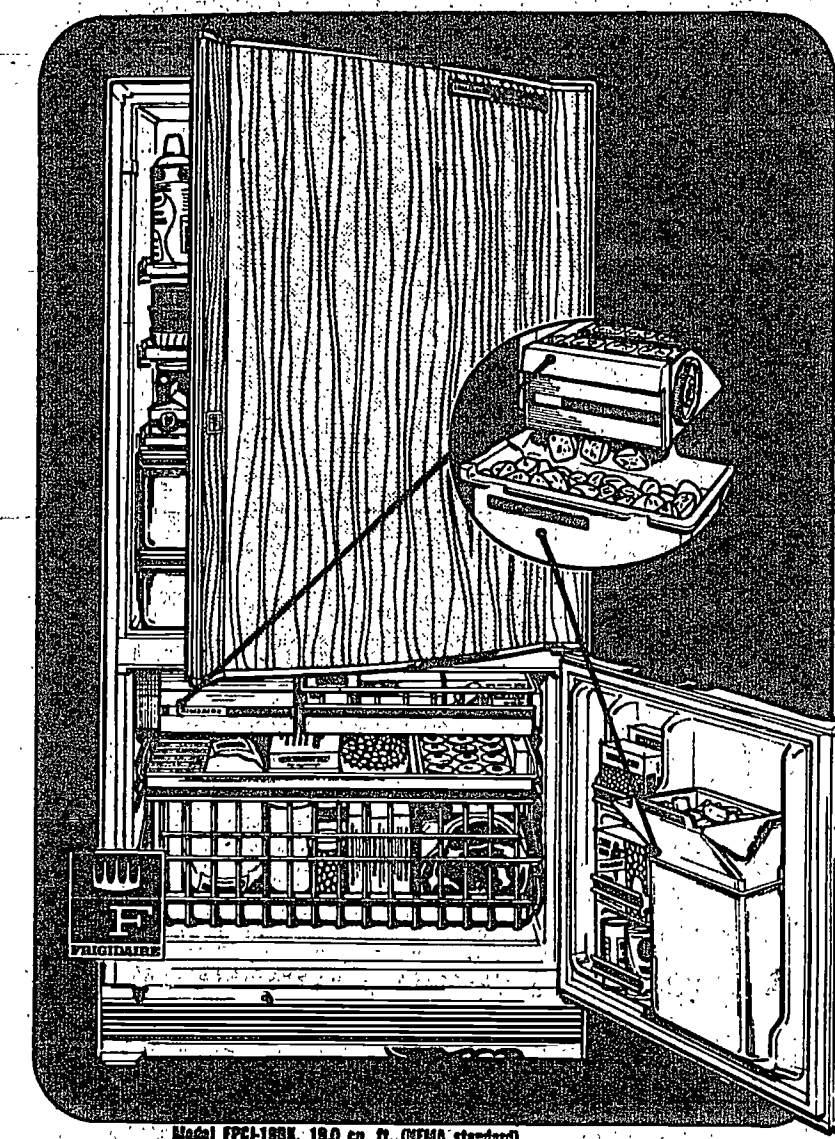

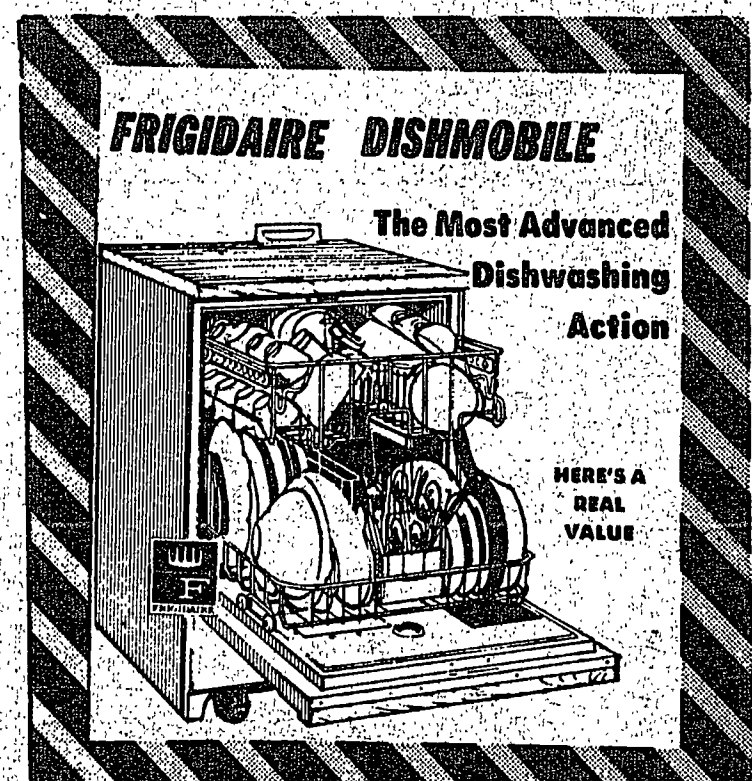

which consists of Physical fitness, sports, games and swimming classes is one of the outstanding programs for the Handicapped in the Metropolitan Chicago area. It is designed to meet the needs of each Handicapped individual be it either Physically or Mentally Handicapped.

Under the direction of Ray Newman, a volunteer instructor starting his 3rd year at the Y three special Physical Education classes are offered each week. On Tuesdays from 2:00 P.M. to 3:30 P.M. a pre-school Handicapped class is offered. The child must be 2 years of age or over, Mentally or physically handicapped. Each child will receive individual instruction in crawling,

rolling, simple co-ordinating, exercise, games and swimming. The benefits from the class will help the child when he or she enters public school. The limit in this class will be 10 pupils. This pre-school class is the only one of its kind in the Chicago area.

A class for the Perceptually Handicapped is offered on Tuesdays from 3:30 P.M. to 5:15 P.M. and a class for the Physically Handicapped and Mentally Retarded is held on Fridays from 3:30 P.M. to 5:15 P.M.

Pat Nardi, also a volunteer instructor will hold swimming classes each Thursday evening from 7:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M. Each student in the swimming class will have its own volunteer instructor, and will be taught at his own pace.

The classes are staffed with volunteers from Niles High Schools, boy scouts, girl scouts, service clubs and Adults. Mr. Donald Hardesty, Program Director of the Leaning Tower YMCA said that the program needs more volunteers and interested persons can contact Mr. Hardesty at the Y. Also parents with Handicapped Children who want more information about this program can contact Mr. Hardesty, Telephone 647-8222.



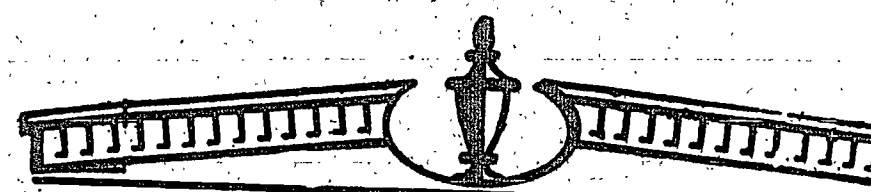

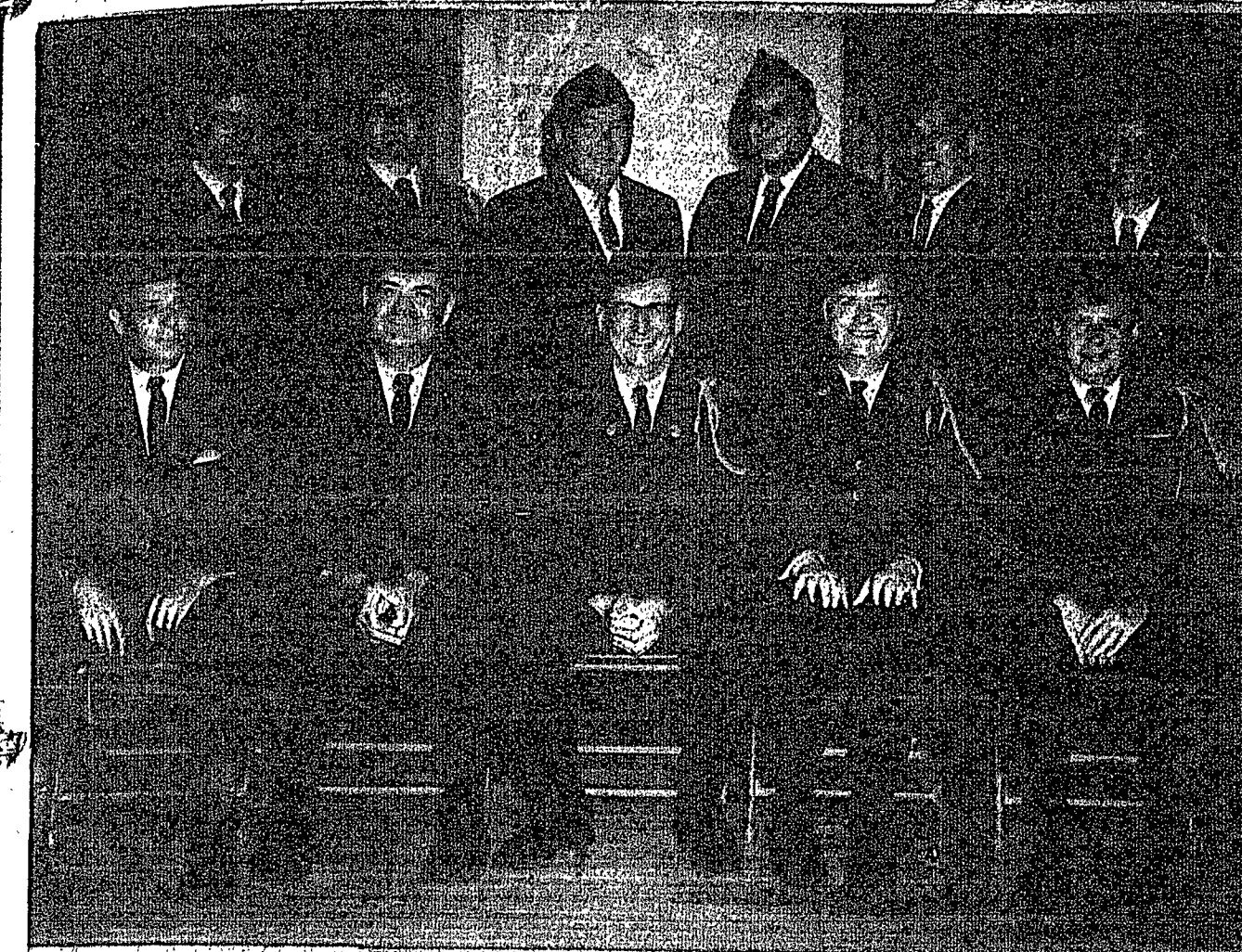

John Sebastian Offers Course In Defensive Driving

The three most common faults among drivers are: first, lack of driving skill; second, improper attitude; and third, inattention behind the wheel. "There is no good reason for not becoming a skillful driver," Ben Mankowsky, Chairman of the Niles Safety Council said today. "Driving, like any other complex task, requires study and practice," he emphasized. The average driver spends more than two hours a day behind the wheel of a car. This is more time annually than most skillful athletes practice.

The skillful driver will learn to analyze traffic situations, weather and road conditions and the probable reactions of other drivers the same way a ball player quickly analyzes a play. "He increases his skill by practice," he observes what will happen next in the constantly changing traffic scene. "Chairman Mankowsky emphasized.

The competent driver guards against letting one hazard overshadow another. He realizes that death or injury lurks in every hazard. He knows how one hazard may strike while he is dealing with another. Day after day the skillful driver extracts a lesson from each block in the city and each mile on the highway. He adjusts to his driving environment by adapting his driving techniques to the different con-

ditions he encounters, such as limited-access or freeway driving.

"Above all," Chairman Mankowsky said, "a skillful driver will sharpen his defensive driving tactics by learning to recognize traffic hazards, understanding how they could affect him, and then will take corrective action in time to avoid an accident." The competent driver will always cooperate with other drivers. He will yield the right-of-way to avoid a smashup even though legally he has the right to go first. He will always watch for other drivers and never count on them to watch out for him. The good driver will acknowledge that complacency can make him a killer! He will size himself up from every angle - mental, physical and emotional. He will ever strive to become a "better driver". He knows that safe driving is really an exercise in self-government.

A course in Defensive Driving is offered monthly by John T. Sebastian, former Village of Niles Safety Council Chairman, at Maine Township High School East on Thursday evenings at 7:30 P.M. Mr. Sebastian, the senior staff member of the combined Maine Township High Schools Safety and Driver Education staffs, is offering his 16 years of teaching experience as a civic contribution to the entire community.

Dist. 207 Extends Date For Jr. College Notifications

The Board of Education of Township High School District #207 passed a resolution which established the date May 15th, 1968, as the date prior to which "Notifications of Intent" to attend a recognized public junior college in the state of Illinois will be received and honored with the issuance of an Authorization for Partial Student Support while attending a recognized public junior college in Illinois. July 1, 1967, had been the previous acceptance deadline date for such support. A recently enacted state bill (House Bill 1820) made this resolution possible. This and other resolutions were passed at the regular monthly Board meeting held Monday evening, September 18th at Maine East.

The tentative budget of \$13,110,590.22, as presented at the August 18th, 1967, Board of Education meeting, and placed on public display for the period August 18th through September

18th, was unanimously approved and adopted.

Mr. Paul Hanson, Park Ridge resident, raised the question as to what proportion of Federal funds — helped support the "Transportation" item in the budget. Mr. Harold Markworth, District #207 Business Manager, commented that about nine students were presently being transported into the Chicago area and that State funds were available for this purpose, not Federal funds.

Mr. Hanson and members of the board later commented that the general public transportation system of transporting students to and from school should be improved if and where possible.

The board further adopted a resolution which would permit the issuance of \$15,000,000 in General Obligation Bonds for construction purposes related to improvements and additions to the three high school buildings as approved by the Referendum of 1967.

A resolution was also adopted to file a certificate of Tax Levy for 1967 in the amount of \$9,803,577.

Levies were suggested and approved as follows: Transportation Fund, \$49,000; Educational Fund, \$7,720,400; Regular Building Fund, \$1,631,077; Municipal Retirement Fund, \$240,000; Junior College Fund, \$163,100.

Dr. Richard R. Short, Superintendent of Schools, pointed out that these levies would provide funds for Township High School District #207 to operate for the 1968-1969 school year!

Progress was being made on preliminary plans and initial construction at all three high schools, according to Mr. Roy

O. Makela, Niles, board member and chairman of the Building and Grounds committee. Sketches and preliminary drawings were once again presented by Mr. Don Stillwaghn, and Mr. Makela stated that he was calling a meeting of his Building and Grounds Committee for Monday, September 25th, for further consideration of approved construction and improvement building projects.

Other items of board action included the approval of the employment of eleven teachers new to the system; employment of four non-certified employees; and acceptance of one teacher resignation. Additional board action authorized the Superintendent and/or the Principals of the three Maine high schools to suspend students guilty of gross disobedience or misconduct for a period not to exceed 7 days or until the next regular meeting of the Board of Education, whichever first occurs, and no action shall lie against them for such expulsion or suspension.

Due to the signing of House Bill 1616 by the Governor of the State of Illinois, which establishes October 12th as a legal school holiday, the board further approved the extension of the school year to June 12th, 1968. Dr. Short explained that, by law, the school calendar must contain 185 school days.

Dr. Short also stated that 155 teachers and other personnel related to administrative jobs had been employed during the year and that of this number one Doctor's degree, 78 Masters' degrees, and 76 Bachelor degrees were represented.

President E. Hoy McConnell asked for adjournment after calling a special meeting of the Board of Education for Monday evening, Oct. 2, 1967.

Sister Mary Georgia holds the Master's Degree in Science from Catholic University in Washington.

As assistant, Sister Mary Celine Hynes has been appointed. Sister was formerly a member of the English department of the Academy.

She has been replaced by Mrs. John Pokorney, the former Judith Wessil, an alumna of St. Patrick Academy.

A new Drama Department has been begun by Christine Middendorf. Mrs. Middendorf will

also be a member of the English Department.

As an assistant to the Administration, Sister Mary Donatus, R.S.M., has been added to the staff of the Academy. Sister comes from Mary, Seat of Wisdom School in Park Ridge, Illinois. From St. Xavier College, Sister Paula Mary has been added to the English Department.

Praises School District 64 Board

Dear Mr. Besser,

I attended School District #64's board meeting last night, and, believe me, these people have something which I'm not sure I possess.

What a thankless job!

To begin with, I would have to attend meetings for a year or more to begin to understand all the technicalities, but I don't know whether I could tolerate trying to work for a cause I believed in — a good education for all the children in the community — when their own parents aren't concerned enough with their education to read a few facts about what other communities are doing, for example, or even to just maintain a status quo, by OKing a referendum at the polls, which is so desperately needed to avoid overcrowding and it's end-result, And sit on the board "for free" yet — ?

How would my husband and I feel if, after working hard for a long period of time (at a minimum wage for the job) and then hear the boss say, "Sorry, Verne, we have to pay too much taxes, we can't afford a raise for you just now."

Many parents hold teachers entirely responsible for the education of their children, but I know from experience and from what I've read and heard in lectures, that more children than we care to admit, are ill-prepared to enter school in the first place, and improper handling of children in the home causes a mental barrier which makes learning difficult.

I'm not trying to protect or excuse teachers, because I believe that many of them need to sit down and do a little soul searching from time to time, but I do believe that not all problems children have in school can be laid at the school's doorstep.

Many parents feel that if they talk to their friends and neighbors about their child's school problems and maybe discuss them with the teacher once, (sometimes with a result that does not please them) and continue to be irritated about it inwardly, that this is enough. I say this is only the beginning. Parents should take a good, long look at their child and their own ways of guiding this child thru life and stop avoiding "traumatic experiences". These are what build character — education only fortifies them for the good. It brings to mind a quotation I came across recently — "No man can choose what coming hours can bring to him, of need, of joy, of suffering. But what his soul shall bring onto each hour to meet its challenge — this is in his power." (written by Priscilla Leonard)

In some of my own soul searching, one of the many recollections which come to my mind — is my father's saying, "Let him who is blameless, cast the first stone." As I look back, this helped me to love my father and respect him.

People today are so concerned with the almighty dollar that they've lost sight of their own purpose on earth. Instead of weighing the problems with the children and trying to look at them objectively and come to a constructive solution with their mates, they turn off the problems by turning on

the boob-tube and hinder the children's getting their homework done. How can children respect anyone when their parents haven't earned it.

Complacency! How I hate that word. So satisfied with one's self that one can't even read the handwriting on the wall.

God help the children — the future of the world lies in their hands.

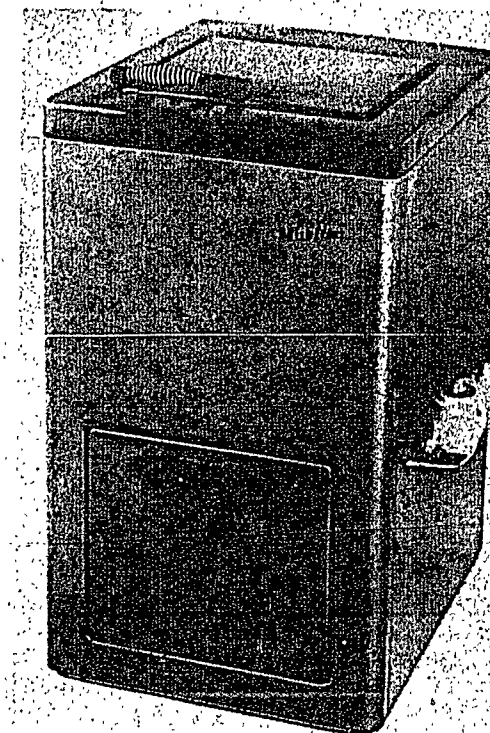
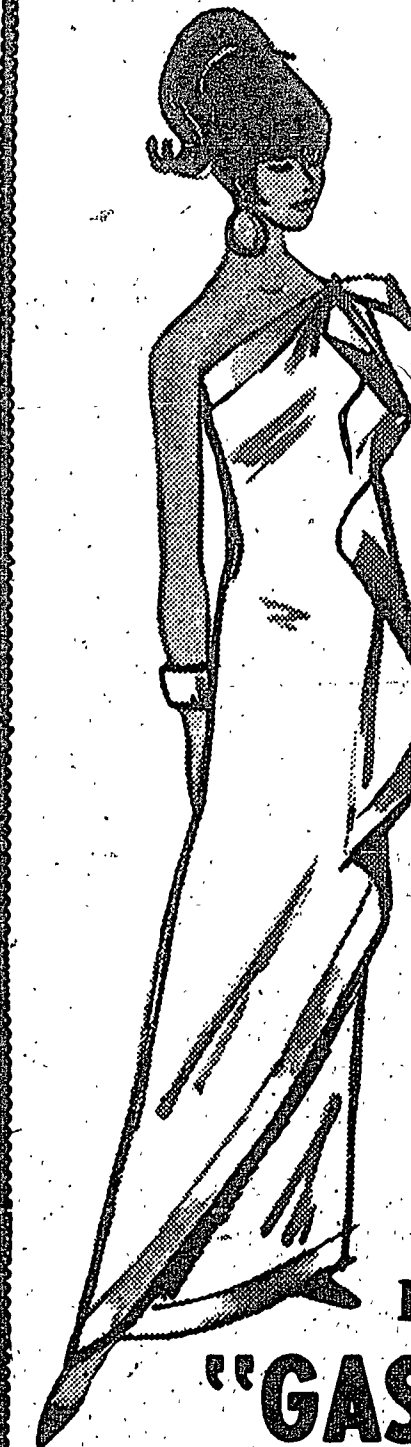

Tarzan Feature At Morton Grove Theatre

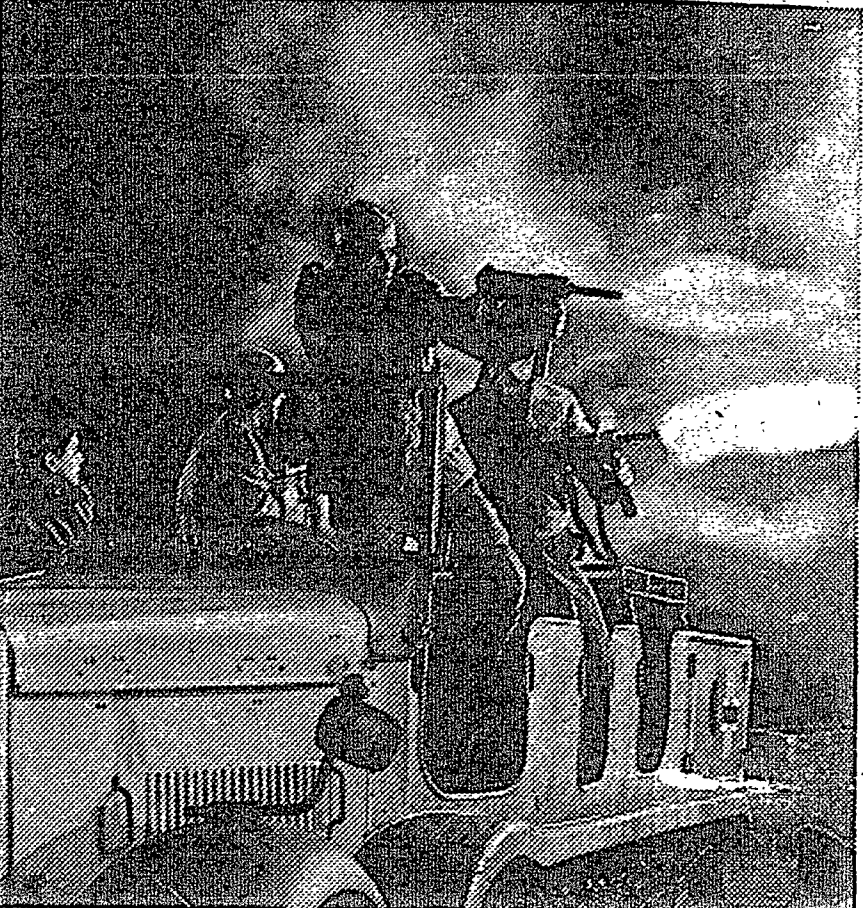

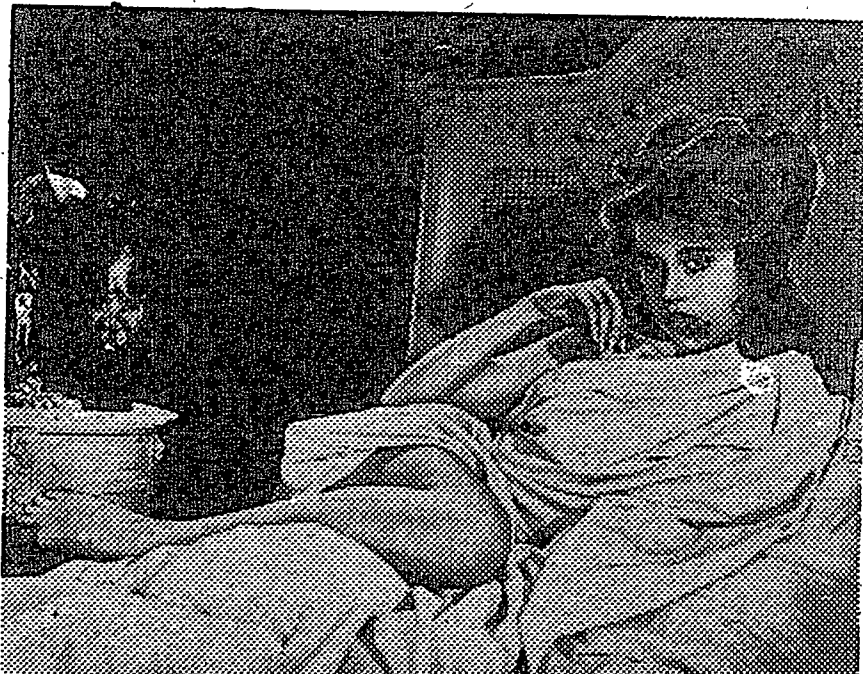

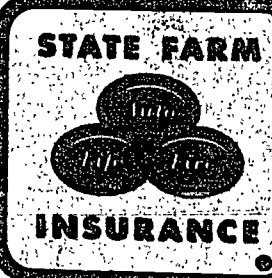

With eight remaining matches and a post-season tournament, coach Bob Dollaske "looks forward to a season of success."

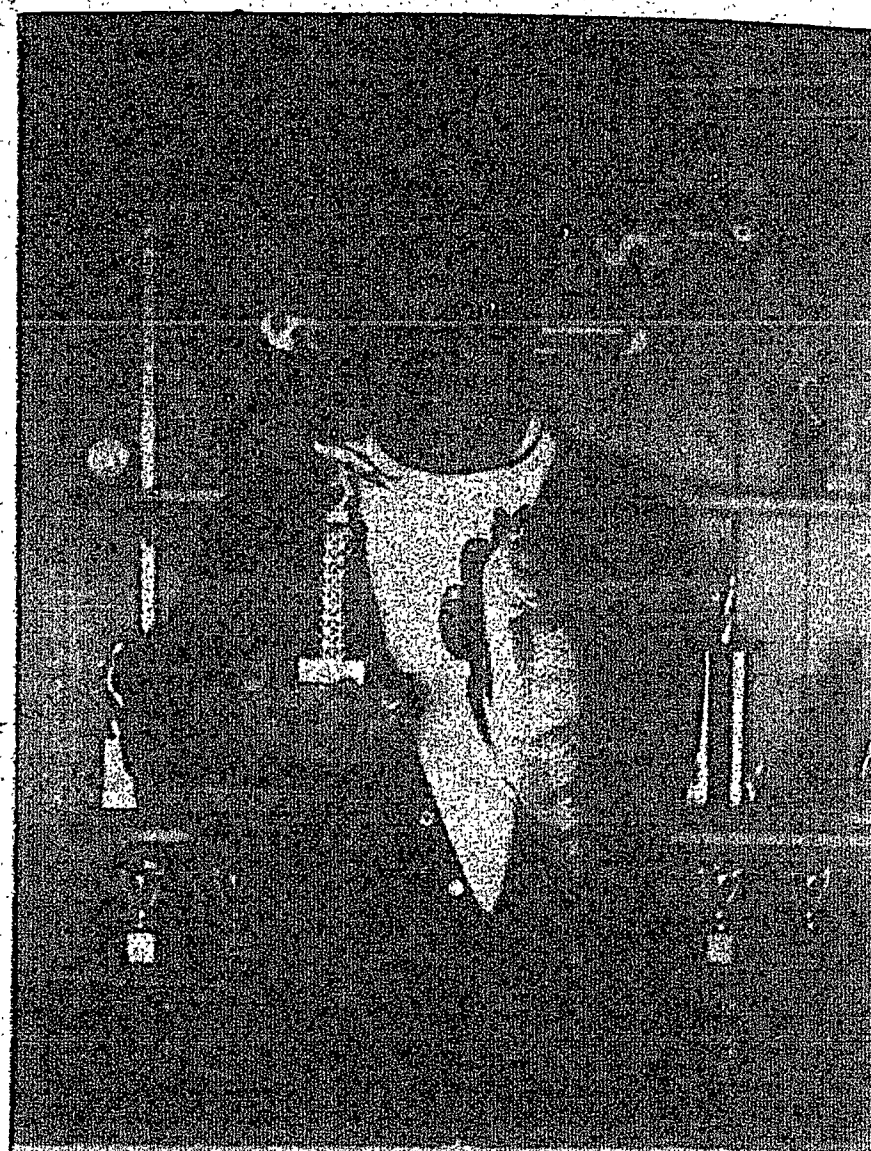
Maine East Varsity Cross Country News

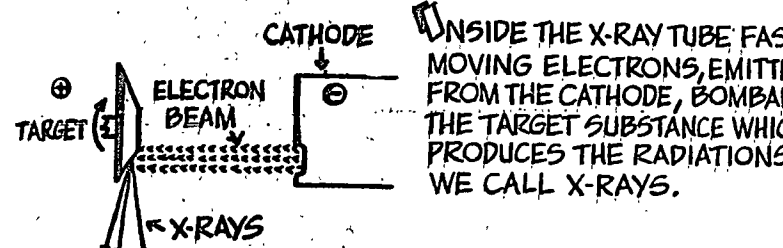
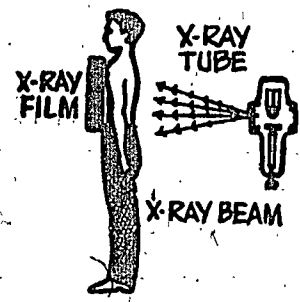

installed without the necessary permits. With all the bugging devices we now read about, a guy doesn't have much of a chance in this beloved land of the free. Somehow spying from up above takes all the sport out of that great American game of trying to out-manuever the government.

Monday night we attended the Maine High Parent-Teacher meeting and heard about the title 3 program which will aid students at the high school, as well as local students in district 63. A 3 year federal grant of \$300,000 annually is being used to create a diagnostic center in Park Ridge which will be staffed by medical people and social scientists who will aid poor learners in the school. A psychiatrist, psychologist, ophthalmologist among many, will be available to aid children who are not living up to their native ability. It's a far-cry from the remedial reading program they had when we were in school, and manifests the educational explosion which is taking place today.

One of our favorites thru the years is the new assistant superintendent in District 63, Frank Dagne. Six years ago Frank was principal at Oak School and more recently was principal at the new Nathanson School, where he instituted non-graded classes.

Monday night Frank let go with some of his marvelous enthusiasm which becomes so infectious, when he reviewed the success of the non-graded program. We could not do justice to the program by giving capsule comment here but Frank pointed out the lack of disciplinary problems he had due to the new system. By allowing a student to move at his own rate the frustration of not being able to keep up with the class was significantly lessened.

Coupling Frank's remarks with those of the head of the new diagnostic center, a revolution in non-grading is likely to come to our areas sooner than can be comprehended. The diagnostic head, a Dr. Tiedler, pictured the misery of the problem child, who is a poor reader (and) or a poor learner. He asked the audience to imagine an adult getting up each morning and knowing for the past 7 years he had failed every day in living up to what is expected of him. After experiencing this failure every day, every week for 7 school years, he then is pushed into the summer school routine, knowing he will meet with the same despair there. Such an utter lack of accomplishment breeds problems which leads to an unruly child, and worse, to an unhappy child.

The diagnostic center and the ungraded school scored heavily with us non-professionals as we heard these educational professionals open the doors to the oncoming educational revolution.

One question brought up by former Nilesite, Dr. Nick Kartinos, questioned why district 64 was not included in the program. Someone in this district is missing the boat if they don't try to become a part of the title 3 program, which seems such an obvious step forward.

Two items deserve mention.

which are indeed local. At last week's park board meeting Niles 3rd recreation director in recent years was placed on the spot, by Mrs. Schreiner, wife of the park commissioner, who is trying to return to the park district to supervise the teens. When she asked why she wasn't returned the commissioners, other than her husband, said it was the decision of the director. Since it was the hiring of commissioners relatives which was partly responsible for the resigning of the two former directors, the Schreiners may as well have it spelled out in black and white so they'll get the message. The decision not to hire relatives is the policy of the park board. It seems it more important the park district be run free from pettiness and disruptiveness rather than one commissioners' relative should work for pay in an area which has already laid away 2 directors.

The teen center in Lawrencewood is a subject which bears interest and study which we'll report on next week. Money has been siphoned off from Niles Days for the project, which has proven less than successful. Why has it failed? How much has gone for the project? Will another year's Niles Days money be used for the center? Since Niles Days money is a contribution of most residents has there been an accounting of the money for the center? Tune-in next week.
